

Annual Poppy Day Sale Will Be Held on Streets Friday

American Legion, VFW Organizations Both Participating

Members of the American Legion Auxiliary and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary will be at their stations on the downtown streets from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. tomorrow, May 28, for the annual Poppy Day sale.

Mrs. George West, Poppy Day chairman for the American Legion Auxiliary, in soliciting the support of the community, pointed out that the funds derived from the poppy sale constitute the largest source of revenue for the rehabilitation and child welfare work of the Legion and Auxiliary. The money received from this source, she said, enables the Post and Auxiliary to carry out a constructive program of aid to the disabled and to the dependent families of veterans.

MEMORIAL SYMBOL

The crepe paper poppies are replicas of the Flanders Field poppy of World War I and have become a memorial symbol for the dead of all wars. The American Legion slogan for Poppy Day is "Honor the Dead—Aid the Disabled."

The VFW Auxiliary members will be assisted by Girl Scouts of Troop 1 after school tomorrow. Members of the VFW Auxiliary who are chairmen of Poppy Day for their organization are Mrs. Carl Lentz and Mrs. Clara Hutzler. Assisting them is Mrs. Mac Packard, Auxiliary president.

Mrs. Lentz said the VFW goal in Michigan this year is the sale of 1,100,000 of the paper flowers, which the VFW calls "Buddy Poppies."

HELPS ORPHANS

Mrs. Lentz said "We have obligations to the children at our National Home at Eaton Rapids, especially those whose fathers lost their lives in the service. We also recognize our continuing obligation to the disabled veterans and their dependents when we repeat our motto 'Honor the Dead—Aid the Living.' The support of the public tomorrow will help us carry out these obligations."

DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS

Mrs. Lentz explained that the VFW Auxiliary Poppy Day dollars are divided as follows: 45 cents to Post and Auxiliary relief funds; 15 cents to the Department rehabilitation fund; 10 cents to the National Orphans Home and Hospital; 10 cents to the National Rehabilitation fund; 2 cents to cost of materials; 8 1/2 cents to cost of literature and sales promotion; and 2 1/2 cents to disabled veterans for assembling the poppies.

Lima, Lyndon, Sylvan Receiving Dust Layer Coat

Washtenaw County Road Commission Manager Howard G. Minier said the county's "Operation Dust Layer" is now in progress with the completion date set for July 1.

Eighteen townships are participating in the project under the plan whereby the township pays for the material used and the county road crews and machinery do the work of applying the liquid chloride.

When completed, the project will have involved the use of 1,500,000 gallons of chloride at a cost of approximately \$60,000.

Sylvan township roads were treated the first of this week and Lyndon township roads are now being coated.

Lima township is next on the list, Minier said. He estimated that it takes approximately three days to finish the more sparsely settled townships.

Mabel W. Fox Named To Presidency of Area Teachers Club

Miss Mabel W. Fox, local teacher, was last Monday evening elected president of Southeastern Michigan Area Teachers Club, an organization of 8,000 members. She was also named by the club as its official expense-paid delegate to the Representative Assembly of the National Education Association to meet at New York this summer. This will be the eighth consecutive year that Miss Fox has attended.

Miss Fox is active in teacher club work. She is also a member of the board of directors of Michigan State Teachers Club, member of the state Public Relations Commission of the M.E.A., a delegate to the Representative Assembly of the M.E.A., a member of Region 8 (M.E.A.) Planning Council. Locally she is chairman of the Board of Stewards of the Methodist Church, secretary to the Library Board, member of the Woman's Club, and treasurer of the Chelsea Teachers Club.

Episcopal Church Starts Diocesan Mission in Chelsea

The Episcopal Bishop of Michigan, the Rt. Rev. Richard S. M. Emrich, has recently designated Chelsea as the site of a new diocesan mission. The location has not yet been decided, but a brief future site is under consideration. It is expected that Sunday services will begin soon.

In communities showing promise of considerable expansion, such as Chelsea, where a number of Episcopalians may be located, the Bishop of the diocese may, on the request of those interested churchmen, establish a mission. Such a mission may be sponsored by the diocese in which it is located or by the nearest established parish church. Once a mission has proved itself financially and by adding to its congregation, it may, at some future date obtain permission to be re-established as a parish.

The group of churchmen in Chelsea is anticipating a bright future for this addition to the many fine churches in this community.

Chimes Installed on Electric Organ at Methodist Home

Chimes for the electric organ in the Methodist Home Chapel, a gift from the Chelsea Home Friends of the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Church, have been installed and may be heard daily at 6:45 a.m. and at sunset.

By means of four large amplifiers, the chimes can be heard for almost a mile. Mrs. Mildred Chever, who is on the Home staff, is organist.

Chimes recordings of some 40 familiar hymns were also given by the Chelsea Home Friends group and provide much enjoyment for the residents.

Recent activities at the Home include an inspection tour by a Detroit Youth Caravan group. The group, under the direction of Mrs. Elsie Ayers, of Hillsdale, Methodist Youth director, had visited the Methodist Children's Village at Redford before touring the Chelsea Home.

This week, on Monday, Rev. M. J. Betz, superintendent of the Home, Rev. R. E. Bachus, retired minister living there, Rev. William Follwe of Adrian, and Rev. Ira Cargio of Fowlerville, with Mrs. Betz and Miss Cora Simpson, visited the Chelsea Home to observe the Memorial at Unadilla. The four pastors are on a committee for the Detroit Conference Historical Society and were delegated to study the possibility of moving the memorial boulder and plaque to the Methodist youth camp in the Irish Hills near Wampler's Lake.

