Merkel-Wagner Production Arranged To Benefit M. Fox Scholarship Fund

The Merkel-Wagner Travelogue is to be shown at Chelsea High school Saturday evening at 7:30 p.m. when residents will share an eight-day journey of more than 30,000 miles with two local residents.

The special program will benefit the Mabel Fox Memorial Fund which provides scholarships to Chelsea High school graduates. Tickets will be available at the door.

The journey took the pair to 15 countries located in the continents of Africa, Europe and North America.

Fritz is teaching school near Johannesburg this year and Pat is a student at Cleary College. Both earned college credits from their travels.

Their adventures and colored slides of their motorcycle tour will include visits to game reservations, copper and diamond mines and geographical features.

The Chelsea Jaycees are sponsoring the benefit program. Ronald Brannum is program chairman for the evening of travel.

Registration Drive on for Sylvan Voters

All residents of Sylvan township are reminded that they must re-register before May 10 to be eligible to vote in national, state, township or school elections.

The reminder was issued by Sylvan township clerk Daniel Murphy, who, in co-operation with the State of Michigan, sought an order from the Circuit Court in Ann Arbor requiring all residents of Sylvan township to re-register.

The action was taken because of irregularities found in the township registration which had accumulated over a period of years. Murphy reported to the secretary of state that it would be impractical to correct the voting except by a general re-registration.

Circuit Court Judge James R. Breakley, Jr., ordered the re-registration in January and set May 16 as the deadline.

Many voters believe that since they have voted in most elections in the past, they need not re-register. This is a false assumption, Murphy said, and each voter must re-register.

All immigrants are required to bring their citizenship papers with them at the time of registration. Invalids who cannot get out should contact Murphy at his home and he will see to it that they are registered.

Following is a schedule of registration times and places: Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. office on N. Main St. 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday; Sylvan Township Hall, this Saturday only 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and at the Murphy residence at 227 Washington St., evenings.

Teachers, School Board Continue Negotiations

Representatives of the Chelsea Board of Education and representatives of the Chelsea Education Association continued their contract negotiations Monday night in the home economics room of the high school. Both groups agreed on basic ground rules governing their future meetings.

A master contract was presented to the Board representatives by the teachers, outlining salary proposals, fringe benefits and teaching conditions. Negotiations will continue this evening. Teachers salaries, the major cost item, will be the principal area of discussion.

School Board Briefs

A special meeting of the Chelsea Board of Education was called to order Feb. 17 with all members present.

An executive session from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. on disciplinary problems was held with court officers and parents involved.

Payment of bills amounting to \$3,704.08 from the general fund and \$189.60 from the building and site fund was approved.

Approval was given to search for a part-time remedial reading teacher for St. Mary's school in compliance with the law.

Material was presented to the board for study regarding the proposed county's school data processing equipment. It will be determined on March 1 whether this district will participate in the use of the equipment.

The transportation committee recommended the purchase of one 73-passenger bus and two 60-passenger buses for the next school year.

Chelsea Blood Bank Clinic Slated Nov. 1

The date of the next Chelsea Blood Bank Clinic has been set for Tuesday, Nov. 1, 1966.

Announcement of the date came from Mrs. Dudley Holmes, local chairman for the clinic. Mrs. Holmes added that the balance in the "bank" as of Dec. 31, 1965, is 180 pints.

This year, one out of every 80 persons in the United States will have a transfusion, according to information from the American Red Cross. This means that 5 and 6 million pints of blood, or 10 pints a minute, will be needed throughout the country. The use of blood to save human life is one of the world's greatest discoveries; a Red Cross spokesman said, and thousands of people are alive today after serious accidents, illnesses and major operations because of blood transfusions.

W. de St. Aubin, executive director of the Washtenaw County American Red Cross, expressed thanks to Chelsea Blood Bank members for their contributions toward this program.

Chelsea Area Church Members Will Meet at 1 p.m. in Union Service

Church members in Chelsea will join their counterparts across the nation and around the world Feb. 25, in the annual observance of World Day of Prayer. Mrs. William Storey of 216 Jefferson St., chairman of United Church Women's local World Day of Prayer Committee, has invited all interested persons of the Chelsea area to attend this special service in the First Congregational church at 1 p.m.

Now 80 years old, World Day of Prayer is observed in 125 countries and on six continents around the globe. In the United States it is sponsored by United Church Women—the national co-operative fellowship of Protestant and Eastern Orthodox women's agencies, which is a department of the National Council of Churches Division of Christian Unity.

"Observed each year on the first Friday of Lent, World Day of Prayer is truly world-wide in character," Mrs. William Storey said today. "The same order of service, translated into many different languages, is used in all parts of the globe. This provides a unique opportunity for a deep experience of Christian unity in prayer with Christians all over the world."

