Plans Announced for
Essay Contest Open to
High School Students

"A Decade of Progress in Employing the Handicapped" is the title of the essays to be entered in a contest for 11th and 12th grade students, sponsored by Ypsilanti Lodge 76, American Federation of the Physically Handicapped, Inc. The contest closes Feb. 15, 1956 and essays chosen as the best ones by the total English teachers should be sent to Miss Ruth E. Loyster, 116 North Normal street, Ypsilanti, to reach her by that date. The state contest closes the same date.

Each contestant must submit two identical copies of the essay, one for the local contest and one for the state competition.

Rules of the contest may be secured from the students' English teachers.

Local prizes are \$5, \$3, and \$2 for first, second and third place winners.

State prizes are listed as a \$100 U. S. Defense bond for first place; \$50 bond, second place; and \$25 bonds for third, fourth and fifth prizes. All state winners will also receive a trip to Lansing.

Nationally, trips to Washington, D. C., and a total of \$2,000 in prizes will go to five winners.

The essays must contain no more than 1,200 words.

The contest is sponsored as a means of helping to focus public attention on the vocational skills and abilities of physically handicapped citizens and disabled war veterans.

This attention, it is believed, will be a means of assisting the handicapped to obtain "proper consideration for suitable employment in their search for job opportunities."

Judges for the Washtenaw county contest are Mrs. Marian Magoon of Michigan State Normal College, Thor F. Marsh and Gerald L. Post.

A parade of farm progress will greet visitors to the 1956 Centennial Farmers' Week. The change in agriculture is reflected in everything from exhibits to the general theme.

"A Century of Partnership—Agriculture and Michigan State" will be the slogan for the "winter fair" for the farmers of Michigan and nearby states.

The 40th annual Farmers' Week will be held on the MSC campus from Feb. 7 to 11.

For the first time, there will be no Saturday meetings during Farmers' Week. This leaves the day open for the beginning of the Michigan State College Centennial. Feb. 12 has been designated as Founders' Day for the celebration.

Another change on the 1956 program is moving the meetings of the Michigan Horse Breeders' and Michigan Dynamometer associations from Tuesday to Monday, to fill an otherwise light opening day program.

"Bangs Facts For You" meetings will be Tuesday to Thursday to acquaint farmers with the details of the disease and the fight to control it. This year there will be no Tuesday general sessions to make room for more individual meetings.

On Wednesday evening this year there will be an intercollegiate debate. Split teams from MSC and University of Wisconsin will debate the present agricultural price control support program.

Other changes see the Muck Farmers' exhibition condensed to eliminate Saturday and the postponing of the Soil conservation meetings until later in the year.

Roy Ives Writes
From Saudi-Arabian
Air Force Post

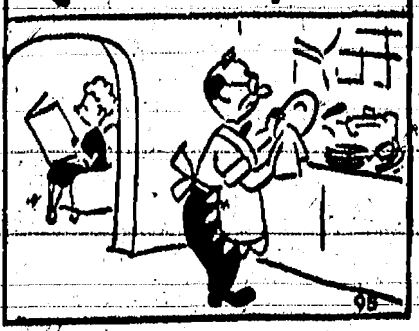
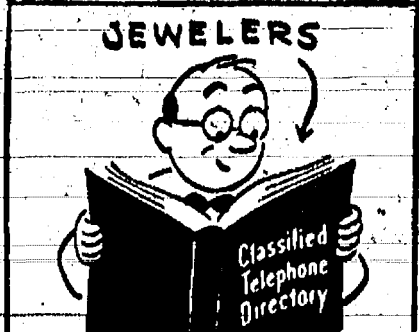
Mrs. Everett also enclosed a check-buget of the First Methodist church of Tucson which included a letter from Roy G. Ives, former Chelsea and Tucson resident, now a master sergeant in the U. S. Air Force and serving as a weather forecaster in Saudi Arabia.

