Kiwanis Club Hosts Division Clubs Monday

Representatives of 12 Clubs Attend Instruction Meeting

The Kiwanis Sixth Division organizational conference, designed to advise officers-elect for 1954 on the duties of their jobs was held here Monday, preceding the regular Kiwanis club meeting in the social center of the Methodist church. The session began at four o'clock in the afternoon.

Alfred Mayer, lieutenant-governor of Division VI, was introduced to the group by the present lieutenant-governor, Harold Coolman.

Twelve clubs were represented in the roll call by Mayer, showing a total of 60 people at the conference.

Past Lieutenant-Governor James J. O'Kane, of the Ann Arbor club, told the presidents group how to prepare for their office and Leo Kulawa, a past president of the Brighton club, advised the vice-presidents-elect.

The secretaries-elect were coached by Theodore S. Weber, former Chelsea resident and a past secretary of the Ypsilanti Kiwanis club, while duties of boards of directors and treasurers were outlined by Lieutenant-Governor Coolman.

A question and answer period, immediately preceding the recess for dinner, was led by Frank Stalger, district secretary-treasurer.

Anton Nielsen, president of the Chelsea club, welcomed the guests at the opening of the afternoon program and conducted a roll call of clubs and members present.

Stalger was the principal speaker of the evening stressing the 1954 Kiwanis International objectives and the theme for the year, "Build By Faith, Loyalty and Service."

He went on to elaborate on nine objectives for 1954, all of which were planned for the purpose of creating better communities by strengthening homes, churches and schools.

Group singing at the after-dinner program was led by Past Lieutenant-Governor John Hoey, of the Dexter club, with Mrs. P. F. Niehaus as piano accompanist.

Other features of the program were cornet solos by Robert Palmer and saxophone solos by Bernard Miller, accompanied by Lynda Mayer and directed by Eugene Shroyer; a talk by Alfred Mayer on Michigan District objectives for 1954; and a report of the condition of clubs in Division VI at the close of 1953, by Harold Coolman.

Guests at the meeting included Dr. Frank Swartz and Charles Hill, of the Methodist Home. Dr. Swartz was a Kiwanis since 1923 at Port Huron, home club of District Secretary-Treasurer Stalger.

Hill is a charter member of the Lapeer Kiwanis club.

Announcement was made of the Division VI mid-winter meeting to be held in Kalamazoo, Jan. 10 and 11.

A meeting of Chelsea Kiwanis club officers for 1954 was held at the home of Don Albert following adjournment of the regular meeting and committees and chairman for the year were selected.

Preliminary Plans Approved for New Elementary School

Final preliminary plans for the new elementary school were approved at the meeting of the Board of Educational Schools on Nov. 25.

Architects are now engaged in preparing what they call "working drawings" for the construction of the building.

Dec. 16 has been set as the date for opening bids on the bonds and it is expected that bids on the new school will be advertised for and opened the latter part of January.

The Chelsea district has borrowed \$25,000 against state aid appropriations (it is entitled to but which do not begin to come in until the end of January). The money will tide the district over until the state aid money comes through and local taxes begin to come in.

In an effort to expedite the receipt of the needed tax monies, local industries have been contacted by letter, requesting them to pay their taxes as soon as possible.

Farm Guild National Meet Is Held Here

Julian Lemon of Reynolds, Ind., president of the National Farmers' Guild, Inc., presided at the national convention sessions held in the Knights of Columbus hall here Tuesday and Wednesday.

Included in Tuesday's sessions were talks by Frank Minges of Cleveland, Ohio, president of the Ohio Guild; Sam Bolinger of Kansasville, Ind., president of the Indiana Guild; and Harry S. Atchinson of Salem, president of the Michigan Guild.

Entertainment at Tuesday afternoon meeting was piano and solo-voice duets played by James Versailles and his sister, Mrs. William Collins. Versailles played the solo-voice, an electrical attachment for piano.

Tuesday evening, entertainment was furnished under the direction of Paul F. Niehaus.