She pointed out that each year's order of service is designed by an individual or committee in a different country. The 1966 service, based on the international theme "You are my Witnesses" (Isaiah 43:10), was prepared by women of the World Day of Prayer Committee of Scotland.

AGRICULTURE in ACTION

★ The Bottle Battle

To see a farmer who's hopping mad, just pull up behind him on the shoulder of the road when he's stopped to repair a tire slashed by a broken beer bottle.

Farmers have to use highway shoulders a lot in these days of heavy traffic and considering what is to be found on many road edges, they might be safer out in the main stream. Especially with tractor tires costing from \$115 to \$140 and with truck tires around \$175.

Last year more than 18,000 truckloads of bottles, cans and paper were picked up by hand on state highways alone in Michigan at a cost of \$584,000—and an incredible pick-up cost of around 32 cents for each discarded beer can and bottle!

More than most, farmers have to deal with the litter left by unthinking people and from sad experience are quick to tell you that an up-ended bottle bottom is capable of slashing completely through an expensive tire casing. Tractor tires, with their deep tread but comparatively thin casing, are especially vulnerable.

Tired of the foolish and careless way in which bottles are tossed around, farmers have demanded strict enforcement of the anti-litter laws with the suggestion that instead of a fine, the judge may require the offender to pick up roadside litter.

Last fall, delegates to the Michigan Farm Bureau annual meeting took note of the fact that most road litter traces back to the beverage industry, and adopted a policy urging the legislature to require a minimum deposit of five cents on each bottle of beverage sold in Michigan. The idea was to encourage return of the bottles through giving them enough value so that if nothing else, little boys would gather them for spending money.

Doctor from Mexico Tells Kiwanians His Impressions of United States

Juan Salom, M.D. from Tampico, Mexico, told members of the Chelsea Kiwanis club of his experiences and impressions of the United States at the Monday evening meeting at the Congregational United Church of Christ.

Wallace Wood, chairman of the International Affairs Committee, introduced Dr. Salom. Dr. Salom graduated from medical school in Mexico, later attended Temple University in Texas, St. Joseph Hospital in Kansas City, Grace Hospital in Detroit and is now at the University Hospital in Ann Arbor specializing in kidney transplants.

Dr. Salom said that life in the United States was superior to that in Mexico and that United States aid had done great things for Mexico as a whole. He told of increased industry, including oil, that had transformed Tampico on Mexico is generally neutral on Vietnam, according to Dr. Salom.

He spoke of differences in seasons at Tampico, saying that they had spring, fall and winter from Dec. 1 to March 1 and for the next nine months it was full fledged summer with temperatures up to 110 degrees.

Tampico has not been advertised as a tourist attraction up to now but the lovely beaches and the motels that are being built will soon transform the city into a mecca for tourists, Dr. Salom predicted.

He said that when he graduated from medical school they had no need for him in Tampico but he just recently received a letter asking him to come at once. He also said that 50 percent of the Mexican people are under government medical insurance.

President Floyd Fowler presided at the business meeting which was opened with Paul E. Nicholas leading the singing of "America" followed by a prayer by Jerry Beaumont.

The first major piece of legislation to be passed by the Congress and signed into law by the President this year was the "Cold War G. I. Bill." This law provides educational, home loan, and other benefits for veterans who have served in the armed forces since January, 1955, the date on which Korean War benefits expired.

There is little doubt that the benefits provided under the earlier G. I. Bills more than paid for themselves, in the extra tax revenue produced by the increased earnings of veterans who benefited from them. This will undoubtedly be the case with the new law also.

Here is a summary of the benefits to be provided by the new law: Education—A permanent program of educational assistance for individuals serving in the Armed Forces, discharged after Jan. 31, 1955. College-level and below-college-level training in trade, vocational, and technical schools is provided. Part-time training is permitted. Eligibility accrues at the rate of 1 month of training for 1 month of service, not to exceed 36 months. (Persons serving on active duty for training do not accrue eligibility.) The education and training allowances provided are as follows:

Type of Program	No Dependents	One Dependent	Two or more Dependents
Full-time	\$100	\$125	\$150
Three-quarter time	75	95	115
Half time	50	65	75
Co-operative	80	100	120

Fees and tuition are paid for less than half-time training. Education must be completed within eight years from the date of discharge or eight years from the effective date of the act, whichever is later. Training is provided for active-duty members of the Armed Forces who have served at least two years, a portion of which occurred after Jan. 31, 1955. These active-duty members may receive payments for fees and tuition. Administrative provisions of the GI bill for veterans of the Korean conflict and the war orphans' training program are applicable to this proposed program. Schools will be approved by State approval agencies of the various States, and these agencies will be responsible for extending supervision to approved schools.

