Carl C. Chandler Retiring After 32 Years as Teacher

When school opens this fall, Carl C. Chandler, English teacher at Chelsea High school, the past 15 years, will not be one of the faculty. His retirement becomes effective this year.

In addition to teaching English he also taught French at the local high school the past seven years.

Following announcement of his retirement plans at the close of the past school year, he was presented with a 32-year Michigan Education Association service pin by fellow teachers and was also awarded a certificate of recognition by the association. In addition, the Chelsea Agricultural Schools Board of Education presented him with a citation for his work in the Chelsea school. Dr. J. V. Fisher, president of the board, making the presentation.

A 1912 graduate of Chelsea High school, he received a bachelor of arts degree in education from the University of Michigan in February, 1923, and began his teaching career at Battle Creek that same year. At Battle Creek he

taught English, French and German.

He did post-graduate work at McGill University, in Montreal, Canada, and in 1927 was a student at the Alliance Francaise, in Paris, France.

His teaching career included 11 years at Southeastern and Central High schools in Detroit before coming to Chelsea High school in 1940.

During World War I, Chandler served as a lieutenant in the U. S. Navy after training at Great Lakes, Ill., and finishing a short course at the Naval Academy at Annapolis. His service in the Navy included the four years from 1917 to 1921.

Chandler makes his home here with his father, Ed. Chandler.

Local Schools Set To Open Tues., Sept. 6

Chelsea schools will open at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 6.

All high school students are to meet in the gymnasium at 8:30 a.m. and will then be registered. In the afternoon all class periods will meet on the regular schedule.

Any new students who have moved into the community should register during the week of Aug. 22-26. All new elementary age children, grades kindergarten through six should register in the office of Elementary Principal Arthur Schumke in South elementary school, while new high school students in grades 7 through 12 should register in the office of High School Principal John Griffin.

Textbooks will be on sale at Chelsea High school all day Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 30 and 31. Lockers will also be assigned at the same time.

Faculty meetings are scheduled for Thursday and Friday, Sept. 1 and 2.

Complete bus schedules are to be announced next week according to John Griffin, High school principal.

Adult Education classes are scheduled to begin Sept. 12 and all interested persons are advised to contact the high school principal's office as soon as possible so class periods may be arranged.

New Series of Adult Classes To Be Started

The Chelsea Board of Education has decided to continue the Adult Education program this year if this program has the continued interest and support of the people of the community.

It is the desire of the school to offer instruction in any subject or craft in which there is sufficient interest. If there is anything anyone would like to learn more about or if there is any activity in which there is a desire to participate and which, it is felt, others might enjoy, too, readers are requested to turn to page seven of this issue of The Standard, fill out the Adult Education blank and send it immediately to John Griffin, Chelsea High School principal. Others will probably have similar interests and a class can be started.

It is planned to begin adult classes during the week of Sept. 12.

Cost of classes will again be figured on the basis of \$4.00 for a 10-week course if the class meets once a week for a two-hour period. Variations from this will be prorated either up or down.

The Adult Education Advisory Committee will hold its first full meeting, Monday, Aug. 22, at 8 p.m. in Room 11 at the High School. An attempt has been made to contact all civic groups and many of the local industries, hoping they would each select someone to represent them on this committee.

The primary purpose of this committee is to aid the school in determining what kind of an Adult Education program the people of the community want. If any organization has not been contacted, and it is felt it should be represented, there need be no hesitation in contacting the school, as interest in the program is welcomed, it was pointed out.

The following courses for adults were taught in Chelsea last year: cake decorating, china painting, soils (agriculture), sewing (beginning, advanced and tailoring), typing, geology, finish carpentry, furniture refinishing, driver training, and community classes.

In announcing the proposed adult classes, Griffin said, "We will be happy to teach any of the above classes again this year or to add others in which sufficient interest is indicated. Let us know your wishes. In very popular classes, such as driver education, we may again have to have a waiting list. In this event the first interest cards will be given preference for the first class. Hurry, don't be one who has to wait for later classes."

Final Plans Told For Organization of Saturday Parade

Don Alber, Community Fair parade chairman, has announced the locations assigned to the various sections of Saturday's parade and urges everyone to be at the assigned place at 1:30 p.m. At that time the first blast of the first siren will be sounded as a signal. Floats are to line up on Park street, south of Chelsea High school, facing East street. Bicycles are to line up on Park street west of the East street crossing and facing east.

Cars, both new models and antiques, are to be on Jefferson street, also facing toward East street, while Harrison street will be reserved for horses.

Farm machinery should enter on Van Buren street, come up East street as far as Jefferson and stop there until assigned a place in the line of march.

Bicycles should gather at 1:30 p.m. at the Municipal building where H. T. Moore will be in charge. The triangles and bicycles will be judged before the beginning of the parade so it is especially important for them to be at the assigned locations at 1:30 p.m.

