"The present law is so terrible," says Sill, "that four major innomes on a large scale will not

"More benefit than 100 new industries, would be a sensible mort-gage law," he argues. "This would make millions more which could be loaned to our citizens," he states.

"Overnight several very desirable things would happen if the state had a sensible law: interest rates would be reduced; property prices would drop; discounts which must now be paid by a seller would lessen or disappear; real estate activity would increase.".

Big trouble with present law is that it takes 16 to 18 months to foreclose. Sill favors a shorter period: four to six months. "It is possible, and it actually happens," says Sill, "for a buyer to thumb his nose at the lender and pay nothing for nearly two years while he lives in a house." "You can imagine the kind of care the house gets," he continues. In the meantime the lender must pay in-surance and taxes to protect what is left of the investment.

"If a person cannot pay and is going to lose his house," Sill argues, "it is better to get it over with." He believes that once a person is four menths behind in mortgage payments, he is not

likely to catch up. "Protecting the ne'er-do-well or the unfortunate does him no real good, but puts the lender at an unfair advantage," says Sill.
"Most of all, it forces all the neople who should be eligible for low cost mortgages to pay higher

Present law forces buyers to accept land contracts with higher interest and less security than mortgage, and prices that are artificially high to allow for discounts. Even the federal government apocifies a discount rate 16 to 1% higher in Michigan than other states according to Sill.

Sill gets little support. Banker and real estate groups are not inclined to get excited about this. and legislators tell him the change is not good politics. But Sill says he'll keep speaking at lunch clubs, before trade groups and to whom ever will listen.

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Battle Shaping Up Over Attempt To Restrict Antlerless Deer Open Area

Michigan's 10,000 archers, dismayed at the prospect of facing coming deer seasons with half of the state's counties closed to them for the hunting of anterless deer, are releasing verbal barbs at the Lansing politicians responsible for it.

Opposition is being directed at House Bill No. 136, introduced by Rep. Walter G. Nakkula of Gladwin and 11 others.

If the bill passes, archers in Michigan will lose the right to hunt deer of either sex in 40 counties, since the conservation commission has provided archers with an "any deer" season in these counties under the authority of the law which House Bill 136 would repeal. This fact was pointed up in no unquestionable terms by members of the highly-organized Michigan Bow Hunters Association.

Rather than oppose the portion of the bill which affects them directly, MBHA members have voted to join forces with other conservation groups and is opposing House Bill 136 in its entirety.

In this fight they have the full support of the Michigan Conservation Commission, the Michigan Bear Hunters Association and the Michigan United Conservation Clubs, all of whom are vigorously opposed to making the deer herd a political football again. Hunters also favor any-deer seasons by a 2 to 1 margin, according to impartial polls.

It is interesting to note that Rep. Nakkula is chairman of the Gladwin county board of supervisors and in this capacity is forced to support HB 136.