Guaranteed and Direct Home Loans—Benefits of both the guaranteed and the direct home loans programs are extended to veterans discharged after Jan. 31, 1955. The guarantee of a loan by a private lender in the amount of \$7,500 is extended to this group and, in areas established as direct loan areas where guaranteed financing has not generally been available, a maximum direct loan of \$17,500 is authorized. The Administrator of Veterans' Affairs is authorized to regulate interest rates, consistent with the ceiling established for the Department of Housing and Urban Affairs. A fund is established for the Administrator to offset losses under this program by requiring the veteran to pay 0.05 percent of his loan at closing.

Non-Service-Connected Medical Care—At the present time, veterans serving after Jan. 31, 1955, are eligible for medical care in Veterans' Administration facilities only for service-connected disabilities on the same basis as war veterans. Eligibility for treatment of non-service-connected disabilities is based on availability of a bed and the signing of a statement of inability to pay for treatment elsewhere, as is required of veterans of earlier conflicts.

Preference in Federal Employment—Preference in employment in Federal service is extended to the group of veterans discharged after Jan. 31, 1955, on the same basis as is currently applicable to war veterans. This benefit is not extended to those on active duty for training.

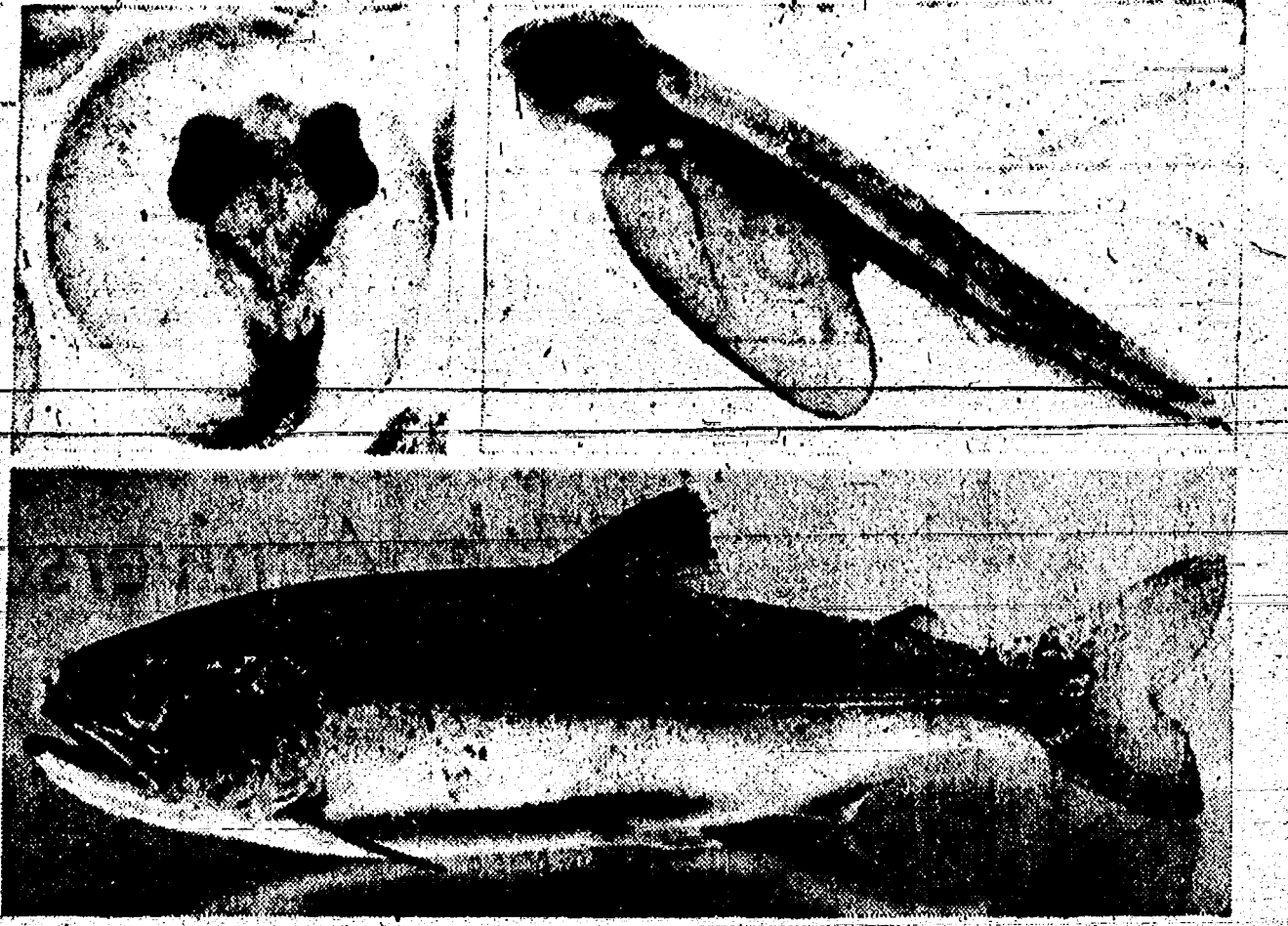

It is among about 750,000 cohos of the same age raised from Oregon and Washington eggs which will be planted this spring to launch the Conservation Department's hoped-for introduction of these fish in the Great Lakes. The fish, most of them 5 to 6 inches, will be released in the Platte River, Benzie county, Bear creek, Manistee county; and the Big Huron river, Baraga county.

