
Turner, who went on to Hawaii after the convention, will show pictures he took there when the club meets next Monday evening in the social center of the Methodist church for a regular meeting.





Methodists Using New Church School Curriculum

Christianity's important doctrines will be introduced to Methodist children at an earlier age than ever before with the introduction of a new children's curriculum available for use in more than 37,000 Methodist church schools across the nation beginning Sept. 6.

Dr. Bullock said the new literature, entitled "Christian Studies for Methodist Children," is founded on one curriculum plan for nursery level through sixth grade and comprises the first phase of an ongoing curriculum development program soon to include all age levels and all aspects of the educational ministry of the Methodist Church.

The Editorial Division, under the guidance of the board's Curriculum Committee and in co-operation with The Methodist Publishing House, has supervised the preparation of 28 all-new publications.

School Board Attempts To Eliminate Confusion

In this article it is the hope of the board of education of the Chelsea School District to help eliminate some of the confusion which surrounded the bond issue voted on July 18.

In all publicity prior to the election it was stated that the levy would be three mills for three years to retire these bonds.

The levy the third year would be less than three mills if tax collected the first two years was 95 percent or better.

"The average cost per thousand of assessed valuation is \$2.80 per mill, or \$3 million multiplied by \$2.80 per thousand of assessed valuation for the three mills required.

An example: Property assessed at \$3,000 multiplied by \$2.80 per thousand would mean an increase of \$840 for the year of the three-year period. It must be remembered that figure is an average. Some townships may be as low as \$100 or as high as \$30,000.

Let's use the example of property assessed at \$3,000 in a don township. According to the accompanying chart we see tax would be an increase of \$22.41 per year.

This is admittedly a confusing subject. The above figures are based on the assessed and not the equalized valuation of the electorate is urged to contact any board member or the superintendent of schools for further information or clarification.





★ Subsidize Babies?

(Guest Column by Donn Wilber)

"A better price for their products—that's the No. 1 problem facing the man on the land." Finding the solution to this problem is not easy. The market and its pricing process is a complicated affair, and unwise action on the part of farmers could destroy their future.

The answer currently favored by a small group of farmers is "withholding" their products from the market—a "declaration of war" on the consumer market—to force prices up through strike tactics. The occasional violence, unfriendly feelings between neighbors, threats, and the bad "public relations" between farmer and consumer, resulting from this type of action, has kept most farmers from taking this route.

Among the farmers who shun these tactics are many who meet in monthly discussion groups throughout the state to talk about common problems and to formulate action to solve these problems. Members of these 1,500 Community Farm Bureau groups were recently asked how they thought the marketing situation could be improved. They came up with some interesting and enlightening answers.

"Our group firmly agrees that the sooner subsidies are removed and supply-and-demand take over, the sooner things will be better for the farmer," was one conclusion.

If the government would stay out and let farmers do the farming, things would eventually level off to the farmer's advantage," was the opinion of others. Less government control, top quality consumer-accepted products, participation in such cooperative associations as Michigan Milk Producers, Michigan Agricultural Marketing Co-operative, Berry and Cherry Growers, Bean Growers, etc.—and a return to the "supply and demand" system, was the consensus of most groups.

The farmers felt these to be the best solutions for a fair income for themselves without sacrificing their best customer—the American housewife—through unfair prices.

With tongue-in-cheek, one group after reviewing how best to improve the farmers' marketing position, came up with this "solution": "Nothing can be done unless farm production is reduced or popula-

tion increased. Perhaps the government should forget about farm progress and subsidize babies instead."







President Johnson has, on several occasions, emphasized his desire to reduce the number of federal employees. There is no doubt of the sincerity of his efforts to that end.

In March, the President notified the Congress . . . that I have established new employment ceilings for most federal agencies well below those contained in my 1965 budget estimate. These reductions will cut total federal civilian employment by 6,526 below the budget estimate for the current fiscal year . . .

Who Pays?

Thus expansion of the public payroll is regarded as a vice in Washington but as a virtue in New York. This is especially puzzling since the national administration and the city administration in New York are generally regarded as sharing a common political philosophy.

The plot gets even thicker when it is discovered that New York expects to finance its expansion of city employment—with funds supplied by the federal government. Moreover, this will be under a recently-enacted bill sponsored by the Johnson Administration—the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, popularly known as the anti-poverty law.

There seems to be some inconsistency in the economics here. The administration has rejected the idea that we can make the country prosperous by hiring federal employees at the taxpayers' expense. But it is providing funds to local governments which they can use to hire people—as a means of fighting poverty.

You make sense out of this.
