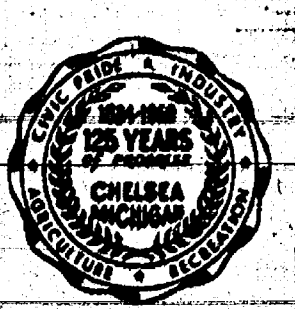

## G. Turnbull Dies Friday In Detroit

George W. Turnbull of Cavendish, Lake and Grosse Pointe, died suddenly Friday morning at the Secours hospital, Grosse Pointe, following a heart attack. He was 64 years old. The family home in Grosse Pointe was at 792 Hurcourt road.

Mr. Turnbull was co-founder of the Michigan Book Binding Co. of Detroit in 1924 and at the time of his death was vice-president of the firm.

A graduate of Chelsea High school and the University of Michigan, he was a veteran of overseas service in World War I. He was a member of Herbert J. McKune Post No. 31, American Legion; a life member of Olive Lodge No. 135, P.M.A.; a member of the First Congregational church; the Chelsea Rod and Gun club; Lost Lake Woods club; Exchange club of Detroit; Detroit Yacht club; and a member of the Graphic Arts Association, Detroit.

Born in Chelsea, Feb. 15, 1895, he was a son of Bert and Florence G. Turnbull. He was married Dec. 15, 1921 to Esther A. Chandler who survives.

Also surviving are his mother, Mrs. Turnbull, of Birmingham; a daughter, Mrs. Thomas Pond of Dallas, Tex.; three grandchildren, Mary, Sarah and Carol Pond of Dallas; and four sisters, Mrs. Phoebe Nemethy and Mrs. Norma Walter of Flint, Mrs. Gordon Marshall (Pence) of Downy, Calif., and Mrs. Larry Mutart (Jean) of Cumtush.

The body was at the Verheyden Funeral Home in Detroit until Saturday night and at the Staffan Funeral Home here from Sunday morning until the funeral service which took place there at 2 p.m. Monday.

In the absence of the Rev. Philip Huston of the Congregational church, the Rev. S. D. Kinde of the Methodist church officiated at the funeral service. Burial took place in Oak Grove cemetery where Herbert J. McKune Post No. 31 was in charge of military rites.

## Hoover Operations Subdivided into Separate Divisions

Announcement has been made that the Hoover Ball and Bearing Division at Ann Arbor, was subdivided into a separate Ball Division and new Hoover Bearing Division, the change becoming effective Saturday, Aug. 1.

It was explained that the main reason for forming the Ball Division is "to specifically define as a separate unit the sales, financial and manufacturing programs of the ball operation." ## Recreation Program Closes Successful 6-Week Schedule

Total attendance for the sixth and final week of the 1959 summer recreation program was listed by Director Alan Conklin at 1,228. A total of 409 participated in the swimming program; 407 at morning playgrounds; 200, morning athletic fields; 50, girls' evening programs; 62, boys' baseball; and 100, at Friday night dances.

The six-week program of summer recreation began June 22 and ended July 31.

Total attendance for the six-week period was 7,301, or an overall weekly average of 1,217. The average was brought down by the fact that attendance during Chelsea's 125th Anniversary Week, July 11-18, was approximately one-third of the normal number. There was no girls' evening program that week and no Friday night dance at the school. In fact, no dances were held July 8, 10 and 17, because of anniversary activities.

Listed attendance in six categories for the six-week recreation program are as follows: swimming, 2,192; morning playgrounds; 2,555; morning athletic field, 1,173; girls' evening program, 375; boys' baseball, 781; Friday night dances, 225.

## Village Votes Monday On Bonds To Improve Sewage Treating Plant

### County Juvenile Home Supervisor Resigns Position

Announcement was made this week that Jacob E. Terptrat, supervisor of the Washtenaw county juvenile home on Platt Rd. since June 1957, has resigned his position effective Aug. 15.

Terptrat, a psychiatric social worker, will become superintendent of the American Legion billet for children at Otter Lake, near Flint.

In his new position, Terptrat will be in charge of a staff of 32 to 34 social workers, house parents and other workers who operate the billet around the year.

