## THE LETTERBOX

July 26, 1962

Dear Editor:

I desire to tell you of my pleasure of having returned to Chelsea after a six-week study period in North Carolina.

I attended the 1962 summer counseling and Guidance Training Institute at North Carolina State College in Raleigh, N. C.

This program was sponsored under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act of 1958. One of the main purposes of these programs is to train school counselors in knowledge and skills of identifying gifted and talented students and counseling with them and their parents.

I attended this program under a complete scholarship, which allowed in part also for family expenses.

Under similar provisions I also attended the 1960 summer institute at Missouri University. There the emphasis was on advanced counseling theories, advanced statistical methods, and the nature of the gifted child.

This summer's training furthered my skills and understandings in administering the Stanford-Binet Intelligence Scale, 1960 revision, the Wechsler Intelligence Scale for Children, and the Wechsler Adult Intelligence Scale, and the uses and interpretation of the results. These instruments are administered to children and adults on an individual basis and consume the vicinity of two hours per administration. My previous training and experiences include also the uses of interest inventories, achievement and aptitudes tests, and personality inventories.

In spite of the warm weather in the land of cotton and tobacco, I enjoyed working with a number of very gifted students and their parents. Two trips to the Atlantic beaches, one to Cape Hatteras during gale strength storms, during which I gained on the Outer Banks knee deep practically in sand-waters, added vacation atmosphere.

I loved the food and sights, but found it hard to adjust to the vast differences in some cultural values.

It is so comfortable to be back in the relative freedom of outlook in life in the North. In fact, some of the signs on doors and other locations, the distinct lines drawn between whites and colored, the dense expressions of religious blues, made me feel as if I were again under Hitler-like occupation conditions, yet as one of the privileged class.

Unintentionally, yet in every respect in the raw, we students and some professors "integrated" the "de-luxe" white city recreation facility during one of our institute times. No physical harm resulted to anyone, but this probably was due to the immediate arrival of armed law enforcement officers, who stood by in order to discourage the large number of white managers and a number of white men who were quite indignant at the occasion.

You see, those who planned the vacation simply forgot that two of the members of the institute

are colored and that the facility has some rules in respect to who or what may not enter. But I was as much involved in my feelings probably as my fellow students and professors from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Texas, Mississippi, and New York. And probably this was even more meaningful an experience to the students, professors, and townspeople on the spot who maybe never before have come to grips with facing their own true feelings.

On the whole, though, I really most sincerely must say that there are many, many wonderful and most hospitable people in the South. I feel lucky in this respect—wherever I have been in my life, Chelsea included, I have been fortunate to meet many more "good" people than outright "bad" or destructive people. This is true even in the case of my short wartime stay in Nazi Germany.

By the above I do not mean to imply that I prefer to work with the talented students mainly. In fact, it is the great variety in abilities, interests, family backgrounds, and personalities, which make my job thoroughly enjoyable.

I also try to accommodate those who have completed the high school level, and are at work or study elsewhere on advanced level. Even though I am only one counselor for our four schools, and at least another person is needed just to cover adequately the numbers in the junior and senior high schools, I try to serve also concerned adults in our community. My training and available information is not limited only to educational problems. They, in fact, include personal, as well as, vocational problems.

One of the greatest needs in Chelsea is for co-ordinated flow of information between the businesses and industry and the schools, as well as the available adult manpower pool. Unfortunately we as yet have no organized approach to more adequate utilization of available jobs and manpower.

## Korean Orphan Child 'Adopted' by Local Woman Through Relief Agency

Yesterday was the 10th birthday of Shin Bok Hee, in Korea and somewhat in the nature of a birthday gift, she has been assured of a year's financial assistance as an "adopted" child of a Chelsea woman—Mrs. B. R. Donaldson of Cavanaugh Lake.

