All Young Men, 18, Must Register With Draft Board

Many young men are forgetting to register on their 18th birthday as required by the current draft law, according to Colonel Arthur A. Holmes, state director of Selective Service.

Registration under Selective Service is the first and one of the most important actions to be performed under the provisions of the draft act. Every male citizen and most male aliens are required to register on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

Registration can be accom-plished at any local board in the area where the registrant may be always have jurisdiction over his classification.

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
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
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At Least One Admiral Calls It War

One of the most significant statements made in Washington in recent weeks was that of Admiral Hyman G. Rickover, the man who built the first atomic submarine, the Nautilus.

Testifying before the Senate Armed Services Committee recently. Rickover revealed some of the things he has learned in heading a development and pioneer research group. Commenting on the situation confronting the United States and the difficulties of avoiding typical stubborn government-bureaucracy in research and development, projects—now so vital to U. S. security—Rickover said this:

"I think we are kidding ourselves. I think most of our people cannot understand that we are actually at war. They don't understand it. They need to hear shells.

"They are not psychologically prepared for the concept that you can have a war where you don't have actual, literal fighting, and this is the trouble.

"Most people say they see it, but they do not really act that way. I think everybody today in the military should be acting, should be doing things as if we really were at war. We must learn ways of doing things faster. I think it is almost too late. That is what I worry about."

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





Michigan Farmer | Emmons Home Is National Corn **Growing Champ**

It was announced today that the National Corn Growing Champion was Henry Penning of Decatur, in Van Buren county: This is the first time a Michigan farmer has ever won this honor.

His yield was 203:47 bushels of shelled corn per acre. His land with DeKalb Hybrid Variety 402 on May 20, 1957. He used 600 pounds of 5-20-20 starter fertilizer and side-dressed with 100 lbs. of amonia-sulfate.

The Waterloo township farm owned and operated by Dan Emmons and his sister, Ida Emmons, has been designated a "centennial farm" by the Michigan Historical Commission.

The commission designates that centennial farms are those which have been owned by the same family for a period of 100 years or more.

The Emmons family has owned the farm at 8667 Waterloo-Munith road since 1852. Originally, it had been purchased by Daniel T. Em-