REPORT from LANSING
 State Representative

As predicted the first of a series of politically inspired gimmicks by the majority party has been maneuvered to the floor of the House.

Majority Democrats have reintroduced and reported from committee the same poorly conceived disabled veteran tax relief bill which was vetoed by Governor Romney last year. This has been done despite solid Republican approval and ascending veteran and public support for a program worked out by the administration and GOP legislators.

Knowing their proposal is unacceptable, majority Democrats have adopted the strategy of forcing another veto and thus successfully winning veteran support in the November elections. The losers in this scheme will be needy disabled veterans, their widows and Michigan citizens who desire sound programs of relief based on real need.

The Republic program is obviously far superior to the vetoed bill and would eliminate inequities in the existing program as well as these contained or continued in the Democrat version.

The main difference is that Republicans support the concept of providing higher benefits to veterans who made permanent mental and physical sacrifices while serving their country. Democrats want to treat all veterans the same, disabled or non-disabled, at a lower maximum rate.

Features of the GOP proposal include a sliding scale of increased property tax exemptions based on the degree of disability in order to provide meaningful relief to those who need it most. And, unlike the majority party's proposal, it will include those fighting now in Vietnam.

Taxpayers, be they veterans or not, should note that the Republican measure would cost about \$1.5 million less than the vetoed bill, but still provide significant increases in relief.

Despite these and other favorable features, the majority party apparently will insist on their version for strictly political purposes. It is indeed unfortunate that Democrats have chosen the disabled veteran as a political pawn.

If you have any comments on this vital issue, I would be glad to hear from you.

Sound financial policy has once again been tossed to the wind by the Michigan legislature.

The latest example of fiscal irresponsibility came when the majority party decided to settle Governor Romney's budget bills. They said this was a necessary move to get around the Constitution which requires action on the Governor's proposals before embarking on new spending programs.

House Republicans opposed this move and called upon majority Democrats to obey this constitutional mandate for sound financial management. However, the majority party refused to recognize the proven principle that you ought to take care of providing food, clothing and shelter—the essentials—before you buy a new car.

Governor Romney's general fund budget, which took months to prepare, but was given less than an hour of consideration by the legislature, calls for total expenditures of \$944.9 million for fiscal 1966-67. This represents a \$126.6 million increase over 1965-66. Of the increase, the bulk, \$98 million is needed to cover built-in costs resulting mainly from increased population and new programs enacted by the legislature last year.

From the general fund, \$498.2 million or 52.7 percent of the total is for education at all levels. This figure reflects the startling fact that Michigan this year must provide for 17,000 additional college students and a 45,000 pupil increase in elementary and secondary schools.

It is also interesting to note that the Governor's proposed budget provides over \$82 million of additional assistance to local units of government. Some of this "rescue" from the state assuming the costs and some is in the form of direct grants to local units.

Amidst increased spending it is refreshing to note that the Governor's Task Force on Executive Management has produced an estimated annual savings of \$10 million. This, combined with other programs now being developed in each of the 19 new prime departments, should result in greater savings.

Now that the Governor's budget bills have been killed, it is expected they will be reintroduced under majority party sponsorship in substantially the same form. From this point on, however, appears as though majority Democrats will greatly increase their final budget hoping to buy votes in election year.

Governor Romney's proposals allowed for a surplus of \$67 million on June 30, 1967 to provide cushion for meeting pending needs. Substantial increases will result in the total elimination of the surplus and will undoubtedly jeopardize Michigan's future progress.

Cagers Drop 9th Straight Vandercook
 The Bulldogs travelled to Vandercook Lake Tuesday, Feb. 22, and were routed by a defeated V.L. squad, 74-10.

The defeat, a non-conference game, was the Bulldogs' ninth row giving them a record 4-11. Vandercook's record is 14-0. They have won the Cagades Conference title.

Vandercook ran to a 15-0 quarter lead and were headed.

The half-time score read 14-0 in V.L.'s favor.

In the third quarter the Bulldogs matched the Lakers on goals only to see the spread widen the teams widen on shots.

The final quarter was all Vandercook's. Favor as they creased their 16-point lead to final 74 points.

Leading the Chelsea attack Mike Tarasow with 14 points. Parsons followed with eight. Again the Bulldogs played without the services of their lead scorer, Tom Wojcicki, whose injured ankle had not fully healed. Also David Clark, the second leading scorer, was obviously wobbled from the past week's bout with laryngitis.