The "financial adoption" project is handled through the Foster Parents' Plan, Inc., 352 Park Ave. South, New York City. "Foster Parents" under this plan contribute \$15 a month toward the child's support for a year. Of this sum, the child receives \$8 each month as an outright cash grant. The remainder is used for periodic food and new clothing packages, translations of letters, medical services and education.

The present financial adoptee of Mrs. Donaldson replaces a Korean girl adopted several years ago. That girl no longer needs the particular help provided under this plan and makes it possible for Shin Bok Hee to receive the assistance.

Acting on the father's request, in 1959, the child was brought to the orphanage by her mother. He had learned all about his work through a nurse employed there and he requested that his daughter be admitted to live at the orphanage. He explained that the child's mother had died when Bok Hee was born. He had cared for the child in their native village of Ha Dong Gun in the Province of Kyongsang Namdo, until Communist units overran the vicinity. The father and child then fled and went to Pusan where he had earned a livelihood as a day laborer. However, early in 1959, the father became ill with an internal ailment and could no longer support the little girl. Acting on the father's request, the orphanage authorities agreed to accept the little girl and the father left and has never been heard from since.

The child attends classes of the fourth grade in the primary school. Foster Parents' Plan is a non-sectarian, non-profit, non-propaganda, independent, government-approved relief organization which provides children who are orphaned, distressed, or otherwise made destitute with the care, education, and moral support they need.

Foster Parents' Plan, which has rehabilitated more than 70,000 children on a personal basis since its founding in 1937, is now helping more than 27,000 youngsters in Greece, Italy, Korea, France, Viet-

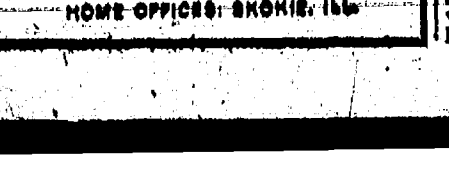

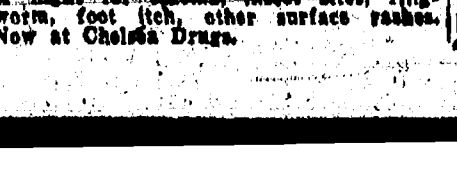

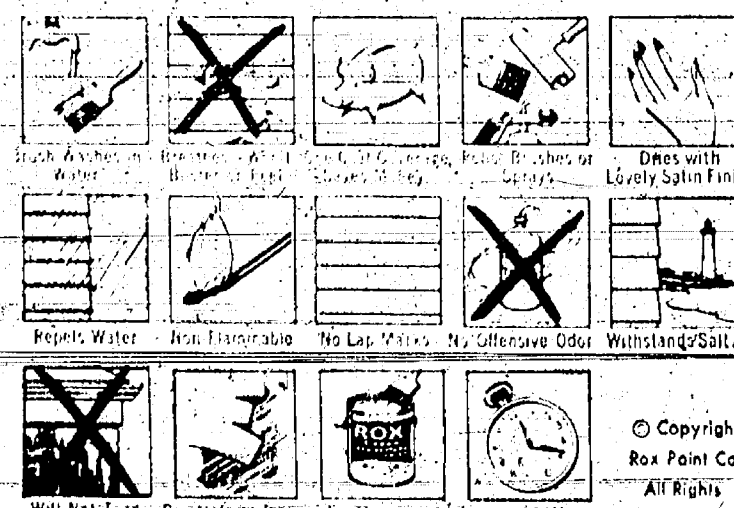

## Dexter Bank Directors OK Merger Plan

Ward A. Tupper, president of the Dexter Savings Bank and Joseph B. Foster, president of the Ann Arbor Bank, today announced that a special meeting of the shareholders of each institution is being called on Sept. 18 to consider an agreement for the consolidation of the two banks which has been approved by the boards of directors of the two institutions.

The proposed plan calls for the merger of the Dexter Savings Bank into the Ann Arbor Bank. The consolidated bank is to be known as the Ann Arbor Bank. The present Dexter bank location and facilities will be continued as the Dexter Office of the Ann Arbor Bank. The two officials disclosed that all present employees of the Dexter Savings Bank will be retained and that the Board of Directors of the Dexter Savings Bank will continue to serve as an Advisory Board.

