## Brief Exercises Scheduled Monday For Memorial Day

### Soldier Graves To Be Decorated In Traditional Rites

Memorial Day will be observed here Monday with the traditional parade to the soldiers' monument in the Grove cemetery where brief exercises will take place, followed by decoration of soldiers' graves.

Members of the Woman's Relief Corps are in charge of preparing the flowers for the graves—and have requested that anyone who has some to contribute should contact Mrs. John Kilmer or Mrs. George Hafner.

Paul Prager of Herbert J. McKune Post No. 31, American Legion, will be parade marshal. The parade will start the march to the cemetery from the Municipal building at 10 a.m.

Included in the line of march will be Boy Scouts and a Brownie Troop sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary. Gold Star mothers who participate will have cars made available for them.

All veterans of the community are requested to take part in the parade, wearing their uniforms if possible.

Men's and women's service organizations are preparing to take part.

Heading the parade will be the service organizations' color guards and the Chelsea High school band in uniform.

At the cemetery, Merle Barr, Sr., will read General Logan's orders for the decoration of soldiers' graves and a service organization representative will read the names of soldier dead buried in local cemeteries.

Pastors are being contacted to take part in the ceremony which will close with a salute from the firing squad and the sounding of bugles.

Following the parade, members of the Legion and their families will hold their customary Memorial Day picnic at Cavanaugh Lake.

### Series of Classes Scheduled for Expectant Parents

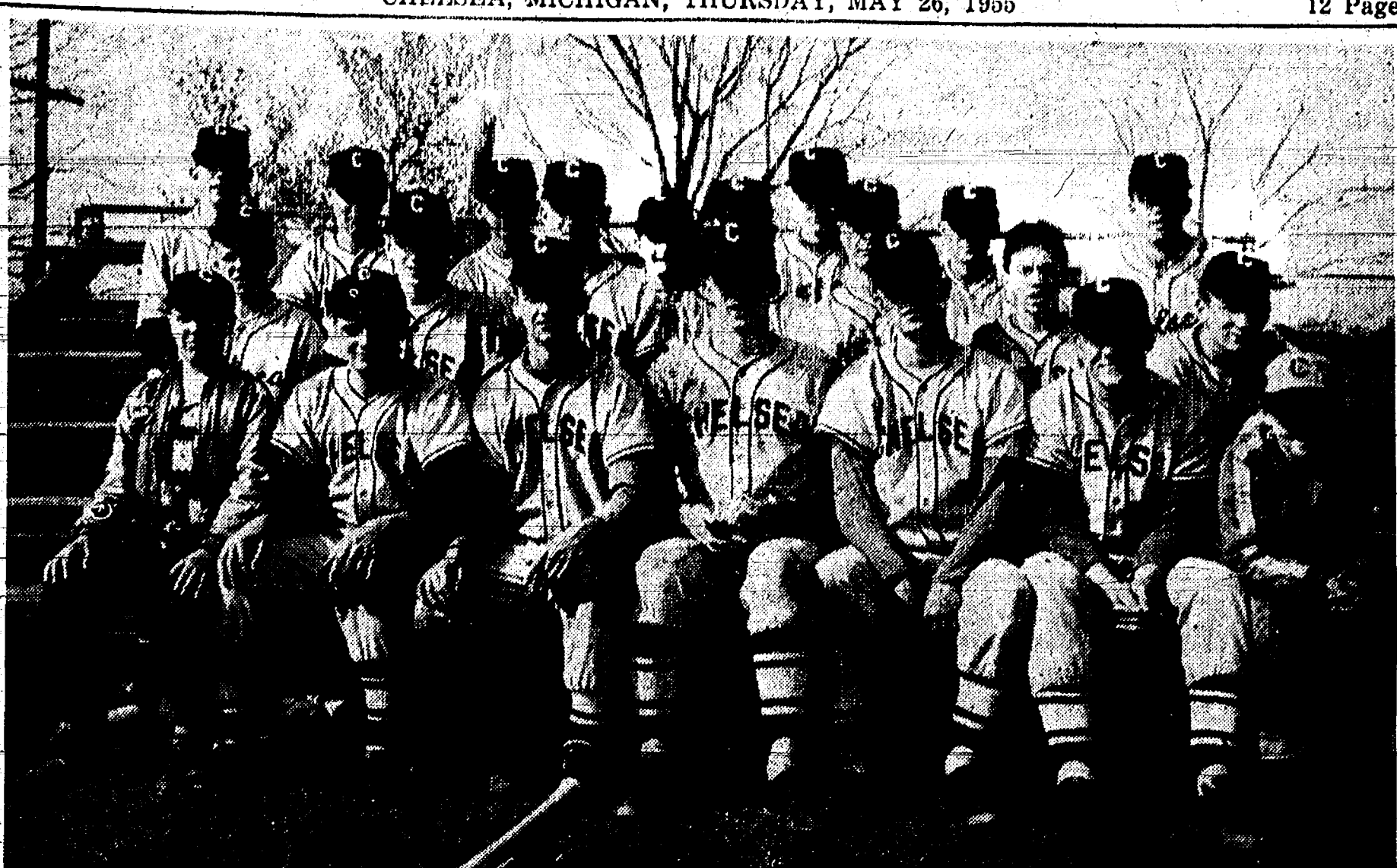
Are you expecting a baby? Then how would you like to attend a series of classes for expectant parents?

