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## Leon Marsh Wins School Board Post

Leon Marsh was the successful candidate in Monday's school election. He was elected a member of the Board of Education for a three-year term.

Total number of votes cast in the election was 748. Marsh received 305; William Collins, 189; John W. Merkel, 126; and Reuben Lesser, 117. Five ballots were spoiled.

Following certification of Marsh's election, the Board of Education met and organized for the coming year and re-elected Dr. J. V. Fisher president.

Howard Elmer was re-elected secretary and Earl Beaman was named treasurer, the post held by William G. Kolb whose term as a board member expired this year.

Dudley Holmes and the newly-elected Marsh complete the five-man board.

It was announced that all regular meetings of the board for the 1957-58 school year will be held the third Tuesday of the month. Meetings begin at 7:30 p.m.

In other action the Chelsea School Board approved the eight-day FFA trip planned by the Chelsea chapter members and their sponsor, Philip Smith.

## School Bids Rejected as Too High

All bids submitted May 14 for the construction of the new high school building have been rejected by the Chelsea School District Board of Education. It was announced this week. The bids exceeded the budget for the new high school construction by \$80,000.

The amount represents the difference between the architects' estimated cost of \$16 per square foot and the cost of \$17 per square foot which the bids indicated as the actual cost for the specified construction.

The amount of the bond issue was originally determined in line with the architects' recommendations. Planning committees, architects, the faculty, administration and school board worked together in determining the amount needed on the basis of the estimated figure of \$16 per square foot and the \$220,000 bond issue, approved June 18, 1956, was considered sufficient for the construction of the high school and for eight additional elementary classroom buildings.

The architectural firm, Yamaoka, Leinweber & Associates, have now agreed to re-draw the entire plans for the new building at no cost to the Chelsea School District. The revised plans are to include all the functions of the original drawings with the exception that the athletic field will not be completed as provided in the original plans.

The new drawings are to be ready in time so bids may be advertised for in the state contractors and builders' trade magazines July 6 and 13. Under this schedule, Aug. 6 has been designated as the date for the opening of the bids.

## Firemen Pledge \$500 Toward New Proposed Fire Hall

At the regular meeting of the Chelsea Fire Department Monday evening, it was voted to pledge \$500 toward the cost of a proposed new fire hall for Chelsea. The \$500 represents proceeds of \$350 realized from the Kiddie Carnival sponsored by the firemen and held last week, together with \$150 taken from the firemen's fund.

### Harvey Lixey Re-Elected Head of Amalgamated Local

Harvey Lixey received a total of 212 votes to re-elect him president of UAW-CIO Amalgamated Local Union No. 437, at the election held last Thursday in the Union hall. His opponent, George Cantrell, received 109 votes.

A run-off election is being held today for the office of recording secretary, neither of three candidates receiving the required majority. The three candidates were Mitchell Picklesimer, who received 85 votes; Stanley Policht, 144; and Cecil Salvers, 89. The run-off candidates are Policht and Salvers.

Others elected last Thursday are Mac Packard, vice-president; K. R. McMannis, financial secretary; treasurer; Al Kaiser and Charles Patrick, trustees for four years; Arnel Minix, trustee for two years; Western Allen, guide; and Fremont Boyer, sergeant-at-arms. Kaiser, Patrick, Minix, Allen and Boyer were unopposed.

Packard received 169 votes and his opponent for the vice-presidency, Elwood McGlothen, 143 votes.

In the only other contest, McMannis had 190 votes to Al Mshar's 114 votes for the office of financial secretary-treasurer.

## Youth Rescued From Cave-in of Drainage Ditch

Charles Staphan, Jr., buried to the armpits for almost a half-hour in the cave-in of a trench he and his father were digging at the Staphan farm on Waterloo road Saturday morning, was released unharmed when his father succeeded in digging away the pile of earth in dirt which imprisoned him.

The senior Staphan had also been caught by the cave-in, although only his legs to his knees were covered.

He called to his wife to send for help as he began shoveling himself free and then went to the assistance of his son whose shovel was buried under the dirt which had him in a helpless position.

Ten men from the Chelsea Fire Department responded to Mrs. Staphan's call for help. However, Fire Chief Ted Balmer, on reaching the scene, ordered his men to remain at a distance for fear their weight near the trench should dislodge more dirt. They stood by with the rescuer in readiness while the elder Staphan finished digging the son out.

