

List Changes in Fire Siren Signal Code

Fire Chief Ted Balmer announced this week that there are to be some changes in the fire siren signals, the principal change being five long blasts for a fire in the business district or in a factory. The previous signal was one long blast for the business district.

Daytime fires in the country will be signaled by one long blast and fires in the four wards of the village will call for one extra long blast followed by shorter blasts indicating the ward where the fire is located.

The signals as listed by the Fire department are as follows:

One long blast—Country fire in the daytime.
Five long blasts—Business district or factory.
One long and one short blast—First ward, beginning at Schneider's store and comprising the northeast section of the village.
One long and two short blasts—Second ward, beginning at Central Market and comprising the southeast section of the village.
One long and three short blasts—Third ward, beginning at the post office and comprising the southwest section of the village.
One long and four short blasts—Fourth ward, beginning at Chelsea State Bank and comprising the northwest section of the village.

Anti-Rabies Dog Vaccination Clinic Schedule Announced

The annual anti-rabies vaccination clinics for this area will be held in Sylvan Town Hall Thursday, Jan. 28, from 7 until 9:30 p.m., and in Lyndon Town Hall Friday, Jan. 29, from 7 until 8:30 p.m.

Clinics for the vaccination of dogs against rabies will be sponsored again this year by the Washtenaw County Veterinary Medical Association and the County Health Department. They are scheduled for the last two weeks in January to permit dog owners to comply with the law passed by the Board of Supervisors in 1948 which required that all dogs be vaccinated for rabies within a 12-month period before the license deadline on February 28.

The county veterinarians and health authorities report that this jointly-sponsored program of rabies prevention through dog vaccinations has practically eliminated mad dogs in Washtenaw county.

Since the program was started in June of 1948 not a single native mad dog has been reported to the Health Department. Only four rabid, or mad, animals have been reported; two were skunks, one was a cow, and one was an imported dog in a laboratory.

In 1952 there were no rabies reports at all.

The vaccination program has been responsible for the almost complete eradication of rabies in the county while rabies is still a serious problem in neighboring counties where dogs are not vaccinated.

Health Department records show that from 30 to 50 cases of mad dogs were listed annually prior to institution of the vaccination program. The mad dogs infected cut and exposed hundreds of people to the virus which causes rabies.

Civil Service Exam Is Announced for Post Office Positions

A Civil Service examination for probational appointment to post office carrier at Chelsea post office at the rate of \$1.61½ per hour, was announced today by J. A. Connor, Director of the Seventh U. S. Civil Service Region. Additional compensation is provided for night work and for authorized overtime.

Competition in this examination is restricted to residents of Chelsea and persons now employed in the Chelsea post office, who are between the ages of 18 and 50. These age limits are waived for veterans. Persons now holding temporary or indefinite appointments should file for this examination if they wish to be considered for permanent appointment.

A written test is required of all applicants.

Applications must be filed with the Director, Seventh U. S. Civil Service Region, New Post Office Building, Chicago 7, Ill., and will be accepted until the close of business Jan. 19, 1954.

Cause of the alarm was an overheated furnace. There was some smoke damage to the house from a canvas which got afire.

Seek To Surpass Last Year's Total Collection of \$3,900

Dime cards for March of Dimes contributions were mailed out during the past week to all homes in the community. Mrs. Hugh Sorensen, local drive chairman, said yesterday.

Assisting Mrs. Sorensen in preparing the cards for mailing were Mrs. W. J. Grossman, Mrs. Nelson Kreider, Mrs. John Brooks, Jr., Mrs. Floyd Fowler, Mrs. Fred Seeley, Jr., Mrs. James Hough and Mrs. Loren Turner.

Saturday afternoon Mrs. Sorensen and Mrs. Grossman placed canisters in all business places of the community.

Tuesday night Mrs. Sorensen and Mrs. Kreider attended the "dinner" for the campaign chairman of the county, held at the Moose lodge hall in Ann Arbor. Paul Bagwell, state chairman, was the principal speaker.

Mrs. Sorensen said at the beginning of the 1954 campaign that because of the increased need for funds to finance the tests for the new polio vaccine the Chelsea workers will try to increase last year's total of \$3,908.22 which was contributed under the chairmanship of Mrs. Herbert Sanborn, now living in Detroit.