## Poppy Sale Is Scheduled For Friday

Friday, from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m., American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars organizations of the community will hold their annual Memorial Poppy sale on the streets of Chelsea.

In charge of the event for the Legion Auxiliary are Mrs. William Blaess, Mrs. Paul Prager and Mrs. George West, while the VFW Auxiliary committee chairman and her assistants are Mrs. Clara Smith, Mrs. Clara Hutzler and Mrs. John Chaplin.

The crepe paper Legion poppy and the cloth "Buddy" poppy of the Veterans of Foreign Wars are sold each year just before Memorial Day for the purpose of obtaining funds for use in providing aid to disabled veterans and their families or widows and orphans of deceased veterans.

The VFW organizations use the slogan, "Honor the Dead by Helping the Living," and point to their state hospital program, the National VFW Home at Eaton Rapids and the two Michigan children's camps (Camp Norcom on Steinhilber road, and Camp Trotter in Allen county) as chief beneficiaries of the proceeds of the annual Buddy Poppy sale.

The Legion points out that the poppy they sell is a crepe paper replica of the poppies in Flanders Field, France, in World War I, and have come to represent a symbol of the dead of all wars.

Legion proceeds realized from Poppy day sales are the chief source of funds used by the organization for rehabilitation, child welfare work and aid to disabled veterans and to dependent families of veterans.

The sale begins at 9 a.m. tomorrow.

## Four Candidates Seek Positions On School Board

Names of four candidates will appear on the ballot at the June 13 school election, including Dr. J. V. Fisher, president of the board, and Earl Begman, trustee, who are seeking re-election.

New candidates for whom petitions have been filed with the school board secretary, Howard Flintoft, are Reuben Lesser and Robert Harris.

At the meeting of the Chelsea Agricultural Schools Board of Education Tuesday evening, there was an extended study and discussion of written school board policies which are being compiled; however, these policies have not yet been officially adopted.

Reports given at Tuesday's meeting show that rural schools of the area who have met the May 20 deadline for annexation to the Chelsea district include Jewett, Stone, Jerusalem, Rogers Corner, Waterloo, Lima Center and Beach schools.

McLaren and Canfield school districts turned down annexation in recent elections and three others have not yet voted on the question. The three include Bears district where the rural school has been closed for a number of years, and Spieguberg and Palmer schools, both of which are in areas where the districts would likely be divided for annexation.

## Remodeling, Modernizing Wave Hits Main Street

Three downtown Chelsea business places are in the process of doing extensive remodeling. These include Gambles, where a 20 x 60-foot basement showroom is nearing completion; Chelsea Bakery, which is being modernized by installation of a new aluminum front with wide expanse of glass showing the interior of the store. Work on the exterior was begun this week.

The interior remodeling of the drug store will include moving the soda fountain to the opposite side of the store at the center of the south wall. This will eliminate the present side entrance. Fountain service will be increased to include serving of sandwiches, coffee and light lunches.

