

## TB Testing of County Cattle To Start Soon

### Step Undertaken To Certify County As Disease Free

Tuberculin testing of cattle for re-accrediting Washtenaw county as a modified tuberculosis free area will soon begin under the co-operating program of the Michigan and U. S. Departments of Agriculture in the drive to eradicate animal tuberculosis.

All of the cattle in the following townships must be tested: Sylvan, Lima, Freedom, Sharon, Lyndon, Manchester, Bridgewater, Dexter, Scio and Webster. Records of the last test show 18,596 cattle tested with 87 reactors, for 0.46 per cent infection which is just under the requirements for re-accreditation.

The infection must not exceed one-half of one per cent in order for the county to qualify for re-accreditation as a modified tuberculosis free area. One half of each county is tuberculosis free every three years to meet these requirements. Latest estimate gives Washtenaw county a cattle population of 38,000, making it one of Michigan's large dairy counties.

Whenever reactors to the tuberculin test are found, they are appraised on the farm and must be shipped direct to a federal establishment in Michigan for receiving tuberculosis infected cattle are the Detroit Stockyards, Woolin Packing Co., Flint, and the Murray Packing Co., Plainwell. A permit is required to ship tuberculosis infected cattle interstate and then only to a federal inspected slaughtering plant or federal inspected stockyards.

Bovine tuberculosis has cost Michigan dairymen and stockmen thousands of dollars. Under certain conditions it is transmissible to man. It can also be spread to swine, poultry and other animals.

Tuberculin testing in Washtenaw county will be under the direct supervision of Dr. George L. Whitehead of Lansing, district veterinarian for the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Testing will be done by the local veterinarian whenever his services are available.

Even though tuberculosis infection in cattle has been reduced through continued testing in the past, this disease can re-establish itself under favorable conditions. The veterinarians solicit the cooperation of the herd owner in the testing of their cattle—tuberculosis may more successfully be eradicated.

Rain which fell throughout the night was believed responsible for keeping the foxes in their dens, many dens being sighted throughout the area.

Three sections were hunted in the Sharon area and one in the vicinity of Sugar Loaf Lake, and the day's activities were concluded at Lyndon Town Hall where mulligan stew was prepared and served at 4:30 p.m. by Mr. and Mrs. Orson Beaman and Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Guinan.

Discussion at Lyndon Town Hall after the hunt brought out the fact that the day was greatly enjoyed by men from the sponsoring groups and the area farmers who joined them.

Another hunt is planned for next year and it was decided to hold the event soon after the first of the year since hunting conditions would be more favorable then.

## Saturday Crash Fatal to Jackson Man

A Jackson man was fatally injured and another Jackson man seriously injured in a crash involving a west-bound truck, a west-bound car and an east-bound car on U.S. 12, one-quarter mile west of M-92, at 11:20 p.m. Saturday, according to police records.

Oliver Parker, 24, was the Jackson man fatally injured. He died at 5 a.m. in Foote hospital, Jackson.

The two injured men, also taken to Foote hospital, are William Norris of Jackson, who suffered left shoulder injuries, and Marvin Love, of Ann Arbor, who sustained chest and head bruises.

Love, driver of the west-bound car, was later released from the hospital but detained for further questioning about the mishap.

According to sheriff's deputies' reports, Love's car was in the center lane passing a truck driven by Cecil Boyd of Peoria, Ill. It was theorized that his car first collided with the rear fender of the east-bound car driven by Arthur J. Williams of Munnich, and then hit the rear of the truck he had been attempting to pass.

Norris and Parker were passengers in Love's car.

At 12 p.m. the same night, a car driven by Norman Phelps ran off the road and struck a tree on Warkner road, one mile north of M-92. Phelps was not injured, according to police records.

In another accident, which occurred shortly after midnight Friday at Grant and Middle street, no one was injured and the two cars involved were driven away under their own power.

Drivers of the cars which collided as one was making a left turn off the road, were Paul Hackworth of Manchester, and John Rudd, Jr. The Rudd car was reportedly the one making the left turn.

## Quotas Listed In Red Cross Solicitation

Mrs. John Fischer, Chelsea chairman for the annual Red Cross residential solicitation, assisted by Mrs. Stephen Slane, is proceeding with arrangements to assign volunteer workers to the various sections of the village in order that the solicitation may be completed as soon as possible.

The Chelsea quota for the residential canvass was announced last week to be \$600.

The Chelsea Community Chest contributed \$1,000 to the Red Cross, designated as coming from business and industry, but the Red Cross, in accepting it, reserved the privilege to conduct its annual spring residential canvass here in conjunction with the national campaign.

The county drive, which will extend through March, is headed by Mayor Carl J. Scheffler of Ypsilanti, with Mrs. Jessie Collier of Ann Arbor, as assistant county chairman.

Chairman in charge of townships and out-county campaign is William G. Hayes of Ann Arbor.

The county quota has set a goal of \$30,750 for the 1955 campaign, with Ann Arbor's share to be \$43,380 and Ypsilanti's \$14,000.