Tricycles will drop out of the parade at the corner of Orchard street but all other entries will remain in the line of march until the fairgrounds are reached.

Trucks and all other parade entries are to line up on Park street, east of Main street, and behind the bicycles.

Line of march for the parade will be from East street, in front of Chelsea High school gymnasium to East Middle; East Middle to Main street; Main street to Old US 12; and west to the fairgrounds.

The fire siren will be sounded at 2 p.m. to signal the start of the parade.

In case of showers, Alber said, the parade will be delayed until it stops raining, the siren to be sounded when ready to start marching.

An additional feature at the fairgrounds, following the parade, is to be a horse show for all ages under the direction of Clarence Staphish.

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Fat Stock Auction Is Scheduled for Friday Afternoon

Chelsea's 1955 Community Fair opened yesterday, the annual Children's Day program being the feature of the grandstand show last night. Dave Mitchell, Detroit television artist, appeared in person as master of ceremonies and presented a program of magic.

Also present for several hours yesterday afternoon was Albert Warnhoff, Ann Arbor "Santa Claus helper." He is exhibiting a number of the toys he makes throughout the year for Christmas giving to

crippled and hospitalized children and to others. His exhibit includes a doll bed he made, together with bedding made and contributed by the Model Homemakers Extension club of Whitmore Lake. Warnhoff said many Extension clubs in the county sew and contribute such necessary items for his toys.

Other items included in Warnhoff's exhibit are toy animals and furniture. He said he is leaving the items with the Fair Board to give away.

Judging of all exhibits at the fair began this morning. Chairmen of the various livestock divisions report record entries as follows: Reuben Lesser, beef cattle division, 25 animals; William Van Riper, dairy cattle division, 35; Arthur Barth, sheep division, 82; LeRoy Heller, swine division, 45; and David McCormick rabbits, 25 pens.

Late entries are expected to bring the number of sheep exhibited to 100, while from five to ten additional animals are expected in the beef and dairy cattle and swine divisions. Approximately 80 pens of poultry are also entered.

Today is designated as Farmer's Day, the big special event being the heavyweight horse pulling contest at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Everett G. Van Riper, chairman of the contest, said yesterday that drivers of eight of the top teams in this section of the country had promised to be here for the event.

Professional entertainment in the fairgrounds arena is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. today and tomorrow and again in the evening at 8:00 p.m. both days. Rides and concessions and live radio broadcasts directed from the grounds are scheduled for each day of the fair.

At 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, preceding the professional entertainment in the arena, there will be the eagerly-awaited beef sale when exhibitors' animals will be put up for auction to the highest bidder.

Another high spot of Friday's program will be the annual pig scramble, scheduled for 9:30 p.m. In this event each boy gets to keep the pig he manages to catch, with the provision that he will provide a pig from the animal's litter for the next year's fair. Original pigs for the first pig scramble some years ago were contributed by Chelsea businessmen.

Any boy in grades seven through twelve who wishes to enter the pig scramble event, should contact Philip Smith, Chelsea High school agriculture teacher.

The big events Saturday are the annual street parade at 2 o'clock followed by a children's and young folks' rodeo and horse exhibition at the fairgrounds arena; a band concert by Chelsea High School band at 8 p.m.; crowning of the "queen" by Village President Maxwell G Sweet; and the awarding of free door prizes by the merchants of Chelsea.

Also to be awarded Saturday night is a home freezer donated by R. G. Martin, Inc., and stocked with frozen foods donated by other merchants of the community.

Live radio broadcasts from the fairgrounds will take place from 11:45 until 12 noon daily and from 6:30 until 7:30 p.m. each evening. During that time, from 6:45 until 7:00 p.m. and from 7:15 until 7:30 p.m. last night, the Junior Chamber of Commerce broadcasted.

Tonight the two 15-minute periods will be in charge of the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce; Friday, at the same time, the Kiwanis club will broadcast; and Saturday, the American Legion will preside.

In addition, his devotion to duty, courageous leadership and aggressiveness were a great contribution to the successful accomplishment of the United Nations efforts against the Communist aggression in Korea.

