Michigan MIRROR State-Wide Tid Bits

Michigan's patent prison problem remain unresolved after the legislature returns in January.

This question disturbs many people interested in the welfare of the state in general and penal problems in particular.

Recent statements by Adrian DeBoom (R-Owosso), forshadow a large group of lawmakers, the taken-for-granted nature of a new prison can turn into a first class row causing serious delay.

DeBoom announced recently that he planned to ask for a special legislative committee to study the whole problem of penal institutions at the expense of post-pending construction until another year.

He criticized the new organized corrections commission, embracing the advice of "out-of-state experts."

Object of this attack is considered to be Austin MacCormick, nationally recognized prison authority who was executive director of a non-partisan special committee appointed by the governor to study the startling Jackson riots.

MacCormick is also the author of an article in the December Reader's Digest. In it he holds up Michigan's prison system as a horrible example. Millions of Digest subscribers read his description of how Jackson prisoners with no activity to divert their time were jammed together in crowded cells.

Serving with him on the committee when he investigated Michigan's riots were several well-known state citizens. His chairman was Prentiss M. Brown.

A complete report was filed in February last year based on the April, 1953, riots. Most emphatic of its recommendations was that overcrowding must be reduced. It proposed to cost about \$14 million which would facilitate "sorting out" of prisoners, particularly psychiatric criminals.

The legislature, with more discussion about the location of the new building than about the cost, appropriated \$75,000 to lay plans. DeBoom was present for this legislation but did not vote upon the issue.

They appropriated nearly half a million dollars to remodel Jackson for state prisoners was also created. This hall began operating Oct. 2. All its members were appointed by Gov. Williams, DeBoom charges that the commission held a "secret" session in Detroit with MacCormick a few days before publicly endorsing the \$14 million plan for the new building.

Commission members are said to occupy a very weak position, but action since none have been confirmed by the senate and the "secret meetings" in Detroit leaves them open to criticism.

Now comes a request from DeBoom for more time to study the prison situation. He suggests that another solution might be better. Perhaps a 600-man institution for an estimated \$75 million maybe two of them in different portions of the state.

Best argument is that "out-of-state" experts were wrong during the time when they recommended that Jackson prison be built. Its gigantic size is now considered by other "experts" to make it an administrative impossibility. DeBoom is said to favor more probationary camps.

Economic facts of legislative bills cannot be overlooked. Fourteen million dollars is a large sum of money. The state financial situation is a chief concern of many lawmakers.

Much of Michigan's income is derived from taxes which shrink when business drops. Returns from sales taxes and business receipt taxes would reduce overnight should there be a recession.

If this should develop, the legislature would prefer not to be spending \$14 million when it might be argued that \$7 million would do as well.

Temporary uneasy peace exists behind bars" said Austin MacCormick in his Digest article. It was easily broken with newer and more serious riots if conditions that caused previous uprisings are not rectified.

Prisoners have no one lobby in their interests. If legislative action does not meet minimum living standards no one should be surprised if they revolt. Their fate is intertwined with politics, economic and other factors beyond their control.

The governor is stuck with accepting the recommendation of the commission he just appointed. To refuse would be to invite its members' resignations.

The legislature is stuck with the dilemma of beginning a prison program now, or facing the name for future riots which MacCormick says must be expected.

Immates are stuck in red tape of delay. After two years of delay, they are still in limbo.



Insufficient activity; insufficient medical care, and certainly insufficient rehabilitation programs.

● Taxpayers are stuck with the bill. Whatever is decided, they will pay the check. If the decisions of the legislature are wise and made in time to remedy a situation long overdue for action, they can take some comfort from the knowledge that a social situation that no one is proud of has at last been dealt with in a sound manner.