The Dexter Savings Bank was organized in 1893 and at present has assets in excess of \$4,500,000. The combined total assets of the Ann Arbor Bank, after consolidation, will exceed \$70,000,000.

The Ann Arbor Bank presently has, in addition to its main office, three branch offices in Ann Arbor and one in Whitmore Lake. By terms of the consolidation the total number of offices will increase to six.

Both boards of directors feel that the proposed consolidation will be of great benefit for individuals and businesses located in the Dexter-Ann Arbor area.

The proposed consolidation is subject to approval by the Michigan State Banking Department, the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

## U-M Also Has Music School At Interlochen

Ann Arbor — There's music in the air this summer, and it's coming from two University of Michigan "campuses."

Some 400 students are attending the Summer Session in Ann Arbor, and about half that number are studying in the University division at the National Music Camp, Interlochen.

"The Ann Arbor classes are well known," says Dean James B. Wallace of the School of Music, "but I think far fewer persons know that the University is active in teaching at Interlochen which, perhaps, has become better known as a high school level camp."

"At Interlochen we teach courses in music, drama, art, dance, speech and camp counseling, all under the direction of a faculty and staff of 35 headed by Eugene Troth."

"In addition, we run the all-state band, orchestra and choir organizations with another staff of 35 led by Orien Dalley."

The University also is advising and consulting with Joseph E. Maddy, camp founder and U-M professor emeritus of music, on the establishment of the Interlochen Arts Academy, which will be a highly specialized high school emphasizing music and the related arts, but including all other courses appropriate to the modern high school curriculum.

## Highway Map Went Like Hot Cakes

Lansing — The Michigan State Highway Department is out of 1962 highway maps.

Public Information Officer Tom Farrell said the demand for maps this year was greater than in any other year.

"We stopped filling requests for bulk shipments less than a month after they arrived from the printer," Farrell said. "Only requests for single copies have been filled since July 15."

Farrell said requests for quantity shipments totaling more than 50,000 maps have been unfilled and individuals, companies and chambers of commerce requesting bulk shipment have been notified that the Highway Department is out of maps.

The Highway Department has distributed more than 400,000 maps since mid-June.

The biggest increase in demand for the maps was in individual requests. Up to 2,000 letters and post-cards arrived daily during the peak demand.

Farrell said one of the principal reasons for the increase in individual requests was the strip map of Michigan's 826-mile freeway system showing all points of entrance and exit.

"We've had more favorable comment on the strip map than anything else on the 1962 map," Farrell said. Copies of the 1962 map are still available from many travel agencies, chambers of commerce, local and regional tourist centers and similar outlets, but they are going rapidly.

Whether the map order can be increased next year is a budgetary problem now being studied, Farrell said.

## Con-Con Report

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is No. 11 in a series of articles about the proposed new Michigan Constitution. Subsequent articles will appear in subsequent weeks.

Concluding sections of the proposed new Michigan Constitution have to do with amendment and revision of the constitution and putting the new document into effect if it is adopted by the people at the April 1 election.

Amendments to the constitution may be initiated by the legislature or by petition of 10 percent of the electors. The procedure is similar to that outlined in the present constitution, except that the legislature is prohibited from proposing amendments "less than 60 days" before an election.

This time limit was inserted by the convention to discourage a tendency in recent years to submit legislative proposals for amendment so late that election officials find it impossible to observe statutory deadlines for ballot printing and delivery.

Several changes are made in the section dealing with future constitutional conventions. It provides:

1. The question of a general revision of the constitution may be submitted to the electors at the general election in 1978 and each 10th year thereafter.

2. If a constitutional convention is called, it will meet the first Tuesday in October following the election, or at an earlier date if provided by law. Delegates are to be chosen at a partisan election.

