State-Wide Tid Bits

Michigan's 1954 primary election campaign is off to a roaring start.

And as usual, all of the primary fireworks are expected in the Republican contest for the gubernatorial nomination.

So far, five candidates have tossed their hats in the ring for the GOP nomination. The field may be reduced by one or possibly two contenders by the time voters go to the polls Aug. 3.

Already there are rumors that this candidate or that candidate plans to drop out of the race if the right "deal" comes along. But publicly they all say: "I'm in to the finish."

All five GOP hopefuls are "name" candidates.

They include D. Hale Brake of Stanton, Owen J. Cleary of Ypsilanti, George N. Higgins of Dearborn, Eugene C. Keyes of Dearborn, and Donald S. Leonard of Detroit.

Brake, 65, has been state treasurer since 1933. Known as Michigan's "Mr. Republican," Brake has wanted to run for governor for years but held off each time in favor of someone else who party leaders believed had better chance of beating Democratic Gov. G. Wrenn Williams. Brake will stay in the race to finish.

Cleary, 54, is completing his first term as secretary of state.

Active in Civil Defense during World War II, he rose to rank of brigadier general in Michigan State troops. Cleary served on state Liquor Control Commission with Williams in 1947-48 and was chosen chairman GOP State Central Committee in 1949.

Higgins, 53, has been in state legislatures since 1938 except for two years after his unsuccessful bid for Republican nomination for lieutenant governor in 1946. Author of the highly-publicized Business Receipts Tax, which is credited with getting state out of red, Higgins is only non-lawyer among candidates. He's an auto dealer.

Keyes, 63, Dearborn's doctor-dentist-lawyer, has been on state primary ballot every two years (Continued on page five)

Letters Show Live  
Hope for Waterloo  
Road Improvement

The Waterloo road blacktopping project, which a number of Lynden township residents are seeking to have done "now" rather than in 1957 as scheduled under the Washtenaw County Road Commission's plan, was brought before the public again during the past week in an exchange of correspondence between L. D. Guinan and Howard G. Miner, Road-Commission manager.

Agitation for the road improvement has been underway for some time and a meeting of Lynden township residents with Guinan and Miner was held last fall in Lynden Township Hall. At that time it was brought out that the over-long-range county road improvement plan had been approved by the Board of Supervisors and was being carried out according to its schedule which lists the Waterloo road for completion by 1957.

A committee of Lynden residents, including Guinan, was appointed to work for blacktopping of the road at an earlier date and means of accomplishing this purpose. Accompanied by Miner, they went to Lansing in the hope they might enlist aid from Conservation Department sources because of the large amount of state-owned acreage in the area.

They were advised a legislative act would be necessary if the Conservation Department was to be involved. (Continued on page six)

Land Buying  
Causes Stir  
of SpeculationLansing Realtor  
Attempting To Buy  
Large Block of Land

Another "mystery project" is believed to be the underlying reason for attempts to buy large areas of land in the vicinity of the intersection of Pleasant Lake road and the Chelsea-Manchester road during recent weeks.

The method of approaching land owners in the area has all the earmarks of the three-year "mystery of mysteries" which culminated in the disclosure of plans for the 3,500-acre Chrysler Proving Ground.

At one of the farms where he called, the real estate agent identified himself as the man "who sold all the Ford property in Sharon Hollow." He is also believed to be the same agent who handled land deals for a large housing project at Tecumseh. He has told farmers he is from Lansing.

Owners known to have been approached regarding possible sale of their land all have property in the area north of Pleasant Lake road and west of the Chrysler-Manchester road in a block bounded on the west by Smith road and on the north by Grass Lake road.

Some of the farmers were told that 1,000 acres was being sought and others were told that the prospective buyer wanted 600 acres.

Some residents of the area believe there are two separate projects involved, while others believe the discrepancy in amount of acreage is a deliberate attempt to confuse people.

Every type of land found in the vicinity seems to be of interest to the would-be buyer or buyers. Owner of a 60-acre plot on Pleasant Lake road, much of it low and marshy reportedly said he was approached regarding its sale. Others, none of whom are adjoining each other, have some of the best farming land in the area and still others own hilly land with only a small percentage of tillable acreage included.

