Late Friday night when it started to snow, driving was hazardous and sanding crews worked for several hours.

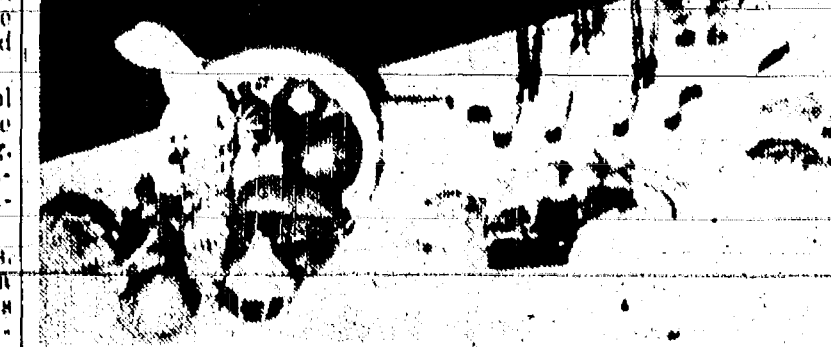

Safe Driving Day Scheduled Dec. 1

The President's Committee for Traffic Safety is again sponsoring a special day dedicated to safe driving—S-D Day. The date is Dec. 1, next Thursday, and the aim is to hold deaths and injuries to the lowest possible level for a 24-hour period.

While perfection probably is too much to expect—even for one day—from a combination of about 72 million drivers and 58 million motor vehicles, no sensible person would argue for a minute that the usual toll cannot be substantially cut by more sensible driving.

It's too bad that such a worthwhile effort must be limited to only one day. The sponsors apparently think so, one-day exception. We could make every day S-D day.

There lies the irony of our traffic accident problem—that it takes a presidential blessing and a high-powered educational effort to achieve reasonable conduct on the highways for only one day of the year.

Safe driving should be the year-round rule, not the one-day exception. We could make every day S-D day.

We add our hopes to those of the Washtenaw county sheriff's department and the village police department that our entire county can exercise a little extra care and not only have a perfect record on this special day but can continue the safety program through the holiday period ahead.

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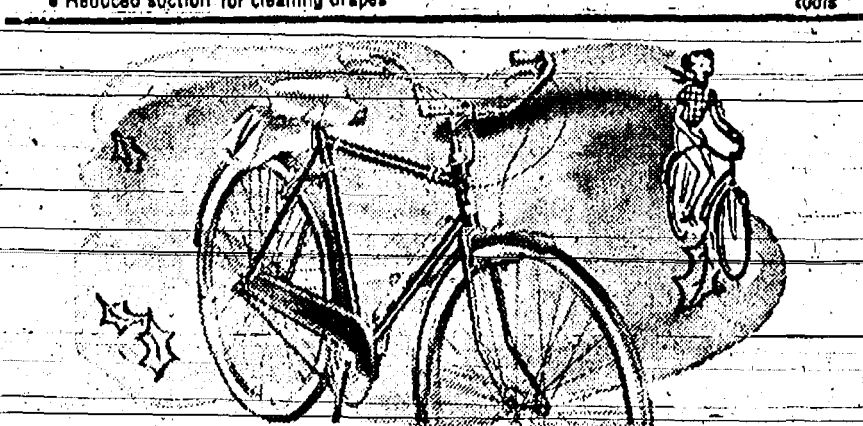

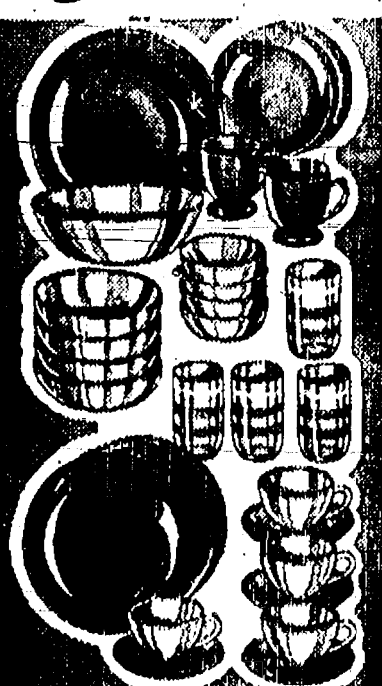

Don't Admit Fault In Auto Accident, U-M Lawyer Warns

Ann Arbor—Politeness pays, but don't be too polite when you're involved in an automobile accident or it may cost you money and trouble.

