
International Student Adviser Will Speak Here

Announcement has been made that James B. Chandler, director of classification for the state's prison-camp system, has been appointed probation officer with the Washtenaw County Adult Probation Department.

He replaces James H. Horn who resigned to accept a position with the Macomb County Child Guidance Clinic at St. Clair Shores.

Chandler has been with the Michigan Department of Corrections for 16 years. He became classification director, assigning persons sentenced to Southern Michigan Prison to the 13 camps throughout the state in 1963, and operated Camp Waterloo, eight miles west of Chelsea. He was a counselor at the state prison prior to that and worked in the state's Bureau of Social Aid in Muskegon for a year before entering corrections work.

Chandler was transferred by the state to this county post at his own request because he wanted to have more direct contact with individuals coming before the corrections authorities.


Jerry Bristle Granted Exclusive Herd Name

\$80,000 Project Now Underway at Half Moon Lake

Steady progress is being made in the development of a bathing beach and picnic site at the Half Moon Lake section of Pinckney Recreation Area in Livingston and Washtenaw counties, according to the Conservation Department.

Work is also moving ahead under other phases of a \$88,000 improvement project which is scheduled for completion by July 1 of this year.


Other work includes the paving of roads and parking areas, and the construction of a new bathhouse and concession building.

The area's total list of improvements is designed to handle an additional 1,700 day users at one time.

Last year, some 246,000 daily visitors used the Pinckney area, buying an estimated \$677,000 worth of gasoline, food and other such items from local stores.

Addition of facilities by the Conservation Department will boost the area's potential for visitor spending by \$4,675 per day.

Improvements at the Pinckney area are financed through the \$10-million state park bonding program which is being underwritten by the sale of vehicle entrance permits.







Preparation, Sale of Meats Is Topic for Food Information Week

In observance of Food Information Week, April 5-11, in the Greater Detroit Area, the Co-Operative Extension Service of Michigan State University is working with community organizations, the food industry and others in presenting information of value to homemakers.

One of the most important areas of the food industry is the preparation and sale of meat according to Extension specialists. The last 30 years have brought about as many changes in our meat supplies as forces brought to the old West. As consumer income has increased, more money has been spent for meat and meat quality has improved.

In the past 30 years, the number of cattle fattened in feedlots has increased fourfold. The fed cattle marketed has increased from 30 percent of the nation's commercial production in 1930 to 61 percent in 1962. Consumer use of beef has gone from an average of 65.6 pounds per person annually in 1947-49 to 95.2 pounds in 1963.

Grain fattened beef is tender beef which barely resembles that driven over the range to distant markets in the past. Tender young beef fattened in feedlots will have a thick covering of firm white fat, thin streaks of fat through the lean, the lean muscle will be a bright red color and the bone will be red and porous.

Consumer preference for lean pork has resulted in changes in both production and marketing of hogs. More lean type hogs, which have more muscle and less fat, are being produced and hogs are fed to a weight at which there is little or no excessive fat accumulation. Retailers have been trimming the outside fat covering to about one-fourth inch for several years.

Preliminary reports show that in 1963 per capita use of beef, pork, veal, and lamb reached an average of about 170 pounds of meat in carcass form. This consisted of 95.2 pounds of beef, 65.6 pounds of pork, 5 pounds of veal, and 4.9 pounds of lamb. In addition, persons used an average of 31.1 pounds of ready-to-cook chicken, 6.7 pounds of turkey, and 10.2 pounds of fishery products.

For almost 60 years Federal inspectors have checked meat moving in interstate and foreign commerce. Today, about 32 percent of the commercial production of meat and meat food products are federally inspected for cleanliness and wholesomeness. More than 1,000 meat processing establishments are under Federal inspection and more than 100,000,000 meat animals are slaughtered annually under Federal inspection. Inspection begins with live animals and continues through examination of each carcass with supervision of each stage of curing, canning or other processing. Final approval on carcasses and large meat cuts is shown by a small

Housewives should check with their meat department to learn the quality beef, lamb, and veal it provides.

The NATIONAL OUTLOOK

Administration's Accent Put on Youth . . .

The emphasis on the problems of youth is understandable. The age group between 16 and 21 is the fastest growing segment of the population. These are the people who will be around longer than any other group in the country. Many of our young people have not acquired the skills, attitudes and work habits which would make them attractive to prospective employers. The Administration's program is aimed at remedying this by giving training and work experience to selected young men and women.

