Fall-Out Shelter Offers Best Hope For Survival If Nuclear Attack Hits

The latest information on bomb shelters to come from official sources indicate that a surprisingly large percentage of residents will survive an atomic attack-if they take the proper precautions.

-In this area, it is said that those who have home shelters will almost certainly survive, unless they should be unlucky enough to be in the exact spot where a bomb is dropped. Even in World War I and World War II there was no remedy for a direct bomb hit. That was that.

Today, however, the blast and fall-out dust is a great danger to those in above-the-ground homes. Since most of our homes are above ground that means a city's population might well be decimated by a nuclear blast. The only way you can be fairly certain to survive such an attack-and you can-is to provide yourself with a shelter. It is already late to be thinking about this, even if your neighbors, like you, have succumbed to the communist line, which goes something like this: "Oh well, if a nuclear bomb is dropped we'll all be killed anyhow, so what's the use?" This slick line, the psychology of resignation, or despair, could well luil the American people to sleep. The only sane and determined policy is to provide for our survival if nuclear war comes. If we are ready for it, that may be one reason it does not come, but if we are not ready for it, and Russia for example, is, then it is almost sure to envelope us.