empire" and developed a plan for state aid to smaller colleges.
He formed a legislative committee of 10 to work with five businessmen to iron out the details.
The idea is to build up the small schools as preliminary educational steps toward the four-year specialized institutions, like Michigan State University and the University of Michigan.
"We can save up to \$100 million of the estimated cost if we do it this way," he said.
Private colleges reacted to the program of the public institution presidents in varied ways.
Reduced from academic languages, their comments charge that public institutions are recruiting students away from private schools and then seeking the taxpayer to finance more facilities.
Duplication of courses was another point. Three public colleges have forestry curricula, for instance.
The latest champion of the private school view was Dr. Simon Leimund, dean of liberal arts at Northwestern University.
He charged that public-supported institutions have "grossly overestimated" their needs and were urging higher education upon young people whose aptitudes were inadequate to handle it.
Dr. John A. Hannah, president of Michigan State University, and a champion of the theory of education-for-all, said:
"It was the most completely irresponsible speech I ever heard uttered by a college man."
More conservative but still of a mind with Hannah, Dr. Harlan H. Hatcher, president of the University of Michigan, said:
"I can think of a lot of explosives."
Fr. Celestin J. Steiner, president of the University of Detroit, called Leland's speech "a clear, factual and marvelous exposition which should help clear up in the public mind a lot of misconceptions."
Fr. Steiner is a leader of the private-college group which, with some notable exceptions, would like to see the Vander Werp plan go into effect.
He said his university is not on the hunt for state money, but "we wouldn't refuse it if it came."
Vander Werp plans a series of meetings with his committee in the fall to prepare something definite to lay before the 1956 legislature.
"We hope to resolve these disputes and give Michigan a realistic and economical answer to our problems of higher education," he said.
Political seers place significance in the company Gov. Williams kept at the governor's conference in Chicago.
They expect Williams to make his move toward the national Democratic political scene soon, and his every maneuver is tested for signs and portents.
The four-term Democratic governor took Lt. Gov. Philip A. Hart and Rep. Ed Carey (D-Detroit) to the conference—possibly for the experience.
Hart is being groomed as the heir-apparent if and when Williams ever leaves the executive office. Carey, a former CIO official, is the Democratic wheelhorse in the House.
Normally at the governor's conferences, hopefuls for the presi-

dential nominations sound out sentiment in other parts of the country.
If Williams moves out, Hart and Carey will be very much in the news as leaders of the party Williams leaves.

Poultry Feeding Should Include Suitable Grits

Well-planned poultry feeding programs should include grit along with the regular rations. Grit, if used properly, will yield returns far above its actual cost, according to Philip J. Schiabe, poultry nutritionist at Michigan State University.

Grit acts as a crushing and grinding material in the gizzards of poultry. It breaks down coarse feed materials and so improves the digestibility and efficiency of utilization. You get greater benefits from the use of grit when whole grains are fed than where the mash is ground.

Schiabe lists three classes of grit: hard or soft, soluble or insoluble and calcareous or non-calcareous. Calcareous grit can serve two purposes—grinding feed and supplying calcium. Soft has a short life as grinding material but can supply calcium if it's calcareous.

Use of the calcareous type may be good with the laying flock. But it may not be so desirable for starting, or broiler chicks as most of the mashes contain the needed calcium.

Use the size of grit suited to the digestive tract of the bird. Some poultrymen have used local supplies of river gravel and pebbles for hard insoluble grit with good results.

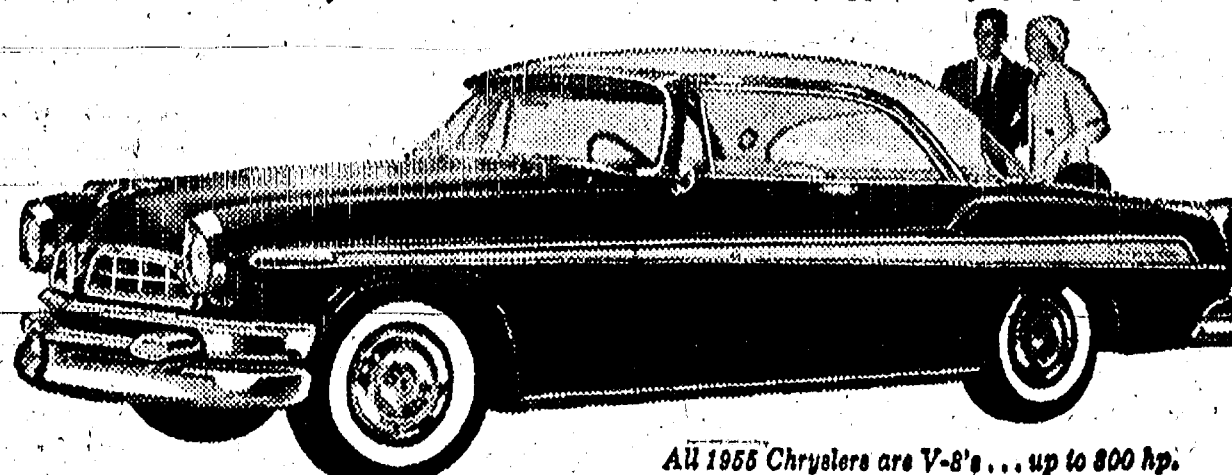

Hogs, Cattle Supply Reported Greater

The fall pig crop may be 10 per cent larger than a year ago, according to farm economists at Michigan State University. Reports of farmers' intentions as to farrowings indicate this will likely be true.

The spring pig crop was nine per cent larger than the previous year. The two large crops combined may total 101 million head, the largest production since 1951. The farm economists say that prospects for large supplies will tend to hold down seasonal price increases for fat cattle in August.