Only ill effect felt by the rescued man was numbness of his legs. The two men were working five or six feet apart digging a trench for a drain and had reached a depth of seven or eight feet when the cave-in occurred, according to Fire Department records.

### Summer Arrives Officially June 21

Ann Arbor—Summer starts officially in Michigan at 11:21 a.m. Friday June 21, a day that promises to be a real scorcher for the whole Northern Hemisphere, according to a University of Michigan astronomer.

Prof. Hazel Losh explains that Michigan will receive the most heat from the sun in any 24-hour period of the year June 21, when the sun will reach its most direct position over the northern half of the earth. Fortunately, the sun then will be about three million miles further away from this planet than it was in January.

Despite the tremendous heat gauging the northern hemisphere will experience June 21, the chances are very good that day will not be the hottest of the year. Professor Losh continues, Michigan will continue to receive more heat from the sun than it loses every day until around August 1, so temperatures generally can be expected to keep climbing until then.

June 21 will also be the shortest night in the year for amateur astronomers, with only about nine hours between sundown and sunrise.

In order to obtain a duplicate permit, an affidavit must be signed concerning the original.

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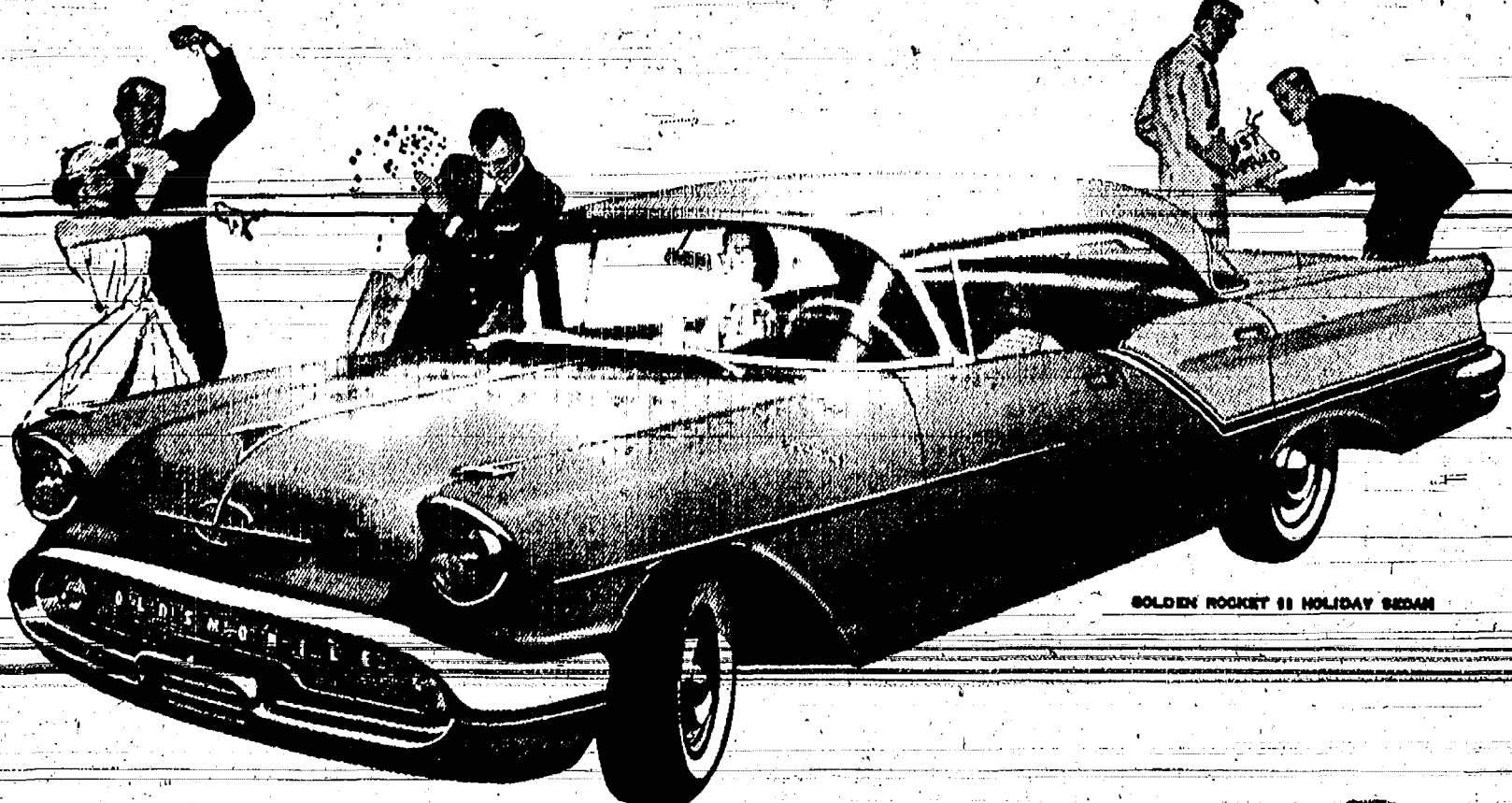