With between 40 and 50 acres of land at Otter Lake, the American Legion has operated the billet for 30 years. Food and salaries are paid by the State of Michigan and maintenance of the building and grounds, clothing and medical care are paid for by the American Legion, its auxiliary and the 40 and 8.

Juvenile Director Willard J. Maxey, Jr., is taking applications for the position vacated by Terptrat. The position requires a master's degree in social work.

### State Health Department Orders Council To Act

Next Monday, Aug. 10, registered voters who live in Chelsea and own property in the village (and their wife or husband) will be asked to approve a general obligation bond issue of \$235,000 for necessary expansion of Chelsea's sewage treatment plant.

Because of the residential and industrial growth of the village the plant which was suited to conditions 20 years ago is no longer adequate for present-day needs. The present plant was constructed in 1937.

The State Health Department has for the past four years recommended additions to the plant and on June 16 notified the Village Council that permits for additional sewers in the village will not be granted until definite steps have been taken to remedy the situation.

Result of this ultimatum by the state was an agreement between the Village and the Health Department that additions to the sewage treatment plant will be under construction by May 1, 1960.

If the Village fails to comply, the Health Department will exercise its prerogative of asking for a court order requiring the Village to comply, even to the point of selling general obligation bonds without voter approval.

Such action would cause needless delay and added expense, village officials point out. They state that by voting "yes" at Monday's election, property owners can save valuable time and money in carrying forward the necessary expansion of the sewage treatment plant.

### Who May Vote in Special Village Election

Any registered voter living in the village of Chelsea and owning property, and their spouse are eligible to vote for the \$235,000 general obligation bond issue on Aug. 10 for the expansion of the sewage treatment plant.

Representatives of the consulting engineers, bond consultants and state and county health departments were present Monday evening for a special open meeting in the Council room at the Municipal building to answer questions regarding the bond issue.

It was explained that the additions to the present sewage plant are vitally necessary and that the work should be done at once to safeguard the health and well-being of people in the entire community.

In a statement explaining the need for added sewage treatment facilities, prepared for publication in The Standard it was explained that the Village, in 1956, engaged engineers to investigate the conditions at the sewage treatment plant and to report on the necessary changes and additions. This report was completed and accepted by the Village and the Health Department.

In 1957 the Health Department again requested the Village to carry out its program for expanding the sewage plant facilities. Detailed plans and specifications were ordered prepared by the Council and these documents have since been completed and approved.

On June 16, 1959 the Village was notified by the Michigan Department of Health that, due to the existing conditions at the sewage treatment plant, construction permits for additional sewers in the Village would not be granted until definite steps have been taken to provide the adequate treatment facilities required.

Cost per year to the individual taxpayer has been estimated at approximately \$3 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation if the bond issue is approved at this time.

The election Monday will be by paper ballot and will take place in Sylvan Town Hall. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m.

Other guests included Harold K. Strout of Toledo, O., Wally Bencie of Lansing and William Chandler.

