Staff Complete for Opening of Schools On Tuesday, Sept. 7

Public Schools Will Start Year with 14 New Teachers

Chelsea schools will open Tuesday, Sept. 7, including Chelsea High school, Chelsea Elementary school, St. Mary's and most rural schools.

At Chelsea High school books will be on sale Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 31 and Sept. 1. Lockers will also be issued both days.

Pre-school teachers' meetings will be held Thursday and Friday, Sept. 2 and 3.

Buses will begin the school year on the same schedule as last year's runs. Superintendent Charles S. Cameron announced this week that pupils should be at their regular bus stops a few minutes early.

The first day of school, Sept. 7, the buses will make the afternoon runs after school a little earlier than the customary time.

There will be 14 new teachers in the public school this year.

Mrs. Joanne Moore Gagnon, who received a BA degree from Michigan State College in 1950, is a new kindergarten teacher.

She is making her home here with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Moore, while her husband, Larry, is in the service.

Miss Ann Nelson of Ann Arbor, who will teach a second grade section, received her BA degree from the University of Michigan this year.

There are two new third grade teachers: Miss Mary Ellen Fryfogle of Grand Rapids, whose BA degree was awarded this year at the University of Michigan, and Mrs. Paula Balfour of Ludington, a 1954 graduate with a BS degree from Central Michigan College.

Miss Sylvia Arkin of Detroit, who earned her BA degree at the University of Michigan this year, will teach fifth grade and Miss Evelyn Brance of Flint, with a 1954 BS degree from the University of Michigan will be a sixth grade teacher.

The new basketball and track coach is Ray Glasser of Bronx, N. Y. He will also teach social science and will be in charge of driver training.

He coached the freshmen basketball team at Kalamazoo College for two years and received his BA degree from Kalamazoo College this year.

Mrs. Shirley Roof, another U. of M. graduate, received a BA degree in 1948 and MA degree in June 1952. Her home is at Lark, N. Dak. She has taught at Fairview, Mont., and at Dowagiac, Ann Arbor, and is now teaching at Chelsea.

She will also teach commercial subjects. Latin and English will be taught by Mrs. Barbara MacGregor of Lansing, who graduated from the University of Michigan, receiving her BA degree in 1951. She is to receive her MA degree this year.

Miss Marion Frye, a 1954 graduate of Alma College, has a BA degree received in June. She will teach speech, English and junior high subjects.

James Young, director of Dearborn School Camp at Mill Lake the past two and one-half years, and a 1950 graduate with a BS degree from Stout Institute, Menomonie, Wis., will teach junior high social sciences and Math. His home is at Menomonie.

Vocal music will be taught by Miss Martha Smith of Eaton Rapids, who graduated from Western Michigan College with a BA degree in 1954.

Speech correction instructor is to be Miss Mary Ann Dineen of Columbus, Ohio. She graduated from Ohio State University in 1952 and taught last year in Dayton, Ohio. She has a BA degree.

Procedure Listed For Kindergarten Pupil Enrollment

Arthur Schmunk, elementary school principal, announced this week that the initial arrangement of classes will be similar to that followed last year except that two teachers have been added. He said numbers of pupils to be accommodated in the health room, kitchen and all-purpose rooms will be kept to a minimum and when the new north elementary school is completed it is planned to move a section each of grades one through five to that building.

In general, these will be children who reside in the north portion of the school district.

Kindergarten children from the rural area are to come to school at 9 a. m., accompanied by a parent, and village children are to come in at 1 p. m., also accompanied by a parent.

Parents will be expected to furnish transportation for kindergarten children the first week of school or until bus schedules are arranged.

Mr. Schmunk said children will need pencils, paper, crayons and their own lunch on opening day. Text books are furnished by the district.

Soon as Possible

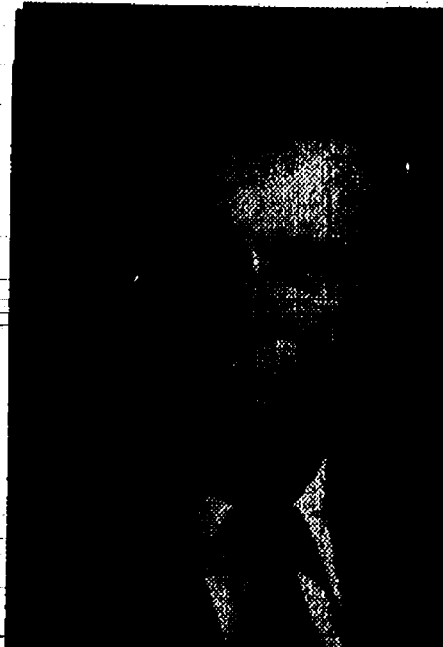

Students who registered in the spring should see High School Principal John Griffin before school opens if any schedule changes are contemplated.

