

Committee Asks Road Improvement

Waterloo Road Residents Request Action by County

Paul Pappendorf, Hugh Gaddis, Bert Conway and Sam Markey constitute a committee of Waterloo road and Sugar Loaf Lake taxpayers who have announced that they are working toward getting early action on improvement of Waterloo road from M-92 to the Jackson county line.

Members of the committee claim most of the residents of the area are asking for a blacktop road to overcome the dust nuisance and prevent damage to their cars from the rough condition of the highway extending from M-92 to the Jackson county line.

The committee members, who say they were appointed by taxpayers living along that stretch of Waterloo road to carry their complaint to Lyndon township Supervisor Orson Beeman, consider the difficulty in getting funds for proper care of the road is the result of the large tract of state-owned land in the area on which they claim little or no tax is paid.

The committee claims the traffic load on the road justifies the expenditure for a blacktop road. They quote figures claiming that 4,200 people visited Farband Camp via Waterloo road last year and that 200 people are an average number who go to Cassidy Lake on visiting days.

Automatic Renewal Plan Started for GI Insurance

Four million veterans with GI term insurance in force will no longer have to apply to Veterans Administration for renewal of their policies for another 5-year term before their old policies expire.

VA said it will do this for them automatically if their old policies are not lapsed at the expiration of the term period. This means the policy must be in force at the end of the term period with the final premium having been timely paid.

The new procedure went into effect July 23, 1953, when the President signed Public Law 148. It will save at least \$500,000 a year in administrative costs. The new law covers only those term policies that expire on or after July 23, 1953. VA said it cannot be applied retroactively to term policies which expired before that date.

Approximately 270,000 World War I and World War II term policies are expected to be renewed automatically under the new law during fiscal year 1954.

Although the law also provides automatic renewal for the more recent post-Korea term policies, none of these is scheduled to expire during fiscal year 1954.

Once the automatic renewal is effected, the veteran has a new 5-year term policy on which he must pay the increased premiums timely if he wishes to be covered against death. If he misses any premium payments, he may re-instate the policy at any time before the end of the term period under the usual reinstatement procedures.

Director Rasch realizes that the concept of civil service tends to be controversial but feels much of the criticism stems from misunderstanding.

“Unfair treatment by state employees need not be tolerated by the public,” he insisted. “A citizen has a Constitutional right to file complaints any time he is dissatisfied with a state employee,” he continued. “We at the Commission recommend that complaints be registered with department heads—but if satisfaction is not forthcoming, we are glad to investigate.”

Constant research is carried on at the commission. It covers such subjects as salary levels, test values and new methods of administration.

At present an effort to develop better tests for personality traits is underway. Civil Service figures show that dismissal in 70 per cent of the cases is due to inability of an employee to adjust to the position.

Telephone Rate Case Recessed for Indefinite Period

Lansing—The Michigan Bell Telephone company rate case before the Public Service Commission is in indefinite recess after week-long hearings highlighted by the company's appeal for recognition of its “real costs” of doing business.

Michigan Bell seeks a general rate increase averaging three cents a day per telephone with residence users asked to pay two and one-half cents daily per telephone on the average.

Company witnesses hammered home the contention that regulation should take into account that the dollar of today is worth only half that of pre-inflation times and the effect of this change on costs of doing business.

Clifton W. Phalen, Michigan Bell president, keynoted the company's case with testimony that “the only reason we are here is to make sure we can continue to give good service and meet expanding needs.”

“There can be no other reason. We don't pay bonuses. We don't cut any melons. Our dividend policy has been conservative. We have no reason to ask for excessive earnings.”

Like it or not, the general price level of today is here to stay, Dr. Paul W. McCracken, professor of business conditions at the University of Michigan, testified.


SENIORS WIN 2-0

Donald Proctor Impressed with Friendliness of People

Donald Proctor and the other members of the national championship dairy judging team which went to England to compete in the international contest, arrived at Willow Run airport at 7:35 p.m. Monday, happy to be home again.

Donald said the four-week trip was “a wonderful experience.” One of his outstanding impressions of the trip was the friendliness of the people he met, not only in England, but in Germany and Holland, as well.

A flying visit to Paris was a “little disappointing,” he said. An all-day trip up the Rhine river from Mayence to Cologne was a highlight of the sightseeing trips the team took. He said the double-deck 300-foot boat, named “The Cologne,” was a fine ship and the Rhine scenery with its forests and castles “was a beautiful sight.”