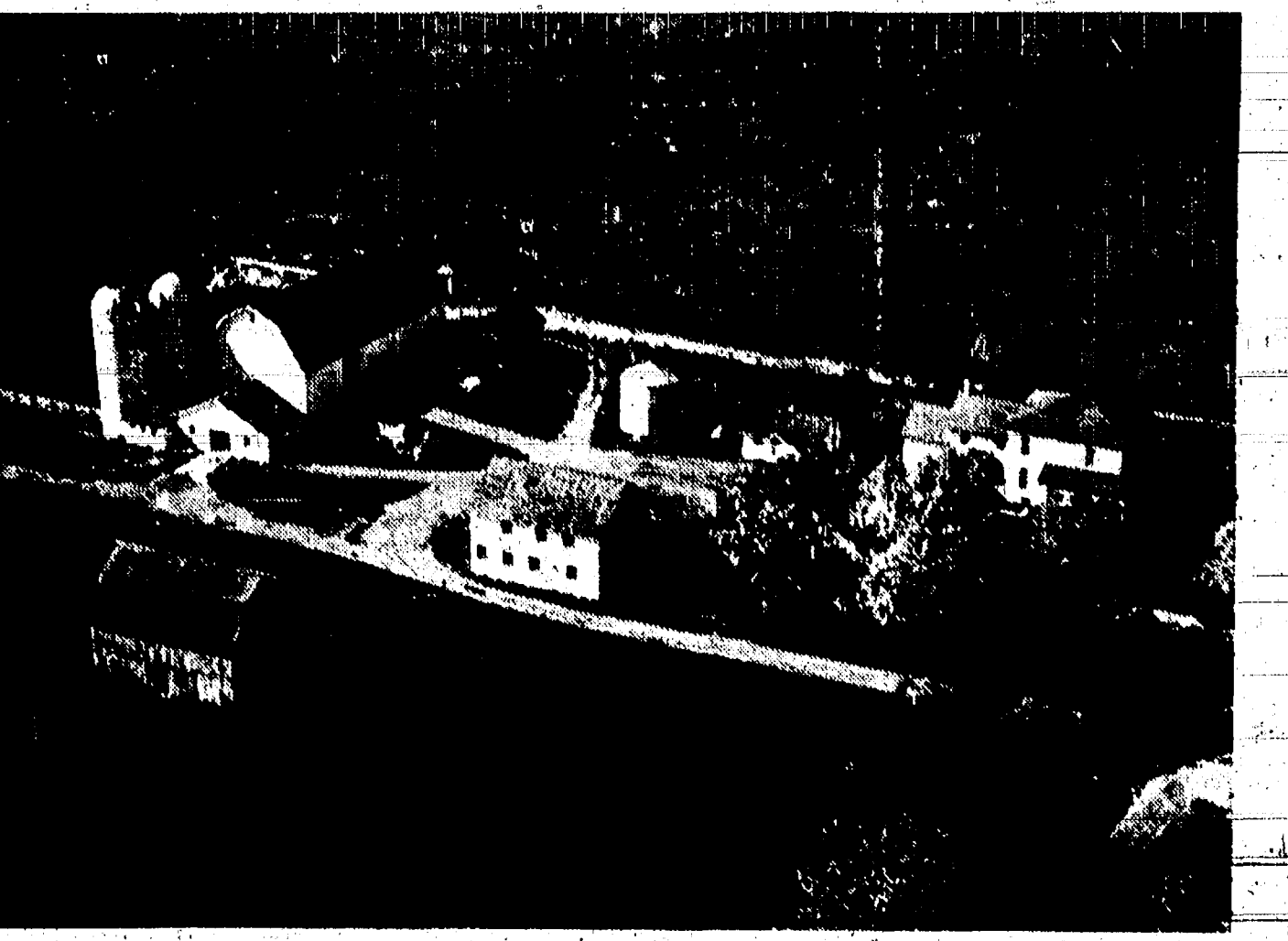
### Polio Vaccine Available for All Who Need It

The polio immunization level of Washtenaw county has been raised through the co-operation of the County Medical Society, the County Health Department and the Washtenaw Chapter of the National Foundation. Polio vaccine furnished by the National Foundation to Washtenaw county doctors for use in their offices, has provided for more than 200 injections to children whose parents were unable to pay.

Polio vaccination clinics are conducted by the Health Department and the Medical Society at St. Joseph Mercy hospital and at the Health Department building in Ypsilanti. Purpose of the clinics is to give vaccine to persons living in areas known to have a low level of immunization against polio and who have been unable to arrange for this service at their doctors' offices. Vaccine has been provided by the National Foundation and Foundation volunteers have assisted. No charge is made for vaccinations given in these clinics. Persons in "soft spot areas" have been notified about clinic services.

In the first seven clinic sessions, 1,333 polio immunizations were given. Of this, 298 were given in the Ann Arbor clinic and 1,035 in the Ypsilanti clinic.

Though these results are encouraging, there are still many children and adults in Washtenaw county who remain unprotected against polio. "By beginning immunization now, some protection can be established before the height of the polio season," commented Dr. Otto Engelke, county health officer.