Part of his letter reads as follows:

"Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from this land of Hadjed Maffi-Arabia for 'much of nothing.' However this is a misnomer for underneath its barren sandy and rocky surface is one of this earth's richest-known oil deposits—one of the reasons we are here. Again, it is a misnomer to use that term for there is a tremendous population considering the scarcity of vegetation. This is also a land of non-Christians where missionaries are prohibited and there is no Base Chapel service for Protestants being held unannounced behind the closed doors of the Base Theatre on Fridays, which is the Moslem Sabbath.

My recent journey to Jerusalem and Bethlehem has been the crowning achievement of my tour, for the inspiration of the ages comes when one views the beautiful Mount of Olives from the edge of the rim of the Cedron Valley near Saint-Stephen's gate overlooking the sacred Garden of Gethsemane.

I was astounded at the climatic and geographical similarity of Arizona and Jerusalem and its environs. But Arizona lacks that which Jerusalem has, the heritage of the three great religions of the World—Christianity, Judaism, Islam."

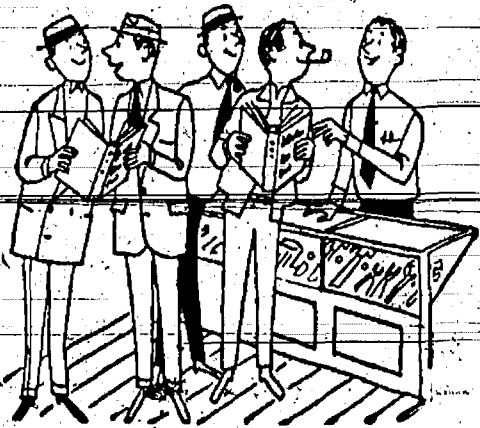

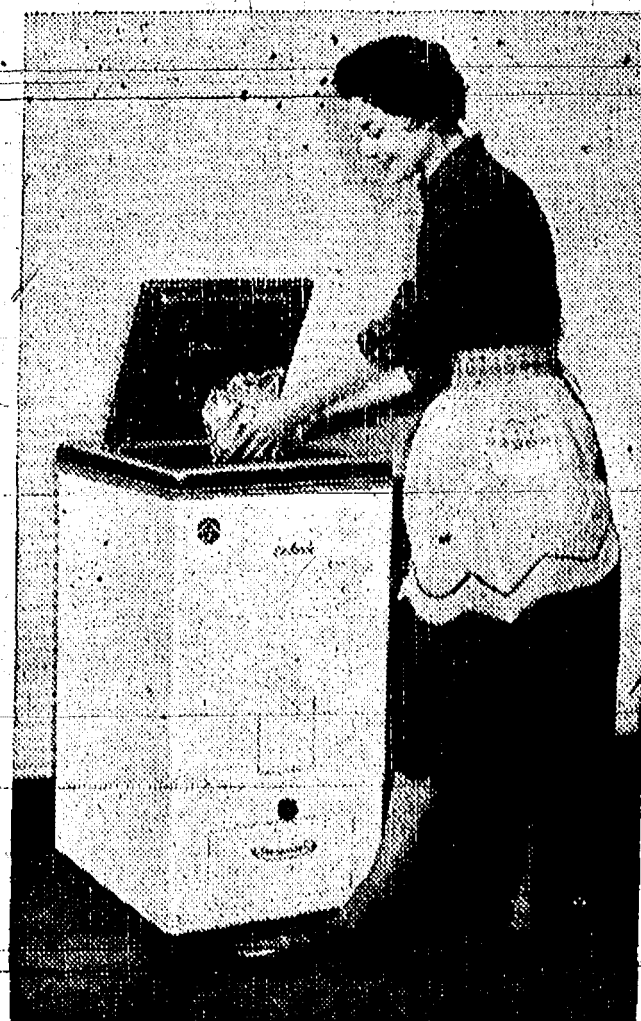

Michigan is getting the tax answer it expected weeks and months ago.

Rather than scour for another revenue source, Republicans are ready to extend the life of the business activities tax beyond March 15.