An African Ambassador to the United Nations titled a speech "The Winds of Change Are Blowing." In it he talked about the deep changes taking place in the African nations and among the African people. For some it was the first time they were aware that the African nations were catching up with a world that thought they were left far behind.

Winds of change blow in other places also. With the recent announcement concerning the way in which Roman Catholics may celebrate Lent, some are beginning to discover the gentle breezes of change there.

An Episcopal Bishop publishes a book in which most people's off-hand belief about the Christian faith is radically challenged. The winds are felt there also.

Large numbers of clergymen from many denominations have been active in Civil Rights and Peace movements because of their commitment to the Christian faith. Here, too, the winds of change blow. Not long ago very few was the number who would take the risk.

Church members, in increasing numbers, are discovering that Christianity is more than a something. They study the Bible and theology and they ask hard questions and they take on hard jobs in inner cities, in slum schools, among Appalachia's poor, India's hungry, Africa's sick, and their own town's indifferent. There, too, the wind of change blows.

The Church isn't out of date. It only looks that way.

THE COUNTRY PULPIT:
Have You Wondered, Too?

"Say, sir, I am confused. There are hundreds of religions and each one claims to be the only true one. How can a man like me discover the truth?"

"Hundreds of religions, you say? That's strange; I've heard of only two."

"Oh, but surely you know there are more."

"Not at all, sir. I admit I have found many shades of difference among those who make up the two groups. However, there are only two main groups. The one group includes all who expect salvation by their doing; the other, all who expect salvation by something being done for them."

"Salvation? Is that the same as religion?"

"No, salvation and religion are very different. Religion cannot save. Religion is what we do for God; salvation is what God does for us."

"Can you explain salvation to me?"

"Certainly. 'Salvation' is one of the most wonderful words in English. It is derived from the word 'save' which is found many times in the Bible:

"By grace are ye SAVED, through faith."—Ephesians 2:8

"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be SAVED."—Acts 16:31

The word 'save' describes the true reason Jesus Christ, God's beloved Son, came into this world. 'The Son of man,' said Jesus, 'is come to seek and to SAVE that which was lost.'"

"Your words are strange to me. Do many people know about this salvation?"

"Millions of people in the world can testify to 'being saved.' They can bear witness to something that has happened to them—a work of divine grace in their lives. They actually have an inner assurance of eternal well-being."

"A man once told me he was saved and I thought he was boasting."

"A truly saved person is not boasting, he is just grateful. It is not conceit when a man believes he is saved. Neither is it humility not to believe it. Because the Bible can be taken seriously and Jesus Christ can be trusted, then we ought to come to the place where we have definite assurance that we are saved through the merits of Christ who died and rose again for us."

"How can we be saved?"

"You can be saved by taking three simple steps, sometimes called the 'ABC Steps of Salvation'—

a. Acknowledge your sin to God.
b. Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ with all your heart.
c. Confess Christ to others.

Romans 10:9-10—If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation."