The cosmetics counter will be moved to the present location of the fountain.

A new prescription room is also included in the plans, as well as a self-serve ice cream bar in the center of the store. Air conditioning will also be installed.

Approximate cost of the interior remodeling project is estimated at \$12,000.

Wes Hawes, owner of the Gamble store, said the remodeling project there should be completed in ten days or two weeks. A wide stairway at the north of the store gives access to the newly-constructed basement show room which he plans to use principally for furniture display. Removal of the furniture displays from the first floor will provide much-needed additional space for other merchandise.

Chelsea Bakery has announced that it will be closed for an indefinite time while its present store and the adjoining one formerly occupied by Dexter's market, are being remodeled. No announcement has yet been made by Elmer Schable, Chelsea Bakery proprietor, as to what his plans are for the two stores.

Also proceeding on schedule is the renovation of Central Fibre company's clock tower in readiness for installation of the clock which is being converted to run by electricity. The clock was dismantled last week and taken to the J. N. Verdin company's factory at Cincinnati, Ohio, where the work is being done.

This week a new roof of red asphalt shingles is being installed on the tower. The shingles were chosen to match the color of the brick building and tower. All stone and brick work is being repointed and thrust rods are being added to strengthen the walls.

Work on the tower is being done by Alliance Building Restoration, Inc., of Detroit.

## Ferris Official To Be Speaker at Commencement

The 1955 commencement address at Chelsea Agricultural Schools will be delivered by Raymond V. Shoberg, administrative assistant at Ferris Institute. His subject will be "The Price of Leadership."

Prior to accepting the Ferris assignment last November, Shoberg had 15 years of industrial and commercial experience. During the training director in charge of the educational program for 800 foremen and supervisors, personnel for the Cleveland plants of the Aluminum Company of America.

More recently he served as sales manager for an Alcoa division in the Cleveland and Detroit areas. As training director and sales manager he has addressed audiences in most major cities in the east and midwest.

Shoberg began his teaching career in 1933 at North Muskegon. He later taught speech and coached debate teams at the University of Michigan, Western Michigan College, and Grand Rapids Junior College. From 1939-43 he was a Michigan representative for Allyn and Bacon, Publishers, of Boston, Mass. He is a graduate of Western Michigan College and has his Master's degree and work on a doctorate at the University of Michigan.

The assignment given Shoberg by President Synthel at Ferris Institute is in the field of institutional relations, and includes various publication duties and instruction of classes in journalism.

## L.J. Knickerbocker Killed Tuesday In US-12 Collision

Loren J. Knickerbocker of 1200 Wilkinson street, was fatally injured and Dwight L. Gadbary of Cavanaugh Lake, suffered a fractured hip and other less serious injuries in an automobile accident which occurred at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday approximately one-quarter mile west of Lima Center.

According to sheriff's deputies' reports, witnesses' statements agreed that the Knickerbocker car went into a spin and collided with the Gadbary car headed east. Rain falling at the time was believed a contributing factor in causing the accident. Both cars were severely damaged.

Knickerbocker and Gadbary were taken to University hospital, Ann Arbor. Knickerbocker, being pronounced dead on arrival.

Born Oct. 17, 1900, in Freedom township, he was a son of Hollis and Nellie Knickerbocker. As a youth he attended the Red School of Manchester road, now moved to the Chelsea Community Fair grounds on Old US-12.

From 1923 until 1927 he served as an engineersman, second class on the USS Omaha and on the USS Mississippi which was later sunk at Pearl Harbor.

Oct. 8, 1928, at Mt. Pleasant, he was married to Leola Bain, who survives.

He was employed as a baker at Howard City and also farmed for a time before coming to Chelsea. He was employed successfully at Chelsea Milling Co., Federal Screw Works and Chelsea Spring Division. The past six years he had been employed as a janitor at the University of Michigan.

Knickerbocker was a member of Loyal Order of the Moose No. 156, of Jackson.

Surviving, in addition to Mrs. Knickerbocker are a son, Irvin, who is an apprentice seaman in the U. S. Navy and stationed at Bainbridge, Md.; a sister, Mrs. Dorothy Stoll of Ann Arbor; three brothers, LaVerne Knickerbocker of Jackson, and Earl and Leroy of Manchester; and a number of nieces and nephews. Another sister, Mrs. Hattie Elbers of Ometed, died in 1949 and a brother Benjamin, died in Victor, Colo., in January of this year.

