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## F. Gendron Quits Post as Club Agent

Accepts Position as  
Dairy Specialist  
At Michigan State

Frank Gendron, Washtenaw county 4-H club agent since June, 1951, has accepted a position as dairy specialist in the Michigan State University Dairy department, according to an announcement by Donald R. Johnson, county agricultural agent.

Gendron's position at the college will be on a half-time basis while continuing his work on a doctor's degree in dairy production. His appointment to the college position is subject to State Board of Agriculture approval.

Washtenaw county 4-H clubs will hold a farewell party for Gendron tonight at Superior Township Hall. The party, sponsored by local leaders and the Washtenaw County 4-H Service Club, will begin at 8 p.m. All 4-H members, parents, leaders and friends are being urged to attend.

Gendron's administration of the 4-H club program of Washtenaw county has grown to be one of the largest in the state of Michigan, maintaining meanwhile its record of ranking with the highest in quality.

Most outstanding achievements of 4-H club work in the county have been accomplished in judging. In the last four years more than half of the Michigan 4-H judging teams have been Washtenaw county boys.

Three years ago, the Michigan dairy team captured the national championship and two years ago, under Gendron's leadership, the county 4-H club youth, was the national champion 4-H dairy judge.

These instances support the past record of Washtenaw county having more members on state 4-H judging teams than any other county in Michigan.

Many examples of 4-H achievement under Gendron's leadership might be cited, including 4-H camp which has become an outstanding event, and records in demonstration at state competition level.

Washtenaw county has been receiving national recognition. Many appointments to the 4-H position is to become effective Sept. 20.

A successor to Gendron in the Washtenaw county position has not yet been named.

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## Farm Policy Forum To Be Held at Saline

Michigan farmers will have the opportunity next month to tell the Department of Agriculture exactly what they want in the way of farm policy and legislation. They can tell it to True D. Morse, undersecretary of Agriculture, and to Michigan congressmen at an agriculture forum in Saline, Oct. 3.

Purpose of the session is to give a liaison between farmers and their representatives in Washington.

Senator Charles Potter will act as moderator in a panel discussion by Morse, Ernest Girbach who is a director of the Michigan Milk Producers Association, and others. All Michigan congressmen have been invited.

The farmers will be asked to speak their minds in a question and answer session and will be provided with cards on which to write any suggestions they may have.

The forum is scheduled for 8 p.m. Monday, Oct. 3, in the auditorium of Saline Area Elementary school.

It is expected that Morse will arrive in Washtenaw county about noon that day and will make a swing around the county in a spot inspection of local farm conditions.

The forum is sponsored by the Agriculture sub-committee of the Washtenaw county Republican Committee.

## Civil Defense Calling for Volunteers

Washtenaw county Civil Defense office is calling for volunteers to take part in an Auxiliary Police training program. A large, well-trained force is needed to meet Civil Defense requirements.

The auxiliaries would be used not only in case of a military attack, but also in case of natural disaster where Civil Defense units have been called upon to assist.

Chelsea Junior Chamber of Commerce, together with J.C.C. groups throughout the county have helped plan the program with police and civil defense officials. Jaycees are distributing applications to interested persons in Chelsea, Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Milan, Saline and Manchester areas.

Volunteers from the Dexter area will be handled through the Ann Arbor Civil Defense office.

Applications are being sent to former auxiliary police whose experience should make them valuable members of the program. Junior chamber of Commerce members are also being asked to join. Only residents are eligible. Volunteers be physically able, adult males.

It is expected that more than 200 men will take part in this year's program.

Applications may be obtained at the Civil Defense office in the Courthouse at Ann Arbor; at Ann Arbor or Ypsilanti police departments; the Sheriff's department; or by calling the office of Civil Defense, NO 8-6819 between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Applicants are required to be fingerprinted and to sign loyalty oaths. The Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti Police departments and the Sheriff's department will fingerprint volunteers any week day and Saturday mornings. Fingerprinting will also be done on nights Sept. 12-16 and Sept. 19-23.