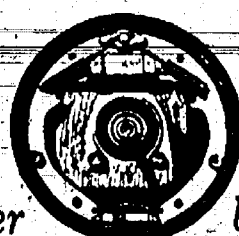

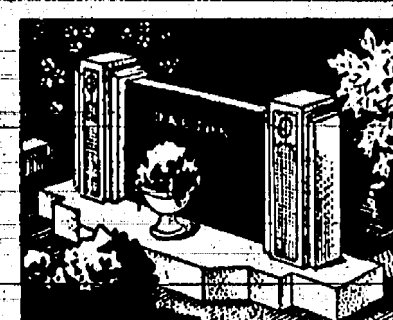

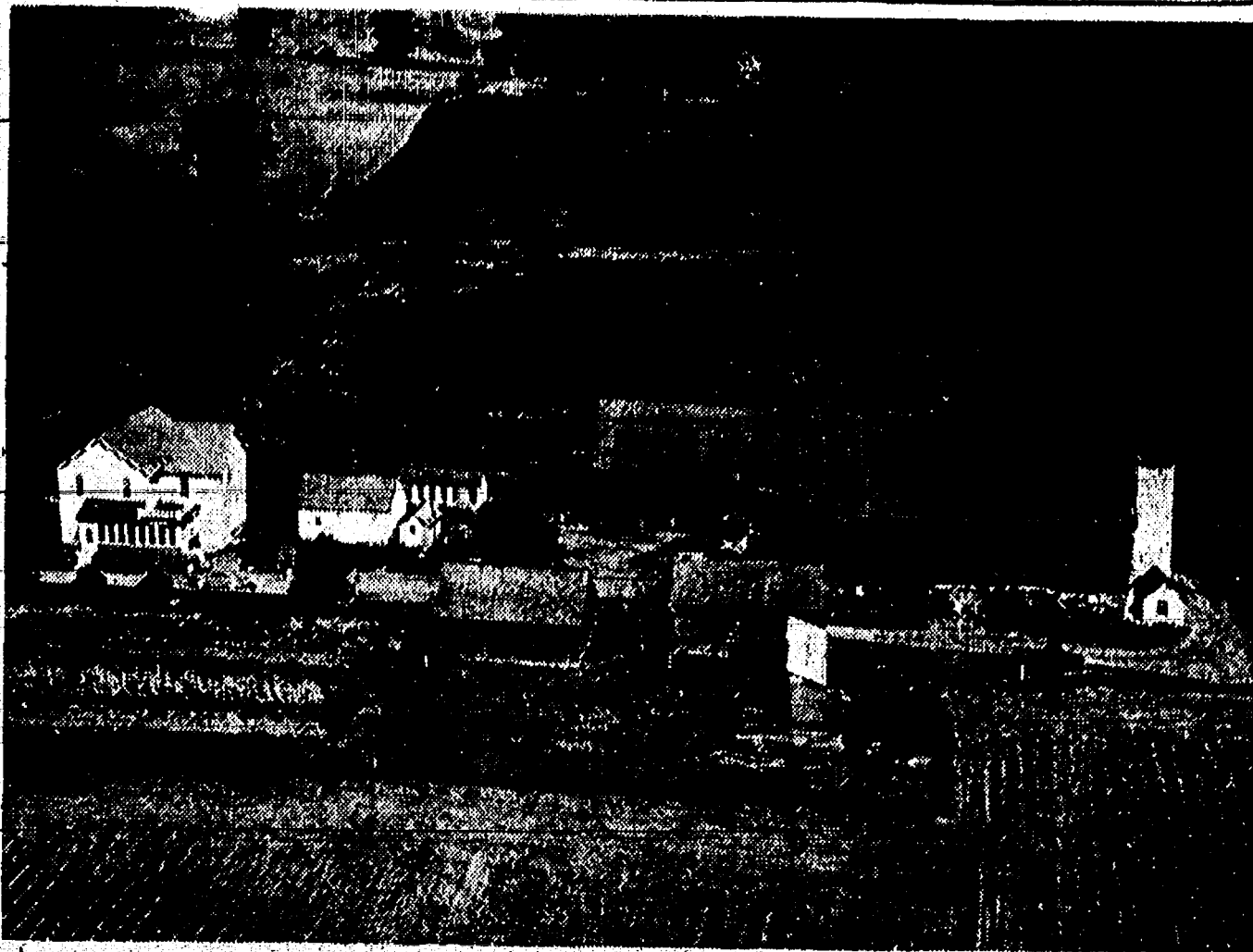

**MYSTERY FARM NO. 61**, originally published in the July 30 edition of The Standard, without identification, was recognized at once by many residents south of Chelsea as the Erwin Wenk farm. Wenk and his wife, the former Dorothy Pritchard, have owned the farm the past 16 years. It is located at 2495 Fletcher road.

## Mystery Farm No. 61 Is Identified as Fletcher Road Home of Erwin Wenk Family

Dick Gilmore of Manchester was the first person to call in the correct identification of Mystery Farm No. 61 as the Erwin Wenk place, 2495 South Fletcher road. The original photo of the farm was published in the July 30 issue of The Standard.

Soon after Gilmore called, Irene Wenk, daughter of the Erwin Wenks, also identified the photo. Others who correctly identified the farm are Jackie Hooyer, Thomas Lounsbury, Jerry Bristle, Carl Leoffler, Julius Blaess, Barbara Wenk and Mrs. Walter Beutler who formerly lived on the farm.

It was the home of Mrs. Beutler's parents, John Franklin and Lydia Feldkamp, and of her grandparents the John Henry Feldkamps, for many years.

John Henry Feldkamp bought the farm in January, 1880, and his son, John Franklin, became the owner in 1890. The latter's family included, in addition to Mrs. Beutler, another daughter, Mrs. Cora Wright, and a son, the late Ezra Feldkamp.

