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Basketball Season Opens Friday Night

Record Number of 43 Boys Competing for Positions on Varsity

Buildups aplenty. One of the largest turn-outs in the history of Chelsea basketball reported for action three weeks ago, and are now about ready for that big opener Friday evening.

Forty-three boys in grades 9 through 12 are members of the freshman, junior varsity, or varsity teams. In addition to these boys, some 50 more are active in the Junior High basketball program. One of the highlights of the season will be a holiday tournament Dec. 20, 29, 30, to be held in the new High School gym, the first of its kind seen in Chelsea. The Varsity squad, which opens its season tomorrow evening when it travels to Onsted, has but four returning letter-winners in Alton and Homer Nixon, Matt Murphy, and Dalice Ferris. Other who saw action as varsity members a year ago are Charles Cameron, Jack Patrick, and George Wilson. Several boys are up from the Junior Varsity and are waging a strong battle for positions, including Ed Lauhon, Daryl Keezer, Mike Marsh, Don Sexton, Charles Keen, Danny Mayer, and Dave McLaughlin. Out after a year's absence is senior Fred Patterson.

With this article being written in advance of the opener, it makes it impossible to list a starting line-up, and at least nine or ten names would have to be listed.

Santa's appearance here Saturday signalled the official opening of the Christmas season in Chelsea and in keeping with the event, merchants are holding Christmas Dollar Days here tomorrow and Saturday. Special bargains will be offered on seasonable items.

Another feature of the Christmas season in Chelsea is the outdoor lighting contest sponsored by the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce. Everyone who plans to do any outdoor lighting should send in an entry blank since only officially entered displays will be eligible for the cash prizes to be offered—\$15, \$10 and \$5, respectively, for first, second and third place winners.

Lighting effects described as being of prize-winning caliber were pointed out by judges in previous contests but because they had not been officially entered, they could not be awarded prizes.

5 Directors Named for Steer Club

At the Nov. 24 meeting of the Chelsea Chamber of Commerce, a board of directors for the newly formed Chelsea Steer club was named by the Chamber of Commerce president, M. J. Anderson. Directors named are Paul Mant, Norbert Merkel, Calvin Clark, Robert Heller and Stephen Hayden.

The Chelsea Steer club was organized under the sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce as a means of creating additional interest of farm youth in raising fine beef stock as well as providing a means of promoting good business relations between farm youth and businessmen of the community.

The customary fat stock sale at the Chelsea Community Fair will be replaced by a combined Chelsea-Dexter Steer Club sale. Only steers entered in the steer clubs of Chelsea and Dexter will be eligible to be included in the sale.

At Tuesday's meeting the guest speaker was Leonard Thompson, managing director of the Southeastern Michigan Tourist Association, who complimented Chelsea on the progress made in this area by means of the promotion of fall color tours, the chicken barbecue sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, in connection with the color tour, and the highway signs pointing the way to Chelsea.

The signs were erected under sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce.