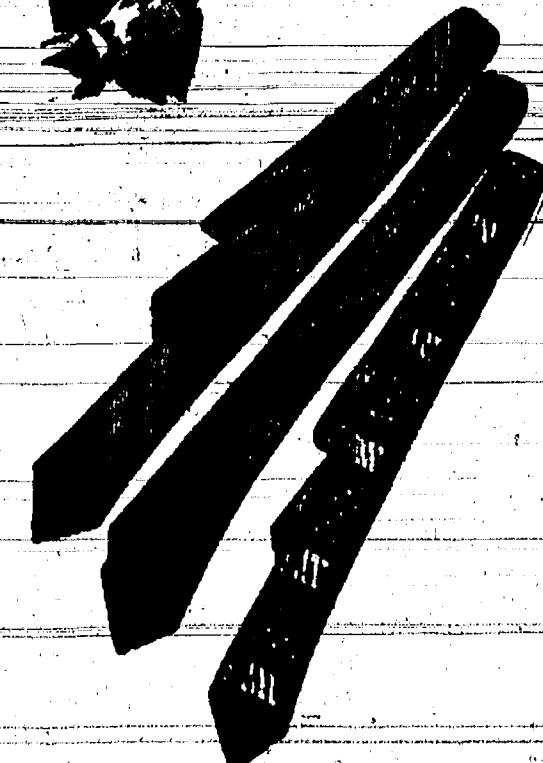

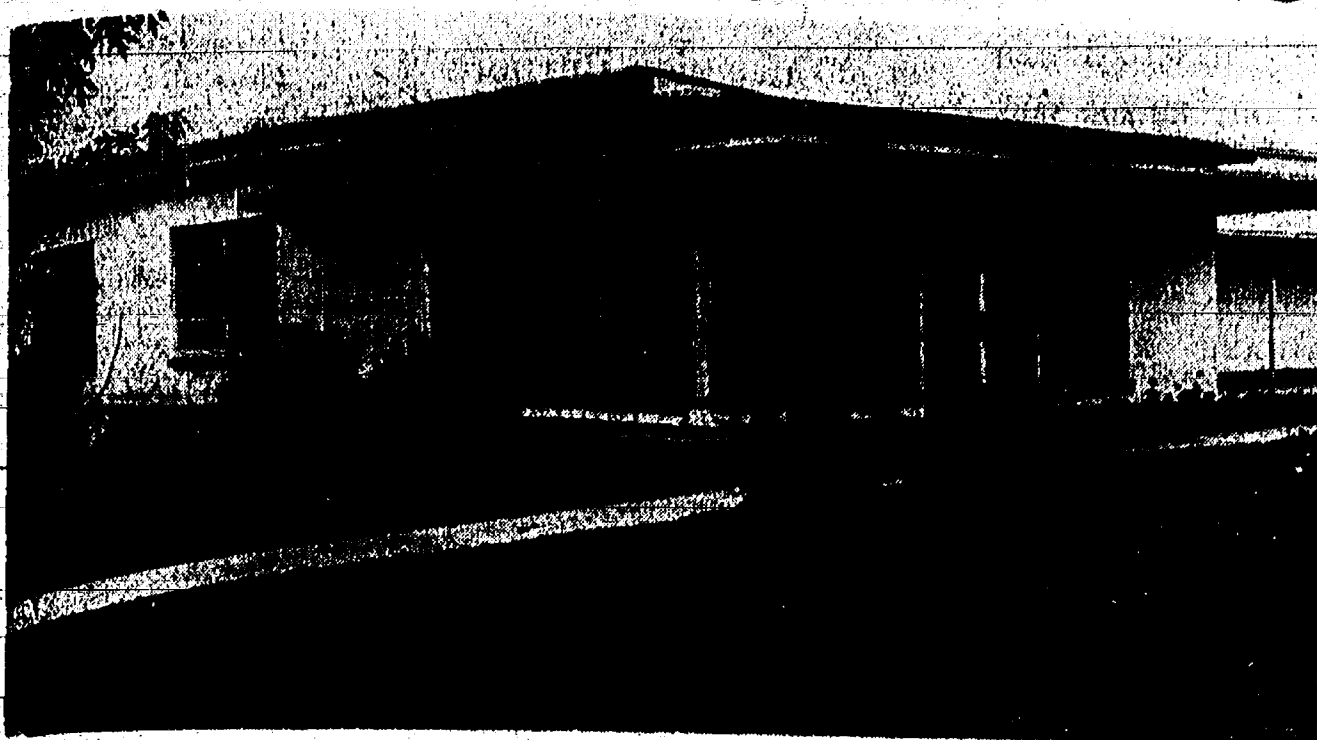

TUESDAY WAS A BIG DAY in the amazing history of Chelsea Products with the completion of a plant addition which gives them about one-third more floor space, and the entertaining of 150 customers and engineers from all parts of the nation. This view shows the beautiful modern entrance at the southeast corner of the new addition.

## Chelsea Power Take-Off Accepted as Standard Throughout Industry

Putting together a formula of some basic patents, brilliant engineering skill, good sound business management and hard work by its officers and employees, has been the key to the tremendous growth and success of Chelsea Products, a home-owned Chelsea industry.

Starting as a separate manufacturing corporation in 1946, the firm has mushroomed into an industry known throughout the nation.

"Chelsea Power Take-Off" is a name well and favorably known throughout the United States and Canada, as evidenced by the interest shown here Tuesday when 150 customers and engineers were guests of Chelsea Products, Inc., manufacturers of the power take-offs used by most manufacturers of standard equipment on their dump trucks. Nine of the major dump truck body manufacturers are included on the Chelsea plant's list of regular customers.

Robert W. Wagner, president of Chelsea Products, Inc., who developed and began marketing the power take-offs during the war years, 1940-1945, is recognized in the engineering profession as the foremost authority on this source of power to operate auxiliary devices. Such applications include operating power winches, fuel delivery pumps on petroleum tank trucks, tail gate lifts, garbage trucks, dump trucks, transit-mixed concrete delivery trucks and many others.

Chelsea Products, Inc., has just completed the fourth major addition to the plant, located on Buchanan street, where manufacturing of the take-offs, exclusive product of the company, has been carried on in steadily increasing

volume since the building was constructed in 1946.

