Varsity Cage Squad Loses Saline Game

Lincoln High Teams Will Play Here Friday Evening

Chelsea's varsity team was vanquished in the basketball game at Saline Friday night by a score of 68-46.

Saline's victory over Chelsea has established the team as one of the strongest in the Huron League this year, with some observers saying it is actually the strongest one of them all. Howard Hill is Saline's coach.

The Saline team lost fewer players by graduation this year than any of the teams in the league.

Saline players got off to a good start with a 16-point lead in the first quarter and kept the lead throughout the game.

Chelsea's reserve team turned in a victory, the final score being 22-22. This was their second victory of the season, which opened Tuesday of last week with the game at Dexter.

High-point man for the reserve game was George Mayer with 10 points.

Bob DeFaut, on Chelsea's varsity team, accounted for 18 points at high-point man for Chelsea at the Saline game.

Lincoln-High players will be here for a home game Friday night. Reserves will begin their game at 8:45 p.m.

He is sports publicity director for the year and directs two 15-minute weekly sports broadcasts on the college radio programs.

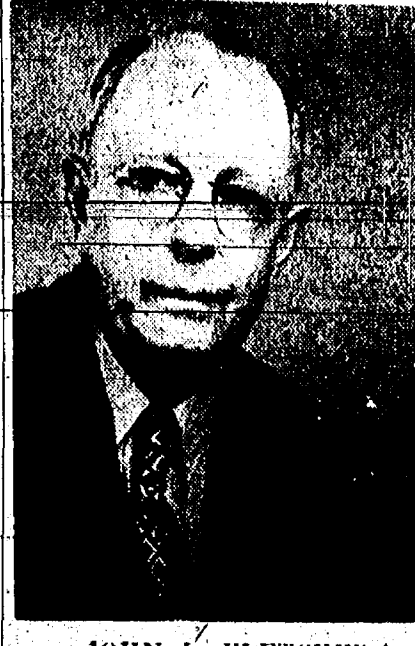

Retired Bank Official Dies Wednesday

John L. Fletcher, who had been active in banking circles for 50 years before his retirement in 1951, died at 7:30 a.m. yesterday at his home, 116 East street. He was serving as Chelsea village treasurer at the time of his death.

His connection with banking institutions began in 1901 when he went to work for the bank at Belleville. He remained there until 1904 when he returned to Chelsea and became affiliated with the former Kemf Commercial and Savings Bank. He headed that bank at the time it merged with the Farmers and Merchants Bank in 1934 to become the present Chelsea State Bank and had served as vice-president and director until his retirement because of failing health.

He was a charter member of the Chelsea Kiwanis club, a member of the Methodist church and the official board of the church, and a member of Chelsea Rod and Gun club.

Born in Sharon township, March 8, 1884, he was a son of William and Verena Lehman Fletcher. He was married Jan. 12, 1921, at Little Valley, N. Y., to Ruth Boyer, who survives.

Also surviving are a son, John E. of Evanston, Ill.; a daughter, Mrs. K. T. McKinney of Grosse Pointe; four grandchildren; and three sisters, Mrs. Grace Moebelman, Mrs. Cora Kellogg and Miss Harriet Fletcher, all of Naples, Fla.

Friends may call at the Staffan Funeral Home. Funeral services will be held there at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon with Rev. S. D. Kinde officiating. Burial will be in Oak Grove cemetery.

Tax Bills Show Slight Increase Over Last Year

Tax bills, which are being received locally at the present time are based on assessments made last January. It was pointed out by Sylvan Township Supervisor Maurice Hoffman, this week, that the rates are \$37.60 per \$1,000 valuation, a slight increase over 1954.

The over-all rate is determined by the county and school budgets both of which were \$3.10 higher than in 1954, (\$34.50 per \$1,000).

In School District No. 1, Fractional, Sylvan Township, the tax rate is divided as follows: county operating, 8.1 mills, and County Building, 1 mill; School operating, 16.93 mills and special voted, 9.51 and 2.06.