The tax is a story in itself. When adopted and allowed to become law without Gov. Williams' signature, tax law authors figured it would bring in \$32,000,000 a year and keep the budget balanced. Last year for the first time since the sales tax diversion plunged state government into red ink, the budget was balanced and the business activities tax was responsible.

Republicans, who forced it through the legislature over Williams' protests, believed they had arrived at a levy which kicked up a minimum of criticism and a maximum revenue.

During the first year, the take was around \$28,000,000—a sum still formidable, a budget-balancer. Republicans, who put the March 15, 1955 expiration date on the original bill, figured it would be well to extend the only tax bill in history that had not kicked up a storm of protest. Senator Carlton H. Morris (R-Kalamazoo), new chairman of the Senate taxation committee, put in a simple bill the first day.

of the 1955 session. It merely erased the expiration date. "It's better than looking for a substitute which would collect that kind of money with as little objection" he said.

But there is still a doubt whether it will be enough for next year, with demands coming in every hour on the hour for more money to run state government.

As an example, W. J. Maxey, state social welfare director, said he would turn in a \$5,000,000 deficiency request. The extra costs to maintain dependent children and the needy aged are responsible. Will there be anything else to add to the tax picture? Said Morris: "I'm not as yet prepared to say what new tax demands, if any, will be made on Michigan citizens."

Republicans and Democrats are at war again in the legislature. To set an example, the Democrats divided up committee assignments on the powerful State Administrative Board to give two holdover Republicans a proportionate representation. On the five-member committees, the two Republicans got two seats and on one three-member committee, one assignment. That was the pattern Democrats hoped would carry over in the legislature.

So, Republicans in the Senate rebelled. After day of hickering in a secret session, the Republican majority on the committee on committees, rejected the Democratic plea for a proportionate share of the seats.

As it now stands, the Democrats have much less than their proportionate membership on committees. Republicans say they're just following the Democratic policy when they had the majority in 1937.

This may not be news around Cadillac and its Caberfae ski resort, but Gerry Williams finally found a pair of ski boots that fit. There was a crisis when Caberfae, which had invited the entire

Williams family and other notables for a week-end, found that Gerry, the governor's only son, wore size 14 boots.

The story had just appeared when a shoemaker came into the executive office with an out-sized box. It contained ski boots for Gerry. Miss Julie Lawler, the governor's personal secretary, was shocked. "Are these for Gerry or Paul Bunyan?" she asked.

There were a lot of guesses, but the best one was that they were for Williams' 6 foot 2 inch son—who is one inch taller than his dad. "Michigan's second son" will get break this year, if all goes well in the legislature. Those receiving the \$70 a month maximum in Old Age Assistance will get \$80 and those requiring medical care \$90 if recommendations of the Social Welfare Commission are needed.

The commission made the proposal because rents and medical costs were increasing. Strangely, the cost of food is remaining constant.

Senator Harry F. Hittle (R-Lansing) introduced the bill. Then came Senator Philip Rahoi (D-Iron Mountain) with a proposal to increase both phases of the program to \$90 a month.

Hittle followed up with a bill to repeal the state law which allows the state to reclaim welfare money from the estate of the recipient after his death.

Michigan Farm leaders issued a warning to reduce rural worry over the coming of the St. Lawrence Seaway.

They agreed that untold wealth will accompany the widening and deepening of the channel from the Atlantic to the Great Lakes, bringing more people, industry and world markets.

"But we'll still need land for farming to feed all these people," said George S. McIntyre, state director of agriculture.

He said that the expansion of industry and residential suburbs possible with the Seaway boom threaten to overrun some of the better farm lands near the border lakes.

Agriculture in Michigan will be called upon to grow more food and livestock to feed the state and also to take advantage of the world markets. "We'll need the land we have now and more probably," McIntyre said.

Michigan State College will test the effectiveness of flu shots it has been providing free for several years.

Each fall when the students flock to the campus, they are offered the shots free when they complete proper flu doctors. They believe they do the trick and keep more students in classes instead of the infirmary, but they are going to make certain in tests this winter.

