Rich Natural Gas Well Hit in Drilling Near Northville

A gas well, which Northville and South-Lyon area residents believe may be the "largest in the nation" was brought in on the Charles Nerretter farm on Chubb road, two miles west of Maybury Sanatorium Tuesday afternoon, May 11.

The gas was struck at a level of approximately 4,300 feet. Drillers were looking for oil and had struck some gas on Friday, May 7, and raised oil in paying quantities on Sunday.

Believing they would reach a deeper, larger oil pool, drillers continued operating and discovered the present gas supply estimated to produce 20,000,000 cubic feet per day.

The force of the gas pressure blew the heavy cable and drill out of the hole and high in the air with a thunderous roar. Workmen scrambled for safety and then turned to cap the hole to prevent danger of fire and explosion.

Nerretter, on whose property the rich gas well was drilled, is a former Kaiser-Frazer employee and has been laid off the past six months.

Last February oil and gas in paying quantities was found in wells drilled by William C. Taggart on the Roy LeMaster farm and the Ralph H. Wilson farm in Salem township and increasing numbers of drillers have been busy engaged in trying to locate oil in the northeast section of Washtenaw county since then.

This well on the Nerretter farm was being drilled by William C. Taggart of Edward Torosian & Associates.

Fibre Employees, Management Make Presentation

At the annual employee-management dinner of Central Fibre Products company Saturday evening, a check for \$1,335 was turned over as an employee-management contribution to the Washtenaw county Chapter of the American Cancer Society.

The presentation was made by Homer Conley, president of the Central Fibre Division of Local 437-UAW-CIO and was accepted for the Cancer Society by Mrs. John Chaplin, Chelsea Cancer chairman this year.

Central Fibre employee-management interest in the fight against cancer has increased steadily during the past six years since Burton French, plant foreman, died of the disease at the age of 28.

In his memory the employees established the Burton French Labor Relations scholarship at the University of Michigan and this year's scholarship student, Jerry Snyder, and his wife, were guests at Saturday's dinner. The dinner was served by women of the church dining-room.

Snyder was introduced during the after-dinner program and spoke briefly. In expressing appreciation he said that when he first learned of the scholarship fund he found it "hard to believe a company could exist where employees gave up a fund ordinarily used for a bigger and better Christmas party for themselves in order to establish a scholarship fund."

Dr. John W. Riegel, director of the Bureau of Industrial Relations at the University of Michigan and one of the committee which passes on the students who are to receive the Burton French scholarship, was one of the principal speakers at the dinner. He congratulated the employees and management of Central Fibre for their "harmonious relationship" and commended them for "not attaching a lot of strings and conditions to hamper the committee in awarding the scholarship."

Dr. Harry Nelson, national president of the American Cancer Society, gave a summary of the work being done by the Society to combat cancer in cooperation with the United States Public Health Service.

Dr. Nelson said that money contributed is used for education, service and research and stated that since 1946, a total of \$31,000 has been spent on cancer research.

Prior to 1946, Dr. Nelson said, there were no full-time cancer research workers, while at present there are 1,800 people engaged in full-time research to find ways of combating the disease.

He said statistics show that in spite of the fact that more and more people are now being cured of cancer mainly through earlier detection, more people are dying of the disease. Cancer of the lung, he explained, has been steadily increasing. Cancer in women is on the decrease because it is more easily diagnosed for early treatment. On the other hand, cancer in men has been increasing, he stated.

Dr. Nelson thanked the Central Fibre employees and management for their generous support of the work.

Donald Bacon, president of Central Fibre Products, in his closing remarks, said it was a source of satisfaction to him to know that the plant here had "a small part in the fine work being done by the American Cancer Society."

Electric Contractors, Union Join Forces in Re-Wiring Camp

Approximately \$9,500 worth of electrical work was done the past week-end, free of charge, at Camp Takonah, located at Clear Lake, which is a Young Women's Christian Association camp.

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

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

High Profits May Be Realized from Woodlot

Is there any money in annual income, in a woodlot?
"It's like a pretty fair income with soil fitting or fertilizing," said Paul J. Hood, Michigan State College soil scientist, as he read a story in the South Haven Daily Tribune. It was about a woodlot near Hood's home town of Covert.
"These figures show a \$25 per acre income for 88 years, just taking the interest and leaving the principal," explained Lester E. Bell, MSC extension forester. Here's the story of \$20,800 cash income from 10 acres.
Back in 1871, Adam Bowman came from Ohio and bought 40 acres south of Covert in Van Buren county. Clearing 30 acres and selling logs to a nearby sawmill for a possible top rate of \$10 per 1,000 feet, he built a home and started to farm. But the story is about the 10 uncleared acres.
In 1922, Bowman's son-in-law, Bert Stanley, sold some 20-inch trees to Pierce Williams company for \$2,100. Two years later he sold the farm for \$4,000 to James Sarno who still owns it.
Sarno bought no coal for 20 years, using about 20 cords of wood a year from his woodlot of beech, hardwood, elm, maple, sycamore, oak and white oak. He also harvested some maple syrup.
In 1945, Sarno sold the 20-inch trees to the same company for \$15,000 but reserved the tops and 38 basswoods. The tops provided 300 cords of wood to sell for \$1,500. In 1950, the basswoods brought another \$500. When a gas main was laid through the property, the damages payment was \$975. He sold another 125 cords of stovewood for \$825, found enough to give him a double garage with logs to build a spare lumber, and still has 200 trees of more than 20 inch diameter.
That's a total of \$20,800 from wood sold, not counting home use.





Telephone Rate Increase Denied by Commission

Lansing — The Public Service Commission has denied the application of Michigan Bell Telephone Company for a rate increase.

Clifton W. Phalen, company president, said the decision "imposes a serious handicap upon the successful operations of this business which is so vital to the public interest." He reserved comment on the company's next step.

The Commission contended company earnings are adequate after adjusting the company's investment downward by nearly \$88,000,000. It held that the company ought to increase its debt to lower its Federal income taxes. It said Western Electric Company, manufacturing arm of the Bell System, should be regulated as a utility in order to reduce Michigan Bell's investment in Western-made equipment.

"The order," Phalen commented, "overlooks basic economic facts, chief of which is that the price of our service, like any product, should reflect the costs of producing that service." He pointed out company rates have gone up on the average, only 27 per cent since 1948 while the cost of living has risen 90 per cent. Investment per telephone is also increasing, he said.

"We must have a price for our service that covers all costs of doing business or something must give. Our payroll exceeds \$100,000,000 a year. We are spending more than \$40,000,000 a year on expansion and improvement of service—an important factor in the state's economic welfare. To carry on this construction work, we must obtain capital in competition with other industries. Satisfactory savings are essential to attract that capital."

Michigan Bell filed its application a year ago in June. It asked for increases averaging 3 cents per telephone per day.