The quota for Chelsea, given as \$1,600, includes the \$600 to be raised in the residential canvass and the \$1,000 given by the Chelsea Community Chest. Thus the drive here is considered three-quarters completed.

Quotas for other communities have been announced as follows: Milan, \$1,000; Manchester, \$1,100; Dexter, \$1,500; Saline, \$1,000; East Ann Arbor, \$275; Pittsfield Village, \$375; Whitmore Lake, \$300; Willow Village, \$200; and the townships, \$5,000.

## Expert Advises Serious Study Of Council-Manager Govt.

Dr. Arthur W. Bromage of the political science department at the University of Michigan, speaking at a public meeting held in the Chelsea High school gymnasium Monday evening on the subject of city form of government, emphasized that his views are impartial, that he is not a member of any group attempting to develop any type of government; and that he was here in an advisory capacity only.

Dr. Bromage's appearance here was made possible by the cooperation of the University of Michigan Extension Service and the collective efforts of the service clubs of the community who have been studying the problem of Chelsea's form of government.

Dr. Bromage said he was impressed with the interest shown in the problem here as evidenced by the number of people who attended the meeting. There were approximately 100 people present, which he considered a high percentage of the population as compared with the number who attend similar meetings in other communities.

Saying that while city government cannot be expected to solve the problems of a community, it would set up a framework within which public officials could operate to get those things done that

have to be done. Under the present form of government in Chelsea this is an impossibility.

Dr. Bromage recommended that the community definitely consider a council-manager-city type of government since council members are laymen, and in most cases do not have the technical background to cope with the highly involved problems of a growing community. He said, "There are people available who specialize in this work and can coordinate the forces which are based on these points and do a more effective job."

As to the advisability of setting boundaries for a city, he pointed out that it is much easier to deal with a boundary change at this time and there is most likely a real need for such a change. He cautioned, however, that it is a serious problem and should receive considerable study.

Dr. Bromage spoke to an attentive and interested audience for approximately 45 minutes after which an open forum provided an opportunity for an hour or more of questions which he answered at length and in detail.

Maxwell G. Sweet presided at the meeting and Dr. Glen Hass, chairman of the boundary determination committee of the service club group, commented on a proposed boundary set up for discussion purposes.

In conclusion, it was pointed out at the meeting, it is possible for a community to have any kind of government desired, but a progressive group must have a progressive type of government to handle the complexities of a growing community.

The group studying the city government question here is planning an early meeting to consider the boundary problem. People of the community will be notified of the meeting at which some experienced person will be asked to speak.

Michigan Republicans are looking for a knight in shining armor to revive the party for 1956.

Confused and hurt after their fourth straight loss to Democratic Gov. Williams, Republicans from the top to the doorbell-ringers are preaching revival.

"We've got to do more than rest on our oars and place our faith in tradition," said former treasurer D. Hale Brake.

It was the valedictory of a sardine party stalwart who was swept out of office in the Democratic landslide after 14 years as guardian-of-the-state's purse strings.

He has seen politicians come and go and at one time figured to be the Republican rallying point. Others differed and rather than split the party, Brake went along.

Now, in the debris of another election in which all Republican candidates for state office met political disaster, Brake is back with ideas to put the party on its feet again.

Brake wants to fight fire with fire. He suggests recruiting an outside man—"a popular figure"—as state chairman and insists he be well-versed in publicity: a man who will capture the imagination of a new kind of voter.

It's the same step Democrats took years ago with Williams, the boyish-looking idol of the young people: the trademarks of politics—the bow tie and the square-dance calling.

The technique made Williams a popular vote-getter, a politician everyone would like to have live next door and it won him four terms in the executive office.

Democrats had the keen Paul W. Weber to guide Williams' footsteps and write his speeches. Weber feints the opposition off balance and crosses with a well-turned phrase.

It's the pattern that Michigan politics has taken in the past decade.

But who is the man or men around which this new and fresh Republican party can be constructed? One choice is Congressman Gerald Ford, the young man from Grand Rapids. His backers say he has the energy, the youth, the foresight to breathe new life into an old philosophy.

Others claim that because Republicans are out of the main state offices, the mantle of leadership will naturally fall to party members in the legislature.

There the Republicans have Senators Creighton R. Coleman, Battle Creek; Edward Hutchinson, Pennville; Carlton H. Morris, Kalamazoo. All are among the "Young Turks" who gained power two years ago.

Coleman admits privately he would like to run for Congress but might stay around for extra party duties. Morris is young, a lawyer and admits to no ambitions beyond the state borders.

Hutchinson, whose grandfather once sat in the Senate, will work in Michigan for the next 1,000 years, if necessary, for Republicans.

The House of Representatives has Rep. Harry J. Phillips, Port Huron; and Herb Clements, Decker; Read Orr, Battle Creek; and a number of other young men ready for battle with Democrats.

Whatever happens, it's a certainty among Republicans that those at the head of the party organization from Detroit will be of less importance when the 1956 convention is held.