The present owners, Erwin and Dorothy Pritchard Wenk, bought the farm in March 1943, from the Feldkamp estate.

Wenk has lived in the area all his life and formerly helped his father, Martin Wenk, in the threshing business. The Wenk family operated three threshing outfits for a number of years.

The Wenks are active members of Zion Lutheran church at Rogers Corners and Mr. Wenk formerly served on the Church Council.

Their family includes three daughters and three sons—Martha, now Mrs. Carl Hause of Ypsilanti; Irene who is a junior and Donald, a sophomore at Chelsea High school; Charles, Paul and Jean, in the fifth, second and first grades, respectively. Irene and Donald are both in 4-H club work.

The 148-acre Wenk farm is utilized for general farming with some dairy cattle and chickens included.

The Wenks and the Feldkamps have been identified with the farm the longest. The farm is a combination of various parcels secured from the U. S. Government by different original owners before 1835 and 1836. The farm is located on the Lima-Freedom township on the Lima-Freedom township.

Date of the original transfer from the United States to the first owners is not given on the abstract.

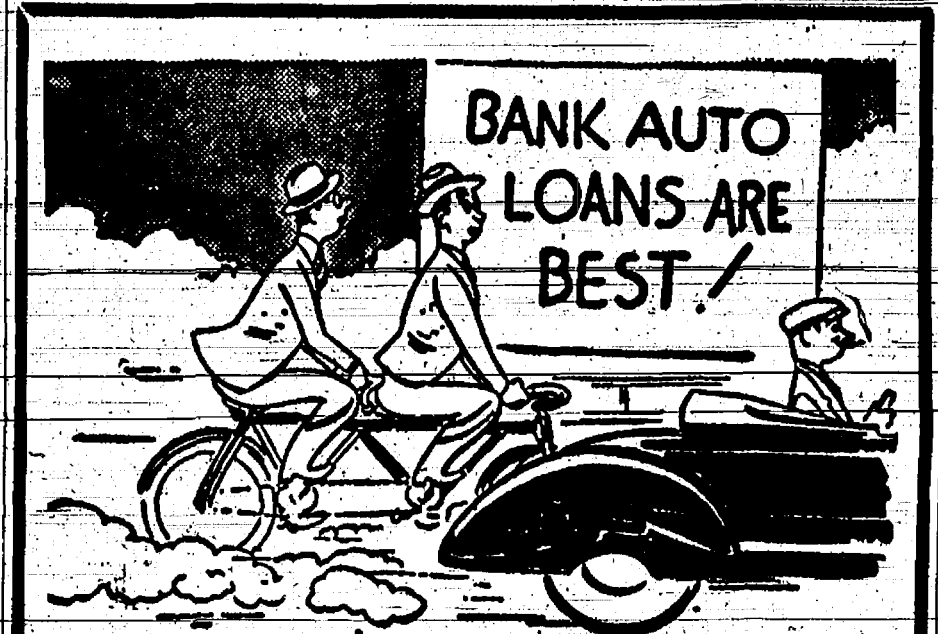
Former owners listed include Thomas Grandy, Almon M. Whipple, and Joseph Sternberg, each of whom was given title to parts of the farm by the U. S. Government.

