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## Chelsea Milling Tells Plans for Expansion Of Plant Facilities

Construction Will  
Start in 30 Days, on  
Warehouse Addition

Chelsea Milling company this week announced plans for construction projects which will add 10,000 square feet of space for storing finished goods and extensions approximately 50 x 70 feet in size to the first, second and third floors of the present building for additional storage of raw materials.

The warehouse for finished products, a one-story building, is to be built to the west and south of the present plant on former New York Central property.

Construction plans call for installation of a conveyor system for moving the completed Jiffy products from the packaging department in the present building to the warehouse and direct to railroad cars and trucks for shipment. Space will be provided for six rail cars and three trucks to be loaded at one time. The new system will eliminate rehandling of the finished products.

Access to the new building will be by means of a driveway on the former McCormack property at 319 North street. The house has been torn down to make way for the driveway.

In addition to the first, second and third floors of the present structure will be almost triangular in shape with the side lengths approximately 50 feet and 70 feet. Although contracts have not yet been awarded, they call for beginning construction on the new warehouse within 30 days.

Construction on the three-story addition to the present building will begin as soon as possible after that.

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## Hessian Fly Causing Wide Damage to County Wheat

Most Local Crops  
Giving Good Yield

Wheat harvesting in this area began in earnest this week, peak loads at both the Chelsea Milling Co. and Blass Elevator being expected at the end of the week.

Chelsea Milling company's first big load of wheat came in Monday night, according to Lyle Haselwerdt, assistant manager. He said the wheat was of premium quality and yield reports were running very good.

Blass Elevator got its first big load of grain at its Four Mile Lake plant Friday, had an extra good run Monday and had gradually increasing quantities brought in each succeeding day.

Of good No. 1 quality, moisture content for the most part has been well under the 14 per cent limit. William Blass said yesterday. He mentioned one load that tested 10.9 per cent.

According to reports of farmers bringing in wheat, the yield average will probably be 35 to 40 bushels per acre, Blass believes. Extremes are a yield of 52 1/2 bushels reported on 15 acres of farm near Dexter and only 6 1/2 bushels per acre on a Hessian Fly infested field on a Grass Lake farm.

Bill Dexter, assistant Washtenaw county agricultural agent, when asked yesterday about the extent of Hessian Fly infestation in the county, said it was widespread, a number of fields showing complete loss of crops. He said a concerted, community-wide effort to secure co-operation of growers will be necessary if the situation is to be controlled.

Principal cause of the infestation, Dexter said, is failure to co-operate in waiting to plant wheat until fly-free dates which are announced by agricultural agencies each year. Farmers who do co-operate by waiting until the recommended dates before planting suffer damage to their crops when the infestation spreads from their neighbors' fields who failed to co-operate.

Called to the Saline area Monday, Dexter found a 50-acre field a complete loss. The wheat yield would be so poor in quality and quantity that it would incur further loss to attempt to harvest it. It was to be cut and used as straw.

Dexter said he has had no direct report from farmers in the vicinity of Chelsea but has learned that a high school in the district and a committee was appointed to take the matter to learn what steps may be taken. The committee includes Will Reno, Vernon Dresselhouse, Clarence Voegeding and Arthur Blanchard. Other action included voting to buy workbooks for the pupils the coming year.

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## Citizen Study Group Asked To Help Plan Local School Needs

Kiwanis Rummage

To Be Successful

John Alber presided at the Kiwanis club meeting Monday evening in the absence of President Charles Cameron and Paul Mann, first vice-president.

Alfred Mayer and Anton Nielsen, delegates to the 40th annual convention of Kiwanis International at Cleveland, June 26-30, gave their reports at this meeting and concluded with pictures taken at the convention by Nielsen.

Mayer, in his part of the report, stated that there were 4,000 delegates at the convention, representing 4063 clubs with a membership of 241,000. Total attendance at the convention, Mayer said, was 13,000.

The next step in the orderly and planned conception of the school board was to present to electors a proposal for the building of a high school. It is still the studied deliberation of the board that this project should be the next step in the school-building expansion, and that such a proposition should be presented to the property holders at the school district within the next year. This will be possible because of the wisdom and foresight of the electors in the approval of the building of the two new elementary schools and also because bond issues on both these buildings will be paid off before the expected date.

"Since March of this year, nine adjacent primary school districts have evidenced their desire and have secured approval to annex to the Chelsea Agricultural School District. Commitments were made to these people that, so far as space permitted, their children would be housed in one of the new elementary schools. Because of insufficient room some of these children will have to remain in their former classrooms, but their education will be the province of this board.

"Your school board is ever more aware that the problems which confront this school system are complex and ramified. For this reason the trustees hope to enlist the aid and counsel of the concerned electors in forming a Citizens Study Group. Such a committee would be selected to represent both urban and rural areas and would include all interests and groups. This body would have no legal standing but its function would be to advise the school board in formulating their plans and policies for the future. The school board would give this group its interested and sympathetic attention and would work harmoniously in framing the plans for the future of our school system."