People will disagree over toll highways until they are completed and paid for, a period of time which may out-distance the life span of those who are building them. The toll theory is that those who use the roads pay for them. Free roads are financed from tax money, which often forces payment from people who never receive direct benefit.

After years of controversy, the new Michigan Turnpike Authority is getting started on a toll road between Detroit and the Saginaw-Bay City area.

It is the second try. Monroe residents objected so strongly to the Authority taking over the Detroit-Toledo expressway, a free road now under construction, that plans were abandoned to make it a toll highway.

Already complaints are being heard about the proposed Detroit to Saginaw-Bay City toll road. Farmers do not want to eliminate farm-to-market roads; resort people want exit points nearby; gasoline dealers want stations on the superhighway.

The law is quite clear on most points, giving the Authority power to make contracts for gasoline service on the highways, to build

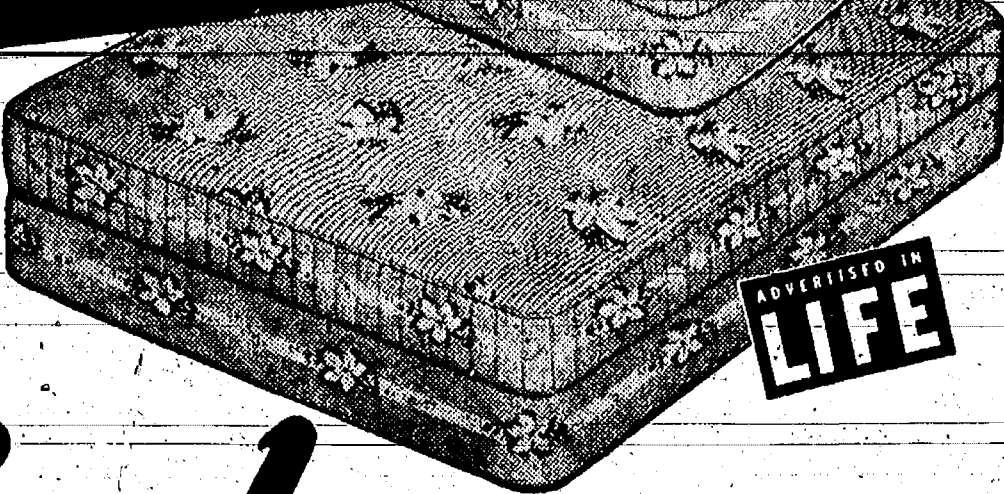

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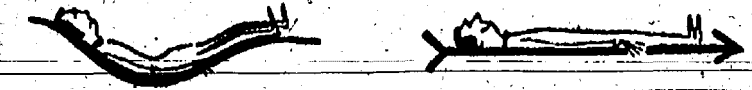

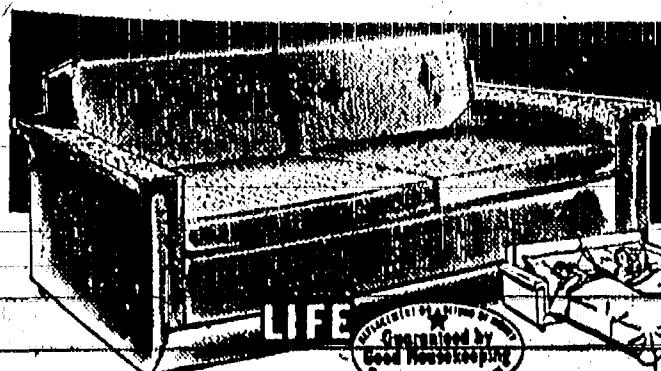

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the roads and sell revenue bonds to pay for them.

Public policy is expected to make certain in the legislature that farmers and resort owners, vacationists and "average" motorists are protected. For instance, one clause in the law requires that free highways come close to paralleling the toll roads.

