





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### Judge Lowers the Boom on Hoffa

As the jaunty Jimmy Hoffa announced a nation-wide campaign to augment his 1.6 million member Teamsters Union by an estimated 10 million policemen, fremen, transport workers and other city, county and state employees; Federal Judge F. Dickinson Letts lowered the boom in Washington.

Judge Letts admonished President Hoffa to give heed to the clean-up orders of the three-man board of monitors appointed by the court and to cancel the convention he had called for next March for the purpose of getting himself re-elected so he could divest himself of the irksome monitors.

Last January, in a compromise settlement of a suit brought by unhappy union members who charged the Hoffa election had been rigged, Judge Letts appointed the monitors and said Jimmy could be "provisional" president but must operate under their clean-up orders.

.The subsequent complaint of the monitors that Jimmy. wouldn't play was upheld by the Judge who pointed out that they "are empowered to exert every known method of achieving the basic purpose as set forth in the consent order. to wit, that a new convention would be free of corruption and in recognition of the rights of the membership." Since there has been no clean-up, there will be convention until the monitors recommend it and Judge Letts approves it.