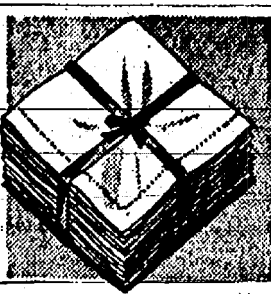

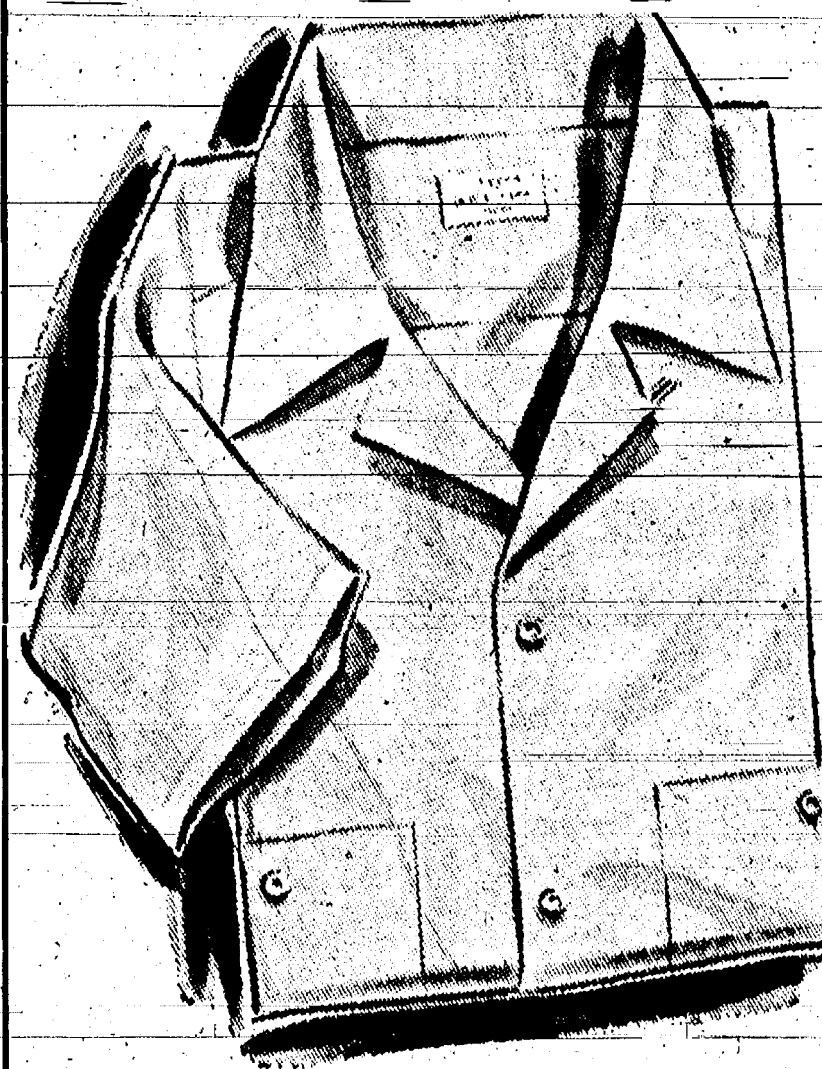

Chelsea successfully defended its record of being undefeated in league games this season by winning last Sunday from the Lansing Latins by a score of 12-2.

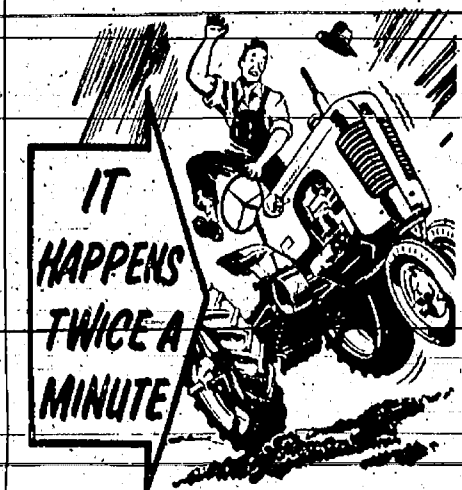
Marty Tobin pitched the entire game for Chelsea, the win giving Chelsea a 5-0 record for the season.

## July Birthdays Observed Tuesday At Methodist Home

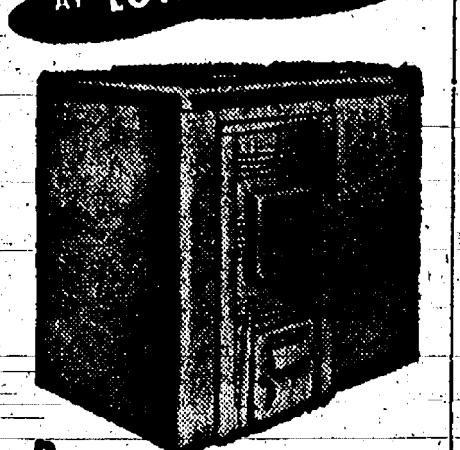
