

St. Mary's Dedicates New Church

Chelsea's newest church, St. Mary's, was dedicated Saturday, Dec. 10, by the Most Rev. John Sheehan, Bishop of Detroit. The ceremony included a blessing of the exterior and interior of the church and the offering of a eucharistic mass, in which Bishop Sheehan, the principal celebrant, was joined by the Rev. Warren Peak, dean of Washtenaw County, and Rev. Francis S. Maliszewski, pastor of St. Mary's parish. The Rev. Zeb assisted the archbishop. The Rev. Zeb was ordained from Chelsea in 1956 and now assigned to a Detroit parish. A homily, or sermon, was given by the Rev. Anthony Kosciuszko, pastor of St. Mary's College, Orchard Lake.

Each of the priests offers mass saying-mass at a separate altar. Two large bouquets of gold and silver flowers were placed in the sanctuary of the church for the dedication ceremonies.

The site of the new church is on Old US-12 East. The 11-acre site has been planned for the addition of a school, convent, rectory, and parking lot. These facilities are now located on Congdon St.

The 700-seat church, designed by the firm of Robert L. Svoboda Associates, was begun on the site after a ground-breaking ceremony was held in April of this year.

Cost of the church is estimated at near \$300,000. General contractor for the project was the R. E. Davis Construction Co. of Ann Arbor.

The building contains more

than 10,000 square feet and rises at the center to a height of 35 feet. The church is shaped in the form of a diamond, with a skylight forming a cross in the ceiling. This cross extends to each point of the diamond. The brick veneer exterior is broken by several contemporary glass windows on four sides. The main entrance is flanked by cut fieldstone. The sanctuary, located at the point of the diamond opposite the main entrance, is floored in travertine and rimmed by a communion rail of Italian Verde marble. The altar, which is centrally located in the sanctuary, is also of Italian marble.

In keeping with the liturgical influence of the recent Second Ecumenical Council, the choir and organ locations and the arrangement of the sanctuary, baptistry and the reredos were planned in accordance with the recent pronouncements.

The interior of the church uses wood extensively. Laminated wood beams support the ceiling, which is also finished in wood. Along the perimeter of the interior 14 Stations of the Cross have been hung. They are original linden wood carvings, designed and hand-carved by a Swiss-Italian sculptor.

Three contemporary mosaics are incorporated in the interior. The central mosaic, above the tabernacle, depicts the resurrection of Christ; the two flanking it are abstract designs.

The baptistry is located near the main entrance and light enters the area through contemporary stained glass windows.

Chelsea's first St. Mary's church was built in 1844 on the site of the present Mt. Calvary cemetery near Chelsea. The second church was built in 1899 on Congdon St. This building was razed in 1901 and the approximately 400 families in the congregation have been using St. Mary's school gymnasium as a meeting place, until the new church was completed.

The Rev. Fr. Maliszewski, pastor of the parish, was ordained 26 years ago by the late Cardinal Mooney. A native of Detroit, Father Maliszewski attended St. Mary's College and seminary at Mount St. Mary in Ohio. He was assistant pastor at Assumption church in Detroit before coming to Chelsea in 1960.



THE CEILING of St. Mary's new church is supported by massive laminated wood beams. The building is in the shape of a diamond, with skylights forming a cross in the roof. The new church seats 700 and does not include extra facilities for education or other activities. The choir and organ locations may be seen to the left and right of the sanctuary. Contemporary stained glass windows are placed along the sides of the church.

The robbery was not discovered until morning by Schumm and owner of the gas station, de-regular police checks.