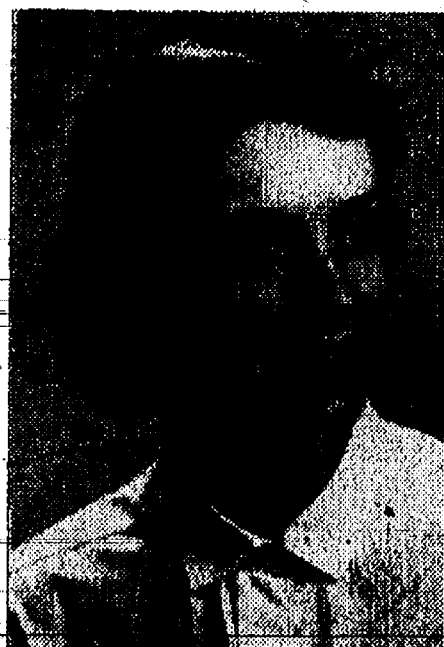

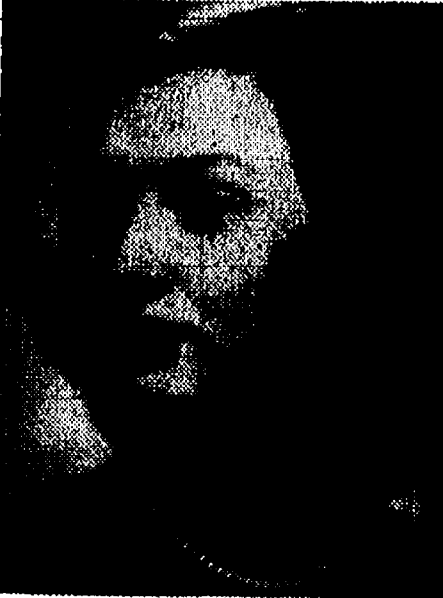

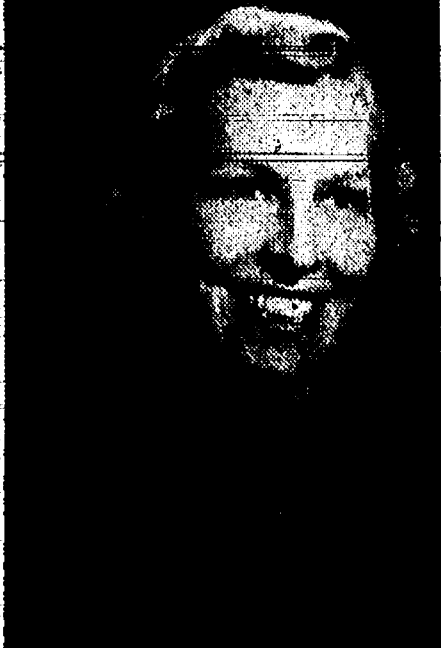

The emergency drive at this time of the year was necessitated because of the huge expense involved in fighting polio by means of gamma globulin, a precautionary measure following exposure to the disease, and the Salk trial vaccine tests given this summer and now being evaluated by physicians and technicians across the country.

Washtenaw county workers are hoping to raise \$20,000 in the present campaign. As of July 1, the county's polio fund treasury contained less than \$3,000.

Youngsters got into the swing of the campaign, also, when Jeffrey and Craig Seeley, Carol Wilkerson and Chris Kreider made arrangements for a popcorn, homemade candy and cold drink sale at the corner of Grant and Chandler streets. The sale was to be held at 1:30 yesterday afternoon.

All proceeds of the sale will be turned over to the Emergency March of Dimes.

The home-made candy was made by the Seeley boys' grandmother, Mrs. Grover Douglas, while the popcorn and cold beverages were contributed by mothers of the youngsters.

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Group Files Application for Community Chest Charter

Efforts on the part of a committee representing the Woman's Club of Chelsea in promoting action to institute formation of a Community Chest in Chelsea are proving successful as indicated by action taken at a Community Chest committee meeting Tuesday evening.

Present at the meeting, held in the Village Council room in the Municipal building were a group of men and two women representative of a cross section of the entire community and headed by William Rademacher as chairman.

This general committee was named early this year to form a Community Chest and at Tuesday's meeting they approved the first by-laws and charter for filing this week with the Corporation and Securities Commission in Lansing.

The group also nominated seven people to serve on the first board of directors. The seven are Mrs. Warren Daniels, William Rademacher, Stuart R. Booker, Maxwell G. Sweet, Charles Blanchard, Charles Baize and Ishmael Picklesimer.

Approval of the charter and by-laws at Lansing will pave the way for an organization meeting which is to be held at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, Aug. 31, in the Village Council room. The public is invited to attend the meeting.