Funeral services are to be held at the Burghardt Funeral Home at 1:30 p.m. Friday. Burial is to take place at Arborcrest cemetery, Ann Arbor.

Superintendent C. D. Miles, of Cassidy Lake Technical school, announced this week that everyone in the community is invited to visit the camp Monday, May 30, during the time of the ninth annual Decoration Day picnic for the benefit of the youths at the school and their families.

There will be supervised camp tours, including open house inspection of the new recreation building which was recently completed. This was built entirely by inmate labor.

Families of the men at Cassidy Lake were required to send in reservations for the picnic dinner and will bring their own food. Past years have seen a total of 500 to 700 visitors during the day. Those arriving by bus will be met by car at the bus station if previous arrangements have been made.

Tours of the camp will be made under supervision and visitors will not be permitted to leave the picnic ground area unless they are in one of the supervised groups.

People of the community may visit the camp between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday.

## Fluoride Tooth Decay Preventive Clinic Dates Set

Thieves entered Seltz's Tavern early Thursday morning, taking approximately \$500 from cash boxes. The exact amount awaited results of an audit.

According to police department reports, the robbery is believed to have taken place at about 2 a.m. when tenants in an upstairs apartment heard glass breaking. The break-in was evidently planned to coincide with the time of a passing train. The tenant told police he looked out of an upstairs window but saw nothing suspicious after hearing the sounds of breaking glass.

Police officers had checked the place at 1:30 a.m. and everything was in order at that time.

## New Subdivision Promises 70 Homes Within Village

Construction on a grand scale, which eventually will provide 70 new homes, was begun this week in the new subdivision laid out on Old US-12 at Wilkinson street. Plans also include putting in new streets. All sewer and water systems will be installed. The builder, the Chelsea Construction company.

Set on large lots the modern, ranch-type homes will feature latest type all-steel sliding windows and screens, will have filtered, forced air heat, automatic water heaters and modern built-in kitchen equipment with formica counter tops.

Each home will have three bedrooms with sliding closet doors; a large living room; and dining area. Choice of several floor plans and many exterior models will be possible.

Both FHA and GI financing will be available on these new homes, according to the builder.

Lynn Kern, local realtor, is working in cooperation with the Ann Arbor Home Realty company in showing and selling the new homes.

## Sheriff's Department Safety Campaign Will Start on Memorial Day Week-End

Sheriff Erwin L. Klager today announced that the Washtenaw county Sheriff's Department is joining the State Safety Commission and the Michigan State Police in a 101-day traffic accident prevention program called "Slow Down and Live." It will run from Memorial Day through Labor Day, a period during which 535 people lost their lives in traffic accidents last year.

According to Sheriff Klager, the program is aimed at those driver behavior faults associated with "a hurry" complex and the "me first" attitude on the highway. They include the motorist who is speeding, excessive speed, or too fast for conditions; the driver who passes dangerously, the fellow who steals the right-of-way, and the person who follows too closely. National figures show that these are responsible for 90 per cent of the deaths.

The Sheriff pointed out that the "Slow Down and Live" program purposely begins with the three-day Memorial Day week-end. Last year the Memorial Day week-end cost the lives of 20 people in Michigan traffic accidents. He urged all motorists to cooperate with the Sheriff's Department in the safety campaign by getting off to a good start in being extra careful during the Memorial Day week-end.

"Early in June," the Sheriff said, "schools close and children are out on streets and highways without the protection of school safety programs."

During June traffic safety authorities are placing special emphasis on dangerous passing and safety posters displaying the warning "Keep in Your Lane" are being displayed throughout the state.

Sheriff Klager called upon all residents of the county to heed the slogan "Slow Down and Live," not only when driving within a community but when driving out in the country. "It is significant," he added, "that most of the people killed out on the highways in the country are people who live in cities."

Washtenaw county will have six patrol cars patrolling the main highways from noon, May 27 through May 31.

All uniform officers' leave days will be cancelled during this period and detectives will take over the office duties.