At that time the total floor space in the white, modernistic-style factory and office building was 15,000 square feet. The latest addition of approximately 16,000 square feet, now brings the total space occupied to 31,000 square feet, almost three times the size which had appeared adequate when the firm was organized in 1946.

The new addition practically doubles the former office space and is so arranged that each of the department—sales, engineering, production, accounting, etc.—is a separate unit reached from a corridor extending the length of the building. Doors on the opposite side of the hall lead to the factory.

Additional boiler-room facilities for heating the enlarged area are at the north end of the newly-completed building. Added there, also, are new modern wash room facilities for the employees.

Somewhat unique in the manufacturing field is the fact that the firm maintains no actual sales force, as such. Wagner, himself, is a most effective salesman as he demonstrates the workings of the power take-offs, he has perfected. He is constantly called into the field to help solve special problems and adaptations of the product.

For approximately five years before the present firm was organized, the power take-offs were manufactured in a department of the Central Fibre Products plant on North Main street, with Wagner as manager of the division.

Of the 65 employees who worked in that division at Central Fibre and moved to the new building

when it was completed in July, 1946, 27 are still with the company and two, Mrs. Jennie Mackinder and Robert Freysinger, are retired under the company's pension system.

Included in the 27 still with the company are Wagner, the firm's president; E. W. Eaton who was treasurer of Central Fibre Products at the time and is now vice president and treasurer of Chelsea Products; Armin D. Schneider, present purchasing agent of the firm; Stephen Slane, plant superintendent; Ollie Carpenter, Owen Cavender, Earl Clark, William Collins, Clinton Collier, Grover Douglas, Robert Harper, Raymond Lisbeck, William Nagley, Sr., Kenneth Neal, Mrs. K. Snyder, Claude Spiegelberg, Henry Steele, Richard Steele, Clive Weir, Arthur Westfall, Charles Williams, Albert West, Carole Atkinson, William Peyer, Donald Houle, Andrew Policht and Lawrence Pleau.