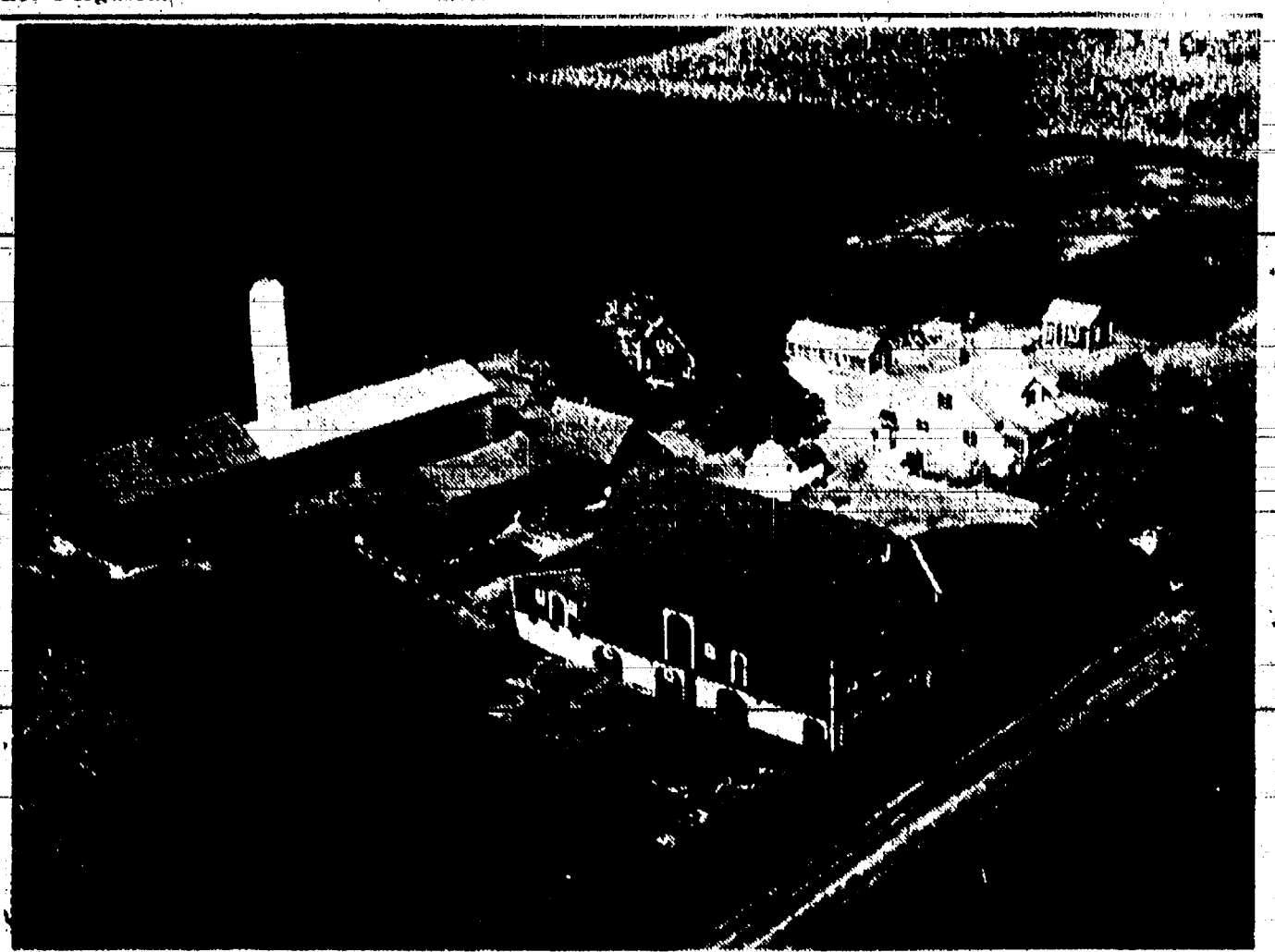

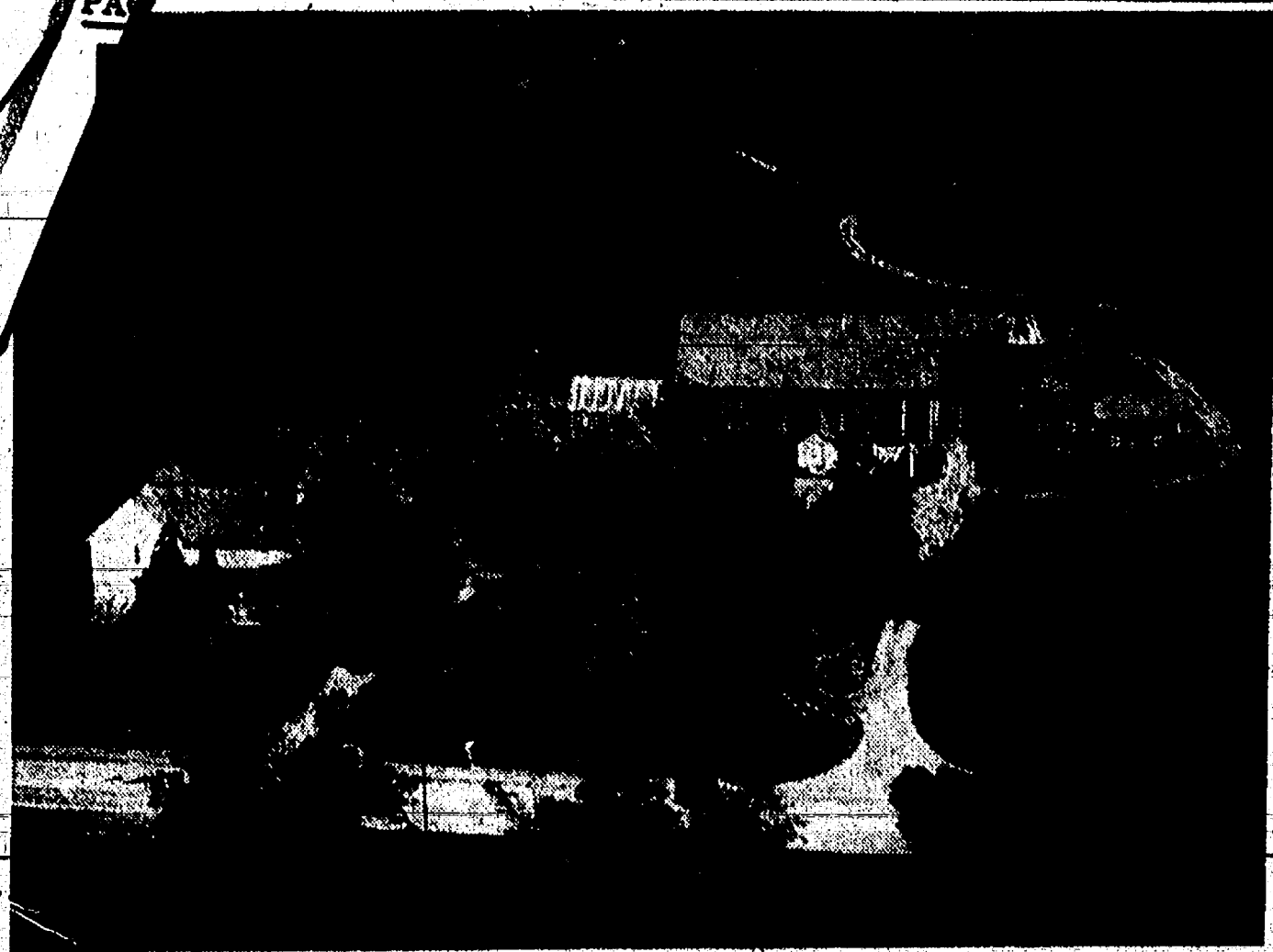

Last Week's Mystery Farm Proves Tough To Identify as Stanley Dyer Family Home

Mystery Farm No. 75 is the Stanley Dyer farm on Grass Lake road, five miles east of Grass Lake. Until about 30 years ago it was the William D. Alber home for many years and he and his daughter, Mrs. Ray Haselschwerdt of Chelsea-Manchester road, were among the first to identify the photo. The farm had belonged to Alber's father-in-law, Isaac Hertrick, before he owned it. After

Alber sold it to a Detroit doctor, it was occupied by tenants for some years. A Detroit fireman was the next owner and then Clayton Coleman of Grass Lake owned it until the Dyers bought it five years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Dyer both are now employed at Chrysler Proving Ground and have no stock on the place; however, when they first took it over, they modernized the barn and operated a large scale dairy product.

They are gradually modernizing the beautiful, 11-room house. Forty of the 220 acres of the farm are in Sylvan township, while the buildings and the remaining 180 acres are in Sharon township.

