Registration of Electors Required; Registration on Election Day, Identification of Elector

SEC. 1. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote; but the name of a qualified elector may be registered on the day of any election or primary election up to 4 P. M. of said day: PROVIDED, That he shall, under oath, state that he is a resident of such precinct, is at least 21 years of age and has resided in the State for at least 6 months and in the Township or City 30 days next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he possess the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution, and that, owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself, or of some member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Township or City on public or private business, and without intent to avoid or delay his registration, he was unable to make application for registration on final days set for such registration: PROVIDED FURTHER, That he or she is accompanied and identified by a registered voter known to a member of the election board: PROVIDED FURTHER, That the Board of Supervisors of any County may by resolution duly adopted discontinue the registration of electors on primary and election days and such registration shall not be taken in such county thereafter on primary and election days unless and until the Board of Supervisors rescinds its action in connection therewith


Transfer of Registration; Application, Time

SEC. 19. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, Ctiy or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30 days next preceding any election or primary election, provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he has not resided 30 days next preceding any election or primary election

Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be flied with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be day upon proper showing.



Such transfers shall not be made within the 80 days next preceding any election or primary election, provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he has not resided 30 days next preceding any election or primary election.

Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered.

Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge
of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his regis-tration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.