The firm now employs a total of 150 people in the factory and offices. Maximum employment has reached a total of 175 people.

The firm was incorporated Dec. 1, 1945, all stockholders being local people who had faith in Wagner's product, designed for use on all makes of trucks and transmissions.

Present officers, in addition to Wagner and Eaton, are M. W. McClure, secretary, and Howard Holmes, chairman of the board of directors. Other members of the board are P. G. Schable, Russell McLaughlin and Ernest King of Jackson.

Exhibits of the various types of power take-offs manufactured here were on display in the office building of the plant for Tuesday's meeting. They range from a comparatively small, single-speed unit to a large complicated model with an adapter for special lifting jobs.

While Wagner's principal interest is the power take-off, he is adept at anything he undertakes, such as the modern, steel frame chairs and lounge seats in the new offices which he designed and had made here at the plant. He had noticed similar chairs at an airport where he was waiting for a plane, did some quick measuring, and when he returned to Chelsea he had the frames made by workers in the plant.

An upholstering firm finished the chairs with the addition of attractive rose color seat and back cushions.

In the shop, especially set up for the gathering of engineers Tuesday, were several models attached to actual truck transmissions to demonstrate how the power take-off fits into the transmission mechanism by removing a plate at one side of the engine block. The opening is standard on all truck engine blocks in anticipation of future power take-off installation. Power take-offs are a necessity and are standard equipment on all dump truck bodies. Castings and forgings for the housings of the power take-offs are purchased by the company but all the machining of gears, assembly and finish is done here, the take-offs being complete and ready for installation on dump truck bodies or other equipment when they leave the plant.

The Chelsea Power Take-Off is also being sold through export agencies to various foreign countries.

Tuesday's visitors here spent the forenoon at the plant and then

## George P. Staffan Was Youngest Village President at Tender Age of 22

When Donald Alber was elected president of the village in April the statement was made that at 80 years of age, he was "probably the youngest man ever to hold the office here."

Since that time, however, it has been pointed out by old-timers that in 1884, at the age of 22 years, the late George P. Staffan was elected president and served in that capacity for a number of terms.

It was during his presidency that Main street from Van Buren street to the New York Central tracks and Park street, East Middle and West Middle streets from Main street to the alleys on each of the streets were paved.

The matter of paving was brought to a vote, according to stories of the incidents leading to the eventual improvement. The proposal failed to carry, however, and matters were at a standstill until the youthful president sought a legal opinion and was told a vote on the question was not required.

Staffan then had the streets surveyed by Leigh Palmer, who had just graduated as a civil engineer, hired the late John Freymuth and a crew of workers and supervised the paving project himself.

Several years ago, researchers took up samples of the pavement here in an effort to learn the reason why it has held up so well through the years. It was remembered that Staffan had explained that all the gravel for the pavement was washed before it was used and some of the investigating engineers expressed the belief that the washing of the gravel was the secret of the exceptional quality of the finished pavement.

The Main street pavement was completed early in the 1900's and after the project was completed Staffan never sought or held public office again.