Michigan will get \$551,000 in Federal money to improve airports in the state. Beneficiaries will be Willow Run airport near Ann Arbor, Detroit-Wayne County airport, Capital City airport at Lansing, Bishop Field at Flint, Kent county airport at Grand Rapids, and Muskegon County airport at Muskegon.

This is the first year that southwestern Michigan fruit growers and other businessmen have received "an adequate share" for their air terminals at Muskegon and Grand Rapids.

"Many of them use the air for shipment and personal travel," said Brig. Gen. Lester J. Matland, state aeronautics chief.

Another point in the increased Federal aid for the airports: employment which, especially around Muskegon and Detroit, has been at the crisis point for months.

Work is underway on two major prison buildings which are part of an emergency housing program. The inmate population

is creeping toward an all-time record of 10,000.

Corrections Director Gus Harrison said that the new \$250,000 dormitory at Ionia Reformatory for 230 more men and the \$50,000 man farm housing unit at Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson will ease the situation for another two years.

"In addition we can shift around and get room for 270 more, which should ease the situation considerably," he said.

To make the picture even brighter, a new 600-man prison will be built at Ionia. It is expected to be ready within two years when the population reaches a desperation point again.

More sales tax per person is collected from Michigan residents than from any other state except Wyoming according to Louis M. Nims, State Revenue Commissioner. In 1953-54 Michigan people paid an average of \$42.21 each. The per capita rate for Wyoming is \$43.95 only 77c higher than the wolverine state. In 27 states which have sales tax, the average collection per person averaged to \$28.58. California was third with \$38.04. Nims said Michigan is high because the state's income is very high, the tax base is very broad, and his department works very to collect it.

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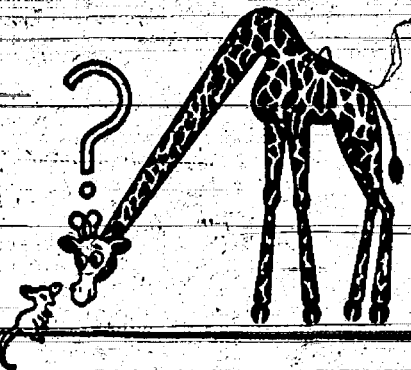