Training program consists of sixteen two-hour sessions covering such topics as "Police Organization and Functions," "Responsibilities and Duties of the Auxiliary Police," "Civil Defense Organization and Plans," "Arrests, Search and Seizure," "Traffic Planning and Control," "Local Ordinances and State Laws," "Fire Control," "Invasion Security and Atomic, Biological and Chemical Warfare."

Sessions will be held about every two weeks beginning in October and continuing through next June. Classes will be held in Ann Arbor in Angell Hall auditorium at the University, and in Ypsilanti.

Police and Civil Defense officials will serve as instructors.

## Paul Maroney Named To State Legion Auditing Committee

Paul C. Coach Conklin pointed out that the starting line-up is only tentative and game time might see some of the above boys in the starting line-up.

Recent additions to the squad since school began have raised the total to 64, the highest squad to represent Chelsea in the last four years.

This year's team lacks the size of last year's squad which won five and lost four and finished in a tie for third in the four league standings. A aggressive play and increased team speed, however, should make up for the lack of size, and the current Bulldogs should provide the fans with plenty of interesting football.

Dexter, under new coach Nick Many, will field a tough veteran team. The Chelsea-Dexter game usually develops into an extremely close, hard-fought battle. Last year Chelsea eked out a 9-7 victory as Ted Nixon scored the TD and added the extra point. The two-point victory margin came as Joe Bauer blocked a punt in Dexter's end zone for a safety.

**Richard Schneider Shown in Oregon Daily's Feature on Migrant Workers**

Richard Schneider, who spent the summer in migrant work on the west coast in an experimental project for learning the needs of the workers at first hand, arrived home at midnight Saturday and is leaving today to return to Oregon as a student missionary with the Council of Churches and to enter Linfield College to begin his junior year college work. He is majoring in social agencies and has transferred from Michigan State University where he took his first two years of work.

He will be on the student staff of SAMM, the Salem Area Migrant Ministry of the Oregon Council of Churches.

Schneider spoke at St. Paul's Evangelical and Reformed church during the worship service Sunday morning and gave an outline of his summer's work and his plans for continuation of the migrant work.

Aug. 23—The Statesman, Salem, Ore., daily paper printed a full-page feature story, illustrated with a number of pictures showing Schneider and other workers with the migrants. There are approximately 1,800 men, women and children in the migrant camp known as Eola Rural Station at McMinnville.

The four Michigan State University students who started west on the project with Richard last June are Barbara Ruesink, Richard First, Alice Severance and Jane Hamlin. They have returned and will continue their college work.

Schneider has been a full-time staff member in the migrant work since June.

## Newsmen Here for Advance Showing of New Chrysler Cars

**School Bus Drivers To Attend Special Training Sessions**

At the meeting of the Chelsea Agricultural Schools School Board Tuesday evening, arrangements were completed for Chelsea's school bus drivers to attend bus drivers' training school sessions at Dexter, Nov. 23 and 30 and Dec. 7 and 14.

The board also adopted a minimum testing program for students in grades 7 through 12. This includes differential aptitude tests and interest tests with a special achievement test planned for seniors near the close of the senior year.

Superintendent Charles S. Cameron and Elementary Principal Arthur Schunk were appointed to make a study of the non-lunch program in preparation for making recommendations to be acted upon at a special meeting to be held for the purpose of coming to a decision on the matter.

Rural schools acquired by the district through annexation of districts are to be held for a year, it was decided.

It was also decided that kitchens will not be furnished with equipment in either elementary school this year.

State regulations regarding operation of bus routes, which require that no child be transported in a district is to be reimbursed for cost of such transportation, were announced to be as follows: elementary children may be required to walk up to one-half mile to the bus route while pupils in grades 7 through 12 may be required to walk up to one full mile to the bus stop.