One may, however, be skeptical as to whether make-work projects would really give these young people with the experience, motivation and self-discipline which would make them more employable elsewhere. There is no artificial substitute for the challenge of getting and holding a job on one's own merits.

In any case, there is little point in trying to make young people more employable unless the economy is generating new jobs for them. This brings up the question of whether the present high unemployment rate among the young is simply the reflection of below-par employment conditions generally or whether it is the result of structural economic changes which have been especially unfavorable to job opportunities for the young and inexperienced.

A look at the unemployment record suggests that the former is the case. The over-all unemployment rate reached its lowest post-war level in the year 1953—2.5 percent. In that year the unemployment rate for teen-age males was 5.8 percent, 2.7 times as great. In 1963, over-all unemployment was 5.7 percent while male teen-age unemployment was 15.5 percent—again a ratio of 2.7 to 1. During all the years in between the proportion stayed practically the same.

This suggests that the best, and probably the only, way to reduce teen-age unemployment is to give the private economy the lift neces-

ary to reduce unemployment at all age levels. The tax cut is a step in this direction but we may have to do more.

Without such an improvement in the general economy, the Administration's plan may turn out to be merely a way of segregating unemployable youths in camps—rather than getting them into the main currents of economic life.



Early Smelt Run Possible This Year

All is quiet along Michigan's smelt-dipping front, but it won't stay that way for long according to the Conservation Department.

In fact, if warm rains come along shortly to go with April's generally mild weather, water temperatures may be raised enough to trigger an early smelt rush in the state's Great Lakes tributaries and small inland streams.

Usually, these tasty little fish start moving up the Lower Peninsula's streams around April 10. Their migrations reach full stride about April 20 in these waters. As a rule, the first major waves of smelt hit Upper Peninsula streams around May 1. Peak runs occur between then and May 10 above the Straits.

Catch records of commercial operators point to no significant shift in the Great Lakes smelt populations. As a result, dip-net fishermen are again expected to take slightly more than one million pounds of these fish during the coming season.

The state's heaviest smelt runs should take place in streams that empty into the northern third of Lake Michigan, including those of the Green Bay region. Streams and cuts draining into Saginaw Bay are other dependable hot spots for action. Good dipping success is also expected farther north in Lake Huron streams and in Lake Michigan tributaries along the southwestern part of the state.

Free lists of Michigan's smelt-dipping waters are available from the Department's Publication Room in Lansing or any of its field offices.

Residents using standard hand nets must have regular \$2 fishing licenses to take smelt upstream from the Great Lakes. Out-of-state fishermen need an ant-

Wild Fire Threat Building Up Through Most of Michigan

Another touchy season for wild fires has erupted throughout the southern two-thirds of Michigan's Lower Peninsula, the Conservation Department reports.

With spring officially less than a week old, forest and grass fires had damaged more than 1,000 acres in this part of the state. More than 340 acres were hit by breakaway blazes during the week ending March 22.

Snow continues to hold down the wild fire threat in the state's northernmost areas. Even there, however, storm warnings are slowly building up as evidenced last week when four acres burned in the Upper Peninsula's Crystal Falls and Escanaba districts.

Landowners are reminded that when and wherever snow is off the ground, fire permits must be obtained from the Department's field offices before burning may begin.

Sheriff's March Report Lists One Fatal Accident

The monthly activity report released this week by the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department for the month of March lists a total of 847 complaints handled; 111 arrests made; 104 warrants closed; 471 civil papers served; 100 traffic violations handled; 144 accidents investigated (71 property damage, 73 personal injury with 125 persons injured and one killed).

The list continues with mention that the department's cars were driven a total of 54,524 miles during March; the Dog Control Division picked up 120 dogs in handling 125 complaints; a total of 6100 meals were served to inmates of the county jail; and the Drivers' License Bureau issued 1,410 licenses (43 duplicates, 208 chauffeur renewals, 945 operator renewals and 164 originals); and License Bureau fees amounted to \$3,797.80.

'Lew' Lehman Is Named Magazine Associate Editor

During his years' tenure in the circulation department, audited paid circulation increased more than 2,000. The Quarter Horse Journal now has more than 33,000 subscribers in 50 states and 18 foreign countries.

In execution of his additional responsibility, sales ring representative, Lehman traveled more than 56,000 miles in the last 12 months to attend Quarter Horse sales in 17 states. Location of these sales ranged from Washington to Florida and from Texas to Ohio.

In his new position, Lehman will devote the majority of his time to continued sales ring representation and to research and preparation of feature articles.