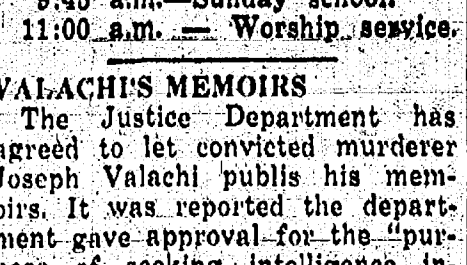

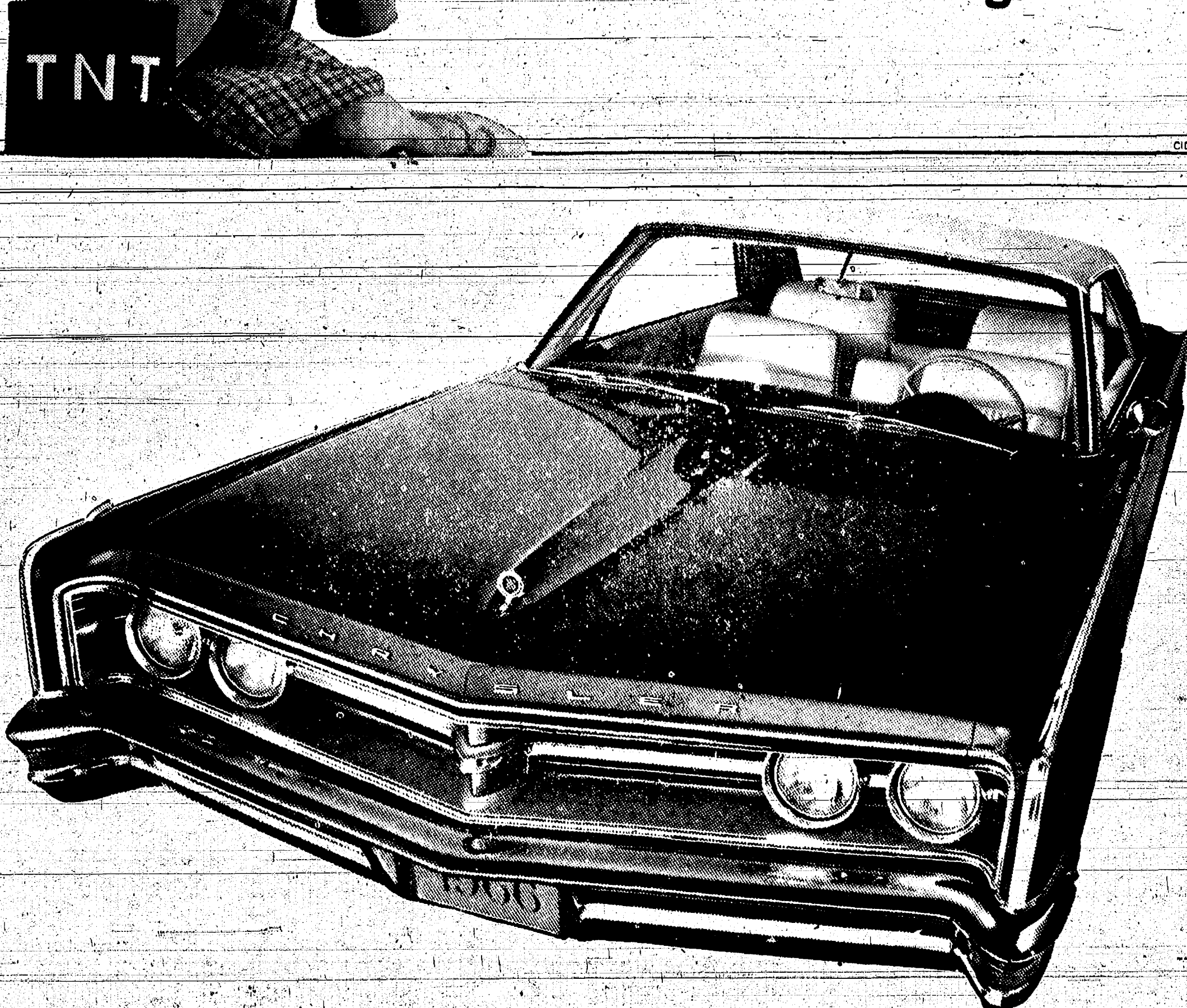

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NEW EXPERIMENTAL CAR: Chrysler has introduced a new research car, the 300X, which offers clues to the future of interior automotive design and driver controls. It is steered with retractable handgrips, instead of a steering wheel. Seats have rubber-diaphragm suspensions, replacing conventional seat springs, and are adjustable with air cells. Key punch cards are used to operate door locks, ignition and radio. There are two TV sets—one to entertain passengers and another to inform the

driver on traffic conditions to the rear of the car. Among the convenience items are push button emptying of ash trays by vacuum action and an audible clock which gives the time by tape-recorded voice. The front passenger seat rotates to a rear facing position. All seats have retractable arm rests and integral safety belts which retract out of sight when not in use. The Chrysler 300X is currently being featured at automobile shows.