**School Child Insurance Plan Offered**

School children from kindergarten age through high school will have insurance up to \$2,500 for any one accident available to them for merely \$1.50 per year. The Chelsea Board of Education has made arrangements with the World Insurance Company of Omaha, Neb., to make available insurance protection up to \$2,500 for any accident which may befall the children from one home to school.

Nealy J. Buchanan, escaped Jackson prisoner, who is being sought as the suspected killer of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Herrick of Stockbridge, has been reported seen in widely scattered locations the past week but investigation in each instance has proved the reports groundless.

With the wide publicity given, it was inevitable that someone should get the idea he was in the Chelsea area and Chelsea police received a message at 1:40 p.m. Friday that a man answering the suspected killer's description had knocked at the door of a home on Wilkinson street.

Police officers discovered, after investigation that the man, employed on a nearby building project, had planned to ask permission to draw a pail of water. When no one answered his knock he returned to his work, not realizing the furor he had unwittingly caused.

In addition, there was no similarity in his description and that of Buchanan.

Thursday night a false report had made the rounds that the suspect was in the Dexter area.

Fingerprints of Buchanan were reportedly discovered at the scene of the Herrick killings.

**Three-Year-Old Boy Suffers Cut Finger in Bike Chain**

David Conklin, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alan Conklin, suffered a badly-cut right forefinger, when the finger became caught in the chain of a bicycle while he was at play Thursday. He was taken to U. of M. hospital and remained there for treatment of the injury.

## Special Train, Buses Transport Group to Proving Grounds

L. L. Colbert, president of Chrysler, has arranged for approximately 500 newsmen from all parts of the nation who were guests at a preview showing of the new 1956 models of the company's cars at Chrysler Proving Ground here Monday.

New "flight sweep" Plymouth, Dodge, DeSoto, Chrysler and Imperial models were displayed to the newsmen, with one first showing of the new cars scheduled for a later date this fall.

Most unusual feature of the new Chrysler line is a push-button control system for all cars equipped with automatic transmissions. Fingertip control of the transmission is made very simple by touching the appropriate button on a selector panel of push buttons mounted on the dashboard to the left of the steering wheel. Selection of the left-of-the-wheel position for the control panel eliminates the selector rod under the steering wheel and also serves as an added safety feature, engineers pointed out, since children cannot reach across the driver to tamper with the control buttons.

Other safety features include seat belts as optional equipment, faster-acting brakes, and new-type door latches which have been demonstrated to keep doors from flying open in case of accident.

A low silhouette is emphasized on the new models which are styled in an aircraft design featuring a high tail-fin motif.

Colbert told the newsmen that Chrysler is "out to get 20 per cent of the automobile, business and more" while quoting figures to show that during the first eight months of 1955 Chrysler production accounted for 17.3 per cent of automobile production.

An unusual innovation in automobile accessories was unveiled when the display revealed a hi-fidelity record player which mounts under the glove compartment and plays through the radio. Special scratch-resistant vinyl discs are issued which provide nearly an hour's entertainment on each side of the disc. The player is to be available as optional equipment on all models.

A special chartered train transported the group from Detroit to the Chelsea station where a fleet of 24 buses met them for the trip to the Proving Grounds.

The smorgasbord type luncheon and stage showing of the new models was held in the large maintenance garage which had been transformed into a plush auditorium for the occasion, with a false ceiling, carpeted floors and a huge circular stage onto which the new models were driven.

William Lundin, who acts as master of ceremonies on the Chrysler-Corpus Christi TV show, was present to handle the program.

**Polio Vaccine Clinic To Be Held Monday**

The polio vaccine clinic for second shots, scheduled to be held in Chelsea next Monday, will take place in the South Elementary school and will begin at 9 a.m., according to a Washtenaw county Health Department announcement.

Dr. V. E. Hansen and Dr. A. A. Palmer are the local physicians who are to administer the vaccine here to all children in the second and third grades, regardless of whether they received an injection in the spring.

