Cagers Win Over Saline Friday Night

Bulldogs Still Tied With Dundee for League Leadership

The Chelsea Bulldogs and the Dundee Vikings remained tied for the Huron League leadership as the result of their victories last Friday night. Chelsea defeated Saline, 65-61, and Dundee defeated Ypsilanti Lincoln, 56-49.

The Saline Hornets jumped into an early lead in the first quarter, principally on Earl Feldkamp's four field goals. The Hornets led 14-9 at the end of the first period.

The Bulldogs, sparked by Neil Buehler and Bruce Hoffman, in the second period, outscored Saline, 10-14, to leave the teams tied at the intermission, 28-28. Neil scored five field goals in this period and Bruce had three field goals and a free throw.

With all of the Bulldogs starting five hitting field goals in the third period, Chelsea outscored Saline, 21-13, to make the score read 49-41 at the three-quarter mark.

In the final quarter, Saline scored 20 points to Chelsea's 16, to narrow the Bulldogs' margin to four points. Final score: Chelsea, 65; Saline, 61.

The Bulldogs made 35.6 per cent of their shots from the field, hitting 29 of 73 attempts. Saline hit 21 of 62 attempts for 40.4 per cent.

Bruce Hoffman paced the Chelsea attack with 20 points. He was followed by Neil Buehler with 18 points, Bob White, 12, Captain Bud Ringe, 9, and Bob Bertke, 4.

In the reserve game the Chelsea Bulldogs defeated Saline, 42-24. Billy Roberts and Fred Hoffman paced the Chelsea attack with 19 points each.

The Chelsea team will be host to Ypsilanti Lincoln tomorrow night, Friday, Feb. 26 at 8:45 p.m.

Polio Fund Total Passes \$3,900 as Campaign Closes

Mrs. Hugh Sorenson, in officially closing the local March of Dimes polio campaign for funds Saturday, announced that the complete total contributed here is \$3,933.39.

This amount is \$30.17 more than last year's total of \$3,903.22 and is the largest amount ever contributed here in the annual drive.

Mrs. Sorenson, accompanied by Mrs. Nelson Kreider and Mrs. James Hough, attended a meeting of all county chairmen at the Michigan League in Ann Arbor, and heard final reports of the campaign.

The total for the entire county was given as \$73,217.21 for 1954 as compared to \$68,655 contributed in 1953.

The \$73,217.21 includes \$3,278.92 received from rural areas and \$1,031.06 which had been contributed after the close of the 1953 campaign and before the 1954 drive began.

It had been the goal of county workers to raise \$75,000 in 1954 and the total is approximately \$1,500 short of the goal.

Sylvan Zoning Committee Discusses Residential, Agricultural Districts

This is the fourth of a series of articles explaining the proposed Sylvan township zoning ordinance.

The series was prepared by interested citizens of the community who are prepared to give authoritative answers to questions sent to the Sylvan Zoning Committee, c/o The Chelsea Standard.


A referendum on the proposed zoning ordinance has been set for Tuesday, April 6.

In this article the two largest areas in the township are being considered—residential and agricultural.

The residential district, for single-families is designated RU-1 on the zoning map. This section is limited to single-family homes, home occupations, churches and community use buildings. In this last group are schools, public parks, utility buildings and organizational buildings. The non-residential buildings must be approved by the zoning board and people living in the area affected.

Lot size must be 6,500 square feet and must be 66 feet wide. Front yards are 35 feet deep and side yards 10 feet wide. Rear yards must be 35 feet deep. Recorded subdivisions recorded before the effective date of the zoning ordinance may have lots less in size. This is in accord with the county sanitary code requirements.

Building area requirements are that each home hereinafter erected

Weight Restrictions Placed on Highways

Weight restrictions are now in force on all county highways, according to Howard G. Minier, Washtenaw county Road Commission manager.

The normal load of 18,000 pounds per axle when axles are nine feet apart, is cut 35 per cent for blacktop roads and 25 per cent for concrete highways during the spring break-up period.

This makes the legal load limit 11,700 pounds per axle on blacktop and 13,500 pounds on concrete highways. The restrictions will be in force as long as deemed necessary to prevent excessive damage to roads before they are settled after the winter's freezing.

During the past week two truck drivers hauling 14,000 pounds and 9,200 pounds overweight loads, respectively, were given summons.

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Registration of Electors Required; Registration on Election Day, Identification of Elector

SEC. 1. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote; but the name of a qualified elector may be registered on the day of any election or primary election up to 4 P. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30 days next preceding any election or primary election, provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he has not resided 30 days next preceding any election or primary election.

Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Registration change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.
