Milan Victory Keeps Cagers In Top Spot

Flat Rock Contest
Friday Evening
To Be Real Test

Milan High school's basketball team was beaten by the Chelsea Bulldogs in a game played in the local gymnasium Friday evening. The score was 69-51.

The win keeps Chelsea tied with Saline for first place in the Huron Valley League.

Coach Ray Glasser said Friday's game followed the pattern of recent games, with Milan staying close to Chelsea in the first quarter, scoring and Chelsea then forging ahead in the second and third quarters to pile up a good lead and Chelsea reserves finishing the last quarter.

Score at the end of the first quarter was 21-20, in favor of Chelsea. The strong second and third quarter play of the Chelsea team brought the lead to 22 points.

Leading Chelsea scorers were Bruce Hoffman, 20 points; Bob White, 18 points; and Neil Buehler, 16 points.

The Chelsea team goes to Flat Rock for a game Friday, Feb. 11. Coach Glasser said the Flat Rock game will probably be the last real test the team will have before tournament time. He said Flat Rock has long been considered strong and tough, especially on their home floor and it will require top basketball play if Chelsea is to win.

Reserves will play at 6:45 p.m. and the varsity game is scheduled for 8 p.m.

Birth Record Needed
In Applying for New
Driver's License

Birth certificates or baptismal records are now required with the new drivers' license tests which went into effect over the state of Michigan Monday, Jan. 10, according to Police Chief George Dow.

Every person applying for a driver's license must take the new test which lists 25 sets of four questions each.

The test is not required for renewal of licenses for drivers already licensed. Out-of-state licenses also are accepted for renewal without taking the test.

Other requirements with new applications for drivers' licenses include complete road tests, such as stopping and starting on hills; parking; stopping and starting for at least two traffic lights and other safe driving practices.

**Immunization
Clinics Will
Be Repeated**

Immunization clinics, sponsored annually by the Washtenaw County Medical Society, will be conducted again this year beginning Feb. 28 according to Dr. Otto K. Engelke, Director of the Washtenaw County Health Department.

These clinics will be held in schools in various locations all over the county, and immunizations will be given for whooping cough, diphtheria, and tetanus or lockjaw. There will also be vaccinations for smallpox given at the clinics. These services will be free at the clinics.

A signed request slip must accompany each child before he is given any type of immunization. Separate request slips are required for smallpox and for the triple toxoid or double toxoid.

Triple toxoid offers protection against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus (lockjaw), while the double toxoid includes only the diphtheria and tetanus.

During this series of clinics, the triple toxoid will be offered to children through the age of 5 years, as recommended by the Medical Society, Michigan Department of Health and Civilian Defense Authorities.

The clinic schedule will be completed and printed in next week's issue of The Standard.

**Slippery Road

**Village Contributions
To March of Dimes
Reach Total of \$1,318**

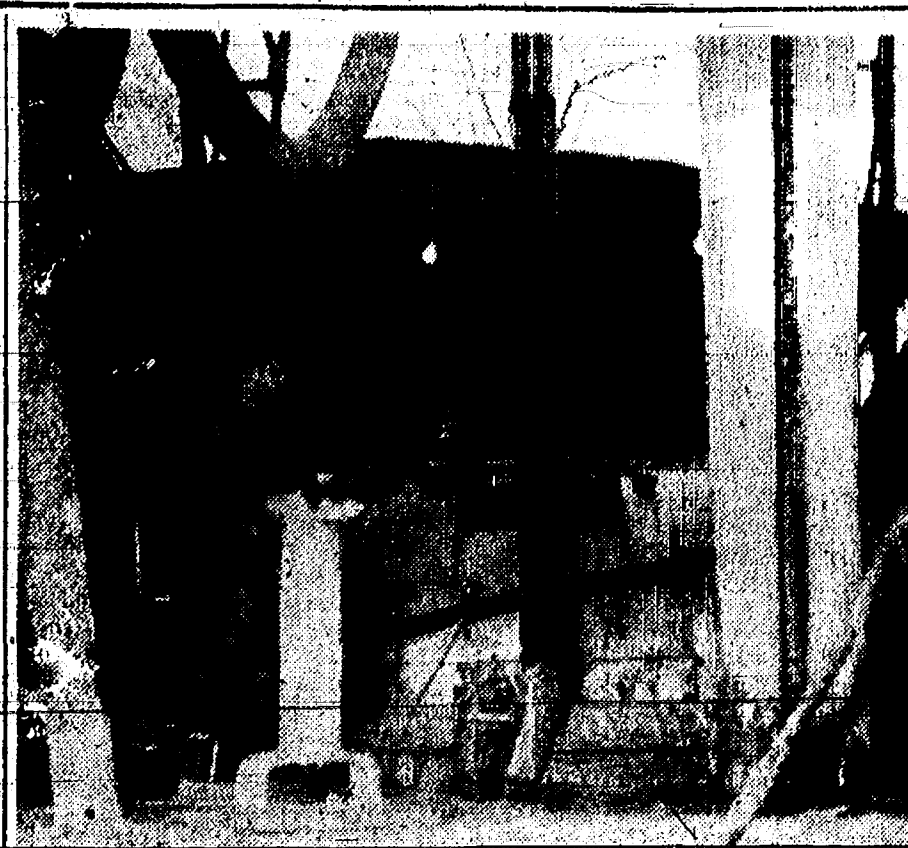
Mrs. Hugh Sorenson, Chelsea March of Dimes chairman, reported this week that the total amount contributed to date is \$1,318.92. No industrial gifts have been received, she said.

Her report lists the contributions as follows: special gifts, \$51.01; small business, \$46.00; organizations, \$112.00; dime cards, \$38.19; special events, \$104.27; Mothers' March, \$410.00; canisters (incomplete) \$105.55; schools (Cassidy Lake) \$32.90.

Last week's report of canister receipts for Chelsea included \$30.07 which is now credited to Sylvan township. Sylvan township's total was also incorrectly listed last week.

Correct total for Sylvan township now is \$149.41. This includes the \$30.07 from canister receipts and \$119.34 from all other sources.

Last year's total contributions for the Chelsea area amounted to \$3,008.89 in January and \$977.17 in the emergency drive in August.



LYNDON OIL WELL—A Gordon-Oil company rig from Minneapolis, drilling under contract for the Ohio Oil Co., had reached a depth of 4,954 feet when the above photo was taken Sunday afternoon. The test well is being sunk on the Edmund Cooper farm on Boyce road and is located approximately one-quarter mile west of the road in a woodlot at the back of the farm. It appears now that the well is turning out to be a dry hole, but much valuable data for future drilling in the area is being obtained from studies and chemical analysis of samples of rock and earth formations at various levels. The huge rig moved into position on the Cooper farm Nov. 28 and started drilling the next day.