Only the land lying in the Pleasant Lake-Manchester-Smith road block is sought, the agent, showing no interest in land lying across either of the roads and even implying that where farms had land on both sides of any of the three roads, he wished to purchase only that part which lies inside the block.

Earle Schumacher  
Directs Research  
in Metallurgy

Earle E. Schumacher, 22-Besch Place, Edgewood, N. J., chief metallurgist of Bell Telephone Laboratories, Murray Hill, N. J., has been appointed Metallurgical Director in charge of a new department of metallurgical research at the laboratories.

Mr. Schumacher, a native of Chelsea, is the son of Henry Schumacher. He graduated from Chelsea High school and received the bachelor of science degree from the University of Michigan in 1918. His Bell System career began immediately after graduation from Michigan, when he joined the research laboratories of the Western Electric company in New York as a physical chemist.

With the incorporation of Bell Laboratories in 1925, Mr. Schumacher helped organize a group for the study of metallurgical problems peculiar to the communications industry. As chief metallurgist he guided the activities of a large team of laboratory scientists engaged in fundamental studies of physical metallurgy; in development work on magnetic, conducting and semi-conducting materials; and in extensive consulting services.

Mr. Schumacher is the author of numerous papers on metallurgical subjects and has taken an active part in the affairs of technical societies, including the British Institute of Metals and the American Society for Testing Materials. He is a past chairman and past director of the Institute of Metals Division of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers.

In 1950 Mr. Schumacher delivered the annual lecture of the Institute of Metals Division of the AIME, and the autumn lecture of the British Institute of Metals in Bournemouth, England. During World War II he served on a number of boards of the National Defense Research Committee and was a member of the metallurgy panel of the NDRC.

Crippled Children

Approximately 2,000 letters containing Easter seals and appeals for funds to support the work for crippled children and adults in Washtenaw county are being prepared and will be mailed to residents of the Chelsea area this week and in the annual Easter Seal campaign.

The work of the Washtenaw Society is carried on by business and professional men and women who receive no compensation for their efforts beyond the tremendous satisfaction in helping to bring joy and relief into the lives of the county's handicapped persons, both adults and children.

Here in Chelsea all of this preparatory work has been done by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Niehaus who also carry on the actual solicitation of funds for the project. Mr. Niehaus has been active in this charitable enterprise for many years, serving at various times as county president and director of the Washtenaw Society for Adult and Crippled Children.

The organization purchases special equipment, such as walkers, wheel chairs, and braces for individual cases. It also maintains a pool of such equipment that can be borrowed on a temporary basis.

One of the finest projects of the society is the summer camp, south of Grass Lake, the expenses for which are borne by contributors to the fund. Here for two weeks each summer more than 60 handicapped boys and girls of Washtenaw and Jackson counties enjoy camp life, boating, swimming, and indoor and outdoor games in which they are able to participate.

Parents and physicians say that the youngsters spend 50 weeks of the year in enthusiastic anticipation of their two-week stay there. The letters which people of the community will be receiving this week-end will contain self-addressed envelopes to simplify the sending of contributions.

Locally, the Easter Seal campaign is sponsored by the Chelsea Kiwanis club.

Indications Monday and Tuesday seemed to be that March, in addition to coming in "like a lion" was also going out the same way, disproving the old belief about "in like a lion, out like a lamb."

Approximately six inches of snow covered the ground when it stopped snowing late Monday evening. The snow had been falling at intervals most of the day.

Following a mild week-end with temperatures in the 50's it began to turn colder late Sunday afternoon and reached a low of 27 degrees before Monday morning. Highways and streets became slippery by noon Monday and the deepening snow gave motorists trouble, with many cars becoming stalled.

Tuesday afternoon, after village crews had sanded the streets, it turned somewhat warmer and the snow was beginning to melt.

Cold, strong winds ushered in the month of March and there were predictions that most of the winter weather would be experienced here this month.

Immunization  
Clinic Being  
Held Today

Parents Required  
To Sign Request for  
Free Vaccinations

Diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox immunizations and vaccinations are being given today at a clinic in the Chelsea Elementary school. The clinic opened at 9 a.m.

Local physicians who are donating their services at the clinic are Dr. R. T. Drev, Dr. J. V. Fisher and Dr. A. A. Palmer.

Registered nurses who are assisting include Mrs. Ralph Oesterle, Gertrude Young, Mrs. Maxwell Sweet, Mrs. Jack Merkel and Mrs. James Daniels. Other volunteer workers are Mrs. George West, Mrs. Lawrence Niehaus and Mrs. Lawton Steger.

There is no charge for the immunizations and vaccinations at the clinic since Health department and school services are tax supported as well as the cost of toxoid and vaccine supplied by the Michigan Department of Health for use at the clinics.

Diphtheria and tetanus booster shots are being given to children who have not been so immunized in the past three years and vaccination for smallpox is being offered to all school and pre-school children who have not been vaccinated in the last five years.

Parents or guardians are required to sign request slips before the children may be permitted to receive the immunizations and vaccinations.

The clinics which have been in progress in Washtenaw county the past month, are sponsored annually by the Washtenaw County Medical Society in cooperation with the Health Department and local schools.

"With this cooperation and above all, with the cooperation of the interested parents, we were able to vaccinate 6,923 children for smallpox and to raise to maximum levels the immunity of many of the 6,335 children who received booster doses of diphtheria and tetanus toxoid in last year's record program," said Mr. Barker, president of the Washtenaw County Medical Society.

"The Medical Society is dedicated to this continuing effort to suppress any epidemic possibilities which would develop were these immunizations and vaccinations neglected," he added.

### Memorial Garden Will Be Dedicated to Military Men

The Garden of the Four Chaplains which is designed for and dedicated to men of the military and their families is being developed in Arborcrest cemetery on Glacier Way across from the Veterans Administration hospital and just east of the new North Campus of the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

This particular Garden is reserved for veterans and their families. There will be erected this spring a memorial commemorating four men of God who in life and in death exemplified complete devotion and sacrifice.

On Feb. 3, 1943, in the cold North Atlantic, torpedoes tore out the hull of the Dorchester, a ship carrying troops to Greenland. On board were four chaplains, a Catholic priest, a Jewish rabbi and two Protestant clergymen. They distributed spare ribbons, quieted panic, and at last, when there were no spares left, they gave their own belts. They were last seen, with arms linked, braced against the rail, praying, each in the tradition of his faith for the safety of the men.

This theme for a veterans memorial was selected by a committee composed of representatives from the various veterans' organizations in the Ann Arbor community, together with Harlow O. Whittemore of the Department of Landscape Architecture at the University of Michigan, who has designed the Garden and is supervising the landscaping.

Carleton Angell, well known for his work as an artist for the University Museum, has designed the memorial. It was sculptured by Bernhard Zuckerman in Carrara, Italy, from a plaster model shipped there by Mr. Angell. The main panel is of White Carrara marble, with a background of Roman Travertine. The Italian studio has notified the committee that the memorial is completed and ready for shipment.

In this Garden a grave space is provided free of charge for anyone who loses his life while in the service of his country. Places are provided for families of veterans, side by side with their loved ones. Areas are reserved for plaques carrying the names of men missing in action and presumed dead.

A committee consisting of representatives from veterans, religious and civic groups in the area held a meeting last Thursday to make plans for a dedication service to be held May 28, at 2 p.m.

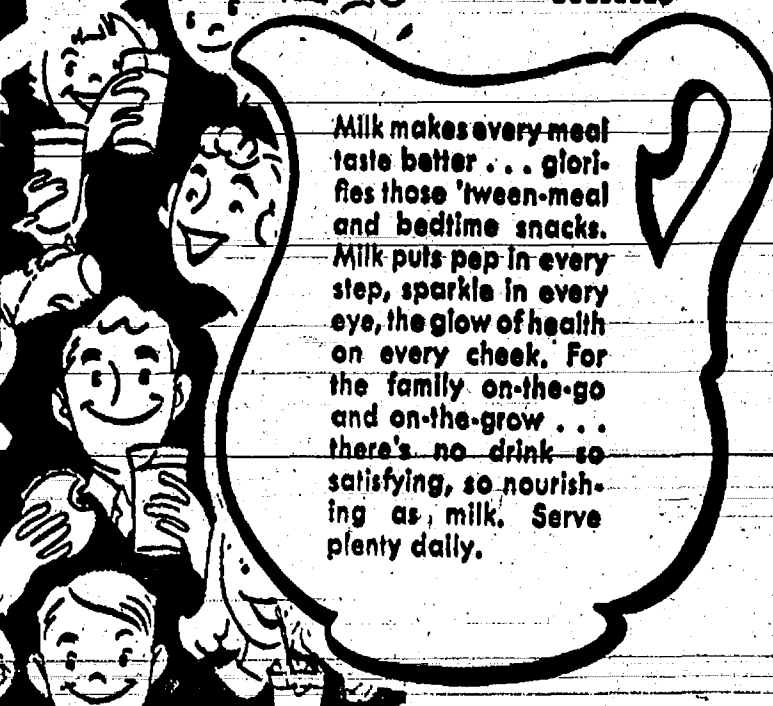

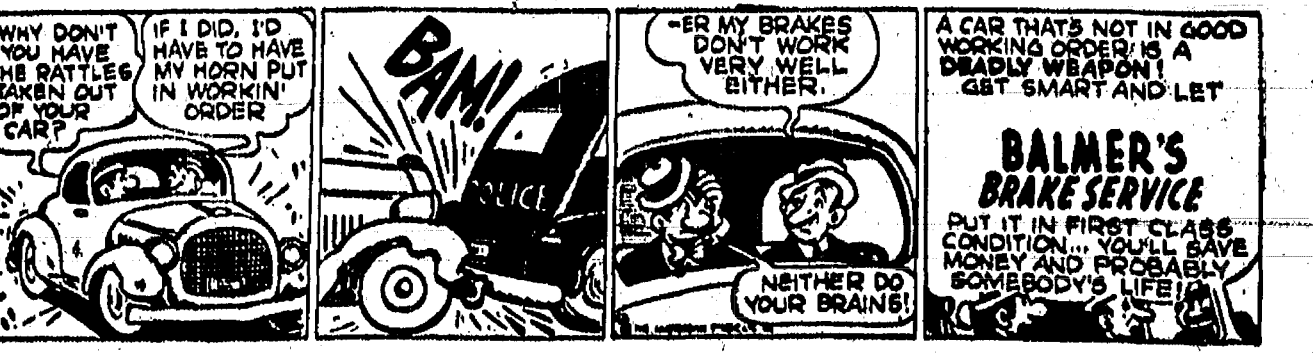

since when he first ran for lieutenant governor. He has served as state's No. 2 official -- 1943-44 and 1946-47 -- and was unsuccessful GOP primary candidate for governor in 1950 and U. S. Senator in 1952.

● Leonard, 50, is making his second bid to carry the Republican banner in final election for governor. He ran second behind Fred M. Alger, Jr., in 1952 primary; is best known as former State Police Commissioner. He has been Detroit Police Commissioner since 1953, headed Civil Defense during World War II.

● In many ways, this year's primary looks much like repeat of 1950 when five candidates fought for Republican gubernatorial nomination with Harry F. Kelley getting the nod.

Five-way race this year is something Republican leaders have dreaded for months because each additional candidate lessens chance

of complete party unity in final campaign when it is needed.

● Many Republicans contend Williams would have been bumped off in 1950 or 1952 if it had not been for multi-candidate GOP primaries in those years which split party into many factions. Wounds inflicted during primary are hard to heal.

Republican candidates have agreed not to attack each other but one or two of them may forget agreement as campaign picks up steam.

● One of the reasons Gov. Williams has not announced whether he will run for U. S. senator or governor is this:

As Governor of Michigan, he gets a lot of free radio and television time each week. But he'll be forced to pay for this time the minute he becomes a candidate. It pays for him to wait until the last possible moment to toss his hat in the political arena.

## DHIA Delegates Attend Annual State Meet at MSC

Floyd Fowler and Ralph Erke of the Washtenaw-Chelsea DHIA, attended the annual meeting of the Michigan Dairy Herd Improvement Association, Inc., at MSC, East Lansing, last week.

There were reports by the officers, election of three directors; Harold Schook of Branch county was re-elected and George Clouse of Barry county and Russel Newell of St. Clair were newly-elected. Dr. Weaver of MSC, gave an interesting talk on "What Can We See Ahead in Dairying?"

Dr. Ralston, MSC Dairy Extension specialist, spoke on "The Development of Records on Dairy Sows from Plymouth Rock to the Present."

Most interesting from the farmer's viewpoint, however, was the discussion and illustrations by L. A. Johnson, Pat Ralston and Al. Thelen concerning the new methods to be used in DHIA testing.

Various IBM cards were shown and it was explained how the tester would send his data sheets to East Lansing for all computer work on these machines. From the farmer's viewpoint, this would mean more accurate records and more testers available as the job was made more appealing.

From the Extension viewpoint, it would mean more (and more accurate) lactation reports to be used in proving bulls.

There have been IBM reports made on 14 herds for the past year. Two full associations are to be started June 1, two more on July 1, and possibly the balance on Oct. 1.

At the present time there are 142 DHIA units in the state, of which 82 belong to Michigan DHIA, Inc.

The cost of financing the program to get it started is borne 30 per cent from Extension and Research funds, and the balance from Michigan DHIA. Michigan Artificial Breeders Co-op donated \$1,000 toward this research last year.

Other honors were distributed to men from all parts of the state.

Attention was called to plans for an ABA celebration of its 10th birthday at the bull barn on June 7 and 8 at which time it is planned to have an exhibition a good showing of ABA sired cows and calves.

According to records passed out at the meeting, Washtenaw-Chelsea ABA, with 1,765 first services for 1953, placed 15th out of 139 units in services gained over 1952. Records for the last four years show 784, 1,307, 1,340, 1,765.

It was reported that more than 20 per cent of the cows in Michigan were bred artificially last year.

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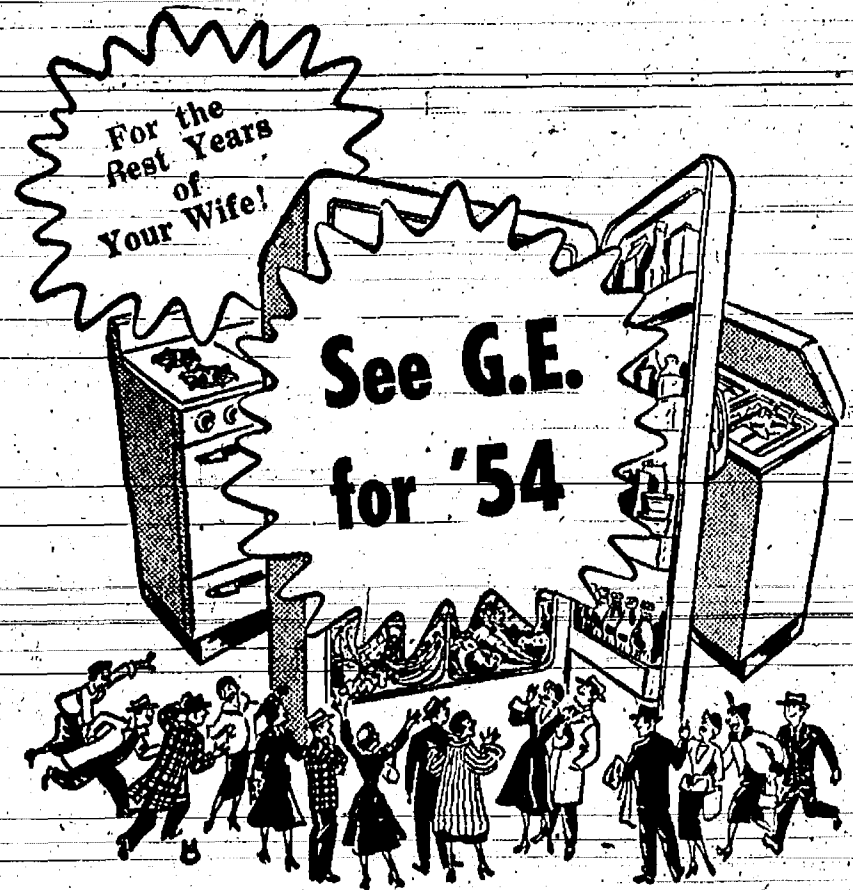
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