The seven board nominees will be voted upon and seven more directors will later be elected by them.

The full board is to include a total of 21 members, the third group of seven to be appointed by the organizations which will benefit from the Community Chest. This first 21-member board of directors will serve until January when a permanent board is to be elected.

Everyone who makes a contribution to the Community Chest will be eligible to vote at the January annual meeting. Since practically all people in the community have customarily contributed to the various drives for funds here, it is reasonable to suppose a combined drive under a Community Chest set-up will be supported by the same contributors, automatically entitling them to vote at the meeting.

The two women included on the committee which has laid the foundation for the Chelsea Community Chest are Mrs. Warren Daniels and Mrs. James Hough of the Woman's club.

Read Label When Buying Your New Raincoat

Girls who are starting to collect a school wardrobe for fall probably have "raincoat" down on that shopping list.

Clothing specialists at Michigan State College offer these tips to help you select the kind of rainwear you want:

If the label says "waterproof," you'll know that the fabric has been treated to shed water completely... even in driving rain. Plastic coats and "slickers" come in that class. But, remember... that treatment also closed the "pores" of the fabric so no air can penetrate. And some people find this type hot and uncomfortable.

"Water repellent" raincoats are comfortable because they maintain their porous quality. They have been chemically treated to make them resistant to wetting. They shed water satisfactorily except in a prolonged, hard rain. The MSC clothing specialists urge you to look for a close, firm weave if you buy a water repellent

raincoat—whether made of cotton, rayon, silk, nylon or a blend of fibers. Look, too, for the tag that indicates whether the water repellent finish is durable or non-durable. A non-durable finish would mean you must have the finish restored with each dry cleaning or laundering—an expensive process.

FFA Students Report on Visit to Amish Area Farms

Chelsea High school's FFA students and their advisor, Philip Smith, with Charles Powers driving the school bus in which they traveled, arrived in Chelsea at 10 p.m. Saturday from a six-day trip during which the visited farms in the Amish community near Lancaster, Pa.

They reported a successful, enjoyable and educational trip, the only casualty being Philip Smith who had his right forefinger thrown out of joint as he was playing ball while waiting to start back Saturday morning. The trip home was delayed about three hours while he was in the hospital having the finger set and taped.

The group had spent the night at Hyde Park at Niagara Falls by special arrangement after visiting the Falls on Friday.

They began their trip at 6 a.m. Monday, Aug. 16, traveling 600 miles in 15 hours. Because of rain the bus stalled at one point and they were late getting to camp at Caledonia State Park, near Gettysburg, Pa., so they had their supper at Chambersburg. They had intended to get their own meal at camp.

Tuesday they were taken on a two-hour guided tour of the Gettysburg battlefield and in the afternoon went to Lancaster where they visited the county agricultural agency and were given a list of farms that were considered especially interesting for them to see.

That same afternoon the group toured the Harry Mumma farm at Landisville which grows tobacco and is also a dairy farm.

Mumma explained the tobacco industry to the FFA boys and told them that \$500 an acre may be grossed from a tobacco crop. He also told them that he gets \$6.40 per cwt. for the Golden Guernsey milk produced on his farm. The boys were surprised to learn the price of the milk as compared to the less than 10¢ per cwt. being paid for milk in Michigan.

The boys also were told that land in the Amish country sold for from \$700 to \$1,000 per acre for farming purposes and they heard of one instance where a farmer had paid \$1,200 per acre.

One of the barns they visited was built of stone and was in excellent condition in spite of the fact it was built before 1800.

Tuesday night was spent at French Creek State Park after visiting a 240-acre farm run by Ralph Martin and his two sons.

near Lancaster, as a hog and heavy steer feeder project.

Wednesday's itinerary included a visit to the Turkey Hill dairy farm owned by Arthur P. Frey. The 800-acre farm has been owned by the Frey family since the early 1800's and boasts a modern "milking parlor" and pen-type stables. There are 130 cows. On this farm, the sons of the family operate a dairy and sell ice cream and milk.

Smith said the FFA group was taken to the back end of the farm for a most beautiful view of the Susquehanna river.

Their planned trip to Philadelphia was canceled because of lack of time and, instead, the group visited Valley Forge where George Washington spent the winter during the Revolutionary War.

Thursday night they stayed again at French Creek and on Friday headed toward New York state. Enroute they visited the Hershey Chocolate factory at Hershey, Pa., and the Hershey Estates farm units, a private vocational school for orphans. The units each have 25 boys who are learning farm management under a plan financed by a trust fund set up by Hershey forbeare.