Bingo is still unlawful in Michigan. The election saw a proposed constitutional amendment defeated which would have led to its legalization under restraints of the legislature. Counties which have been turning their heads the other way for years are suddenly cracking down, chasing bingo out of clubs under the theory that they have a mandate of the people. The most telling argument in favor of bingo during the campaign was: "If Michigan can control legalized gambling at the horse tracks, why not if the game is bingo?"

Now that their election battles are past one legislator is carrying the torch against all gambling.

Rep. Willard L. Bowerman (R-

Lansing) said he would ask the 1955 legislature to outlaw pari-mutual betting at the races, wiping out a multi-million dollar operation.

Michigan gets up to \$7,000,000 a year from the tracks in taxes. Bowerman said: "That's a paltry sum when morals of our citizens are involved."

Prisons and mental hospitals are both overcrowded in Michigan and a battle is brewing over who will get the 200-bed addition to the Ionia State Hospital for the Criminal Insane. "We want it all," said Corrections Director Gus Harrison.

He has a law on his side, one passed two years ago which said that the addition would be turned over to the use of the corrections department. Mental Health Director Charles F. Wagg said: "We also need more space, and we shall see."

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

#### Electors Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 16. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

#### Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 1. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 108, P. A. 1951.)

#### Transfer of Registration; Application, Time

SEC. 19. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30 days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day) provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

#### Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the resident house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.

As provided by Section 10, Chapter 1, Part 2(a), Act No. 306, Public Acts of 1929, as amended by Act No. 291, Public Acts of 1945 and Act No. No. 108, Public Acts of 1951:

From 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. on each said day for the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

#### Electors Unable To Make Personal Application, Procedure

SEC. 16. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

#### Unregistered Persons Not Entitled To Vote

SEC. 1. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 108, P. A. 1951.)

#### Transfer of Registration; Application, Time

SEC. 19. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30 days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day) provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

#### Transfer of Registration on Election Day

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When Village have been changed, such change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.

## Highway 'Stop' Signs Effective at Grade Crossings

The commonplace, but generally respected, highway "Stop" sign may be the panacea for the vehicle train crash problem at grade crossings, the Michigan Railroad Association hopefully asserts.

A year ago the familiar sign was installed at 20 grade crossings in Michigan, following enactment in 1953 of a law sponsored by Representatives Leo Miller and Wilfred C. Basset, both of Jackson, and Edward A. Borgmeyer of Grand Rapids, making its use at such spots optional. Previous to the installations there had been in the period 1937-1953, in some instances the record showed as high as 13 crashes at one location, 11 at another, 10 at another and more than 5 at each of 7 others. Since the installation of the signs there has not been a single accident at any of these crossings nor at four others where similar signs were placed but which previously had shown no crash incidents.

Three of these signs are in the Chelsea area: at Notten road near North Francisco; Hoppe road, four and one-half miles west of town; and at Garvey road, two miles west of Chelsea. At the latter there had been five accidents in the 1937-1952 period.

At 12 crossings in Niles at which 57 accidents occurred in the 1937-1952 period, not one accident has since been experienced.

"The respect seemingly being given these signs at rail crossings uncovers an oddity in human nature," Roub Allie, Executive Secretary of the Michigan Railroads Association, declares. "Standard railroad crossing warning signals are much rarer than highway 'Stop' signs and so are a less frequent source of annoyance to the impatient driver. They are more elaborate, more dramatic in appearance and functioning and they connote an especially serious danger potential. Seemingly some drivers confronted with a crossing gate, a flashing light, a wigwagging sign and a strident gong, still dare to ignore them and will take chances on meeting up with a 1,000-ton train hurtling along at express speed; yet they'll obediently stop at a road 'Stop' sign at a grade crossing and substituting for the other type at which they may have thumbed their noses a few minutes before at another crossing.

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## HERE'S HOW...

MAKE A TELEPHONE WALL DESK

A telephone desk provides a place for the books and pencils and pads so well as the phone itself.

Two 12 x 36-inch pieces of 1-inch lumber form the top and bottom may be made of 1 x 4's, edge-glued. The sides and the drawer slots are made of 1 x 4 lumber, each piece 12 inches long. A drawer may be made or the space may be left open as a pigeon hole. Either way, screws and pencils can be put in.


First make the cut-outs in the bottom board. The centers of the half-circles should be 7 inches from the front corners.

The ends and a pair of 1/2" x 1/2" pieces are fastened from the

bottom with 1/4-inch wood screws. In fastening the top board use screws on the ends, and 2-inch finishing nails to hold the pieces forming the pigeon hole. The heads of the nails are sunk and hidden with wood filler.

A 1/2-inch back board, 7 x 66 inches, projects 1 inch above the top, providing a rail. The two side rails, 1 x 1 inch, 12 inches long, are fastened with finishing nails. Their front corners may be rounded with a rasp or beveled with a saw.

Hardware brackets fasten the desk to the wall. On a plaster wall, the brackets should be placed to screw into a stud beneath the plaster.