Prof. Marcus L. Plant of the University of Michigan Law School points out that a person who says "I'm sorry, it was all my fault" after an accident usually is in no position or frame of mind to accurately determine fault.

And he warns that such an admission may be used against you in court, and there may be a clause in your insurance policy that voids that insurance if you admit liability, moreover the other party may have been guilty of contributory negligence.

The safest thing to do, once you have an accident, is to get the names and addresses of the other persons involved, the names of their insurance companies, their car's license number and the names and addresses of any witnesses. Then notify your own insurance company immediately.

If the accident is in Michigan and someone is killed or injured, you must inform the police and make a written report to the Secretary of State on his forms. The police also must be told if the car has been disabled so it cannot be moved in the usual manner.

Fancy Gadgets Won't Locate Oil, Says U-M Geologist

If you're looking for oil on your property don't rely on "doodle bugs" or "doodle buggers," says a University of Michigan geologist.

Prof. Kenneth K. Landes says a "doodle bug" is an entirely spurious gadget and that it can't locate oil. He states there is no known gadget except the drill which will actually help find the precious substance.

First call in a geologist, he suggests, who knows how and where to look for oil. If you don't get help from one of these gentlemen, Professor Landes indicates, you have only one chance in 32 of being successful.

And remember, he adds, actual drilling of a 3,000-foot hole in Michigan may cost \$12,000, plus lease acquisition, geological cost and the expense of casing and testing.

Ability To Speak Second Language Highly Valuable

Ann Arbor—"Let 'em learn English" is an outmoded slogan for any student who wants to capitalize on the booming demand for skilled linguists in all fields of work, according to Associate Prof. Otto G. Graf of the University of Michigan's German Department.

"Foreign language study may lead to a career in itself, but as an added skill for the engineer, scientist, lawyer, doctor, school teacher, and others, it is worth even more," he says.

Many industries and businesses have overseas branches, he points out, and newspapers, radio, advertising, movies, and books bring American news, ideas and atti-

tudes to all parts of the world. Needs for language competence in government service are so extensive that even a partial listing points to more than 20 separate opportunities in government for students proficient in another language, including foreign service, court interpreters, international broadcasters, educational missions and translators. If a person demonstrates exceptional ability in one language, the government will hire and train him in another where the current need lies.

In the teaching profession alone there are openings each year for more than 2,000 persons trained in foreign languages, he states, adding that "dependent schools," operated by the U. S. Government in foreign countries for children of military and civilian personnel there, offer teachers a chance to go abroad.

No institution in Michigan offers the wide choice of languages to be found at the University," he says, listing Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Norwegian, Portuguese, Russian and Spanish as possible courses.

And in view of the growing emphasis throughout the country on proficiency in the foreign language, rather than the number of years spent studying it, as an indicator of the students' ability to use it, the U-M has recently changed its language graduation requirements.

Entering students will take a test to determine their proficiency and if they pass, will be counted as having satisfied their language requirements toward graduation. If they fail they will have the opportunity to continue study in college—and may take the test again whenever they think they can pass, says Professor Graf, who is chairman of the University's Committee on Language Instruction.

Deer in Southern Michigan Found To Be Heavier

Lansing—The southern lower Michigan deer, with superior winter food supplies for deer, produces the largest yearling bucks according to comparisons of deer weights in different parts of the state.

A study of deer sizes, conducted during the 1952-54 hunting seasons, shows the average 1½-year-old deer in the southern portion of the state outweighs his brothers in the north by 23-29 pounds.

Poor winter range conditions, caused by heavy concentrations of deer and severe weather, result in smaller deer in the northern lower peninsula, the study showed.

Deer in the southern Michigan farm regions have less competition for food, and weather conditions permit a wider range of travel in search of winter food.

Upper Peninsula deer in the same age group slightly outweighed deer in the northern lower peninsula.

Some 7,000 yearling bucks were weighed and recorded by Conservation Department biologists at locker plants and hunting camps during the three-year study.

