

Improvement of Waterloo Road Sought

Call Open Meeting of Area Residents for Friday Evening

Orson Beaman, Lyndon township supervisor, has called a meeting of residents of the township to be held at Lyndon Town Hall, corner of M-92 and North Territorial road, Friday, Aug. 7, at 8:30 p.m.

The affair is to be an open meeting and Supervisor Beaman said he hoped that everyone interested will attend.

Beaman said yesterday, "I have called this meeting because of repeated complaints from residents of my township who use Waterloo road going to and from their places of employment or for business purposes."

"Drivers have complained about excessive damage to their cars due to the rough condition of the surface of Waterloo road," stated Beaman, "and property owners are complaining of the dust which is constantly drifting into their homes."

"I have invited members of the Washtenaw county Road Commission and members of the Lyndon Township Board to attend this meeting so that, together, we can work out a plan to improve conditions on the Waterloo road at the earliest possible date," Beaman concluded.

Howard G. Minier, Washtenaw county Road Commission manager, contacted at his office yesterday, said he planned to be present at Friday's meeting and will talk on the subject of road finance and the over-all county road construction program.

Police Department Will Crack Down on Speed Violators

Chelsea Police Chief George Doe today announced that the local police department has adopted a firmer policy of enforcing the speed laws. This action is being taken at the official request of the Michigan Press Association, which has been urging the police to combat the rising traffic toll in Michigan.

The 1953 first five months' increases in Michigan are terrifying, the Chief said, pointing to accidents increasing 12 per cent, injuries up 21 per cent and deaths up 13 per cent, according to State Police records.

"To battle this traffic disaster the department will apply a carefully thought-out and aggressive attack," the Chief continued. "I have instructed our officers to increase their vigilance for speeders. Motorists exceeding the speed limit may be expected to be stopped by a police officer, even if they are only going five miles over the speed limit," he added.

"Five miles over the speed limit may not seem like much," the Chief pointed out, "but such illegal practice far too often launches a case of traffic violations which leads to more and more severe violations. As a matter of fact," the Chief stated, "a motorist should appreciate being stopped for going five miles over the speed limit, if it serves as a forceful reminder and prevents a more serious violation later which might cause a serious accident, perhaps the same motorist."

"The second prong of the department's attack to save lives will be the policy of charging more motorists with the more serious charge of reckless driving instead of speeding in cases where the speeder endangered the lives of other people or property while committing the violation," the Chief explained. "This will result in a higher fine and a more serious black mark against the driver's license," he added.

"The third prong of the department's plan to cut accidents calls for the more intensive investigation of traffic accidents and the placing of charges against one or both drivers for any violations which were committed that caused the accident or contributed to it," the Chief continued.

"Police officers stop motorists for violations at a time when there is no accident in order to prevent a repetition of the violations at a later date when someone or later they are certain to cause an accident," the Chief explained. "The justification for charging a motorist for a violation at a time when no accident is caused or contributed to is actually far greater," the Chief added.

In conclusion Chief Doe called upon all law-abiding citizens of the area to give their full support to the traffic accident prevention activities of their police department. "I am sure," the Chief said, "that the great majority of our motorists who obey the traffic laws will be heartily in favor of this plan to crack down on the relatively small per cent of motorists who are the violators who are causing the accidents."

Farmer Vote Set on Wheat Market Quota

Wheat growers all over the U.S. will go to polling places in their own communities Aug. 14 to vote on the question of a continuation of the wheat marketing quota on the 1954 crop. If the marketing quota is to be continued the proposal must carry by a two-thirds majority.

Voting will take place from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. at the various polling places listed below.

Rules and regulations regarding eligibility to vote are headed as follows: "Any person who is engaged in the production of wheat or harvest as grain in 1954 on a farm on which the acreage to be planted to wheat for harvest in 1954 is in excess of 15 acres and who is entitled to share in the proceeds of the 1954 wheat crop as owner, landlord (other than landlord of a standing rent, cash rent, or fixed rent tenant), tenant, or sharecropper, shall be eligible to vote."

County Will Receive Motor Vehicle Funds

Washtenaw county's share of the state motor vehicle fund is to be \$172,664, according to information released this week by Howard G. Minier, Washtenaw county Road Commission manager.

Official notification had not yet reached Minier but if the amount is confirmed, he said, it will be approximately 10 per cent more than last year.

Minier hastened to explain, however, that the 10 per cent increase will just about cover the general increase in costs.

The \$172,664 represents the second quarterly payment.

Repair Work on Village Streets Is Completed

Street work in Chelsea by the T. P. Flynn company of Detroit, was completed last week. A list of the work done here includes the following:

Devery street from North Main to McKinley; two-inch asphalt coat. Chandler street from the intersection of Summit and Grant streets to Wilkinson street; two-inch asphalt coat.

Jackson street from East to McKinley; Jefferson street, from East to Madison; and Lincoln street from Grant to Taylor; former pavement torn up, re-mixed and double sealed.

Lincoln street from Taylor to Sixth Main; single seal-coated.

Washington street from Fraser road to the west end of the Chelsea Agricultural Schools property; double seal-coated.

In addition, the approach to the cemetery from the gate at Madison street to the inner gate, was blacktopped, making a great improvement. Cost of the 15-foot strip of blacktopping, together with removal of old trees and other improvement, involving nearly \$2,000, will be paid for jointly by the village and Mt. Olivet and Oak Grove cemetery associations. The two cemetery associations will each pay one quarter of the cost and the village the remaining half.

The street committee of the Village Council, under whose direction the street work has been done, includes Edward and Carline Walter Gage and Claude Spiegelberg.

Howard road, in the northern part of the village, is being improved by the construction of curbing and will be gravelled when curbing is completed.

Load Restrictions Placed on New Blacktop Surface

Weather permitting, blacktopping of Chelsea-Manchester road, from US-12 to Grass Lake road, was to be completed Tuesday.

During the blacktopping operation the Washtenaw county Road Commission had imposed weight restrictions of 12,000 pounds per axle on truck traffic to prevent possible damage to the newly constructed highway.

Howard G. Minier, county Road Commission manager, said the road was designed for normal traffic and could not be expected to stand up under excessively overweight truck traffic. For that reason, he said, watchful care is being exercised to prevent damage.

Minier said also, that Washtenaw county road officials are studying the possibility of retaining some protection of all blacktop roads to prevent costly damage and to keep the roads in top condition for the traffic for which they are intended and for which they were designed.

to build it "on the corner, east of the old school."

The minutes also stated "said schoolhouse shall be painted with two coats of red paint trimmed with white," and that the building was to be finished by Oct. 1942. The school has been the Red School ever since.

A March, 1943, meeting was held for the purpose of getting "an expression on the outrageous conduct of the mob that destroyed the schoolhouse." Vandalism had torn down the school, presumably because they did not wish to be required to attend classes.

June 3, 1943, the re-built schoolhouse was accepted by the school directors who at the same time agreed to pay the builder, Jonas Twitcheil, \$112.50.

The present building was built in 1877 after the second schoolhouse had been destroyed by fire in February of that year. The 22x30-foot building was constructed at a cost of \$500.
