Cagers Drop Tourney Tilt To Roosevelt

Lose in Final Game
Of Sectional Play-off
For Fourth Year

Chelsea Bulldogs were defeated Saturday night in their bid for a chance to play in the regional basketball tournament when, for the fourth successive year, they lost in the play-off in the sectional tournament.

Their defeat Saturday by a score of 53-50 was dealt them by the supposedly weaker Ypsilanti Roosevelt team, coached by Art Walker. The game was a nip-and-tuck battle with the score being tied many times; but Roosevelt was not to be denied, staying right with Chelsea throughout and winning in the last 45 seconds of the fourth quarter.

Chelsea outscored Roosevelt from the floor but Roosevelt had only eight fouls called against them while Chelsea had 22, and the game was decided from the foul line.

Roosevelt played one of its best games of the season, hitting 54 per cent of its shots. Roosevelt, which had won only three of its 12 league games, was in seventh place in the Huron Valley League at the end of the season, while Chelsea, with ten wins and only two losses for the season, shared first place with Dundee and Saline.

The regional tournament games will be played at Ann Arbor. The Chelsea team won the chance to play Saturday night by defeating Ann Arbor St. Thomas 68-48 at Ypsilanti High school Thursday. This was the third year in a row that Chelsea had beaten Ann Arbor St. Thomas in sectional tournament play.

Saturday was the last high school basketball game for five Chelsea seniors: Bob White, Bruce Hoffman, Neil Bucher, Phil Baris and Tom Eisele. Chelsea Coach Ray Glasser said it is "almost certain we'll be hearing more from some of these seniors as they go on to college basketball."

On the whole, Glasser said, Chelsea High school's basketball season must be considered quite successful, in spite of the fact the sectional tournament was lost.

A. Feldkamp Killed in Auto Collision

Albert A. Feldkamp of Sharon township, was killed and Donald G. Pamp and Wilbur Harris of the Gotfredson cattle farms at Grass Lake, were seriously injured in a traffic crash on US-27 north of St. Johns, Saturday.

Mr. Feldkamp was a member of the Washtenaw Agricultural Council and Sharon Evangelical United Brethren church and was a director of the Michigan Brown Swiss Breeders Association.

Pamp, driver of the car in which Feldkamp was riding, is a herdsman for the Gotfredson farm and Harris is the farm's operator. Both were taken to Foote hospital, Jackson.

The crash reportedly occurred when a car driven by Jack Waldron of Ionia, made a sudden left turn onto US-27 from a side road. He and four passengers in his car also suffered injuries.

Mr. Feldkamp, widely known for his interest in agricultural affairs and because of his work in the Brown Swiss Breeders Association, was 65 years old.

He was born in Sharon township Feb. 19, 1889, a son of John T. and Susanna Seymour Feldkamp.

Survivors are his wife, the former Bertha Schlicht to whom he was married March 4, 1914; a son, Glen, a daughter, Mrs. Irene Kemmer; two sisters, Mrs. Elsie Reno and Mrs. Imma Haussler of Freedom township; a brother, Anton, of Sharon township; and five grandchildren.

Rev. J. A. Beardsley officiated at the funeral services held at the Sharon Evangelical United Brethren church at 2 p.m. Tuesday. Burial was in the church cemetery.

School Board Pays \$30,000 Of Bond Issue

At Tuesday's meeting of the Chelsea Agricultural Schools school board members it was decided to recall an additional \$20,000 of the South Elementary school bond issue. Added to the \$10,000 due April 1, this will substantially reduce interest payments.

Parents' Night for the South Elementary school has been set for March 24 but the date for an open house at the North Elementary school has not yet been selected.

Approval of the State Department of Public Instruction has now been received for the proposed annexation to the Chelsea Agricultural Schools school district by Rogers Corners, Waterloo, Jewett-Stone and Jerusalem rural school districts.

Other rural schools in the area are planning meetings to discuss the annexation question and Superintendent Charles Cameron and a member of the Chelsea school board are to speak at such a meeting scheduled for Monday night at the McLaren school.

Jean Young Receives Homemaking Award

Jean Marie Young, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Irwin Young, has been named "homemaker of tomorrow" at Chelsea High school in the local phase of a national contest which will name the "All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow" who will be awarded a \$5,000 scholarship.

The local winner receives a gold award pin, cook books for herself and for the school and will be entered in competition for the state contest. Winner of the state contest is eligible for a \$1,500 scholarship.

The national winner is to be chosen April 21 at Philadelphia.

The basketball held by Hoffman in the picture was used during the entire four years of high school competition. It was later painted with a preservative and still occupies a place of honor in St. Mary's school. Two members of the team, Maurice Hoffman and Robert Wheeler, were named to the all-state team in 1926. At the conclusion of the regular tournament play that year, the team entered the Tri-State YMCA invitational tournament and played eight tournament games in three days to win the championship. The tournament was held at the University of Michigan with participating teams coming from Ohio, Indiana and Michigan. Paul Hoffman and the late Ambrose Eisele, members of the 1925 St. Mary's team, also played in the Tri-State tournament games. In 1925 the same St. Mary's players won the first state championship in the newly-created Class D; inaugurated in the state that year.

Council Okays Ordinance For Increased Pay Scale

An ordinance, approved at Monday's Village Council meeting and passed by a vote of 5-2, provided for an increase in salaries of newly-elected village councilmen and village presidents.