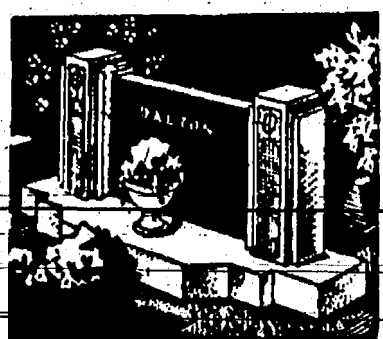
This week in art they made Christmas cards by screen painting. Designs were Christmas trees, bells, angels, and churches. They were very decorative.

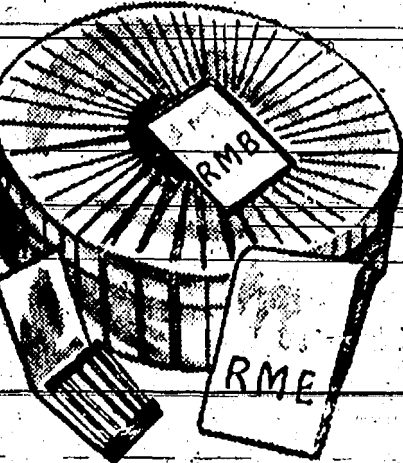

Episcopal Bishop To Officiate at Confirmation Service

Rt. Rev. Richard S. M. Emrich, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan, will officiate at the confirmation service to be held at St. Barnabas Episcopal Mission at 8 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 15.

Born in Marlin, Turkey, of missionary parents, he attended Phillips Andover Academy, Brown University, Episcopal Theological school in Cambridge and Union Theological Seminary in New York City as well as Marburg in Germany.

For ten years prior to 1946 he was instructor, assistant professor and professor at the Episcopal Theological school in Cambridge and served as rector of two Massachusetts churches. He is the author of numerous articles and pamphlets and has lectured and preached widely throughout Michigan.

He was elected suffragan bishop in 1946 and succeeded Rt. Rev. Frank W. Creighton as diocesan bishop in 1948.

Correct Use of Chemical Weed Killers Gets Results

Michigan corn farmers who were disappointed with chemical weed control this year probably didn't use 2,4-D at the proper rate or apply it at the right time.

That's the word from farm crop specialists at Michigan State University. They say that the wrong time and wrong rate will cut corn yields.

MSU experiments over six years show that 2,4-D plus cultivation, gave better weed control and higher corn yields than cultivation alone.

The ester form of 2,4-D as a pre-emergence spray at the rate of one pound of actual material per acre, gave the best weed control and the highest corn yields.

One-half pound of the amine form of 2,4-D after two cultivations gave only slightly better corn yields than the usual three cultivations. But when a half-pound of the amine form was applied after the corn was up, there was a reduction in yield. The chemical was substituted for the first cultivation.

The farm crop specialists insist that the first cultivation can be skipped if the recommended pre-emergence spray is used. They term the spray good insurance against weeds getting out of hand in wet weather.

Farmers attending the Corn Field days this fall saw the effect of using 2,4-D at the right time.

Garfield Diaries Found in Ohio During Search

East Lansing—Valuable personal papers of former President James A. Garfield were turned up at Mentor, Ohio, because of the interest of two Michigan State University professors.

Prof. Harry Brown and Fredrick D. Williams of MSU's history department this year were investigating the possibility of editing Garfield's diaries for publication.

It appeared that originals of earlier diaries had disappeared. Family members renewed their search and found the writings, carefully wrapped, in a vault in the old Garfield house at Mentor.

Sent to the Library of Congress were four diaries, covering the years from 1848, when Garfield

was 18, through 1859, and other records.

"The Garfield diaries, dealing with the period 1848-1881, contain much of interest and value to the student of American political, social and intellectual history," the professors noted. "He was one of the best educated and informed men ever to achieve the presidency."

Garfield, who became a Republican president in 1881, was shot by an unbalanced office-seeker the same year. He had been a college student, Hiram College president, Civil War officer and member of Congress.