The Dyer family includes a son, Stanley, Jr., now a junior in high school, and two daughters, Shirley who is employed in Jackson, and Beverly, now Mrs. Paul Sager. Julius Blaess, who has been able to identify almost every farm

which has appeared in the series of photos published each week in The Standard, admitted he "needed a little help" in identifying the Dyer place.

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U-M Studies Potential of Hardwoods

Ann Arbor—Floors you stand on, chairs you sit on, perhaps even the walls of your house gleam with the beauty of finished hardwood grown in Michigan.

Michigan supplies a considerable quantity of fine hardwoods to the nation's economy, and may supply a great deal more after the conclusion of a study being conducted by G. Robinson Gregory (Ph.D.), associate professor of resource economics at the University of Michigan, with graduate student assistance.

The U-M researchers are studying nationwide demand for hardwood-lumber as a guide to Michigan growers. Other studies have been made in the past, but this will be one of the first to utilize modern economic techniques.

"We will attempt to determine the factors influencing national demand for hardwood timber," Professor Gregory explains. "With this information, hitherto lacking, it will be possible to plan to grow those types of trees most in demand and therefore most valuable."

"Michigan at present is growing more hardwood than any other single wood, but not nearly as much as some of the southern states. Coniferous trees are quick and easy to grow in Michigan, but the value per acre is much lower than that of valuable hardwoods such as birch, walnut, cherry and maple. If our study can determine those hardwood varieties most likely to be in future demand, Michigan growers can concentrate on producing them."

A study of this kind is complicated, Prof. Gregory points out. The demand for forest products such as lumber is a "derived demand," and the research group will study major products made from hardwood to get an idea of the factors affecting demand.

How much hardwood, for example, is needed by the furniture industry? How much for flooring? How much for veneers? Varying conditions of price, cost and income must be considered in arriving at definite conclusions regarding over-all hardwood demand.

Assisting Professor Gregory in the study is William B. Lord, who received his master's degree in forestry at U-M, and now is an assistant professor at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. The pair have traveled widely in obtaining data from furniture and lumber manufacturers, dealers and other sources.

The U-M study originated two years ago. The first part, concerned with hardwood flooring, is virtually complete. A second part, dealing with furniture, may be completed by next June.

SELF-HELP URGED

A special Senate committee studying the problem of chronic unemployment has been told that the Administration has been trying to help depressed areas help themselves.

Senator Jennings Randolph, Democrat of West Virginia, where joblessness has been acute, contended that the Administration programs had taken "a too timid approach." Other Democrats on the committee nodded in agreement.

The Possibility of Tax Reform

On Nov. 18 the House Ways and Means Committee, under the chairmanship of Rep. Wilbur D. Mills (D-Ark.), began the most elaborate hearings on tax reform in many decades. The hearings continue through Dec. 18; and previous to their start some 180 papers had been prepared on various aspects of the present tax system. These papers were printed by the Committee in three volumes with a total of just over 2,400 pages.

The hearings themselves consist of a series of round-table discussions at which each participant summarizes his paper and then is questioned by the members of the committee and his fellow panelists. None of the participants, incidentally, is a spokesman for any organization, and the largest group in terms of numbers is college professors.

My paper was on the relative role of Federal taxes and pointed out that 81 per cent of Treasury revenues come from income taxes. This was on the second day of the hearings, and on the basis of the views expressed the day before it appeared wise to me to use my oral statement to summarize some basic principles involved in the problem of tax rate reform. These principles were the following:

Taxes for Revenue Purposes Only. The tax system should be used only for revenue purposes, and should be designed with a view to obtaining as nearly stable revenues as possible.

Compensatory spending may have some appeal in theory, but it will not work in practice. Rather, all it does, or can do, is give us larger deficits during periods of recession. It never gives us the hoped-for large surpluses in prosperous years to pay off the debt created during economic downturns.

Goal of Balanced Budget. An effort to obtain stable revenues does not mean that the Federal Budget will be balanced every year, but that should be the goal.

Growth of government is at the expense of growth of the private sector of the economy, and government expenditures should be held as low as possible.