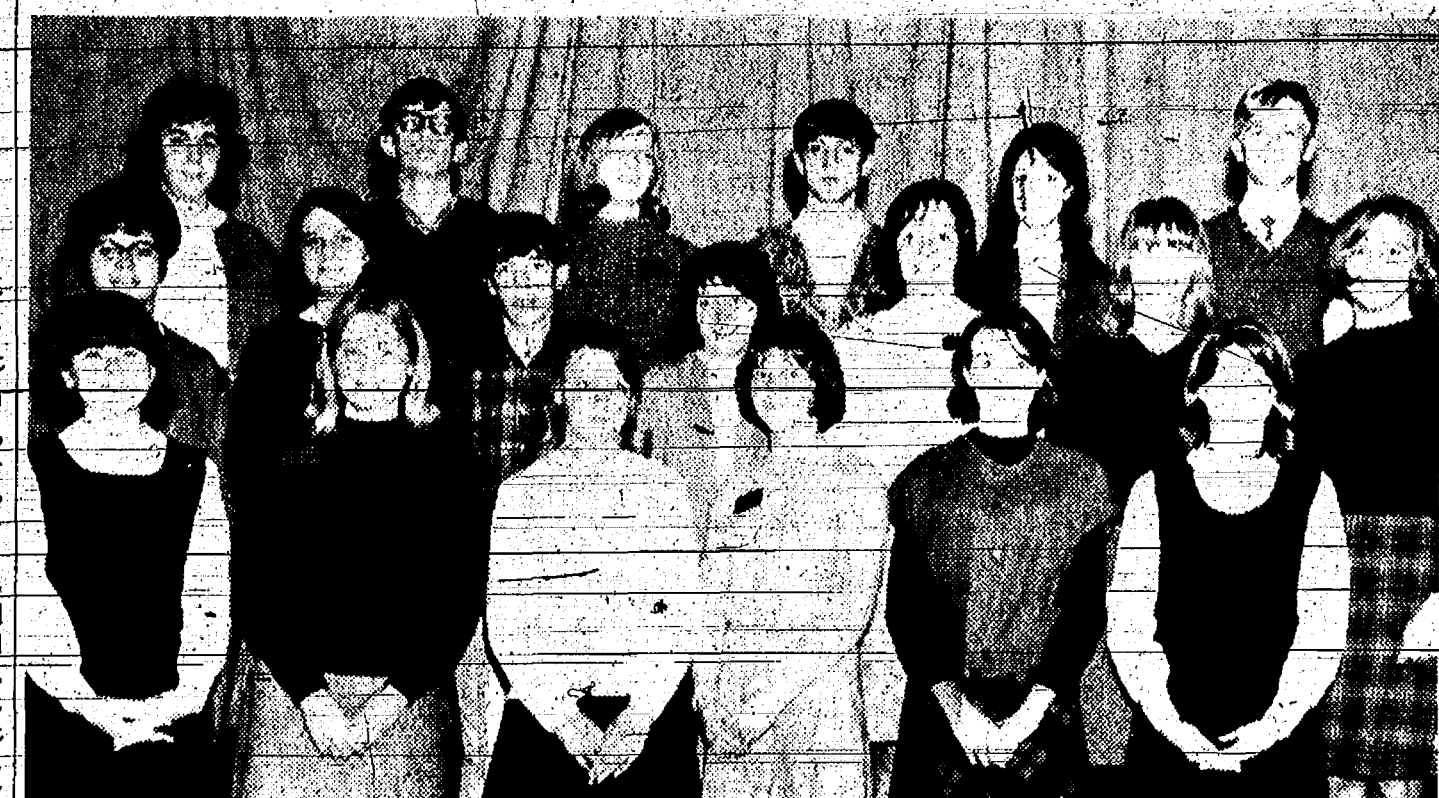
The restaurant owner has asked all persons who have written to his restaurant in the past to contact him as soon as possible.

The seventh and eighth grade Chelsea Junior High school bands will present a Christmas Concert Tuesday, Dec. 20, at 7:30 p.m. in the High school auditorium.

The eighth grade band will begin its section of the program with the Medallion Overture, Jim Wojcicki will be the featured soloist for the second section, "Twilight Dreams." ★ On Highways and Roads, 1966 Session ...

Drag Racing—Public Act 159 makes it unlawful for any person to operate any vehicle on a highway designated parking area for motor vehicles or any other place open to the general public.

1. In a drag race, as defined in the act, a competitor attempts to reach a certain distance in the shortest time possible, or to reach a certain speed in the shortest time possible.

2. In a speed or acceleration contest or for the purpose of making a speed record over a measured or unmeasured distance, whether the vehicles start from a standing start or otherwise.

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Road service vehicles means vehicles clearly and readily recognizable as a vehicle used to assist disabled vehicles.

The Michigan State Police said the reason for allowing vehicles servicing disabled vehicles on limited access highways is to use the emergency vehicle's crossovers.