One-third of all contributions to the March of Dimes in 1954 will be used in the polio prevention program, providing gamma globulin when it is needed, and administering the vaccine to a large group of children for the first time, according to a report received by the local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The remaining two-thirds of each contribution will be divided equally between the local chapter and the National Foundation.

Funds in the Washtenaw county chapter are used to care for patients in the county who have polio or have had the disease. Mrs. Sorensen said. "Polio is an unusually expensive and tragic disease because its main attribute is crippling and because it strikes chiefly at youngsters—a large number of whom must be treated for many years," Mrs. Sorensen added.

One of the peculiarities of the National Foundation—and one that reflects the poignancy and sadness of the polio fight—is that it spares no expense to get a polio patient into an iron lung to save his life and then spares no expense to get him out again so that his life may be worth living, it was explained.

There is no time limit in which care may be given or no limit to the amount of money which may be spent on an individual patient. The chapter provides what the patient's doctor says is necessary for as long a period as the doctor orders it.

In some cases treatment of Washtenaw county patients has been continued for years, and there are numerous polio victims who have had to have several operations as a result of the disease, according to Mrs. Sorensen.

She pointed out that a great deal of money is also needed to support the respirator centers, one of which has been established at the University of Michigan hospital, and patients in this center have the advantage of being close to their families and friends. The center at University hospital serves five states in this area.

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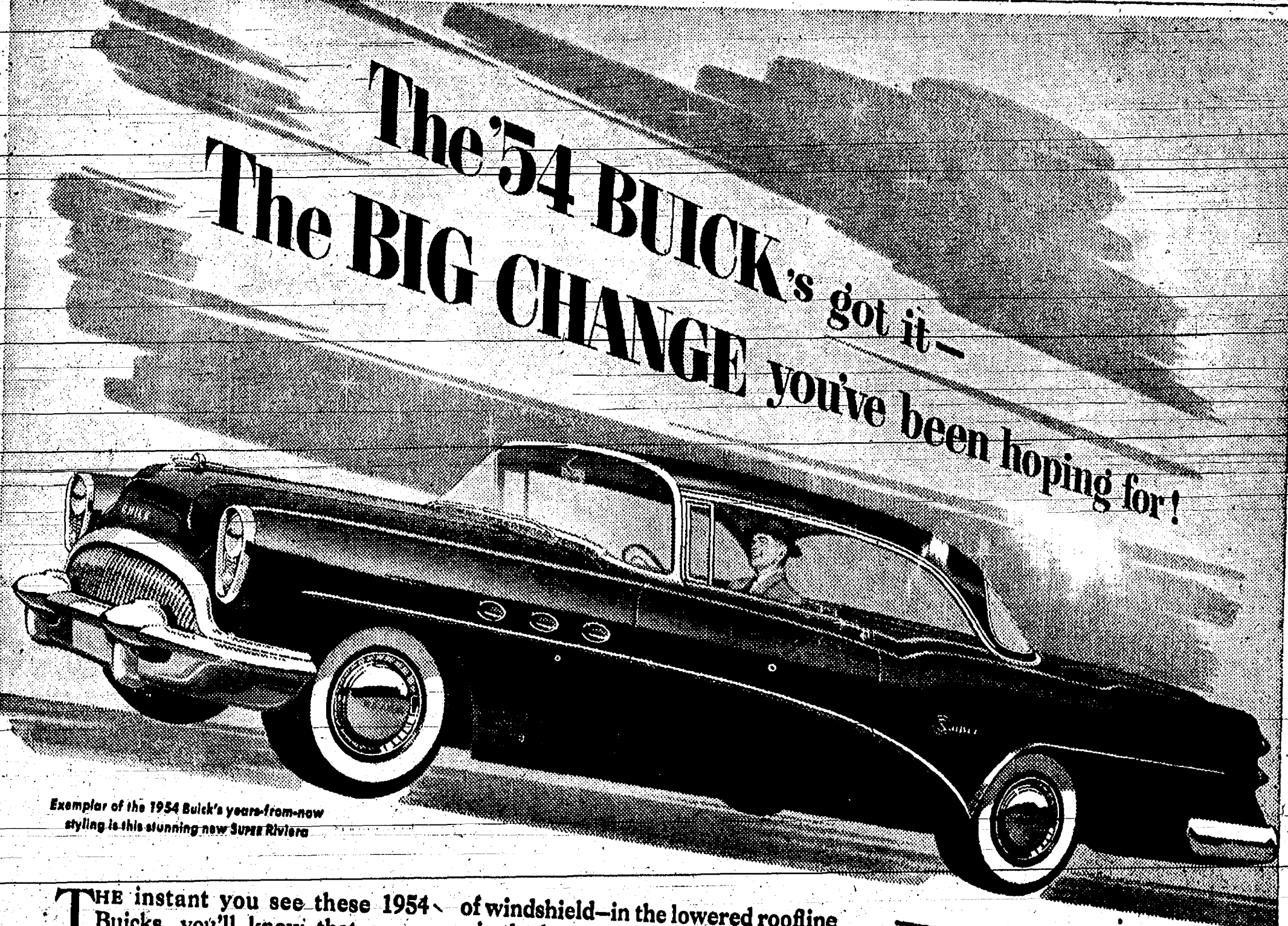