Taxes never serve as a positive

Some 50,000 copies of the "Fun in the Snow" publication will be distributed throughout Michigan and the Midwest during the winter season, council spokesmen said.

This year's guide—the fifth annual edition—lists 71 skiing, skating and tobogganing centers throughout Michigan's two peninsulas. Listings include locations of winter sports centers and the facilities offered by each.

Single copies or quantity supplies of "Fun in the Snow" are available on request, without charge, from: Michigan Tourist Council, Lansing 26.

The growing popularity of skiing—along with ice fishing, hunting, skating, tobogganing and other winter sports—has boosted winter vacation travel to an all-time high in Michigan, according to Robert J. Farling, council executive secretary.

SECRECY ON AID

President Eisenhower has reaffirmed the Defense Department's right to keep military aid contract records secret from Congressional auditors if inspection was deemed "impracticable."

He approved an Executive Order waiving a provision of the new foreign aid legislation giving to the General Accounting Office authority to examine the records of contractors.

1960 CENSUS

A national tabulation of malformations at birth will be started in 1960 by the Office of Vital Statistics.

encouragement to business and the effort should be to make them as light a handicap as feasible.

Basic income-tax-rate reform should have priority over everything else in the tax field, and it is not necessary to have a study of indefinite duration before we start on the task of such rate reform.

The proper basis for tax rate reform is to use the increased revenues that result from economic growth for reductions from the lowest to the highest rates.

Closing so-called "loopholes" is not as important as rate revision. These were put in the tax code

after thorough consideration by the Congress, and must not be eliminated without great care.

The nation today has a serious shortage of venture capital and this can be corrected only by tax rate reform.

All of those dogmatic statements appear true to me. However, it must be recognized that many persons disagree. This is the case in everyone of these principles, and that is one of the reasons why this set of hearings is so important.

You owe your security to those who insisted on a Bill of Rights.

In other notes in this week's world of sports, Michigan will open the home basketball season Saturday night at Ann Arbor when they host a Ball Drake University squad with John Tidwell and Perry Miller, two starters from last year's quintet which finished second in the conference. I'm afraid though that it looks like a long season for the Wolverines.

Friday night, the Harlem Globetrotters will play at Ann Arbor High school. Althea Gibson, tennis star, will also play an exhibition match. The event will be a great one, and if you get a chance, don't miss the Globetrotters this Friday.

Saturday night Michigan's Hockey team will host always strong Colorado University at Ann Arbor. Al Resnar, defenseman, has been named to the team. The series should be one of the year's best.

Here are my Washtenaw Conference picks for this Friday. Chelsea over Onsted. Saline over Dexter. U. High over Clinton and Manchester to top Pinckney.

General Manager Frank Lane of the Cleveland Indians caused the biggest stir in the annual baseball draft at St. Petersburg.

Lane picked an apparent flop thrown into the grab bag after being paid an \$80,000 bonus by the San Francisco Giants.

The player on whom Lane took his fling is 18-year-old Mike Lee, a big left-handed pitcher who has a 7-19 record with Fresno last season. Lee and other youngsters signed to bonuses and not promoted since last November were eligible for signing at \$15,000 each.

Lane said . . . "We tried to sign Lee for \$60,000 out of high school and we feel this a heck-of-a-buy at \$15,000."

Fourteen triple-A players were drafted by 10 Major League clubs at the higher \$25,000 draft price for experienced ball players.

These included several former Major Leaguers, among them Steve Bilko, who was grabbed by Detroit . . . Catcher Darrell Johnson, who was drafted by the Cardinals . . . and Pitcher Don Lee, who becomes the property of Washington.

An East team with a strong Midwestern flavor has been announced for the 35th annual Shrine game at San Francisco. Included in the 24-man squad is the Notre Dame passing combo of George Izo (Eye-zoh) and Monty Stickles, plus Quarterback Dean Look of Michigan State.

Others on the team include Halfback Ron Burton of Northwestern, Guard Mike McGee of Duke and Center Jack Burkett of Auburn.

