
MAKE A VALANCE BOARD



Attractive, easy-to-construct valance boards hide unsightly curtain rods.

The window width (including woodwork) is the inside that may be fastened to the woodwork with screws. If (a) not used, hardware brackets are necessary. Plece (b), 2 inches wide braces against the woodwork. Piece (c) may be covered with moulding (d), or otherwise decorated, on the natural grain may be displayed. Buraight lines may be broken (Fig. 4), or nailed or glued designs made from stock moulding (Fig. 2).

The board shown at the left has a moulding strip at the top. Plain boards may be covered with cloth to match or contrast with the curtain or drape ma-
