## SANTA CLAUS WILL STOP HERE SATURDAY

### Blood Clinic Will Be Held Next Tuesday

90 Per Cent of Blood  
Given Will Stay  
Here for Area Use

Next Tuesday, Nov. 30, is the date for the Chelsea Community Blood Bank blood donor clinic, scheduled to be held from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. and from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. in the Congregational church basement.

Mrs. Dudley Holmes, Blood Bank chairman, has been visiting local factories this week to arrange appointments for personnel who will pledge cards. These appointments are so arranged that donors need be at the clinic only about 30 minutes.

Yesterday Mrs. Holmes repeated her request that women of the community, as well as business people and workers in downtown stores, plan to contribute blood. She said this group could be worked in at any time during the clinic without appointment ahead of time.

The Red Cross workers who will be in charge of the clinic will be working with an 8-bed unit, operating on a schedule which requires a minimum of the donors' time. Ten donors can be handled every 15 minutes.

Local registered nurses and other assistants have volunteered to work at the clinic.

Ninety per cent of all blood contributed at the clinic will remain here for local use, according to a new ruling in effect this year. The new plan is made possible because of changes in the national defense program.

Formerly only 50 per cent of blood contributed locally remained here for use of people of the community, those eligible to receive blood including all people who live or work here.

### Monday Evening Fire Damages Powell Restaurant

Fire discovered at 9 o'clock Monday night did an estimated damage of \$1,500 to the interior of Powell's restaurant, 105 North Main street, according to Chelsea Fire Department records.

The fire, of undetermined origin, is believed to have started under a counter, severely damaging the counter and ruining an adding machine. Spreading to the north wall, shelving, cupboards and a portion of the wall were burned. Heat of the fire badly blistered the paint on the entire ceiling and there was extensive smoke damage.

The restaurant was closed for the night when the fire started and firemen had to break down doors at the front and rear of the building to get inside, according to Fire Chief Ted Balmer.

Mr. and Mrs. Clifton Powell operate the restaurant in the two-story building which is owned by Alfred Schneider.

### Move to New North Elementary School Completed Monday

The move from the South Elementary to the new North Elementary school was smoothly accomplished over the week-end, everything being in readiness Monday morning for the 150 pupils of grades one, two, three, four and six who are the first to be assigned to the newly-completed building on McKinley road.

Elementary Principal Arthur Schmunk and School Superintendent Charles Cameron said pupils and teachers were very happy to only those who were transferred to the new school but those who have been in temporary quarters in the South Elementary school and are now in rooms of their own.

The new school now houses approximately 150 pupils while the South school has a total of approximately 450 children in grades kindergarten through six, inclusive.

The children who were transferred to the new school were given a holiday Friday to permit time for books, equipment and supplies to be moved and for teachers to get the rooms in readiness for the Monday morning classes.

From this fund, a television set is to be purchased for the Forney Clement children's ward project at the University of Michigan.

### Chest Funds Beneficiaries Are Listed

The Community Chest total for Chelsea's first campaign was announced yesterday to be "in excess of \$11,000" and Stuart R. Booker, president of the Community Chest board of directors, speaking for the board, expressed "sincere appreciation for the splendid response to the appeal for support of the drive by all segments of the Chelsea public." He included in the list individuals, merchants, commercial enterprises of all types and industries, including employees and management.

Booker said an important factor in the exceptional success of the drive was "the excellent work performed by all solicitors and committee chairmen."

Reports of the campaign were given at a meeting held in the Council room of the Municipal building Wednesday evening, Nov. 17, and allocations of funds to agency beneficiaries were listed as follows: American Red Cross, \$1,000.00; American Cancer Society, \$500.00; Boy Scouts of America, \$1,000.00; Chelsea Social Service Committee, \$500.00; Chelsea-Regeneration Committee, \$2,000.00; Chelsea School Band, \$500.00; Girl Scouts of America, \$300.00; Salvation Army, \$300.00; United Health and Welfare Fund, \$500.00; Contingency Fund, \$1,000.00; Expenses, years 1954 and 1955, \$570.00.