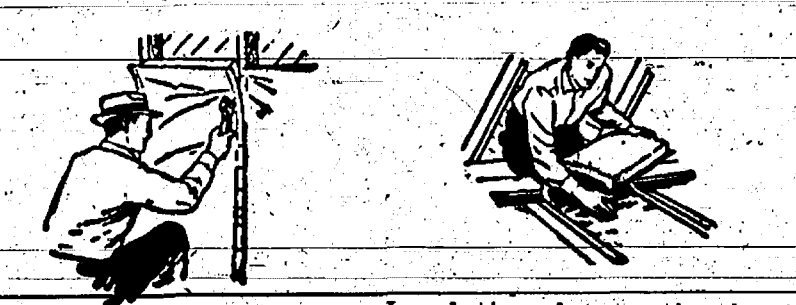

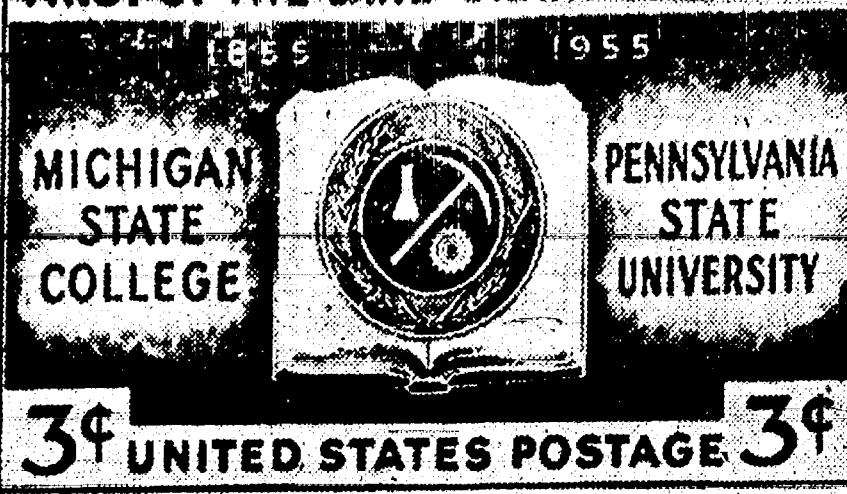

FIRST OF THE LAND GRANT COLLEGES



Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield has announced that this special three-cent stamp commemorating the centennials of Michigan State College and Pennsylvania State University will go on sale in East Lansing, Mich. on Feb. 12, exactly 100 years after the governor signed the legislative act establishing Michigan Agricultural College. The first such college in the nation, M.A.C.—now M.S.C.—became the model for the land-grant colleges set up under the Morrill Act of 1862. Pennsylvania State University established a farmers' high school in 1882 and it was made the Agricultural College of Pennsylvania one month before the Morrill Act was passed. The Centennial stamp is only the third in the history of U. S. Commemorative stamps honoring a college or university.

New U. S. Three-Cent Postage Stamp
Commemorates MSC Centennial Year

East Lansing—The new U. S. three-cent postage stamp honoring Michigan State College and Pennsylvania State University which will go on sale in East Lansing, Mich. on Feb. 12, exactly 100 years after the governor signed the legislative act establishing Michigan Agricultural College.

More specifically, the date of the stamp's sale marks the day exactly 100 years ago when the governor signed the legislative act establishing Michigan Agricultural College.

The first such college in the nation, M.A.C., now M.S.C., became the model for the land-grant colleges set up under the Morrill Act of 1862. Pennsylvania State University established a farmers' high school in 1882 and it was made the Agricultural College of Pennsylvania one month before the Morrill Act was passed.

The land-grant system proposed a new theory in education, that knowledge means progress and progress was meant for all. For the first time, a college was dedicated to serving all the people.

The commemorative stamp to be issued Feb. 12 is conceived as a tribute to the faith the two universities held to that original dedication.

Formal presentation of the stamp will take place at 10:30 a.m. on Feb. 12 in the lounge of Broly Hall on the MSC campus. The program will be open to the public.

Taking part in the special stamp program will be U. S. postal officials from Washington and Lansing, state officials from Michigan.

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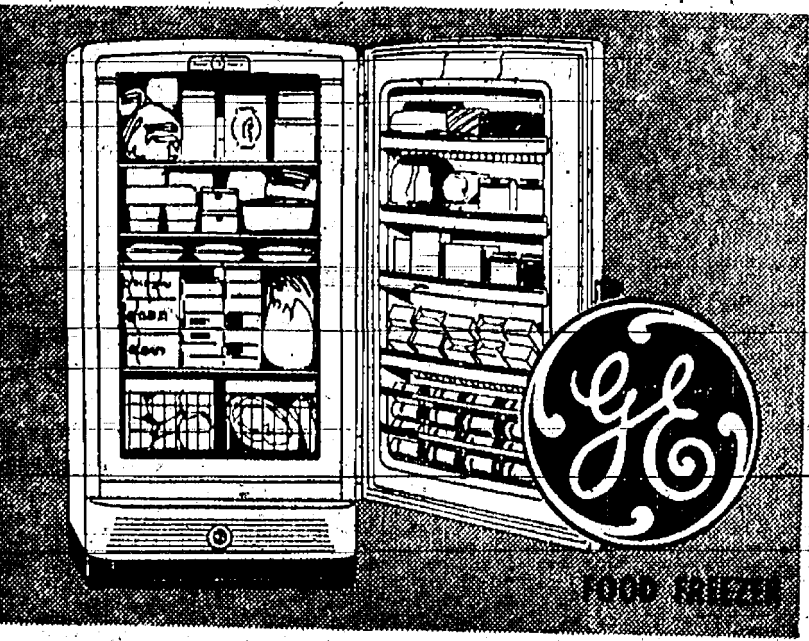
