1. Adopt a strict enforcement policy which shall result in the stopping of every-driver observed violating a traffic law or ordi-

2. Arrest and vigorously prese-cute every driver involved in a traffic accident who contributed to or caused the accident by violating traffic law or ordinance. 3. Adopt a policy of making

more frequent and stringent inspections of motor vehicles during the course of regular enforcement duties, including the arrest of all rivers found to be operating vehicles in unsafe condition. 4. Adopt a policy of strict enforcement of existing pedestrian

laws and ordinances, 5. Increase the use of such scien tific aids to traffic law enforcement as radar and electric speed timing-devices.

6. Increase the use of chemical tests for intoxication. 7. Report by enforcement offi-cers on special forms to be pro-vided, drivers whom the enforcement officer has reason to believe are not competent to drive with reasonable safety.

8. The use of unmarked cars in

traffic enforcement wherever nec

9. That all law enforcement personnel dealing in traffic work be trained at some established school dealing with this phase of police work and that all concerned encourage the governing bodies to appropriate funds for this type of training.

Farm Expenses Seen Near Same in 1956

Farm expenses are expected to total about the same in 1956 as they have been in the fall of 1955. Labor costs and taxes will be higher but there will be declines in the prices for feed, seed and some replacement livestock, report farm economists at Michigan State University, Costs for motor fuel, building materials, fortilizer and machinery are expected to stay about the same.

But the economists warn that farmers must still watch their expenses carefully since net income may be lower. They suggest shop-ping around for good buys in farm machinery and using more of their own labor and family help to do fencing, concrete work, buildings repairs and service jobs.