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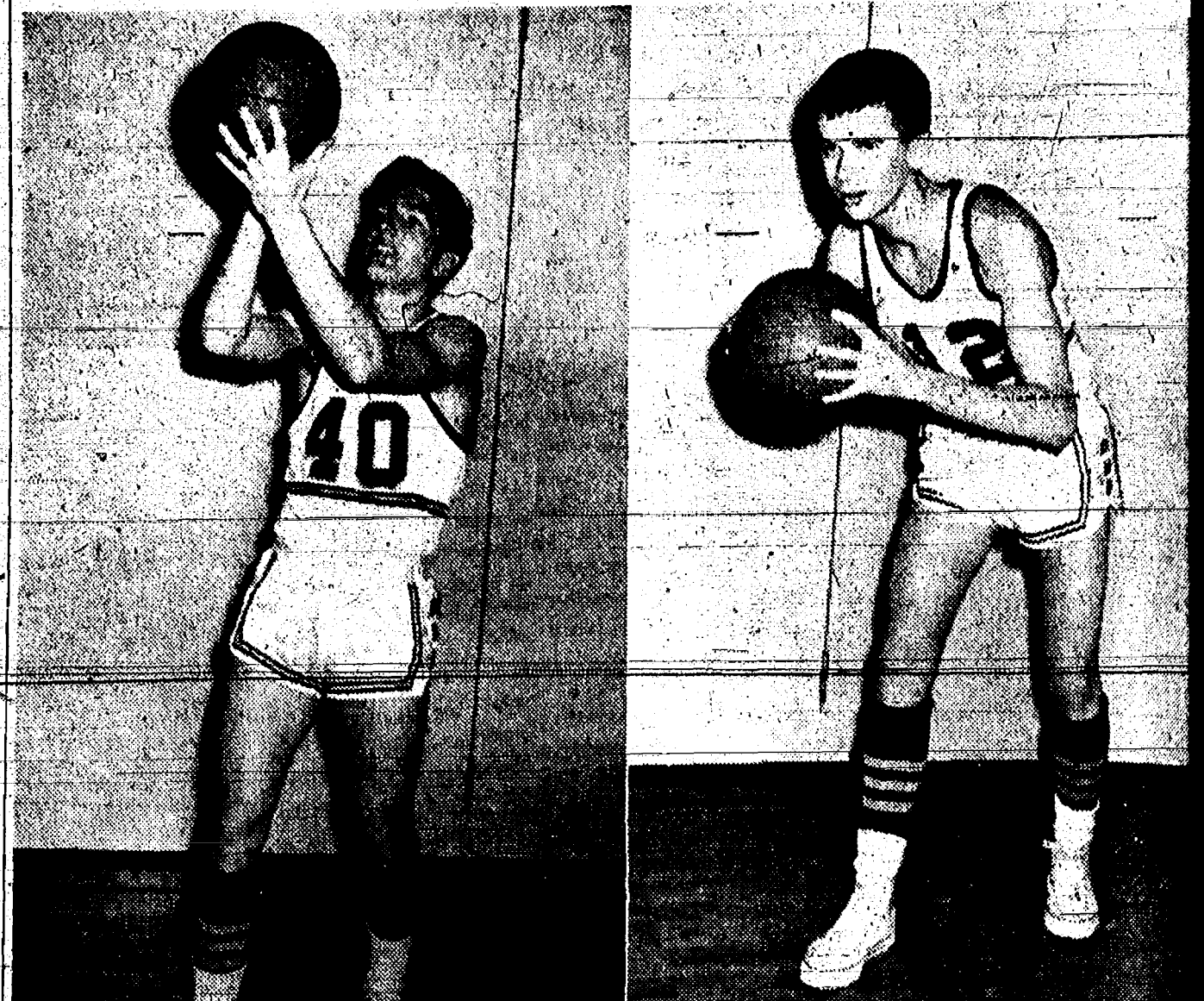