The ordinance provides for payment of \$15 per meeting for all regular and special meetings of the Village Council attended by the trustees and the same amount for each of the meetings for the village president.

The new rate of pay applies only to newly-elected officials, those already in office remaining on the present scale of \$2.00 per meeting until the end of their terms. The \$2.00 rate has been in effect for many years.

Salaries of other village officials are not affected by the ordinance passed Monday and which goes into effect March 17.

These include clerk, \$600; deputy clerk, \$600; treasurer, \$400; and assessor, \$300.

In other action at Monday's meeting, Councilman Norman Eismann and Claude Spiegelberg were appointed as a committee to determine the need and present a proposal for a concerted plan of tree planting in the community.

Paul F. Niehaus, Chelsea chairman of the Easter Seal sale, sponsored locally by the Kiwanis Club of Chelsea, said yesterday that the Easter Seal letters will be in the mail here the first of next week.

In accordance with national policy and because the Easter Seal sale is a direct mail campaign with no personal solicitation for funds, the local organization did not request inclusion in the Chelsea Community Chest.

The opening of the Easter Seal drive—March 10 to April 10—is announced by the Washtenaw county chairman, Mrs. Vladimir Bibicoff, 2828 Stommel road, Ann Arbor.

As the Easter Seal appeal reaches so many homes this month, we hope it will also serve as a means of finding those crippled children who may not be receiving adequate care. It is the society's goal to reach every child who needs assistance," Mrs. Bibicoff said.

"By crippled we mean not only those who are unable to walk but those with many other kinds of handicapping conditions. The society stands ready to help provide care and treatment of all kinds," she concluded.

Jaycees Seeking Outstanding Local Young Farmer

President John Pilkington of the Chelsea Junior Chamber of Commerce announced today that his chapter is joining the search for the nation's Four Outstanding Young Farmers along with 2,750 Jaycee chapters throughout the United States, Hawaii and Alaska.

Heading the local elimination to seek this area's Outstanding Young Farmer will be Jaycee Agriculture and Conservation chairman, Homer Kuhl.

Any successful farm operator who derives two-thirds of his income from farm operation and is between the Jaycee age limits of 21 and 35 is eligible. He does not have to be a Jaycee.

Basis of judging will be contributions made to farming as well as community with special emphasis on farm enterprise and investment. A panel of leading agricultural leaders in this area will serve as judges.

Anyone in the community who knows of an outstanding young farmer is urged to nominate him for the award. Deadline in the local contest is March 19. Nomination cards can be obtained from Homer Kuhl, 4000 M-92, President Pilkington, 116 Park street.

Winner of the area contest will be entered in the state-wide contest which will name the Outstanding Young Farmer of Michigan not later than April 27. Winner of the state eliminations will receive an expense-paid trip to Minneapolis, Minn., June 1-3 for the national finals.

Spring Plant Worker Dies In Auto Crash

Roy W. Morris, employed on the night shift at Chelsea Spring Division here, was instantly killed Friday morning while on his way home when his car and a loaded steel truck crashed head-on at the Mill Creek bridge at the east edge of Lima township during a heavy fog.

The collision set off an explosion of the truck's 125-gallon gas tank and the resultant fire was so intense that wrecker crews were unable to get the road cleared until shortly after noon although the crash occurred about 7:20 a.m.

Morris' body could not be reached for more than an hour by Dexter's fire department working to put out the fire which spread over the area, fed by oil and gasoline from the wreckage.

The truck driver, Thomas J. Hall, 31, of Detroit, miraculously escaped death or serious injury when he was literally blown from the cab by the explosion, landing 10 or 15 feet away.

In reconstructing the accident sequence later, the truck driver reportedly stated that he was headed west when he noticed an oncoming car suddenly begin to veer across the road. With the truck already on the bridge there was no chance to avoid the car.

Hall's truck was carrying 23,000 pounds of steel rolls and the collision drove the Morris car back to the west side of the bridge, crushing it under the front end of the truck cab.

The wreckage halted traffic for a mile each way during the rush hour when motorists were on their way to work.

The truck driver was examined by a doctor at the scene of the accident. He was treated for minor cuts only and appeared to have suffered no further injury. He was taken to the hospital for a thorough check-up later.

Morris, who was 22 years old, lived at 2730 North Territorial road, Northfield township. He served with the U. S. Army from August, 1953, until December, 1954, and was attached to a heavy motor company in Korea.

He was born Jan. 24, 1933, in Mansville, Ohio. He was employed as a machine operator at the Spring company.

Survivors include his wife, Alice, and a daughter, Vickie Mae, both of Ann Arbor; his mother, Mrs. Vida Harwood of Whitmore Lake; his father, Theodore Morris of Ohio; three half-brothers, Richard, Kenneth and Larry Harwood, all of Whitmore Lake; and several aunts and uncles.

Funeral services were held at 9:30 a.m. Monday at the Carl Keen Funeral Home in Dexter, with Rev. L. D. Gordon officiating. Burial followed in Gilmore cemetery, Elberta, Mich.

That this ordinance shall become effective upon the 17th day of March 1955, provided however, that this ordinance shall not be construed to affect the compensation of the President or trustees whose terms of office are now in force and shall relate solely to officers hereinafter duly elected and qualified as President and Trustees of the Village of Chelsea.