“Exceptional” School

Squeaking wheels get the grease, it is usually said, but Michigan has been witnessing a case in which one of the most passive groups in society has achieved its goal with a minimum of squeaking.

The Amish people in Hillsdale county, a close-knit group of religiously oriented farmers have been quietly ignoring Michigan's law requiring certified teachers in private schools.

State officials for two years or more have been telling the Amish spokesmen they must either follow the law and hire a qualified teacher or close their small school.

Teaching the dozen-plus Amish children has been a young girl who herself was educated in the sect's tradition. She has no higher education degree and thus cannot qualify for state certification.

After ignoring the state mandates from the Attorney General and the Department of Education, for two years the Amish have now gained a reprieve of still another year.

During the initial period several legislators tried to come to the defense of the Amish in seeking to permit this one school to operate in its own way.

arose because laws specifying the Amish might violate the church-state separation provisions of the U.S. Constitution, and broader legislation might permit anyone to establish their own sub-standard system.

In giving the Amish at least one more year to operate the school, State Board of Education members emphasized this was a special exception to the law and should not be considered as opening the door to compromised standards elsewhere.

Indian Needs

Junketing legislators have frequently been called to task in the press for seemingly unnecessary trips and futile studies which continue for years without result and sometimes without any recommendations.

But one group which has so far escaped criticism is the now non-existent Senate Committee on Michigan Indians. Much was expected of this committee but little beyond its junket has been accomplished.

The study group, headed by Detroit Democrat Charles N. Youngblood, spent part of the summer of 1965 touring the state in five new, borrowed travel trailers, camping at the various Indian reservations in Michigan.

Purpose of the tour was to study living conditions, schooling, job possibilities and general potential for upgrading the life of the Indians.

Indian leaders at the various reservations were also invited to write to or appear at a committee hearing regarding what they considered to be their peoples' problems.

Working with an unlimited expense account authorized by the legislature, the committee gathered a sheaf of letters and notes and had a documentary film made of the study trip.

That is as far as the now defunct committee's work went and there is no written report submitted to the 1966 legislature, and authorization for continued committee study was not sought.

No doubt another legislator will some day decide the Indian situation needs attention and another committee will be formed.

Any judgments gathered by the 1966 study committee will likely go unnoticed since they appear only in the minds of the committee members, rather than in the official legislative files.

Another junket will be required because conditions can change as time passes.

Without any official report from the 1965 committee, its observations will be of little value to any future study in this area.

More Than Money

Loss of Dr. Robert A. Kimmich as head of the State Mental Health Department points up an important lesson for government policy makers: high salaries do not automatically guarantee that qualified people will stay on the job.

Dr. Kimmich was brought here from California about two years ago. At the time, Gov. George Romney gained approval to pay the director of this important department \$35,000 a year.

It was argued that the state must offer cabinet-level salaries, ranging from \$30,000 to \$35,000 if it hoped to attract and keep good men at the head of its major units.

Speed Violations Account for Most Driver Convictions

Lansing—A study of 60,000 traffic violation convictions point to excessive speed as far the largest single type of fraction by Michigan drivers.

In announcing the findings of this computer survey, Secretary of State James M. Hare said violations involving speed accounted two-thirds of the convictions committed during a 60-day study.

Hare said the survey did include any convictions for felonies such as manslaughter, negligent homicide, breaking and entering and other categories any convictions for driving under the influence of alcohol.

A total of 48,918 varying degrees of convictions were cited. Hare, with nearly 22,000 involving excessive speed and violations of the basic speed law. Convicted drivers were convicted of driving too slowly ... failing to drive up to the minimum speed law.

Equipment failures, headed defective mufflers and lights, totaled 5,254, said Hare. And long problems are apparently prevalent among traffic violators. 3,455 infractions meted out for prohibited turns and an added 1,600 for improper turns.

Nearly 1,600 convictions involved "failure to yield" charges.

Have scored as a "growing pain" drivers who do not have "pure carelessness or forgetfulness" centering about general driving. This type of conviction was 1,355, while convictions for not having a license in that session accounted for an additional 669.

This is not taking into consideration the large number of sons who drive on a revoked suspended license or those who violate driving restrictions, said.

The study indicated that convictions were for reckless driving, while 1,142 drivers were convicted for careless driving.