Waterloo Area Clerk To Present Showing Of Watercolors

B. R. Bower who is employed as a clerk at Waterloo Area headquarters, will present his first public showing of watercolor interpretations of Michigan scenes next Sunday, from 3 p.m. until 9 p.m. in Jackson.

The showing will take place at 1302 West Gunson street. All interested persons are invited to attend.

The exhibition will include indelible pencil watercolor pictures of rural, village and lake scenes, not only of Michigan but of neighboring states as well.

The work was done during the past year.

Rev. Toy will be a resource leader at the conference and will also act as the adult advisor for the four young people who will represent the local church. The four are David Wolfgang, Diana Barr, John Thomas and Quentin Smith.

Rev. M. J. Betz, superintendent of the Methodist Home, will conduct the service and deliver the sermon at the Congregational church in the absence of Rev. Toy.

Club Members May Study Parliamentary Rules by Filmstrip

Examples about who should do what, when and how at club meetings can now be settled with ease through the use of a cartoon filmstrip recently issued by the University of Michigan Audio-Visual Education Center.

Of value to women's clubs, service clubs, high school or college groups and other organizations, the filmstrip is designed to explain and review the most widely used and most necessary rules of parliamentary procedure.

It focuses on the necessity for rules of order, raises questions which stimulate further study, and emphasizes the need for practice in the proper use of parliamentary procedures.

Want to know how the experts would prepare hunter hubby's pheasant or duck for a tasty treat?

The answers are in a bulletin, "Good Eating From Woods and Fields." It's free from the county extension office. It tells about various tested methods on preparing pheasant, rabbit, grouse, wild duck, muskrats and other wild animals. The publication, Extension Bulletin 282, was prepared jointly by Michigan State University and the Michigan Department of Conservation.

College Enrollment May Double in Next 15 Years

East Lansing—Only four of every 100 college age youths actually undertook higher education in 1900.

Today more than 80 of every 100 youths of the same age attend colleges and universities.

Meanwhile the population has grown tremendously and promises to keep doing so.

These facts and figures, presented at the recent Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities convention at Michigan State University, tell as well as any the enrollment problem to be faced by institutions of higher learning.

They are part of a presentation entitled "The Impending Tidal Wave of Students," given by American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers.

Assuming there will be no further increase in the percentage of college-age youth attending colleges and universities, that the only increases will be caused by larger population, we may look forward to an enrollment of more than 4 million by 1970, compared with 2 million this year, the report stated.

If the attendance rate continues its average one per cent increase per year until 1962, following the pattern of the past 20 years, enrollment in colleges and universities will reach 5½ million by 1970—more than double today's enrollment.

Dauntless Davy Crockett Lined Up Sights on Politicians as Well as Indians

Ann Arbor—If Mrs. Crockett's son Davy was never particularly subtle when he notched his sights on a marauding Indian or when he fought to the end in defense of the Alamo—neither was he when he faced opponents on the floor of the House of Representatives.

A copy of a speech by dauntless Davy before the House in March, 1890, found in the Transcription Library of the University of Michigan, reveals that when some members were trying to ram through a bill proposing the construction of a national road from Buffalo to Washington to New Orleans, Davy went after them with scolding knife, tomahawk, and old Davy looked to the muzzle.

Some "gentlemen," he said, had underestimated the length of the road, overlooked swampy ground in figuring construction costs, planned the road to run parallel to the Mississippi River (itself a natural highway) for five or six hundred miles, and had forgotten to mention that parts of the road would be impassable in the winter—a time when it was needed most for the defense of the nation.

He told the Committee of the Whole of the House there was only one reason to justify himself for voting for the bill as proposed.

"I discovered a determination to squander the public funds in some way, and therefore I should strive to 'come in for snacks.'"

He added, however, that because of the high duties which would come with the expenditure of the funds, "I would not be surprised if we should finally be obliged to resort to a system of direct taxation. This will be a tough morsel for the people in my part of the country to swallow."

According to John C. Kohl, professor of civil engineering and director of the Transcription Institute at the U-M, Davy need not have worried about the road. A few years later saw the coming of the railroads and the abandonment of the project. Appropriations for the road were stopped.

Those direct taxes of which Davy spoke did not suffer the same fate.