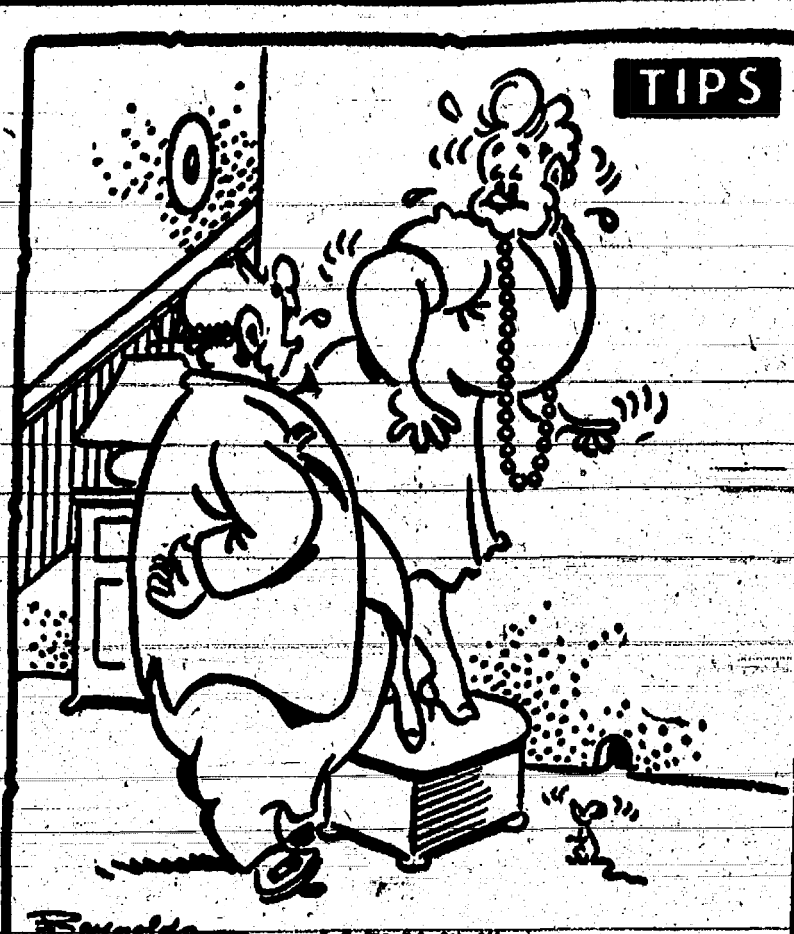

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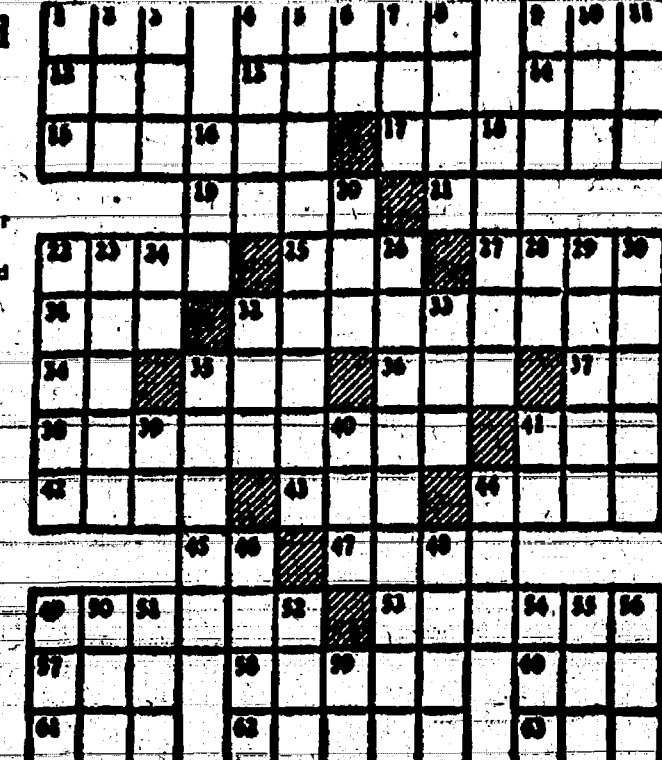