Before a child can receive the vaccine at these clinics, however, a request slip, signed by the parent, must be on hand at the clinic. Now request slips are necessary since those signed in the spring cannot be recognized at this clinic.

Children who failed to receive their first injection last spring may take advantage of the clinic here Monday, according to Dr. Otto K. Engelke, county health officer.

Children of St. Mary's school and Canfield school will be brought to the clinic here in addition to those from the Chelsea Agricultural Schools school district.

Local registered nurses who will contribute their services at the clinic are Mrs. Graham Britten, Mrs. James Daniels, Mrs. Maxwell G. Sweet and Miss Gertrude Young. Also scheduled to be at the clinic are Miss Belle McKinney and Miss Olive Brower, public health nurses from the Health Department.

Mrs. Hugh Sorenson, Chelsea polio chairman, is arranging for volunteers to assist the doctors and nurses at the clinic.

## Bethel Pastor's Daughter Shows Slides, Tells Story of Student Work Camp

At the Women's Guild meeting at Bethel Evangelical and Reformed church Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 7, Rhea Menzel, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. T. W. Menzel, showed slide pictures and told of her experiences of the past summer which she spent in Germany at a student work camp sponsored by the World Council of Churches.

Miss Menzel explained that approximately 1,000 students in 30 work camps participated in reconstruction projects in war-torn Korea and in Europe and Asia. The group she was with was assigned to a small community called Mehren, near Coblenz, Germany, where the project was concerned with construction of a parish hall and kindergarten.

She said the place reminded her of her home here since the church built in 1200 A.D. was of native stone just as Bethel church is constructed of stone native to this area.

The work camp group worked seven hours a day and then participated in study and recreation periods.

They learned that the church at Mehren served 1,300 parishioners in a circle of 15 farm villages. The 28 young people in Miss Menzel's work group represented 12 different nations and 17 different church bodies.

The work camps are designed to teach community living and provide experiences conducive to Christian endeavor.

Individuals in the group were invited to homes of the community once or twice a week, Miss Menzel said, and in this way became acquainted with many of the people. Miss Menzel had previously shown the pictures at a meeting of the Women's Guild of St. John's church, Rogers Corners, held Sept. 2 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Hines.

### Dolly Madison Credited with Serving First Ice Cream

Dolly Madison, whose reputation as a hostess with a flair for the unusual, has frequently been credited with serving the first ice cream. An account of the second inauguration of President Madison contains the following: "Mrs. Madison always entertains beautifully. When finally the brilliant assembly, America's best, entered the dining room, they beheld in the center, high on a silver platter, a large shining dome of pink ice cream."

Undoubtedly, this lovely First Lady popularized the frozen dainty but accounts of man's concoction of a cooling sweet goes back to the 14th century when Marco Polo, returning from the Orient, told tales of slant-eyed men, consuming dishes of ice, brought by camel-back from the mountains, in to which had been mixed sweetening, exotic fruits and flavorings.

The recipe brought back by this famous globe-trotter was quickly adopted by the Italians and, through the Medici, spread to France where the chefs, trying to improve on the water ices, added milk and cream. From there the formula reputedly traveled to England as a court secret.

The first newspaper advertisement for ice cream in this country appeared May 19, 1777, in the New

York Gazette. But, although George Washington's account book under date of May 17, 1784, describes a "cream machine for making ice," it was not until the year 1848 that a patent was issued on an ice cream freezer.

remained through the years since. Mr. White was in the trucking business and later was employed at Central Fibre Products and Chelsea Spring company. He is now retired.

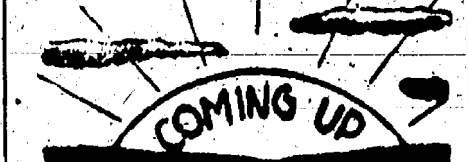