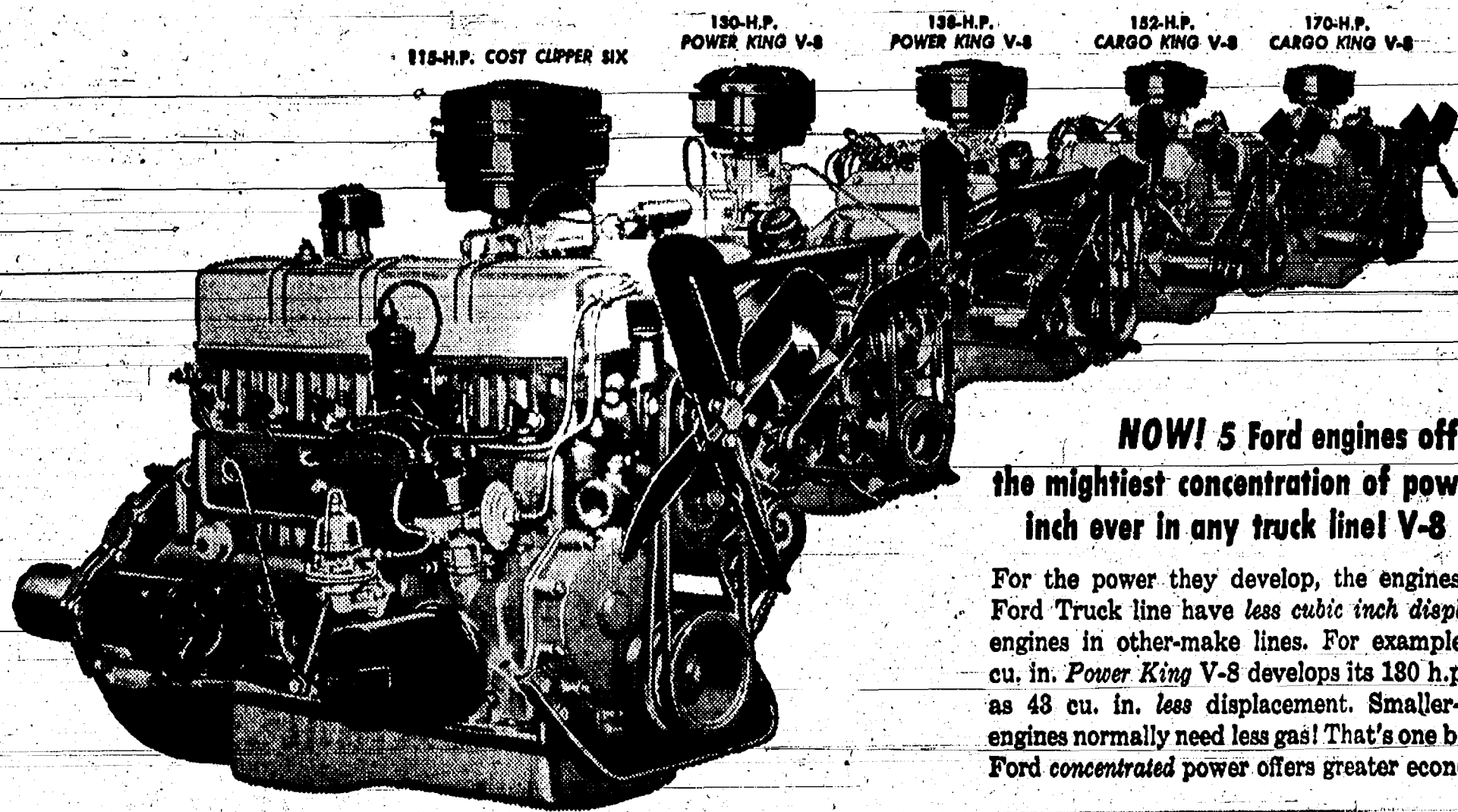

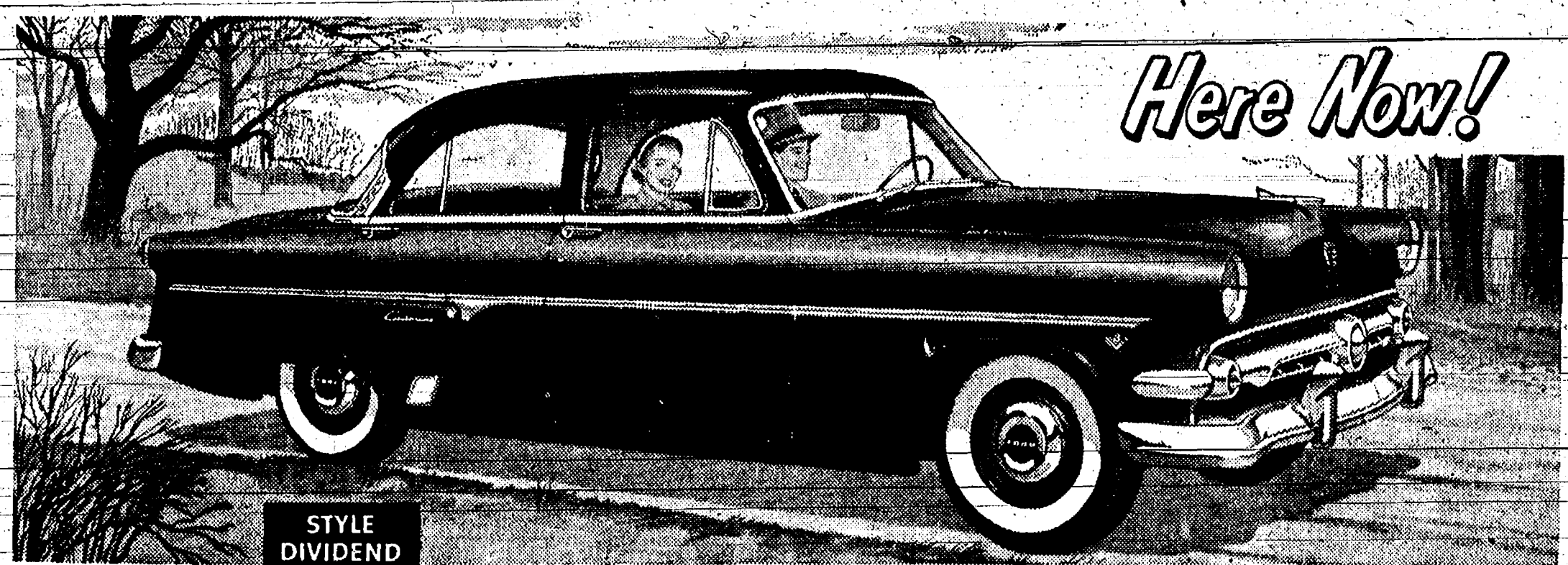

● Taxpayers are stuck with the bill. Whatever is decided, they will pay the check. If the decisions of the legislature are wise and made in time to remedy a situation long overdue for action, they can take some comfort from the knowledge that a social situation that no one is proud of has at last been dealt with in a sound manner.

Charles F. Vollmer, who had made his home with his daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Grant Schooley, at 85 South Fletcher road, since July, 1949, died Thursday afternoon at Colonial Manor hospital. He had been a patient there for the past ten months.