This included songs by Carol Ann Mayer, accompanied on the piano by her mother, Mrs. Carl Mayer; accordion duets by Olive Ann Reddeman and Marlene Kuhl; vibraphone selections by Joe Stanley; and vocal numbers by Paul Niehaus, with the accompaniment of the vibraphone.

The principal speaker Tuesday evening was President Lemon.

Quoting population figures of the past 12 years, Lemon said it is estimated the population of the United States will be 175 million by 1960, an increase of 34 million over the 1940 figure. Because of the increasing population, he said, the nation must have to expand its agricultural program designed to increase production. Present conditions, he pointed out, seem to indicate that for every acre of new land brought into production, some by high-priced reclamation, an acre of productive land will be lost through the normal expansion of urban centers.

He said the building of dams and reservoirs.

A program of agricultural expansion is further hindered, he claims, by the drop in the price of farm products, mentioning specifically the 31 per cent drop in the price of prime steers from Jan. 1, 1952, to March 30, 1953, and the same active drop in the price of all other grades of cattle.

He stated, "some of the things that helped to ruin the cattle market were caused by government action. It did not help the cattle market... when the powers that were let 60 million pounds of New Zealand beef come into this country."

Cost of production plus a reasonable profit means the same to the farmer as to the manufacturer, he said. The "reasonable profit" makes the difference between success and failure to both.

According to the speaker the farmer has too little voice in the matter of prices he is to receive.

Preliminary Study of Community Chest Plan Is Started

N. J. Prakkien, president of the Ann Arbor Community Chest, and Mrs. Cecelia Craig, Ann Arbor Community Chest executive secretary, were present at the noon luncheon meeting sponsored by the Women's Club of Chelsea and held Tuesday in the Congregational church dining room as one of the first steps in the club's promotion of plans for possible formation of a Community Chest program here.

Prakkien and Mrs. Craig gave brief outlines of Community Chest operations in Ann Arbor and answered questions asked by the invited representatives of the community present. These included persons from factories, businesses, Chelsea Agricultural Schools Board of Education, Child Study club, Chamber of Commerce and the Kiwanis club.

Prakkien explained that Ann Arbor's Community Chest has been in operation for 33 years and is considered successful in its consolidation of local drives for funds there. Red Cross, Cancer and Polio funds, however, are not included in the Chest program in Ann Arbor, he said.

Mrs. Craig explained the procedure for forming a Community Chest project and advised keeping the organization as simple as possible at the outset, in the event the program is started here. She suggested only two committees to begin with, naming them as a budget and a campaign committee.

Comments of business and professional representatives present indicated that there is a general desire to institute a Community Chest program here providing such a program could be incorporated to consolidate "all fund drives into one."

Because of Prakkien's and Mrs. Craig's explanations regarding the non-inclusion of Red Cross, Cancer and Polio drives in the Ann Arbor program, it was suggested that a fact-finding committee be named from among the group present and another meeting held Jan. 19. Reports of the fact-finding committee, to be submitted at that meeting, would be a guide to further action, it was explained.

Plant chairman of all local factories should be invited to attend the Jan. 19 meeting, it was agreed.

Harold Jones, who acted as temporary chairman at Tuesday's meeting at the request of Mrs. Prakkien, will be the chair.

Chelsea will again have a Christmas home lighting contest this year, sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce and open to all residents of the community.

Announcement of the contest was made this week by David Strieter, chairman of the project.

The lighting contest was put on here for the first time last year with 12 entries participating. Interest in the contest was evidenced by the large number of people who drove around town to see the displays before and after the judging took place.

It is stressed that no great expense need be involved in entering the contest as one of the principal qualifications considered in the judging is simplicity and originality.

Outdoor lighting only will be considered in judging the entries, although inside lighting visible from the street will be included in conjunction with the outside arrangement.

Rules state that the lighting entries should be in operation from Dec. 18 through Jan. 1, with judging by impartial persons to take place at 8:00 p.m., Dec. 22.

Prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 will again be offered for first, second and third place winners, according to the committee in charge.

First Methodist Church To Mark Centennial Anniversary Sunday

The Centennial celebration at the First Methodist church Sunday will be highlighted by dedication of a new chancel and furnishings which include a number of memorial gifts.

Among the memorials are two candle lighters given in memory of Alvin H. Umstead by Mrs. Umstead; a pulpit scarf by Mr. and Mrs. James Gaunt in memory of the former's brother, Edwin Ives Gaunt; and a lectern scarf presented by Mr. S. Lula Bahnmiller in memory of her husband, Theo. H. Bahnmiller.

The new altar is a memorial to Virginia, Clairice Ann, Gerald and Linda Smith, children of Mr. and Mrs. Clair W. Smith, who lost their lives in an automobile accident. Methodist Church Friends are listed as donors of the altar.

Mrs. A. A. Palmer has provided the altar cross, vases and candlesticks to honor the memory of her parents, William and Lois Congdon Bacon and Dr. L. A. Palmer and his brother, Leigh Palmer, presented the new pulpit in honor of their parents, the late Dr. and Mrs. G. W. Palmer.

A memorial book and missal stand were the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Pearson in memory of their daughter, Alice Carita, and the altar Bible was given by Mrs. Mary Clark and Dean Clark as a memorial to Orson D. Clark.

Many other gifts were contributed to the chancel fund and these are listed in the "Book of Remembrance."

Contributions covered the cost and installation (approximately \$7,000) of the new reredos, choir pews and screens, Communion rail, lectern and parapet rails which transform the entire front of the sanctuary.

Members of the Methodist Home gave a gift toward the purchase of the new reredos curtain behind the altar and savings of the four Smith children were contributed and used to purchase a large reproduction of Sallman's "Gleaners of Christ." The picture will be used in the Sunday School department where the children were enrolled.

The Centennial sermon at the morning service will be delivered by Dr. Otto Nall, editor of "The Christian Advocate."

Dr. Frank L. Fitch, Ann Arbor District superintendent, will be present to take part in the service. Special music by a 40-voice junior choir directed by Mrs. S. D. Kinder and an offertory solo by Jay Thompson, of Ann Arbor, will be the musical features of the morning service which will begin at 10 o'clock.

An informal Homecoming service is to be held at 3 o'clock in the afternoon following a dinner for the church families and friends. The dinner, a planned pot-luck meal, will be served at 12 o'clock noon. Those who attend will bring their own table service, and rolls

and will also bring dishes of food to pass at the table.

Former pastors have been invited to be present and speak informally and a program of music, group singing and outlines of church history has been arranged.

The Chelsea Methodist church was founded in 1852 by Rev. B. A. Hedger, who was pastor of what was then the Lima Center Methodist church. Rev. Ebenezer Steel was the first assigned pastor and the Chelsea church became a part of his "Lima Circuit." In 1854 and 1855 this circuit included Lima, East Lima, Sylvan Center, Rogers Corners and a community known as Irving, in addition to Chelsea.

The Sunday school was organized in 1854 with Silas Sargent as its first superintendent.

The first church building, erected in 1859 on the present site which was donated by Elisha Congdon, was destroyed by fire Jan. 8, 1899.

Elisha Congdon, one of the founders of Chelsea, also donated the site for the parsonage.

The present church was begun the same year and was dedicated Feb. 25, 1900.

Before the first church was erected services were held in an old brick school house that in those days was located on South street, just west of Main street.

Rev. B. I. Ives, who had dedicated the first church, also dedicated the present church when it was completed.

The pipe organ, dedicated in 1901 and rebuilt in 1936, is a memorial to Lillie D. Wood.

Farmers donated stone and many seams were used to haul materials. The key stones over the windows were all cut from one rock taken from the Tom Searns farm at the rear of the Chelsea Cemetery.

Present membership of the church is 447. Of these, Mrs. Florence Howlett has been a member since 1885, when Rev. J. A. McHewitt was the pastor.