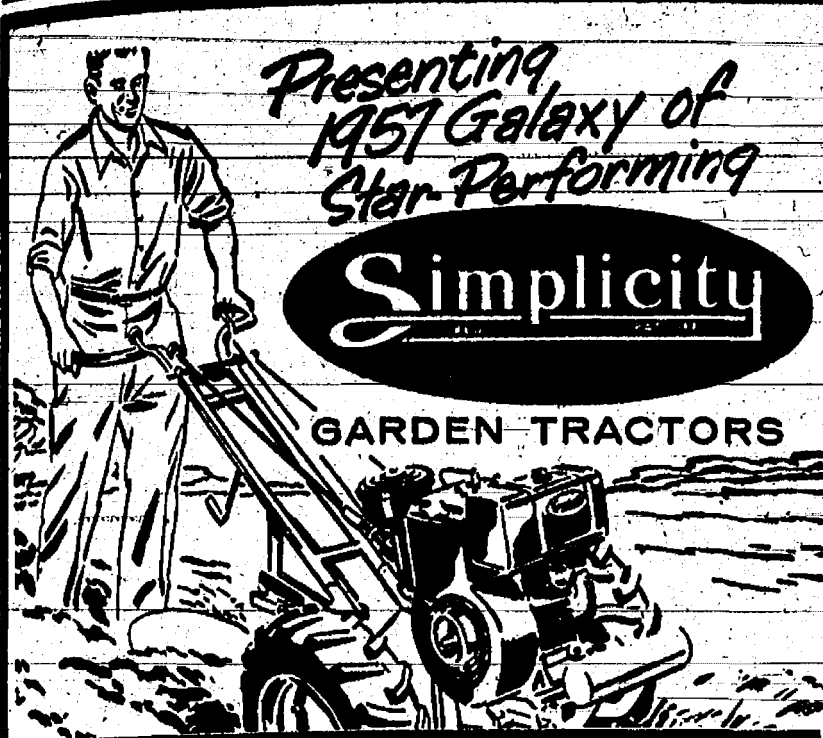

**Smelt Fishing Has Appearance of All-Night Picnic**

Lansing—Smelt dipping, a festive and sometimes hectic activity, provides recreation for thousands of Michigan fishermen—and women.

Unlike the classic "fisherman's wife" who patiently waits at home while her husband tests his angling skill, the smelt fisherman's wife joins in the fun when smelt make their annual appearance in dozens of Michigan streams.

This unusual twist is fitting, of course, because smelt dipping itself is unique. When the silvery little smelt make their annual spawning runs up Michigan streams, the river banks are alive with activity. Wash tubs, barrels, buckets, boxes and other containers are loaded with smelt when the dip-netters go into action, usually at night.

Smelt dipping often takes on the appearance of an all-night picnic, with sandwiches, coffee and fun for all.

Spawning runs for the tasty little smelt usually get under way about mid-April and continue until early May. The latest runs normally occur in the Upper Peninsula, with the greatest concentrations in streams flowing into Green Bay and the Bays de Noc.

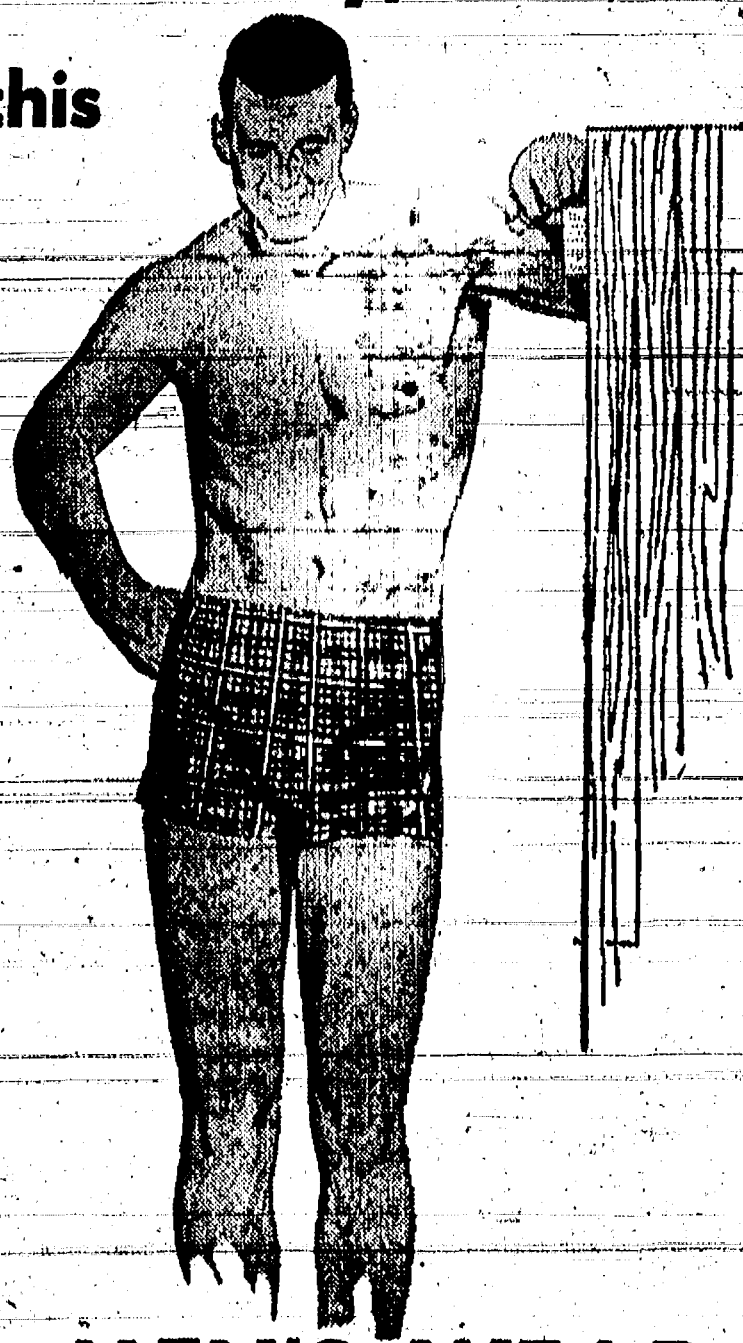

## Wheat Quota Polling Places Announced

The following voting places for the June 20 wheat marketing quota referendum were announced today by Max Kalmbach, chairman, Washtenaw County ASC Committee:

Sylvan, Lima, and Lyndon townships, Sylvan Town Hall, Dexter, Webster, and Scio townships, Dexter Fire Hall, Northfield and Salem townships, Emery store.

Saline and Bridgewater townships, Saline Town Hall, Manchester, Sharon, and Freedom townships, Sharon Town Hall.

The Soil Bank program has caused a slight change in the eligibility rule for voting. Chairman Kalmbach said today, "In past wheat referendums, the general rule for eligibility was that all growers in the commercial wheat area were eligible to vote in the wheat quota referendum who would have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest on a farm."

The rule as it now stands is that all persons are eligible to vote in the June 20 quota referendum who will share in the 1956 wheat crop from a farm in the commercial wheat area on which the wheat acreage to be harvested, plus any wheat acreage to be put in the wheat Acreage Reserve, will be more than 15 acres."

Two-thirds or more of the eligible voters must approve quotas in order to put them into effect on the 1958 wheat crop. If quotas are approved, farmers who exceed the farm allotment will be subject to a penalty of 45 per cent of the parity price on their excess wheat, and the support price for the 1958 wheat crop will be available to farmers who comply with the wheat allotment at a national average of \$1.75 per bushel, which represents 75 per cent of parity.

If more than one-third of the wheat growers voting disapprove quotas, the quotas will not be in effect. However, allotments will remain in effect, and farmers who comply with their wheat allotments will be eligible for support at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

## Contracts Let For 4-H Show Buildings

Contracts were let this week for three livestock exhibition buildings on the Washtenaw Farm Council's recently-acquired Farm activities site of 20 acres on Saline-Anne Lake road. The buildings are to be completed in time for the August 4-H Show. Cost of the buildings is given as "not to exceed \$140 per square foot."

Two of the buildings will be 60x150 feet in size and the third will be 50x150 feet. They will be of pole type construction with poured cement foundations. Footings are to be two feet below ground level and the cement is to extend one foot above the ground. Heavy gauge aluminum will be the material used for the construction of the three buildings.

The contract for the work has been awarded through the Farm Bureau.

Tentative approval has also been given by the Farm Council for a proposed Farm Bureau 4-Club building. Present plans call for building with Farm Bureau offices across the front. A corridor behind the offices would connect with rest rooms and a kitchen, and beyond these with a long exhibition hall primarily for 4-H club handicraft, electrical and clothing exhibits. Rest rooms and kitchen would be jointly available for Farm Bureau and 4-H building use.

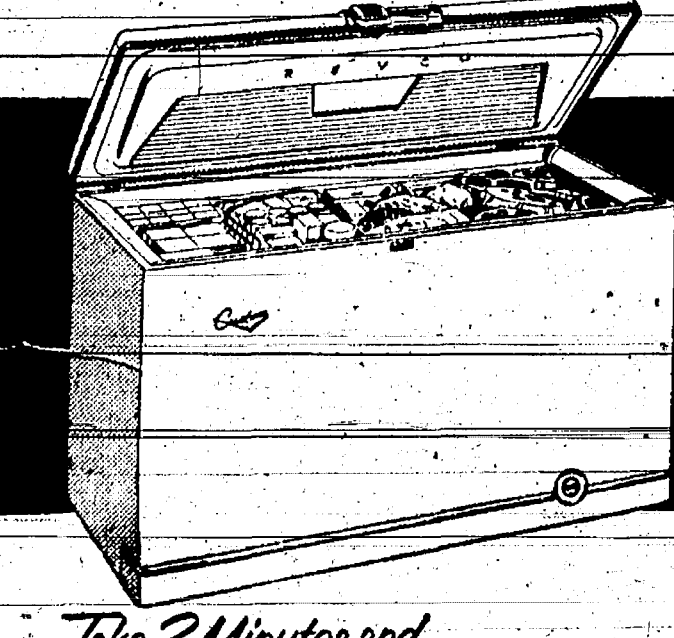