The memorial was erected Sept. 21, 1928, near the old Methodist church at Unadilla, the mission-ary's birth place. The building is now a Presbyterian church.

Judson Collins was born at Unadilla in 1823 and received an MA degree as a member of the University of Michigan in 1845. He taught for one year at Albion College and then came to Chelsea as first Methodist missionary in 1847. He died in 1852 and his body was brought to Unadilla for burial.

Miss Simpson was especially interested in seeing the grave and the memorial, she said, because she had heard so much about Collins from the people in China during the years she lived and worked there.

Methodists Begin Funds Campaign for Redecorating Church

The Methodist church will this week launch a fund-raising campaign among its members and friends to raise \$4,177 toward a triple property improvement project.

The Official Board has secured bids on washing and painting the church proper and the League room and they hope to have the work started within two weeks.

Bids are also in on a new roof of colored interlocking shingles. The roofing companies recommended having the stone work on the church exterior pointed up prior to the laying of a new roof, and plans are being made to have this work done by stone masons. The triple project will cost more than \$5,000 but the church has \$1,000 on hand toward the painting.

While the entire Board will be active in raising the funds, plans for the campaign are headed by a committee composed of the following: Miss Mabel Walker, lay chairman; Lyman Walker, lay leader; Rev. S. D. Kinde, pastor; Calvin Summers, treasurer; and Raymond Schaefer, chairman of the Commission on Finance.

The Methodist Men's Club has turned in a check of \$80 toward the project. Funds were raised by the men serving an Easter breakfast at the church.

Veterans Council Cites Need for Start on Children's Facility

Approximately 80 persons representing organizations of the entire county attended the meeting of the Washtenaw County Council of Veterans, held Monday evening at the American Legion Home in Ann Arbor to discuss the possible early construction of a children's facility for the county.

E. W. Eaton, a member of the Veterans Council Children's Facility committee, Police Chief George Boer and High School Principal John Griffin were the Chelsea representatives who attended.

Eaton said there was a thorough discussion as to the need for such a facility for children, possible type of building and most satisfactory site for its construction. A new building would be required, it was agreed.

A Board of Supervisors' committee, headed by Mrs. Ruth T. Dana of Ann Arbor, is working on a report which is not expected to be completed in time for action at the June meeting of supervisors. Thus it appears a proposal for a bond issue to finance a new building for detention purposes for children will not be possible before November.

Melvin Pierce, chairman of the Veterans Council Children's Facility committee, of which Eaton is a member, presided at Monday's meeting.

Pre-Kindergarten Clinic Held for Parents, Children

The pre-kindergarten conference for children who will be entering kindergarten in the fall, and their parents, was successfully carried out at identical morning and afternoon sessions at the elementary school Friday.

Thirty-five rural children and their mothers were present for the morning session and 55 town children and their mothers were present in the afternoon. It was pointed out that the smaller number present in the morning was caused, in part, by inconvenience or lack of transportation and actual kindergarten enrollment from rural areas will probably equal that of the Chelsea area.

Robert Martin, elementary school authority, Superintendent Charles Cameron, Elementary Principal Arthur Schunk and County Health Nurse Bette McKinney, spoke at both sessions.

Barrie Fisher and Jane McLaughlin assisted Elementary PTA members in serving cookies and cold drinks to the children, and cookies and coffee to the parents. A group of high school girls also assisted.

Miss McKinney made special mention of the dental fluoride treatment to be given here again this summer and several parents immediately signed applications for their children to participate.

Final Plans for Summer Recreation To Be Made Tonight

Chelsea Recreation Council will meet at the High school at 8 o'clock tonight (Thursday) to settle final matters pertaining to the summer recreation program. Representatives of all organizations supporting the project are to attend the meeting.

A financial report to be given during the business session will determine whether an assistant supervisor can be hired so playgrounds at both schools may be used.

Chief of Chaplains Will Dedicate Veterans Memorial

Major General Ivan L. Bennett, retired chief of chaplains of the U. S. Army, will give the dedication address at Saturday's dedication ceremonies and unveiling of the memorial to four chaplains who lost their lives Feb. 3, 1943, when their ship, the Dorchester, was torpedoed in the North Atlantic.

The memorial, of white Carrara marble, sculptured by Bernhard Zuckerman in Carrara, Italy, was designed by Carleton Angell, artist for the University of Michigan museum.

The memorial has been placed in Arborcrest Cemetery, Ann Arbor, in a garden designed by Harlow O. Whittemore of the U. of M. Department of Landscape Architecture, for the men of the military and their families.

The four chaplains who died together were John P. Washington, a Catholic priest, Alexander Goode, a Jewish rabbi, and Clark V. Poling and George L. Fox, Protestant clergymen.

Honor guests at the dedication at Arborcrest cemetery at 2 p.m. Saturday, will include Mr. and Mrs. Frank Heusel who donated the dedication flag which originally covered the casket of their son, Myrl Deibert, killed in Germany in 1944; Carleton Angell and Bernhard Zuckerman, the sculptors; Prof. Harlow Whittemore; Joseph H. Ritzheim, Michigan Department VFW commander; and William Casper, of St. Thomas Parish, Ann Arbor.

Taking part in the program are the Ann Arbor High School band; Lyra Male Chorus, Ann Arbor clergymen, and representatives of the four branches of military service.
