### Safety Campaign Aimed at Reducing

**Drunk Driving** Chief George W. Doe today announced that the police department of Chelsea is cooperating with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission and the State Safety Commission on the December state wide emphasis program aimed at reducing accidents due to drunk

According to Chief Doe the drunk driver is one of the worst menaces to traffic safety. Not only does he cause many accidents and injure and kill numer-ous people, but his intoxicated condition places him beyond any public sympathy. The legislature felt so strongly about the motorist who gets drunk and drives that it passed a law providing for a mandatory suspension of the driver's license for 90 days. Many judges believe the crime of drunk driving so serious that they im-

pose jail sentences.

To acquaint the public with this program 15,000 posters and 800,000 table tents will be used. The posters read, "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail," and the table tents read, "If you are driving take it easydon't lose your driver's license. The seriousness of the drunk driving problem is shown by the following figures from the National Safety Council:
