Health Department Cancels Proposed Polio Vaccine Test

Public Confidence Lost Through Delay in Proving Safety

"Doubts, delays and public confusion," according to Dr. Otto K. Engleke, director of the Washtenaw County Health Department, was given as the reason for withdrawal of Washtenaw county from the scheduled tests of the new Salk anti-polio vaccine in which 5,000 Washtenaw county children were expected to participate this month.

Dr. Engleke read a prepared statement regarding his stand on the matter at a meeting of the Washtenaw County Medical Society Thursday evening.

Unanimous endorsement of Dr. Engleke's stand by the 50 doctors present followed.

Text of Dr. Engleke's statement was as follows:

"Until a few days ago the Washtenaw County Health Department was prepared to proceed with the Salk vaccine study as scheduled. Satisfactory guarantees of the absolute safety of the vaccine and the power of the vaccine to produce immunity, and the receipt of the vaccine and control material in time to complete the program before the polo season or the closing of schools as well as the clarification of legal responsibility for untoward effects, were to have been in our possession as a prerequisite to the actual vaccination procedure.

Were To Have Proved Safety

"These guarantees, as originally specified by the State Health Commissioner, the Michigan Health Officers' Association, the Washtenaw County and the State Medical Societies, this department, and others participating in the study, were to have been accepted by this department as adequate proof of the safety and justification of the program.

"The vaccine promised many of our children a reasonable immediate chance of avoiding polio, and a chance to practically eliminate the disease in a few years. This department is convinced that receipt of the vaccine and guarantees in time would have warranted completion of the program of inoculations as a well planned, medically sound procedure.

"We have had the full co-operation of the responsible governmental agencies, the schools, the Washtenaw county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, representatives of the National Foundation and the County Medical Society.

Plans Were On Schedule

"However, since our start-in the program, the tremendous local tasks involved in completing its organization have been complicated by numerous delays and uncertainties of national origin, of a serious nature than originally anticipated. In spite of these handicaps, local preparations were on schedule.

"On April 5 reports were received of a State Medical Society news release and an ill-advised television broadcast. Subsequent newspaper accounts confirming these reports, and a State Medical Society communication to county societies were examined by this department.

"The State Medical Society news release and letter described conditions for the State Society's approval of the program which had not been met at that time. They were very similar to the guarantees of safety already adopted as a condition of the program.

Annual Spring Flood
of Grass Fire Calls
Plague Local Firemen

At 5:50 p.m. Tuesday the third grass fire of the day was extinguished near the home of Dr. J. V. Fisher on Washington street and firemen were called out again at 6:35 p.m. when it was feared a wrecked car on US-12 would catch fire. The car, a 1951 model was demolished when it skidded and turned over, killing both occupants.

Truck drivers who stopped at the scene, had used their portable fire extinguishers on the wreckage and firemen were not needed. They stood by until sheriff's officers arrived on the scene.

Dexter threatened again in the last inning as the result of a walk and a wild pitch, but Hoffman forced the last man to ground out, ending the game.

Manchester Road Is Now Trunkline

Chelsea-Manchester road from US-12 south to Manchester is now classed as a state trunkline, according to an announcement by the Washtenaw County Road Commission. The classification became effective Tuesday, April 6.

At the same time M-11 from US-112 at Saline, west to the west line of Washtenaw county, was changed from its former classification as a state road to become a part of the Washtenaw county primary road system.

James C. Hendley, chairman of the Washtenaw County Road Commission, in announcing the change, said that the county Road Commission and the Michigan State Highway Department "for many years have felt that Washtenaw county should have another north and south trunkline in order to adequately serve the people." However, he explained, "the state highway commissioner is restricted in the total miles of state trunklines and in order to secure this north and south state route it was necessary to exchange an approximate number of miles of existing state road to become part of the county primary system."

M-11 is an east and west route through Manchester and the reclassification affects the entire distance from US-112 at Saline to the west line of Washtenaw county.

The Michigan State Highway Department has agreed to exchange a section of a state trunkline south of Manchester on the route comprising Sheridan and Logan roads to US-112 in Lenawee county prior to Jan. 1, 1957. This will complete the new state trunkline from US-12 to US-112.

As a temporary measure the Michigan State Highway Department will maintain M-11 from Manchester east to the Clinton Road and the Clinton Road, southerly to US-112 until the section from Manchester south over the Sheridan-Logan route is constructed and opened to traffic.

In the agreement the Michigan State Highway Department has agreed to pay to the Washtenaw County Road Commission \$45,000 to reconstruct the present bituminous surface on M-11 from Bridge-water to Saline. The Washtenaw County Road Commission plans to complete this reconstruction this year.

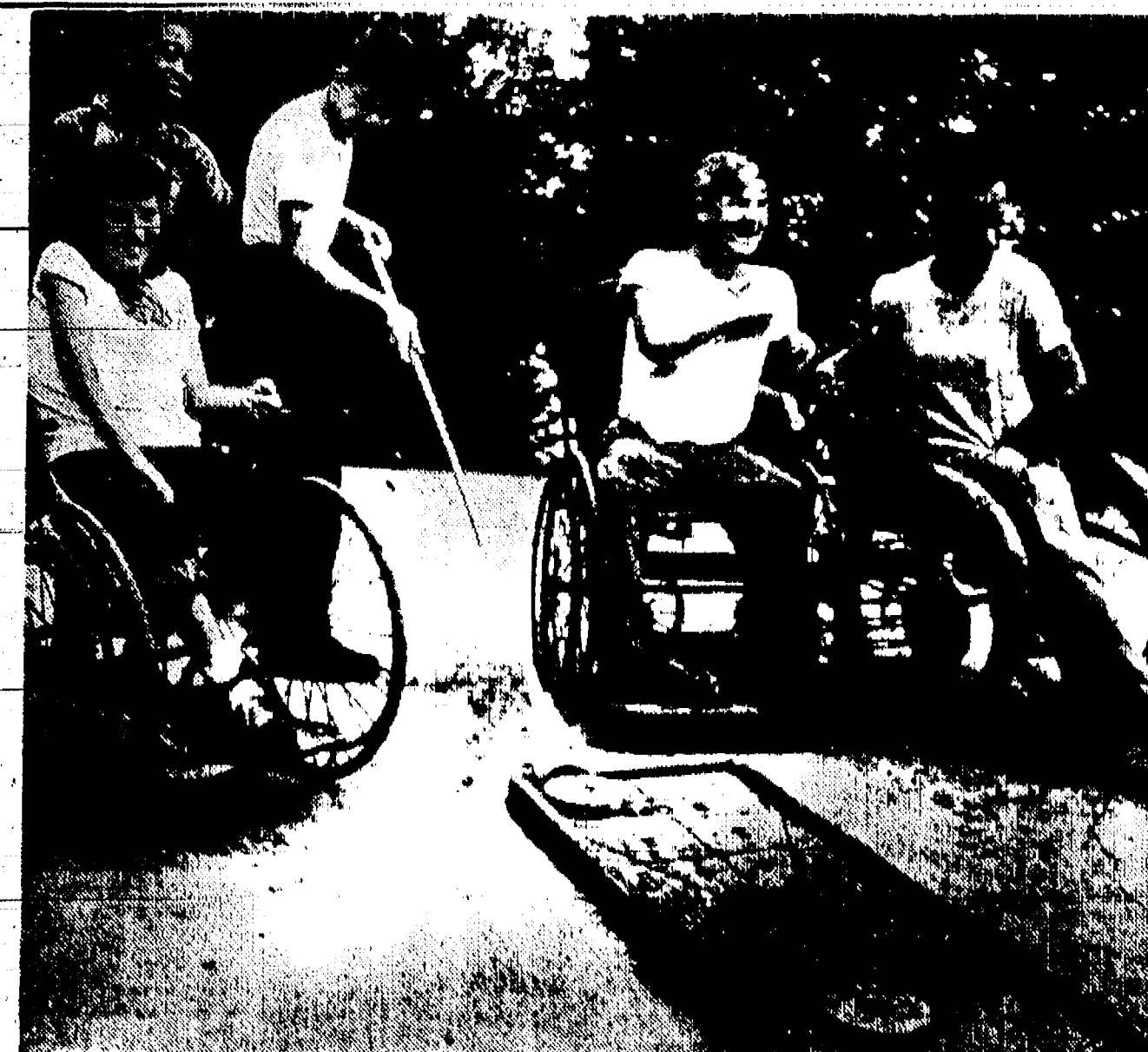
Civil Defense Group To Meet Monday

Crash on US-12 Fatal to Jackson Pair

A 57-year-old man and a 16-year-old boy, both of Jackson, were fatally injured at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday when their car went out of control and turned over on US-12 midway between M-92 and the intersection of Old US-12 west of Chelsea.

According to sheriff's department records the car was driven by the man, later identified as Earl Martin, 215 North Milwaukee street, Jackson.

As reconstructed after observations on the pavement, deputies said the car swerved off the pavement and went out of control when it struck the gravel shoulder.

The youth was identified as Richard Buchanan and his residence given as the Lee hotel, Jackson.

Mr. Martin, who died in the ambulance when he was taken him to the hospital, suffered a broken neck and crushed chest.

Buchanan died instantly of head injuries. He also suffered a fractured pelvis.

The two were returning to Jackson after attending the ball game in Detroit, sheriff's deputies were told.

Michigan Mirror

●Morals, money and medical care, all matters of basic importance to Michigan family life, have been under consideration at this session of the legislature.

●Most spectacular issue was the McCune bill, designed to censor beer and wine advertising on TV. Explosiveness of this issue was demonstrated by the frantic handling it received in the House of Representatives. The bill was killed by the House Liquor committee. At the last minute, after thousands of letters from church and temperance groups swamped the House, it was suddenly revived and put out for a vote.

●After much hedging and many letters on both sides of the beer-TV issue, Representatives passed the proposal. The House, in relieving itself of immense pressures on this controversy, merely turned them in the direction of the Senate.

The McCune bill died in Senate committee by a one-vote margin, but only with the understanding that a resolution would be forthcoming in its place. This is to "leave no stone unturned" in the fight to force legislative regulation next year if its TV commercials are not redesigned.

●Far from settled is the liquor question. More will be heard of it before next year. At least two Michigan counties, Hillsdale and Ottawa, will be voting this fall on a complete ban of alcoholic beverages.

Edgar C. Prettyman, executive secretary of the Michigan Temperance Foundation and a leading supporter of the McCune bill, referred to the legislative battle as "a shot in the arm for our campaigns." People everywhere, including many so-called "wet" legislators, are fed up with the behavior of the liquor industry," he said, "and unless the liquor people get their house in order, prohibition will come back."

Defeat by a two-to-one vote was predicted by James D. Dorach, executive director of the Michigan Table Top Congress, who stated that the dry issue would fail. The Table Toppers is a group of tavern representatives. Mr. Dorach claims that the McCune controversy benefited the group "because it brought to the public just what the Temperance Foundation method are." "It's only a name," he

charged. "Their real aim is total prohibition—we'll beat it handily."

●Several counties will go dry within the next 10 years predicted Dr. Prettyman, who pointed to six Michigan counties already dry on Sunday. They are Isabella, Tuscola, Oceana, Muskegon, Ottawa and Newaygo.

The prohibition issue was defeated at the polls in three counties since 1933: Branch, Barry and Lapeer.

Few situations are so distressing to a family as the need of medical care and the inability to locate a doctor. A House resolution requesting an investigation into the basic science regulation as it relates to the shortage of doctors has been under consideration in a House Committee.

Introduced by Rep. Ben E. Lohman of Allegan, the proposal would provide a committee of five representatives which would submit a report for the next session of the legislature. Its aim is to determine if present law permits the state to utilize all available medical skill—not to consider a change in present medical requirement standards, says Rep. Lohman.

●Biggest fights about unemployment compensation developed within the ranks of the Republicans themselves. Democrats took great delight in the wrangling and in the threat Gov. Williams has maintained over the GOP.

The argument concerns the amount that should be allowed each week; details of eligibility to receive claims. Although Michigan's rates are considered to be among the highest in the nation, there is strong pressure to increase them. Present rate here is \$27 per week up to \$44 with dependents. Ohio pays \$30 and \$35. Average payment in Indiana is \$24 per week. Kentucky pays \$28, nothing extra for dependents.

Health Department Reports Total of 394 Cases of Measles

According to figures released by the Washtenaw County Health Department, approximately 450 cases of measles have been reported in the county to date this year. This includes 394 cases tabulated officially from Jan. 1 through March 31 and an increasing number being reported daily but not yet completely tabulated.

Dr. Otto K. Engelke, director of the Health Department, said yesterday that gamma globulin is available for use as "shots" for young children who have been exposed to reduce the severity of the attacks. A limited amount, he said, is also available for adults who have been exposed.

Measles "epidemic" years run in three-year cycles, it was pointed out and this year was expected to see a large number of cases.

Mumps is also prevalent in the county with 215 cases reported through March 31.