Actual cost of the church was only \$16,000 but today it is valued at \$150,000.

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People active in the raising of funds for the present church included Mr. and Mrs. Frank P. Glazier, Dr. and Mrs. George Palmer, Mr. and Mrs. John Schenk, Mr. and Mrs. Orrin Burkhardt, Mr. and Mrs. William Bacon and others prominent in the life of the community for many years.

A newspaper account of the dedication of the church said, "the success of the M. E. Society of Chelsea in erecting this new edifice has been most remarkable. The church is undoubtedly the finest, for its cost, in southern Michigan. It is built entirely of field stone, with broad unbroken front, constructed somewhat on the plan of an old Scotch church, low, with crows stepped gables. The entrances are at the sides, and at the right a square tower with battlements rises some sixty feet. The auditorium and chapel of the church are finished in quarter sawed oak, the Pastor's study in curly birch, and the Choir room in bird's eye maple."

Friends of Library Given Report on Building-Site Fund

At the semi-annual meeting of the Friends of the Library in the Chelsea Public Library rooms in the Municipal Building Monday evening, a gratifying report of the Library Building and Site fund was the highlight of the evening, according to Harold A. Jones, president of the group.

The report shows a total of \$2,300 in government bonds and approximately \$350 in cash, all of which is reserved for the special fund started two years ago with a contribution from the Woman's Club of Chelsea.

The report given Monday stated that the Woman's Club, to date, has raised \$1,100 in bonds and cash; the Library Board, itself, has set aside \$500 in bonds; and the Friends of the Library group has accumulated \$800 for the fund.

Mrs. Warren Daniels, representative of the Woman's Club, and Thomas Holmes, secretary-treasurer of the Friends of the Library, read the financial reports regarding Building and Site fund.

Jones said after the meeting that the community is to be commended for its voluntary support of the program. With no pressure brought to bear on anyone, the amount accumulated at this time averages \$100 per month since the fund was originated.

As Chelsea grows and present library facilities become inadequate, Jones said, the nucleus for a building fund, will help greatly when expansion is necessary.

Several Chelsea industries, clubs and individuals have included annual contributions to the Building and Site Fund in their budgets.

Mrs. E. W. Eaton, as a representative of the Library Board, reported on the cooperation of the school library and the Public Library, saying that books have been made available to the school through a loan program as well as through planning hours when the library can best serve the students.

Because of present school bus schedules, she said, many pupils can use the Public Library only during the two noon hours each week that it is open. Some other arrangement is being sought to remedy the situation, Mrs. Eaton said.

With Bush and Bob White setting the pace, Chelsea scored 17 points in the third quarter, while Manchester was scoring 8, to make the score, Chelsea 47, Manchester 18.

In the final quarter, with the Chelsea reserves playing most of the period, the Dutchmen outscored the Bulldogs 12 to 9.

High-point men for Chelsea were Buehler with 28 points, and Bob White with 10. High-point man for Manchester was Stan Buss with nine points.

The "B" team score was 35 to 29 in favor of Chelsea. Leading scorers for Chelsea were Fred Elkin, 10 points, and Charles Adkins, with ten, nine and eight points, respectively.

In the second game of the young basketball season, Chelsea's Bulldogs set a new gymnasium and school record in defeating Dexter, one of their old rivals, by a score of 90 to 50.

Phenomenal shooting by a trio of Chelsea juniors, Neil Buehler, Bob White and Bruce Hoffman, gave the Bulldogs an 18 to nine lead at the quarter. With Dave Elkin and Phil Bareis contributing scores in the second quarter, Chelsea increased its lead to make the halftime score read Chelsea 43, Dexter 25.

Chelsea continued its terrific pace by scoring 27 points in the third quarter to Dexter's 18, to make the score 70-43. In the final quarter Coach John Magiera played reserves for the first four and one-half minutes. The regulars returned with three and one-half minutes to play with the scoreboard reading 75 to 53 in favor of Chelsea. In the final three and one-half minutes the Bulldogs hit for 15 points and the old record of 87 points, set last year, was broken.

