Another son, Samuel Hagadon, died Sept. 13, 1944.

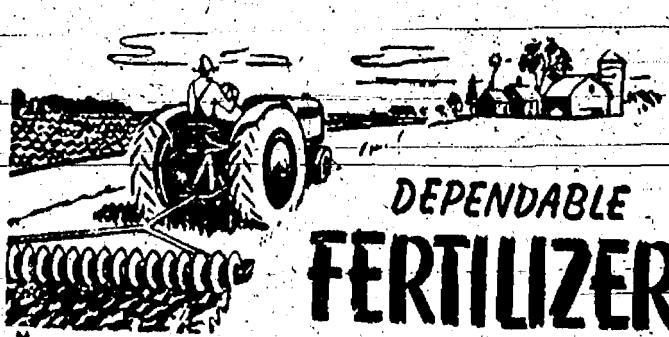