The "Lew Lehman" by-line first appeared in the September, 1959, issue of the Cattleman magazine. Since then he has written additional articles for the Cattleman and has had his work published in the La Hacienda (an agricultural publication for the Spanish speaking countries), The Pacific Coast Quarter Horse and The Quarter Horse Journal.

The Quarter Horse Journal is the official publication of The American Quarter Horse Association, a horse registry organization. Founded 21 years ago, the association now has 30,506 members and has more than 314,000 horses listed in its registry. In 1963 The American Quarter Horse Association registered 41,475 horses and transferred ownership of 47,089.

The Quarter Horse is known for its versatility, speed and quiet disposition. He is equally at home in the show ring, on the ranch or at the race track.

Lehman said it is interesting to note that Quarter Horses competed in 1,000 approved shows in 1963; that since its inception in 1949, the top 10 horses in the National Cutting Horse Association each year have been Quarter Horses.

Lehman said that the richest horse race in the world in reference to dollars per yard (400 yards) is the All-American Futurity for two-year-old Quarter Horses, which is run at Ruidoso Downs, Ruidoso, N.M., each Labor Day week-end. Total purse for the 1963 race exceeded \$200,000.

Lehman, a 1956 graduate of Chelsea High school, was a 1960 honor graduate of Michigan State University. During college he was associated with Phi-Kappa-Tau social fraternity, belonged to the Duck and Bridle Club and was a member of the 1960 livestock judge.

A Charter Night dinner meeting of the newly-formed Central Michigan Chapter of the American Society for Abrasive Methods (ASAM) will be held Monday evening, April 13, at the Holiday Inn, at Jackson. It was announced by Leonard Fortune of Fortuon Industries, Inc., of Chelsea, who was chairman of the organizing committee.

Secretary-treasurer of the new chapter is Clark Chandler of the Universal Vise & Tool Co. of Parma.

Anyone interested in the industrial applications of abrasives covering such operations as grinding, honing, lapping, tumbling, shot blast treatment, glass grinding, etc., is invited to attend the Charter Night meeting. A social hour from 6:30 until 7:30 p.m. will precede the dinner.

The charter for the new Central Michigan Chapter was approved at the National Technical Conference of the ASAM, held March 18-20 at Cleveland, O. The ASAM is the only completely independent technical society devoted entirely to the abrasive industry.

Speaker at the Charter Night program is to be Richard Lane, vice-president of research and development for the MacKlin Co. of Jackson. Lane is a recognized authority in the field of abrasives and ceramics.

Representatives of the sponsoring Western Michigan Chapter, ASAM, located in the Grand Rapids-Muskegon area, will be present to introduce visitors from the Detroit and Saginaw chapters as well as national officers who are expected to attend.

'Civil Liberties' Address Slated By Rep. G. Meader

Representative George Meader will appear April 18, at 2 p.m. in the Ann Arbor High School (small auditorium) to deliver a public address on the subject of "Civil Liberties."

He is appearing under the sponsorship of the Washtenaw County Conservatives. Meader has recently been prominent in his leadership in opposition to the Civil Rights Bill presently before the Senate. In making his views known following his vote against this bill in the House, Meader said:

"It has so many fish hooks in it that it is impossible to support it in its present form. I am hopeful that careful consideration by House members will lead to removal of objectionable features so that I can support its passage. The objectionable features of the Bill have a singular meaning: the take over by the Federal Government of state and local functions of government."

In spelling out his views of what the Civil Rights Act should contain, Representative Meader said the bill should include provisions covering voting, public accommodation, federal financial assistance and making the Civil Rights Commission permanent with expanded authority to investigate vote frauds. Such a Bill also should contain a strong provision to protect the validity of all state laws and municipal ordinances in the field of Civil Rights, Meader further explained.

Representative Meader continued "It has been my aim to shape legislation that clearly would (1) protect the rights to vote from denial or abridgment as secured in the XV Amendment; (2) regulate and protect inter-state transportation of persons; (3) assure that Federal financial assistance will not be employed to perpetuate discrimination by reason of race or color; and (4) prevent discrimination on grounds of race or color in employment by the Federal Government in the execution of contracts let by the Federal Government."

"Congress can and should take action to meet these problems but in taking such action it can not forget even for a moment that equal opportunity is for all, and Congress should not create a tool which usurps the powers and Rights of State and Local Government and the American People."

TIP NAILS SPY

The Pole was identified by sources as Michael Goloniewski who came to the United States in 1961 after reportedly having been in contact with U.S. intelligence agents in Poland since 1958.