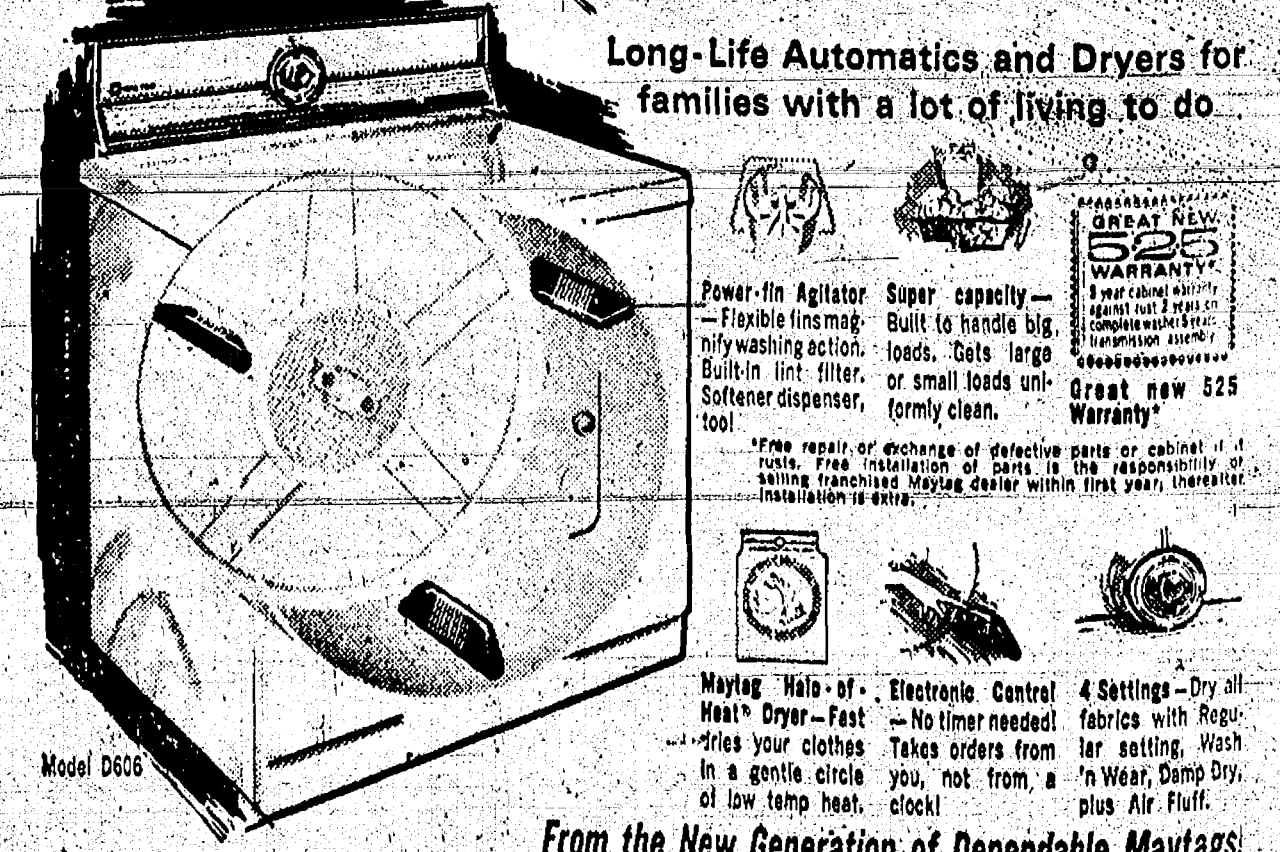
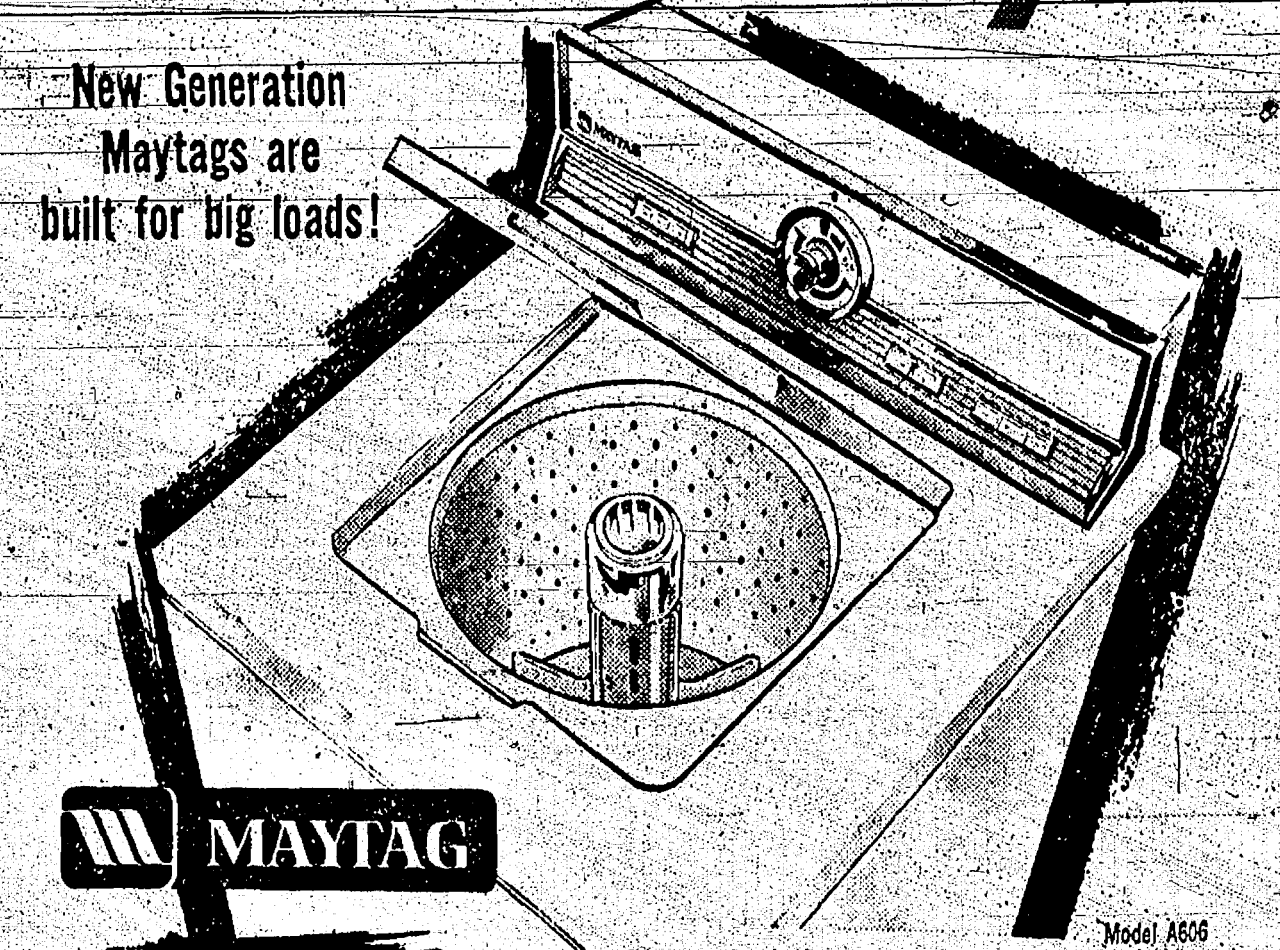