'Tokyo Home' Representative To Be Guest at Assembly of God Chapel

Tokyo, Japan is the location of the first foreign Serviceman's Home sponsored by the Assembly of God churches in the United States. Since it was established about three years ago, "Tokyo Home" has influenced more than 25,000 American servicemen in all branches of the Armed Forces.

In 1953, Rev. and Mrs. E. William Mincey, who before this time were pastoring an Assembly of God church in California, went to Tokyo under the auspices of the General Council of the Assembly of God with headquarters in Springfield, Mo., to establish the first Christian Serviceman's Home. The project was a success from the beginning, and today is widely known and acclaimed by the thousands of servicemen who have passed through its doors. Last year, more than 18,000 men were served free of charge to servicemen. In addition to the home-cooked meals, sleeping quarters, and laundry programs, Christian activities have been provided for boys who have come through on visits from all points in the Far East area.

In response to an urgent request by Rev. and Mrs. Mincey, for addi-

tional help, the Foreign Missions Department of the Assembly of God is appointing Rev. and Mrs. William Sakwitz to go to Tokyo to assist in the work. Rev. Sakwitz is a veteran of World War II, and since graduating from Central Bible Institute in 1951, has been working as a promotional man and statistician in the Foreign Missions Department in Springfield, Mo.

Rev. and Mrs. Sakwitz are presently visiting in the home of her sister and husband, Rev. and Mrs. H. J. Meppelink. They will be itinerating in Michigan for a month, and are scheduled to sail for Japan in January. They will be appearing in the Assembly of God Chapel on Sunday morning, Dec. 11. In the opening exercises of the Sunday School, they will be showing slides of the "Tokyo Home" in Japan, and again at the morning worship service there will be more interesting features concerning the home. The public is invited to attend. The pastor is Rev. H. J. Meppelink.

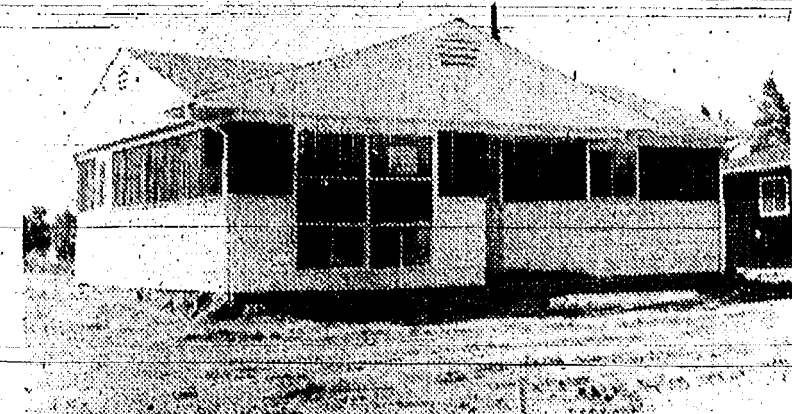

Farmers in 20 counties will get Federal loans to help carry them through the shock of a drought last summer.

Oldtimers said it was the worst summer for potatoes in 25 years and others were worried how they would feed their livestock through the winter.

Farm Home Administration came to their aid in cases where they couldn't get local bank credit.

"These men needing help now are good farmers and we want to help them get back on their feet after several losses," said G. Ellwood Bonine, state FHA director.

He said that some farmers had already disposed of some of their livestock because pasturelands were parched and baked in the summer heat and rainless days.

Others, finding pastures worthless during the summer, dipped into the winter feed already stored, as much as three months early.

Legislators have started a year-long study of ways to find room for another 100,000 college students by 1970.

Business and labor industry have been asked to help determine how the enrollment boom can best be handled—whether to expand four-year colleges or set up an "educational production line."

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He calls his plan, "Decentralized education."

He said he already has the promise of a large private foundation to help finance the study, which will include the problem of duplication of courses.

Vander Werp said the problem exists, for example, in the field of forestry. Three colleges in Michigan now offer the same course.

Vander Werp said it might be handled at one school.

Because of the intricacy of the problem and the many angles to be covered, the study will take a full year, he said.

Applications also are expected from southwestern Michigan fruit growers, livestock producers and from the rich potato areas in the northern lower peninsula.