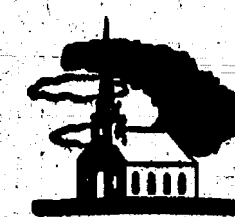

Stop Signs Erected on All Intersections with Chelsea-Dexter Road

Howard G. Minier, Washtenaw county Road Commission manager, announced yesterday that stop signs were erected this week on all roads intersecting the black-topped Chelsea-Dexter road. Eventually, all primary blacktop roads in the county will be posted in line with the county's long-range road improvement program, Minier pointed out.

Minier also announced that a report of a study of Washtenaw county road needs for the next 10 years, as ordered by the Michigan State Highway Commission in response to President Eisenhower's request for a national study of road needs for that period, was completed this week and sent to Lansing yesterday.

The report includes highway and bridge construction projects which would need to be done in 10-year program to make all highways and bridges adequate for traffic but does not include the cost of regular road maintenance work.

Minier said the figures for Washtenaw county are "astronomical."

Philip Winslow Injured When Horse Rears Backwards

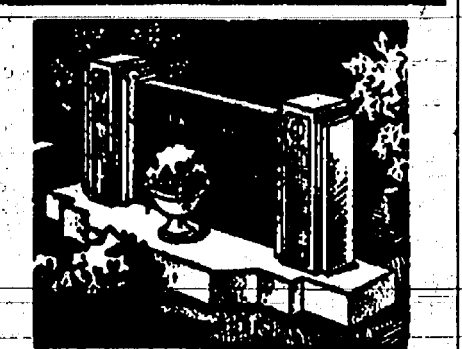

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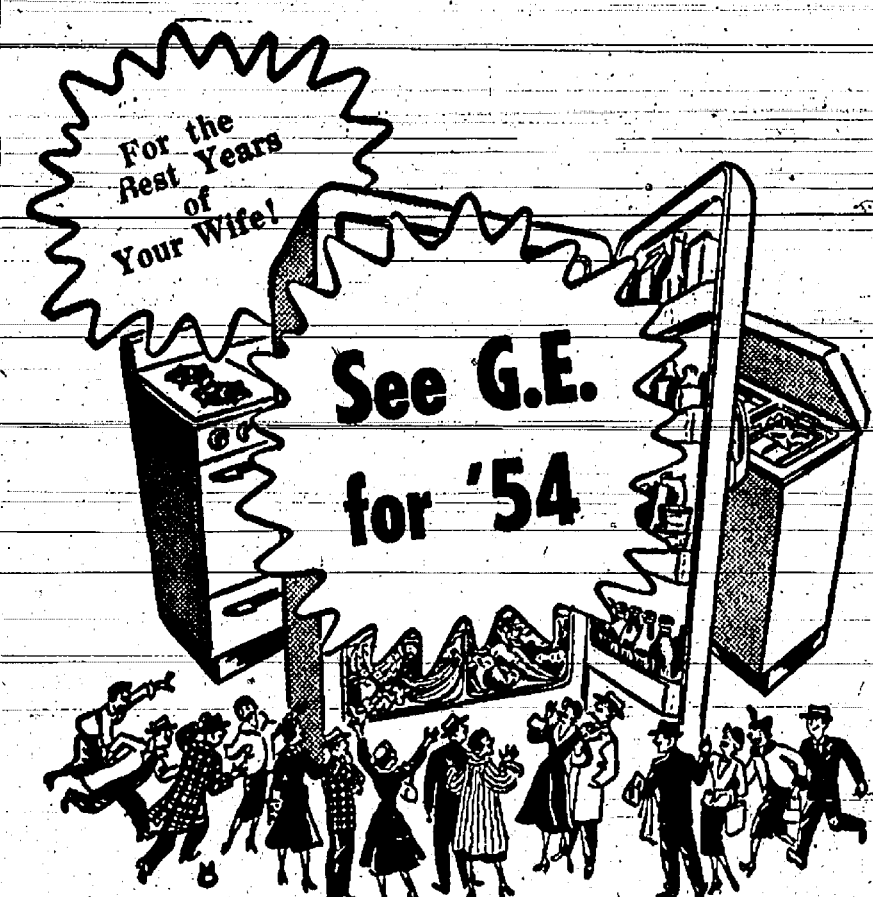

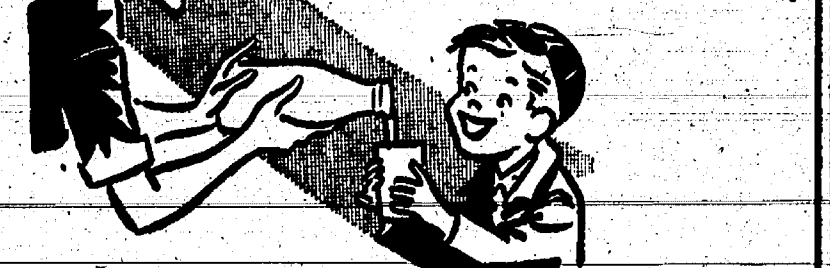