Others listed as owners are Steward Knight who evidently purchased part of the present farm in 1836 and another part in 1848; Philip Stirling, who bought some of the land in 1842; Stephen

Nicholas, 1855; Russell Whipple, 1857; Philip Jacob Wellhoff, 1866; and Reuben Kempf, 1878. It was two years after this that the 63; year ownership by the Feldkamp family began.

## Proposal To Enlarge Sewage Plant Is Wise Investment in Our Future

Next Monday, Aug. 10, residents of the Village of Chelsea will be asked to vote on a general obligation bond issue for \$235,000 to improve and expand sewage treatment facilities.

This election hasn't been proposed now just to satisfy someone's whim or to further any political group. Rather, it is the result of continued pressure from the State Health Department which has been making periodic checks on the plant, as they do on all municipal plants, over the years.

As much as 10 years ago our sewage treatment plant was being overtaxed as far as capacity is concerned. When this situation occurs, the only immediate answer is to bypass some of the sewage and dump it raw or only partially treated into Letts creek. Such practice is of course unhealthy and not acceptable to anyone except on an emergency basis.

In 1956 the village was advised by the Health Department to make necessary changes and additions to correct the overloaded facilities. Engineers were retained to study the plant and make recommendations. This report was completed and duly accepted by the Health Department.

Again in 1957 state officials requested the village to carry out the proposed program to expand the sewage treatment plant. This time the Council was prepared to act. They ordered detailed plans and specifications drawn up which are now complete and approved by all necessary agencies.

Then came the final, decisive blow from the State Health Department on June 16 of this year. In effect they told us we had been sitting on our hands too long and that we were now to get busy on construction. Until existing conditions are corrected no additional sewer permits may be granted. You and I both know what this means to the growth and future of our community. All future growth is not only hampered but stopped cold until the improvements are made.

Under terms of an agreement the village has entered into with the State Health Department, construction must be underway by May 1, 1960 or they will start court action to force compliance. And make no mistake about the threat, they can do just that, and have done so in neighboring communities which failed to comply.

As far as the details of the proposed enlarged facilities are concerned, the Toledo engineering firm of Finkbeiner, Pettis & Strout have over the past several years worked out the requirements, including alterations to the control building, primary settling tank and aeration tanks, new aeration tank, two new final tanks, new sludge-digestion tank and sludge beds, two new raw sewage pumps, return sludge pump, chlorination equipment and all necessary attachments to put us back in business.

This expenditure, which will cost the taxpayer about \$3.00 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, per year, is something which will necessarily have to be made very soon whether we like it or not. By voting "yes" on the proposition at Monday's special election we will not only assure our community of a fighting chance to grow and expand, but we will be saving money over what it would cost when forced upon us by court action at a later date.

Take time to vote "yes" Monday on the proposal to enlarge our sewage treatment plant. It's a wise investment in our future.

## MICHIGAN MIRROR

The widely-quoted 573-page "redbook" on Michigan taxes is headed for the archives.

Someday a tax researcher may blow the dust off a bound volume of the staff papers of the 1958 Michigan Tax Study and use it as background for a new study of Michigan's tax structure.