In addition to the above beneficiaries, invitations to participate in the Chelsea Community Chest were extended to the organizations in charge of soliciting funds for the March of Dimes, Michigan Society for Crippled Children and Adults, and the Washtenaw County Tuberculosis Association. None of these organizations accepted this invitation either because they conducted solicitation of funds by mail only or because affiliation with Community Chest organizations was contrary to the policy of their national organizations.

The agency in charge of collecting contributions for the Muscular Dystrophy Fund was inadvertently forgotten when the list of organizations who were to be invited to participate was compiled. However, the organization is a national one and its charter is one of those which do not permit inclusion in any Community Chest.

The next Community Chest board of directors meeting has been set for Dec. 15. At that time the annual meeting of the members of the Chelsea Community Chest will be designated for a date in January.

Campaign chairmen of the first Chelsea Community Chest drive were Lowell Davison and Alfred D. Mayer.

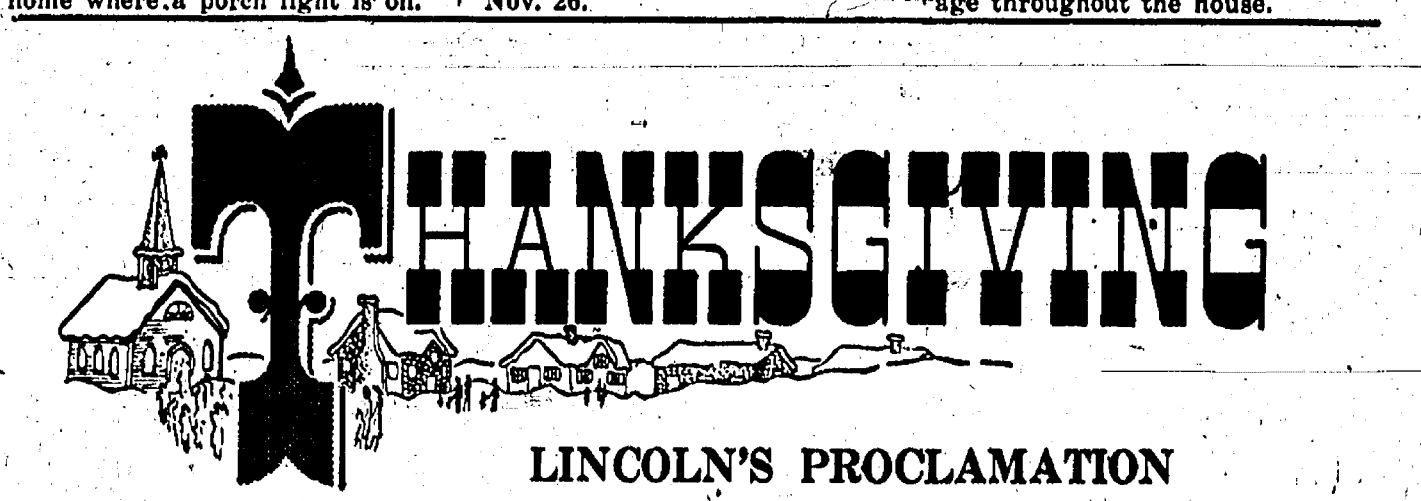
The Chelsea share is included in the total of 45,224 letters sent out for the entire county.

These numbers compared with last year's figures show an increase of 115 in the Chelsea area and an increase of 5,481 in the county as a whole.

More than 250 women from the county contributed some time Friday for the work of stuffing the envelopes which was done at VFW Headquarters, 314 East Liberty street, Ann Arbor. Among these were Mrs. Lloyd Heydlauff, Mrs. Robert Wagner, Mrs. Eugene Fish and Mrs. Warren Daniels. The latter is the Chelsea member of the Washtenaw county Tuberculosis Association and is on the executive committee.

Washtenaw county was entered in a national Christmas seal sale contest which was held to determine the county in the United States which contributed the largest per capita amount the first three days of the campaign which opened officially on Monday of this week.

The prize-winning county will have the premiere showing "Warner Brothers cinemascopes" "Silver Chalice," on Dec. 17.
