Fluoride Treatments Scheduled

John Thomson, in charge of arrangements for the annual fluoride dental decay preventive clinic here, announced this week that the clinic is scheduled for July 3 through July 15. Children who are already signed up for the treatment will be mailed appointment cards, Thomson said. A few openings are still available and anyone interested in registering their children may obtain information by calling Mrs. Arthur Lindauer or John Thomson. Thomson is acting as a representative of the Chelsea PTA in making the arrangements for the clinic. He pointed out that the state Health Department claims that the fluoride treatment results in 40 per cent reduction in tooth decay. Thomson explained that in this program each child's teeth will be cleaned, if needed, and four applications of sodium fluoride will be applied. The clinic will be held at Chelsea High school.



WATER WORKS FILTER TANKS—When the Village Council has its open house next Thursday, June 19, people of the community will have the opportunity to see the filtering equipment shown in the above photograph. Located in the North Street pump house of the Chelsea Electric & Water Department, the huge filter tanks remove excessive iron from the village water supply. Filled with five different grades of gravel through which the water passes after being pumped into the first tank at the left, the water goes through the entire aeration system before reaching the collection tank on the other side of the building and then is pumped to the storage tower. To keep the filtering operation at maximum efficiency, the pumps must be reversed every three days to wash out the accumulated iron. Because of tests being made on the new city wells this week-end or early next week, the water will bypass the filters for two or three days. Homer Nixon, Chelsea Electric & Water Department superintendent, said yesterday. This will permit the natural iron to remain in the water supply but will cause no great inconvenience and will in no way affect its fitness for regular use, Nixon said. The Village Council open house will include conducted tours of all village facilities and projects from 5 p.m. until 9 p.m., with a band concert at 9 p.m. being the concluding feature.

Testing of New Village Water Well To Get Underway

New wells being sunk for the village water supply system have reached the stage where testing of the effect of continuous pumping is to be undertaken in order to learn the effect if any, that such pumping will have on both the old wells and the new ones, according to Electric and Water Department Superintendent Homer Nixon. In order to make these tests the pumps must be operated on a steady, 24-hour-a-day schedule as opposed to the present automatic pumping which turns on and off as the water supply is used. Because of this necessity to operate the pumps continuously during the testing period, the water supply will be diverted to bypass the filtering equipment in the pump house on North street. This will cause the natural iron deposits to remain in the water for the two or three days the testing is in progress.

Red Cross Chapter Feeds 284 Persons As 'Disaster Victims' at Annual Meet

At the annual meeting of the Western County Chapter of the American Red Cross 284 persons were fed as "disaster victims" in 45 minutes at the Presbyterian church in Ann Arbor. Centeen workers fed the guests the same food which would be given to victims of a natural disaster. The group was welcomed by Mayor Samuel J. Eldersveld of Ann Arbor. In the portion of the program devoted to disaster work, W. de St. Aubin, executive director of the chapter, pointed out that assistance to victims of major disasters was a mandatory Red Cross obligation and that the Red Cross was primarily concerned with people. Its task is to provide clothing, shelter and food under emergency conditions and to help rehabilitate families to restore normal living. Jack Hogan, chairman of the committee on disaster preparedness, outlined the task facing the Red Cross today to be ready for any emergencies. He also introduced Civil Defense officials. 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

LOCATED ON US-12 just west of M-92, Mystery Farm No. 7, published in last week's Standard is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mark McKernan. The house was moved in 1938 when US-12 was re-located and it now seems probable it will be moved again when the presently planned expressway is constructed.

Last Week's 'Mystery Farm Identified as Home of Mr. and Mrs. Mark McKernan

Mystery Farm No. 7, seen in the above photograph, is the Mark McKernan home, 20719 US-12, just west of M-92. Mrs. McKernan, the former Virginia Liebeck, was born on the farm and has lived there all her life.

The McKernans, who were married in 1948, have three-year old twins, Tommy and Anne, who are fourth generation members of the family to reside on the farm.

Mrs. McKernan's grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Miller, bought the farm in 1878.

The farm originally was owned by a Samuel Cooper who obtained a deed from the United States government. Cooper sold the farm in 1883 to Daniel Penn who owned it for 45 years before it was purchased by Mrs. McKernan's grandparents, the Jacob Millers. Jacob Miller was a carpenter and built many of the barns in the area.

He and his wife, the former Sarah Jane Stapish, were married in the Catholic church at Dexter at a double wedding service; the other couple being Philip Keusch and Adelia Stefan, grandparents of John Keusch, a Chelsea attorney.

The Miller family included two sons and six daughters, five of the latter taking up the teaching profession. All except the two oldest children were born on the farm. Two daughters of the Miller family survive—Mrs. William Brenner of Homer, and Miss Helen Miller, in supervisory teaching in the schools of Detroit.

Mrs. McKernan's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Liebeck, took over the farm after the elder Miller retired from farming and he and the family moved to the home he purchased at the southwest corner of Taylor and Picqua streets. Mrs. Liebeck was the former Alice Miller.