Most of the recommendations based on the 1958 study were scuttled by the 1959 legislature. Also scuttled was the dream of Rep. Rollo G. Conlin (R-Tipton) for an overhaul of Michigan's patchwork revenue system.

Conlin was a proud man Dec. 2, 1958, when a Citizens' Advisory Committee appointed by his House Tax Committee came up with a comprehensive program for revising the tax structure.

The program was promptly dubbed the "Conlin Plan."

It was built around a graduated personal income tax. The graduated income tax, endorsed by Gov. G. Mennen Williams, failed to get wide support in the House. Conlin turned to a "Piggy back" income tax. It failed in the House.

He then tried a flat rate income tax. It slipped by the House with one vote to spare but was clobbered within minutes after it arrived in the Senate.

Conlin, a pipe-smoking farmer who says he is serving his last term in a 16-year legislative career, didn't vote when the House passed plans to increase the sales tax.

But everybody in the chamber knew what he was thinking.

The legislature may be asked next year to require zoning boards and other bodies at the township level to open their meetings and records to the public.

Kenneth West, managing editor of the Lansing State Journal and chairman of the Freedom of Information Committee of the Michigan Press Association, said some study was expected in this direction.

West's committee was instrumental in securing passage of a bill requiring open meetings and records of school boards.

The 1959 "Right-to-Know" bill was sponsored by Reps. William Romano (D-Warren), Elmer E. White (D-Ann Arbor), Robert Waldron (R-Grosse Pointe) and Russell Strange Jr. (R-Clare). Senator John H. Stahlin (R-

Belding; championed the freedom of information cause in the Senate. Stahlin was responsible for killing an amendment that would have allowed school boards to take final action in closed-door executive sessions "in the public interest."

"This would not be a fair way to do it," Stahlin said. "You would be taking away a freedom."

"A little group of people could shut everybody out, make a decision and let you know about it afterwards."

Stahlin will be remembered as one of the most colorful freshmen in legislative history.

He was popular among Senate GOP leaders early in the session when he criticized the Democratic state highway administration during his maiden speech, which was delivered in a Will Rogers style. But his colleagues held him with less enthusiasm when he argued they could get things done more quickly.

During the last days of the session he was openly critical of what he called "the wheels" in the Senate.