All-America Halfback Billy Cannon of Louisiana State apparently is the most sought-after player in college football.

The Los Angeles Rams opened the National Football League Draft at Philadelphia by naming Cannon their first choice. Cannon previously had been selected by Houston of the new American League.

Other National League first round choices included Quarterback George Izo (Eye-zoh) of Notre Dame, picked by the Chicago Cardinals, and Halfback Johnny Robinson of Louisiana State, selected by Detroit. The Cardinals announced that Izo had already signed a contract.

Quarterback Richie Lucas of Penn State was picked by the Washington Redskins, while Green Bay selected Tom Moore, a halfback from Vanderbilt. The Pittsburgh Steelers chose Jack Spikes, a Texas Christian back who had been selected earlier by Denver, of the American League.

The Chicago Bears' first choice was Roger Davis, a Syracuse guard, and the Cleveland Browns

took Jim Houston, an end from Ohio State.

Philadelphia took Northwestern Halfback Ron Burton, who previously had been selected by the American League's Boston club. In other selections, Baltimore picked Tackle Ron Mix of Southern California . . . San Francisco took End Monty Stickles of Notre Dame . . . and the New York Giants picked Lou Cordileone (Cor-dee-oh) of Cleveland.

Prior to beginning the draft, National Football League owners discussed a number of subjects, including expansion.

George Halas of the Chicago Bears said he had been contacted by Minneapolis-St. Paul and by Dallas.

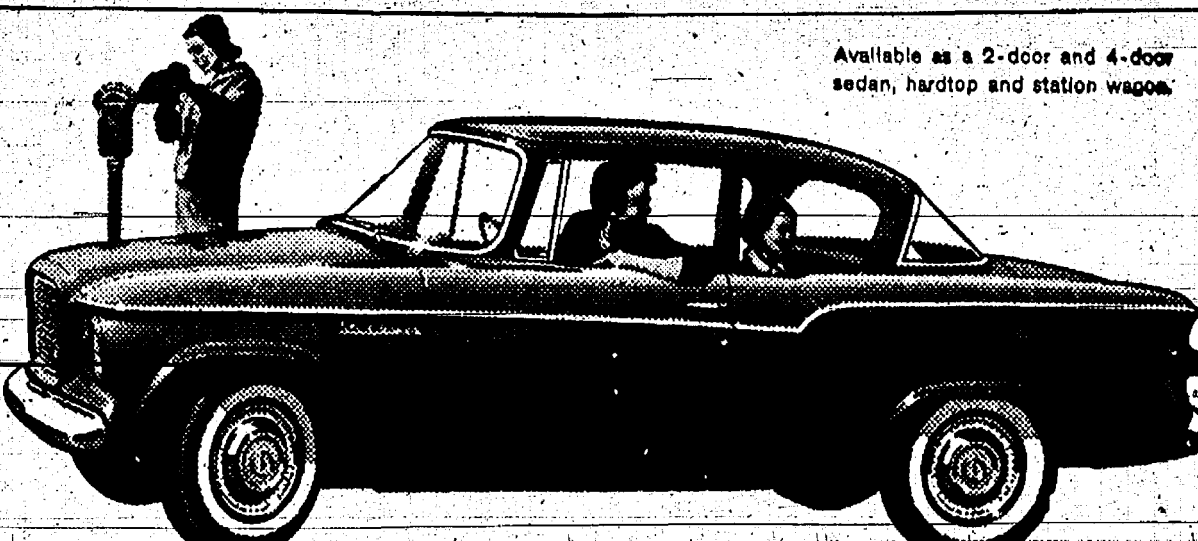

a family cannot prove it has lived in the city that long, the Wayne County Social Welfare Commission opens its doors. This emergency county relief is supposed to be temporary while the indigent family prepares to return to its native state.
But only 452 families were "persuaded" by the authorities last year to accept bus or train tickets back to their homes—or gasoline for their jalopies.

No one relishes getting into trouble, but it is a quick way of learning who our friends are, as well as those who have been waiting to catch us bent over at the right angle.