3. Vacancies among the delegation to the convention will be filled by appointment of the governor from among qualified residents of the district in which the vacancy occurs, but the appointee must be a member of the same political party as the delegate vacating the office.

4. The convention will have constitutional authority "to explain and disseminate information about the proposed constitution and to complete the business of the convention in an orderly manner." This should help to avoid possible conflict between the convention and the legislature.

5. The date of submission of the new constitution or amendments proposed to the electors of the state is to be provided by the convention. It must be not less than 60 days after final adjournment.

The Schedule and Temporary Provisions adopted as a part of the new constitution establish an orderly transition from the present 1908 document in the event the new constitution is approved. The attorney general is directed to rec-

Lansing—A study is underway to determine if new state laws are necessary to protect Michigan residents from dangerous drugs such as thalidomide. Federal laws do not apply to drugs and medicines sold exclusively in Michigan. An advisory committee has been appointed by me to study current state legislation and procedures and to recommend any changes it may find necessary. I have been disturbed by recent disclosures that thalidomide is believed to be responsible for thousands of malformed births in Europe. Only the alertness of the federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in preventing commercial distribution of thalidomide averted a similar tragedy in our country. However, the FDA can supervise only drugs which are involved in interstate commerce. A report

## Michigan Leading Nation in Building Interstate Freeways

Lansing—Michigan, with nearly 600 miles of interstate freeway completed, leads the nation in percent of its toll-free interstate system open to traffic.

And in total mileage, the state takes a back seat only to Texas which has completed 745 miles of its designated 3,023 miles of super highway. Nationally, more than 12,500 miles of the interstate network—about 30 per cent of 41,000 miles—were open to traffic on June 30. Michigan had 461 miles of toll-free interstate highway built to 1975 standards open to traffic on June 30. That amounts to nearly 43 per cent of the state's allotted 1,080 miles of interstate highway.

In comparison, here's how some other nearby states measure up to Michigan's 43 per cent: Ohio, 23 per cent; Pennsylvania, 18 per cent; New York, 17 per cent; Illinois, 16 per cent; Indiana, 12 per cent; and Minnesota, four per cent. Connecticut, with 116 of its 293 miles completed, is second to Michigan with 40 per cent. Wisconsin, which has completed 37 per cent of its network, is third.

Since June 30, Michigan has opened 24 miles of interstate freeway and now has 485 miles open to traffic and built to full standards. In addition, it has 5.6 miles open but built to standards adequate for present traffic and 4.4 miles of toll facilities—the Mackinac Bridge—for a grand total of 495 miles open to traffic as of Aug. 1.

Michigan had 250 miles of freeway under construction on June 30 and about 100 miles in engineering or right-of-way stages. Work is underway or completed on 77 per cent of the Michigan Interstate system compared to 71 per cent nationally.

Not included in the Michigan totals are such freeways as US-23 between Flint and the Ohio line, US-181 between Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo, US-10 between Bay City and Clare and US-27 and US-127 between Jackson and Gray.

## AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

## American Land Reform?

When the Chinese Reds swept over the mainland, apologists for their brutality said that they represented a simple "land reform" movement. Sometimes the phrase "agrarian reform" has been used instead to convey the impression that if it has to do with the soil, it must be right.

Land reform, no matter where it is found, be it Red China, India or Cuba, has its roots in the same socialist soil. Property rights are separated from human rights, and the land is divided "from each according to his ability to each according to his need." This is in keeping with directives given by Karl Marx in his Ten Point Manifesto of 1848. Marx called for (1) "abolition of property in land and application of all rents of land to public purposes" and (2) "a heavy progressive and graduated land tax... as among the best ways to bring a country into the communist fold."

It is no accident that the program of the U. S. Communist Party calls for our government to "institute agricultural reform movements." The U. S. Party asks that farmers be paid "100 percent of party price supports for all farm products," (from the federal treasury).