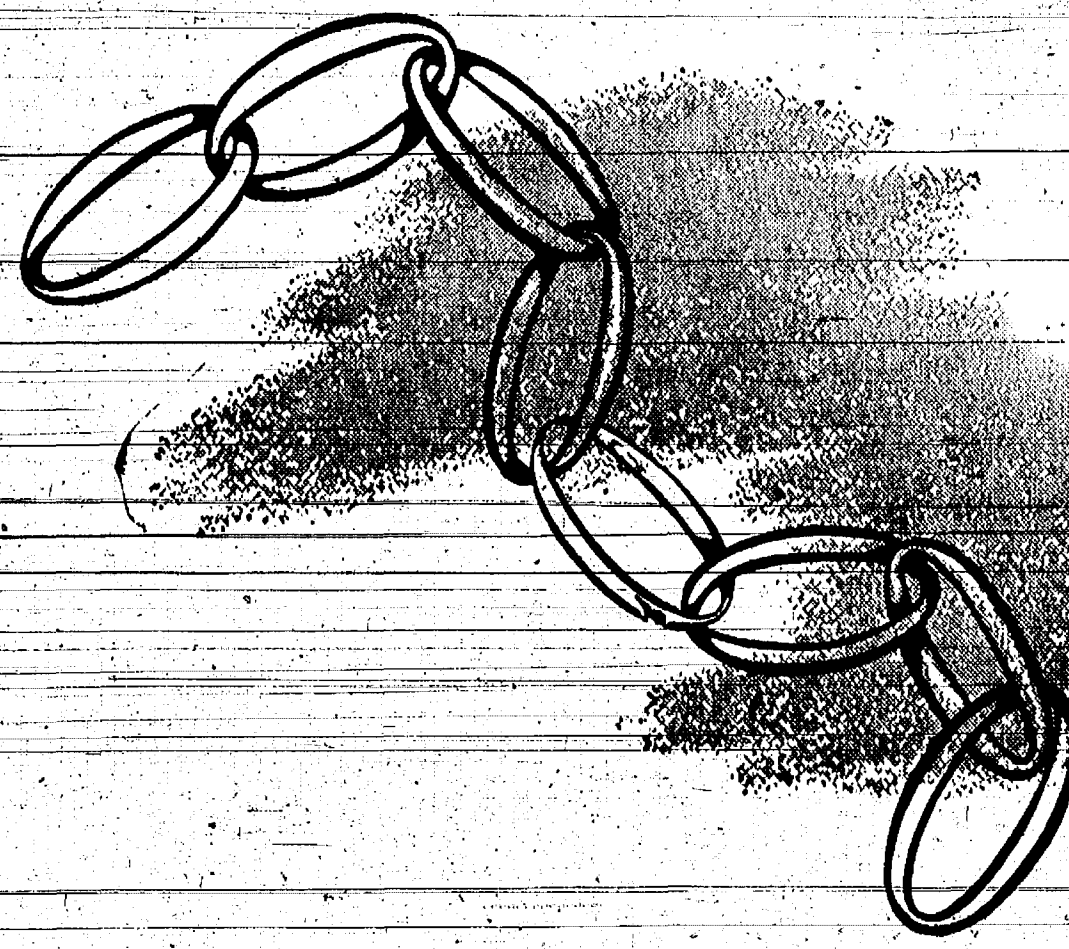

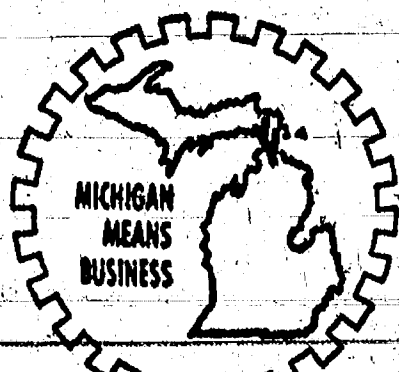

## San Francisco Paper Publishes Story on Proving Grounds

Included in a letter from her grandson, John Capren, of San Francisco, Calif., Mrs. Faye Palmer received a clipping from the San Francisco Call-Bulletin showing a view of Chrysler Proving Grounds "duplicate of the Golden Gate city's Filbert street," described as the steepest paved incline in America.

The story accompanying the photo explained that the 400-foot concrete incline at the proving ground here rises 32 feet every 100 feet and was constructed to test new cars for acceleration and braking under the most severe condition an American motorist would ever encounter.

The story, with a Chelsea, Mich., dateline, stated "The world's worst roads are located here. Winding snake-like over 4,000 acres of rural Michigan are roads packed with teeth-jarring chuck holes, dotted with giant jumps of black-top, rutted with two-inch deep trenches and paved with watermelon-sized rocks.

"Around the clock, production and future model vehicles and experimental components, are tested over this road."

### World War II Vets

Now in Last Year

To Ask for GI Loans

World War II veterans are today in the last year in which they may apply for GI home, farm or business loans, Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the Detroit regional office of the Veterans Administration, said today.

Congress has set July 25, 1960, as the cut-off date in the post-war program that has seen nearly five million World War II veterans take advantage of the GI Bill loan provisions since June 22, 1944.

Jameson pointed out that the law allows an additional year, or until July 25, 1961, for the processing and actual closing of loans.

These dates do not pertain to Korean veterans who have until Jan. 31, 1965, to make loan applications. If a World War II veteran also served in the Korean conflict he has until the 1965 date.

Under the GI loan program, qualified World War II veterans are offered the opportunity to obtain VA guaranteed or insured loans to purchase, build or improve a home; buy a farm or farm supplies; and buy or expand a business.

Nation-wide, 85 per cent of eligible World War II veterans have taken advantage of the loan program. While the Detroit regional office does not break down its loan programs by wars, Jameson estimated that on the national basis some 215,000 veterans in Michigan have received home, farm or business loans.

An exceptionally low record of defaults has won the high approval of the nation's financial leaders and an extremely high percentage of the loans have been repaid in advance of the final due dates.