The Liebeck family, in addition to Mrs. McKernan, included another daughter, Ruth, who lives with the McKernans, and a son Raymond Liebeck, who built a home just west of the farm home following his marriage.

McKernan is rural mail carrier on Chelsea Route 2 and does general farming on the 69 acres of land, raising hay and grain. He customarily has a number of feeder cattle and also has a flock of 28 sheep.

The McKernan family belongs to St. Mary's Catholic church. Mr. McKernan is a member of the Holy Name Society of the church, the Chelsea Knights of Columbus, the Manchester Disabled Veterans, the Farmers' Guild, American Legion and the Washtenaw County Rural Letter Carriers Association.

Mrs. McKernan is a member of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the association.

The McKernan house and farm buildings were moved to the present location in 1935 when the new US-12 construction program called for a right-of-way directly through the spot where the buildings were formerly located on Chelsea-Manchester road. With construction of the new super highway scheduled on the state program for next year, the house will have to be moved again, the McKernans have been told.

First call on identification of the farm was received from Miladore Liebeck, a cousin of Mrs. McKernan. A moment later Mrs. McKernan herself, called The Standard office.

Information Given On State's Boat Registration Law

(Due to the large number of inquiries received concerning Michigan's new Boat Registration Law, The Chelsea Standard, with the cooperation of the Michigan Sporting Goods and Marine Dealers' Association of the Michigan Retailers Association, is posing some of the most frequently asked questions, and the answers.)

Q. When did the new law become effective?

A. The new law was passed by the 1957 Michigan Legislature and went into effect March 1, 1958. All boats covered under the law must now be registered prior to use on Michigan waters.

Q. Does the new law apply to the Great Lakes?

A. No. Boats operating only on the Great Lakes or connecting waters (St. Clair, St. Mary's, and Detroit Rivers), and waters of bays, harbors and parts thereon are not covered and do not have to be registered under the amended Michigan Law. Any boat registered with U. S. Coast Guard does not require State of Michigan registration.

Q. What types of boats have to be registered?

A. All craft over 16 feet in length if not propelled solely by muscular power. (All sailboats over 16 feet must be registered), and all motor propelled craft, inboard or outboard, regardless of length.

Q. Where are application for registration forms available, and where should they be sent?

A. Application for registration forms are available from Branch Offices—Secretary of State, Local Sheriff's Departments, and most sporting goods and marine dealers. The application should be sent, along with the \$2.00 registration fee, to the Secretary of State, Lansing 18. The registration of a boat is the direct and personal responsibility of the boat's owner.

Q. What are the registration fees?

A. 1. For each watercraft registrars—\$2.00; 2. For the sale or transfer of craft—\$2.00; 3. For a change of address—\$.50; 4. For a duplicate certificate—\$.50; 5. For manufacturers and dealers—\$5.00.

Q. Does the boat registration application have to be notarized?

A. No. The Michigan Secretary of State's office is accepting applications with or without notarization.

Q. Are non-residents of Michigan required to register their boats for use on Michigan waters?

A. Yes. The new boat law applies to all out-of-state people and Michigan residents alike. For non-residents who have not previously registered their boats with the Michigan Secretary of State's office, prior to their use on Michigan waters, and so that they will be able to use their boats immediately after arriving in Michigan, they will be required to obtain a certificate of registration and assigned a registration number directly upon proper application and payment of the \$2.00 fee to any Sheriff's office, a branch office of the Michigan Secretary of State, or other designated agent.

Q. How do boat dealers and manufacturers register craft for demonstration or testing purposes?

A. They will obtain from the Secretary of State's office in Lansing, or special registration which they will keep for temporary placement on any boat to be demonstrated or tested. The registration number will contain 4 digits and will be preceded by a D or M (dealer or manufacturer). Each registration will cost \$5.00; and a dealer or manufacturer may obtain as many of these registrations as he may need to properly carry on his normal business.

Q. What must a boat owner do if his boat is destroyed, abandoned, sold, or transferred?

A. Within 10 days of the occurrence, the reverse side of his certificate must be filled out and mailed, with the required fees, to the Secretary of State, Lansing 18.

Forty-eight years ago Mrs. John Bruce Dodd was the driving force in starting Americans to celebrate Father's Day. Since 1910 the third Sunday in June has been observed as Father's Day, although it is not usually declared a legal holiday. This year Father's Day comes on the 15th of June. Each year on Father's Day, emphasis is placed on a closer father-child relation as a means of building a better world. In the average family in Chelsea or any other community in America, the father is away from the home during the major portion of the day. Children do not have an opportunity to become as well acquainted with their father as they do with their mother.

All of us realize how important it is to the proper development of a child to have the sympathetic guidance of "Dad." Too often fathers, weighted down with the responsibilities of making a living, fail to devote enough of those precious moments to the youngsters.