Naturally, farmers want 100 percent of party—so what's wrong with that? When "party" is guaranteed by the government and paid from the federal treasury, it means complete government control of all prices and markets. This, of course, is Communism.

What is wrong with a graduated land tax? First off, most people know little about this proposal where small farmers are taxed at a lower figure, and with the tax rate rising sharply for all property over a certain level. This kind of tax is a perfect tool for land reform—a weapon to forcibly remove land from the possession of the owner if it was determined that a person had "too much" and to balk any possibility of using efficiency to gain reasonably adequate incomes on the farm.

Social action committees working within church groups, labor unions, and political parties frequently fall for some version of these land reform movements. "Do gooders" dupes and follow travel the path of the programs as needed social actions, unimpaired of the direction the programs will eventually take agriculture, and through it, all of America.

**Fishing License Sales Improve This Year**  
Lansing—Fishing license sales have taken a turn for the better in Michigan this year, but Conservation Department officials aren't ready to predict a reversal in the seven-year downward trend. Latest sales reports from dealers are modestly optimistic, except in the case of trout stamps which are down half a percent, numbering about 120,340.

At the end of July, some 495,800 resident licenses had been sold. The year-ago figure was 489,886. Temporary non-resident licenses totaled 15,230 as against 11,835 at this time in 1961. Approximately 61,590 non-resident fishermen bought annual licenses through July 31, 1962 for an increase of 4,076.

Receipts rose nearly \$24,000, totaling some \$1,524,385. This revenue goes into Michigan's Game and Fish Protection Fund which pays for most of the state's wildlife programs.

omment to the legislature "as soon as practicable" the changes necessary to adapt existing laws to the new constitution. Then it would be the legislature's job to make the present laws conform with the document.

No state official would lose his job immediately, even though the position is abolished by the new constitution. Such officials would serve out their terms before bowing to the new provisions.

Four-year terms for elected state officials and senators would not start until Jan. 1, 1967. These officials would be elected in the non-presidential November election in 1966.

Also included in the Temporary Provisions is a section permitting the legislature to borrow money for refunding of bonds issued by the Mackinac Bridge Authority. Approval of such a proposal must be by two-thirds vote of the members in each house and the legislature. It has been estimated that the placing of the full faith and credit of the state behind these bridge bonds would result in interest savings of about \$1 million annually.