On July 4th, Donald related, the group was touring London as guests of the Shell-Max-Gas Co. and were staying at a country hall just outside the city where a dance was held in their honor. He said about 30 Americans were at the dance and when it became dark, the Americans were asked to step out for a special treat. As they did so, they were surprised with a huge display of fireworks to help them feel at home on their national holiday.

Donald and his companions on the trip missed most the fresh cold milk and good drinking water they are accustomed to at home, but said their food was very good.

His month away from farm work, during which time he washed all his own clothes, has softened his hands so that he is afraid he will blister when he starts back to work again. He called them his “dishpan hands.”

Fire Damages Roof of Zion Parish Hall

Early Discovery of Blaze Averts Serious Damage

Timely discovery of a fire of undetermined origin in the attic of the four-year-old parish hall of Zion Lutheran church at Rogers Corners, prevented what might have been a disastrous blaze early Friday morning.

Passersby on their way to a huckleberry marsh noticed smoke coming from the cupola on the roof and notified Mrs. Loren Koenig across the road who telephoned for help.

Approximately 10 square feet of attic floor and supporting “2x8” beams had burned before the fire was noticed. The fact that the insulated kept the fire from spreading faster. Fire-fighters said, however, that the blaze had reached a point where it could quickly have gotten out of control.

The Chelsea Fire department received the call shortly before 7:30 a.m. Neighboring farmers and church members had already reached the scene and were extinguishing the blaze by the time the Chelsea equipment arrived a few minutes later.

The entrance hall ceiling and the ceiling in an office to the left of the entrance were water-soaked and plaster will have to be replaced.

The church's annual ice cream social had been held on the grounds of the parish hall the evening before.

Members of the church were in the building until after midnight replacing chairs and other equipment used at the social and everything was apparently in good order at that time.



Tour Will Show

Ways To Beat

Cost-Price Squeeze

"Many Washtenaw County farmers are being hurt by falling farm prices," is the word received from Donald R. Johnson, county agricultural agent. Farmers are finding that while prices of things they have to sell are going down, prices of things they buy aren't giving much. As a result, profits suffer all around, but some farmers are hurt worse than others. Three farms which have shown a profit in good times and bad will be visited on the fifth annual State Farm Management tour. The state-wide tour will be held in Saginaw county on Aug. 6. Farms to be visited will be typical family farms, and ideas presented will be applicable over a wide area of Michigan.

Loren Black, Saginaw county agricultural agent, is general chairman of the tour. In announcing the tour Black said, "I feel that the tour will be a real opportunity for farm folks because we all know that efficient management of the farm business is becoming increasingly important every day."

Since drainage will make more efficient production possible on many Michigan farms, the tour will start with a tilling demonstration at the John and Fred Sahr farms, seven miles east of Saginaw, on M-81. The Sahrs are beating the cost-price squeeze by keeping machinery cost low through joint ownership. They get high yields of beans, wheat and corn through the liberal use of fertilizer and green manure.

Henry Hetzner and sons, second stop on the tour, have managed to keep in the black by making rapid changes in their farm business to take advantage of new developments. They operate a 176-acre dairy farm which supports three families. Examples of recent changes on their farm are the bulk handling of milk, pen-type barn and making parties new drying of hay, and bulk handling of fertilizer.

The brief noon program will carry out the tour theme with a discussion of "Maintaining Farm Profits in This Cost-Price Squeeze." The speaker will be Arthur Mauch, MSC farm economist, who is nationally known for his work in agricultural policy.

Warner Law, last stop on the tour, is easing the pressure on profits by shifting his farming set-up so as to use less hired labor. He has a 390-acre farm on which beef cattle and cash crops are the main enterprises.

Seeding and spraying crops by airplane, a new and practical method, will be demonstrated as the final attraction at the Law farm.

The tour is sponsored by Saginaw county farmers, cooperating firms and agencies and by the Agricultural Economics department, MSC. Both farm and city folks from all over the state are expected to attend.

Highlights of the tour will be a milk tank truck making a pick-up from a bulk tank on the farm, an aerial seeding and spraying demonstration, and drainage equipment in action. Theme of the tour will be "Beating This Cost-Price Squeeze." Three farmers will tell their own success stories. They have the kind of farms that farmers like to visit.

Thursday morning, Aug. 6, three Chelsea-area boys will participate in elimination contests in junior dairy judging at the annual Blue and White Show at the Milan Fair. The three, Dean Fowler, Lloyd Grau and David Wolfgang, were among the top seven in the county 4-H judging contests and Thursday's contest will be an attempt to select the top five to enter the state 4-H competition next month.

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