The important role a father plays in molding the character of his children has been recognized through the ages. Aristotle wrote, "From good parents comes a good son."

Unemployment Brought into Focus

Every once in a while the politically-oriented recession waiting gets so loud the economic picture is thrown slightly out of focus. Let's look at one aspect of it, unemployment. As of mid-April there were 5,120,000 people unemployed. This figure is a possible total work force of 8,027,000. This figure out to slightly more than seven per cent.

Now to the man who's unemployed it doesn't matter what the figures are—a tough time. But an impassioned analysis of those figures can be made only when they are considered in the light of the nation's employment record. From 1890 to 1929 the average number of unemployed was 10 per cent, although it exceeded 15 per cent during the worst years. Unemployment reached its peak in this country in March, 1933, when it stood at 30 per cent. And throughout the thirties (even though the New Dealers were spending promiscuously) those out of work averaged 20 per cent of the labor force.

Unemployment dipped as low as three and four per cent only during the biggest boom years of the late forties and early fifties, when America's industrial machinery was expanding prodigiously.

Therefore, when we attempt to appraise the present state of the economy in terms of unemployment we should remember that seven per cent out of work, while personally distressing, is mathematically excessive only when compared with the best years any economy ever had—Wall Street Journal.

Conlin has carved a niche for himself in Michigan's financial picture with other ideas and other plans. Michigan's schools—remember him for his "Conlin Plan" in 1954. Until then, state school aid was based on collections two years before. His plan put school aid on a wait-of-the-king's-palace-and-stand-up-on-the-king's-bomb" type of basis. It wiped out the "time bomb" collection of interest on state bonds. Conlin's latest idea helped wipe out the threat of poverty this year. It will give a special revenue study a year in which to revise the state's tax structure and have government reform.

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



SMALL BUSINESSMEN, bucking the complexities of doing business with Uncle Sam, have been known to scratch their heads and give up. A government contract could be a boon to a modest enterprise, but too many are stymied at the difficulty of finding simple answers to such queries as: Which branch of government needs my product? What specifications must be met? Exactly how does the government buy?

3,000 WOMEN are a powerhouse in any man's language, especially when they represent millions of other distaff-side dynamos throughout the United States. I had the pleasure recently of welcoming convention delegates of the General Federation of Women's Clubs to Detroit and, in my opinion, it was most fitting that this energetic body meet in a city personifying everything dynamic and progressive about America.

THE BUDGET BUREAU has swung around in favor of stepping up merchant shipping activity in the Great Lakes. Early in May I warned that the 1959 federal budget would freeze out Great Lakes shippers by denying them the same operating-differential subsidies enjoyed by salt water interests. What good is the St. Lawrence Seaway unless our ships can take full advantage of its potential for economic growth?



Interurbans Commemorated With Marker at Ypsilanti

Lansing—One day in the summer of 1890 a promoter for interurban railroads arrived in Ypsilanti, seeking to work up interest in a line between that city and Ann Arbor. At the time there were only a few interurbans in the entire country and none in Michigan. Within a few years a network of interurbans crisscrossed southern Michigan, linking up with similar systems in Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois.

This year, on May 9, as a feature of Ypsilanti's observance of Heritage Day during Michigan Week, one of the Michigan Historical Commission's official state markers devoted to Michigan's interurbans and including a large, full-color map of the main interurban lines, was dedicated in that city's Gilbert Park, on the route of Michigan's first interurban, the Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti. State and county historical groups, legislators, city officials, and school classes joined in a tribute to a colorful era of our history.

The "Ypsilanti" as it was almost always called, was organized in 1890 after its backers had consulted communities which had established interurbans and satisfied themselves that the chances of commercial success were good. Julius E. Beal, Ann Arbor newspaperman and later regent of the University of Michigan, was president and general manager of the company, and Henry P. Glover of Ypsilanti, was chosen vice-president.

Tracks were laid from downtown Ypsilanti to the city limits of Ann Arbor. In December, 1890, the line began operating using a Porter steam engine until 1898 when electric power was adopted. Beal later recalled the eventful official opening of service. "Members of the common council and newspapermen of the two cities were invited for a ride," Beal wrote. "They went on the electric car to the Ann Arbor city limits where transfers were made to the steam motor. Fortunately, it did not jump the track on that excursion trip and it only set fire to one barn. But that was soon put out and the party was safely landed in Ypsilanti. Not wishing to run any more risks they were all returned home on the Michigan Central night train, declaring the road a success because no one was killed or even maimed for life."

In a short time the Ypsilanti was carrying 600 passengers daily, exceeding even the rosiest dreams of its founders. One reason for the line's popularity was that it

inter-city passenger service within the reach of most persons in southern Michigan.

But the automobile, truck and bus spelled the doom of the interurban. In the fall of 1929 the interurban cars between Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor stopped running. The other interurbans were forced out of business around the same time. With visible evidences of the historical markers, such as the one being dedicated in Ypsilanti, of keeping alive the memory of an important period in American history.