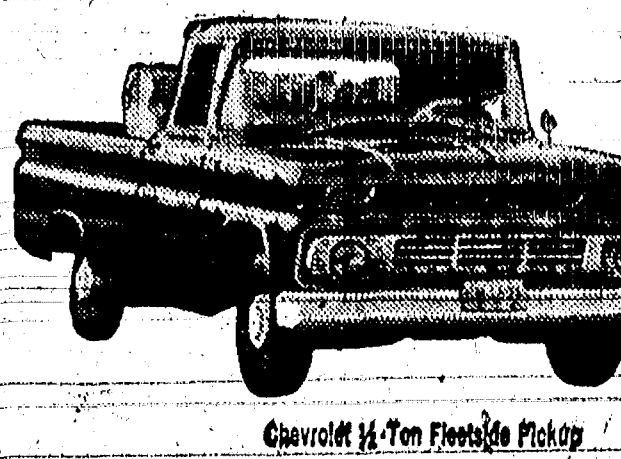

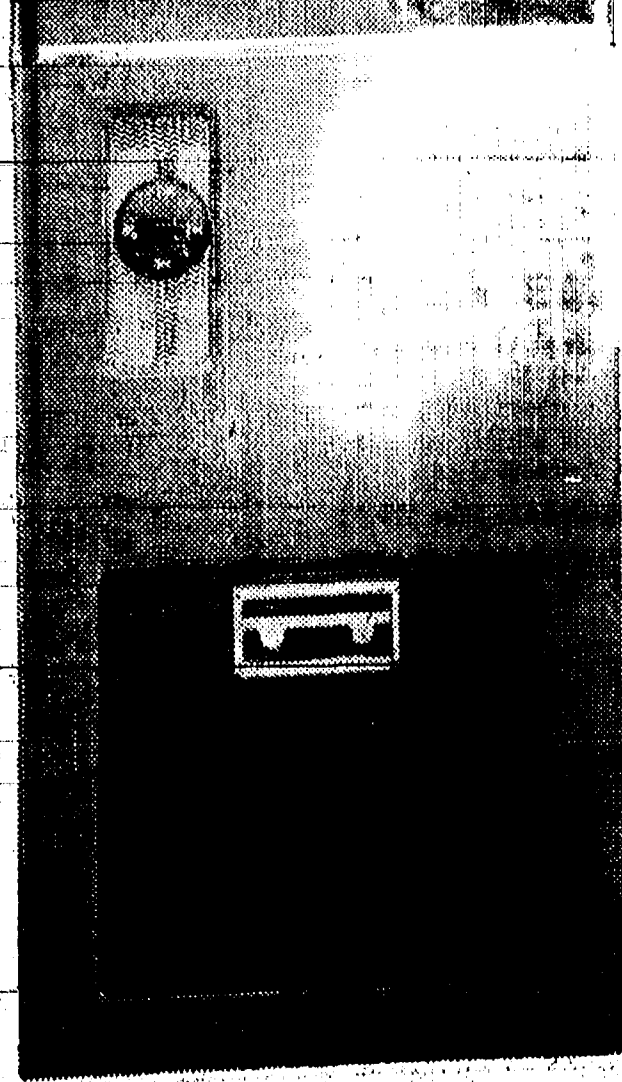

## Supervisors Given Report on Dutch Elm Disease Program

The Washtenaw County Road Commission, in report Tuesday to the road committee of the Board of Supervisors, gave a detailed account of the progress of Dutch Elm disease control program as well as the progress of dead tree removal on roads and streets of the county the first six months of 1967.

Washtenaw County Road Commission forces cut a total of 1,417 dead trees on county primary and local roads and subdivisions streets at an average cost of \$24.27 per tree, for a total of \$34,338.88, with considerable cleanup work remaining to be done.

A survey of dead trees in the right of way of county roads in all townships of the county shows a total of 6,632 dead trees, of which 5,991 or 91 percent are dead elms, to be removed as of July 15. At an average cost of \$24.27 per tree, these operations will cost approximately \$181,000.

To help in the control of Dutch Elm disease and the elimination of hazardous dead trees along the roads and streets in the county, the Board of Supervisors appropriated \$50,000 to these programs, with the Road Commission allotted \$35,000; cities and villages being allotted a total of \$15,000. To date, according to the report, the villages of Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester and Milan have made no report to the Road Commission on any expenditures for the program and therefore have received no share of the allotted total.

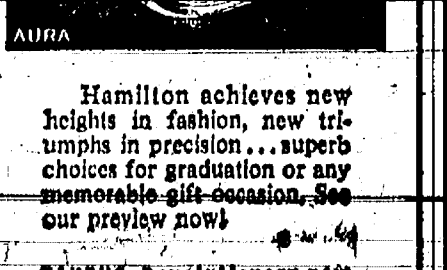
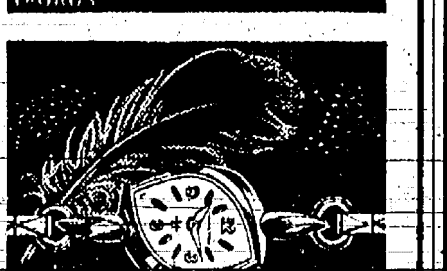
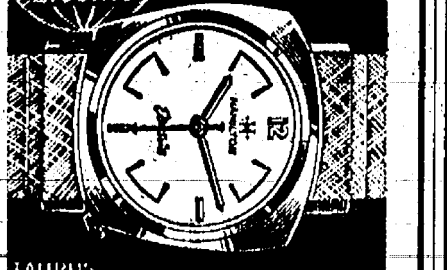