High-point men for Chelsea were Bob White, 32 points, Neil Buehler, 23 points, Bruce Hoffman, 15 points, Dave Elkin, six points, and Phil Bareis, five points. For Dexter Dan Nuttle scored 24 points and Bob Long 17 points.

In the three games played, Coach John Magiera says that he is pleased with the offense, but that the defensive play and rebounding game must show more improvement if the Bulldogs are to be contenders for the title in the strong Huron League this year.

In the reserve game the Bulldogs scored their second straight victory of the season by defeating the Little Dreadnaughts, 37 to 30. Donald Mahar, with 15 points, high-point man for Chelsea, Bill Wentzel scored 11 for Dexter.

Postmaster Urges Early Mailing for Christmas Cards

Postmaster Carl Mayer announced this week that for the convenience of its patrons during the Christmas mailing rush, the Chelsea postoffice will remain open until 5 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 12, and Saturday, Dec. 13.

He suggests early mailing of cards and packages, and also recommends purchase of postage stamps in advance of the rush period.

Regarding postage on Christmas cards, Postmaster Mayer said that greeting cards sent as first-class mail, obtain many advantages; they may be mailed and certain written messages; they are dispatched and delivered first; forwarded, if necessary, without additional charge, and, if undeliverable, returned at no further expense to the mailer, provided the sender's return address is shown on the envelope.

Unsealed Christmas greetings sent as third-class mail without unauthorized writing enclosed, may be mailed with two cents postage.

Further instructions to expedite the mailing of cards, letters and packages advise the following:

Address all matter plainly and completely in ink; give street address and rural route number whenever possible.

Pack articles carefully in strong, durable containers. Wrap and tie articles securely, but do not seal them unless they are endorsed: "Contents Merchandise; May Be Opened for Postal Inspection if Necessary," together with the name and address of sender. Sealed parcels not so endorsed or labeled are subject to first-class postage rates. Parcels may be marked "Do Not Open Until Christmas," this being permitted in order to encourage early mailing.

for his products. He asked, "What other kinds of business can exist where the costs and selling prices are fixed by someone else and their production determined by the good Lord?"

Inequality between farm and non-farm per capita income (\$954 and \$1,827, respectively, as taken from the Bureau of Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture 1952 yearly report) is another factor endangering needed agricultural expansion, he said. Since 1947, according to figures quoted, farm income dropped 23 per cent while retail food prices increased 38 1/2 per cent and he asked "Can

anybody in his right mind believe that the nation has an adequate farm program?"

Safety Campaign Aimed at Reducing Drunk Driving

Chief George W. Doe today announced that the police department of Chelsea is cooperating with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission and the State Safety Commission on the December statewide emphasis program aimed at reducing accidents due to drunk driving.

According to Chief Doe the drunk driver is one of the worst menaces to traffic safety. Not only does he cause many accidents and injure and kill numerous people, but his intoxicated condition places him beyond any public sympathy. The legislature felt so strongly about the motorist who gets drunk and drives that it passed a law providing for a mandatory suspension of the driver's license for 90 days. Many judges believe the crime of drunk driving so serious that they impose jail sentences.

To acquaint the public with this program 15,000 posters and 500,000 table tents will be used. The posters read, "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail," and the table tents read, "If you are driving take it easy—don't lose your driver's license." The seriousness of the drunk driving problem is shown by the following figures from the National Safety Council:

In 25 out of 100 fatal accidents a driver or a pedestrian had been drinking.

Among drivers involved in fatal accidents for whom condition was reported 18 out of 100 had been drinking.

Among adult pedestrians involved in fatal accidents, 26 out of 100 had been drinking.

In conclusion Chief Doe called upon all motorists to cooperate on the December traffic safety program. "As the holiday season approaches it is a good time to remember that driving an automobile safely requires the best mental and physical resources of the driver. A motorist who is befuddled from drinking hasn't a chance in a traffic accident nor do other motorists an pedestrians in his path," the chief stated.