Elementary and High school education is only a part of the total education system in our country that is receiving so much attention in the press, radio and television. Starting this week and attempting to continue for some time, members of the Chelsea Board of Education will present their individual comments on the progress and problems which are part of our school district. Michigan's School Libraries Need 20 Million Books

It would take a team of 100 librarians to handle the books costing \$100 million that Michigan's public libraries up to standards set by the American Library Association (ALA), says a State University librarian.

Writing in the Michigan State Economic Record, Stoddard reports that each week more than 1,000,000 persons use Michigan libraries, borrowing some 600,000 books.

While Michigan's library facilities are average, he says, they fall far behind the standards of the ALA. Some 85 percent of the elementary schools in Michigan do not have central libraries, Stoddard notes, and only 707 of the state's 817 junior and senior high schools have them.

According to 1964 data (the most recent available), library deficiencies also exist at the state's four-year colleges and universities, Stoddard says.

Financial Aid Repaid by Stranded Chicago Youth

The Rev. Warner Siebert, pastor of St. Paul United Church of Christ; Mrs. Louis Ramp, director of Chelsea Social Service; Louis Burghardt, Chelsea Social Service board president, and several business places in Chelsea had a heart-warming experience the past week—they received a letter of thanks from a young Puerto Rican youth they had befriended when he was stranded here on Wednesday of last week. Although the young man had said he would repay the cost of food and gas provided so he could return to his home in Chicago, no one actually expected him to keep his word.

In fact, Mrs. Ramp mentioned that "it would be very unusual" if he did repay since it had seldom happened in her experience with out-of-town transients who had received help.

It all started Wednesday, Nov. 22, when the youth, 18-year-old Hermandino Navarro came to the St. Paul church office where the Rev. Siebert was at work. Saying that his priest had told him that if ever he found himself in trouble anywhere away from home he should go to a church for help, he explained to the pastor that a friend, who has relatives here had talked him into driving to Chelsea and after the "friend" arrived here the "friend" spent all of Hermandino's money and left him hungry and his car with an empty gas tank. He said that for three days he had lived on beans, coffee and an apple and had slept in his car in spite of the cold weather.

Remembering his priest's advice and noting that St. Paul church was nearly empty, he went there to seek help ... and found it.

He said he was willing to work to earn some money and promised to send money as soon as he reached Chicago to repay any aid he received. The pastor told him he might show the walks around the church and in the meantime he would see what he could find out about help for him. (The youth did a fine job of shoveling, incidentally.)

While he shoveled, the pastor contacted Louis Burghardt and Mrs. Ramp and by the time the youth was cleaned, washed and had been arranged for him at Chelsea Restaurant, Poor Service Station had agreed to fill the car with gasoline; Sylvan Hotel offered a room for the night if it was needed; a sack lunch was provided by Stop & Shop supermarket; and he was given four one-dollar bills to buy gas to re-fill the car's tank enroute to Chicago. He left for home at 4 p.m.

The Puerto Rican youth and his parents came to the United States

who helped him when he needed it. In his letter received here Saturday he addressed the pastor as "Dear Father" and wrote that he was very happy to be back home; that his parents were happy to have him safe at home and joined him in thanking "the good Father" for his help; and that he would "try to pray good and serve the Lord as good" as he could. He told the pastor that he didn't want to "fight or steal or get into trouble."

In conclusion he expressed again his thanks for the help he had received here and said that he would continue to "pray to Jesus for the good Father, for the church and for the people."

He said, too, that he hopes to visit Chelsea next summer and bring a friend with him to introduce "to the good Father and to the good people" here who had helped him when he needed help badly. He feels his priest gave him excellent advice when he told him to "go to a church—any Christian church" for help if he ever needed it when he was among strangers.

Dozoky urges all qualified voters to be sure to cast their ballots. Eligibility to vote or hold office as a committeeman is not restricted by reason of race, color, creed or national origin.

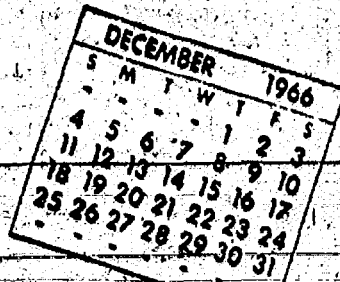

Dies Suddenly Tuesday At Home in Muskegon

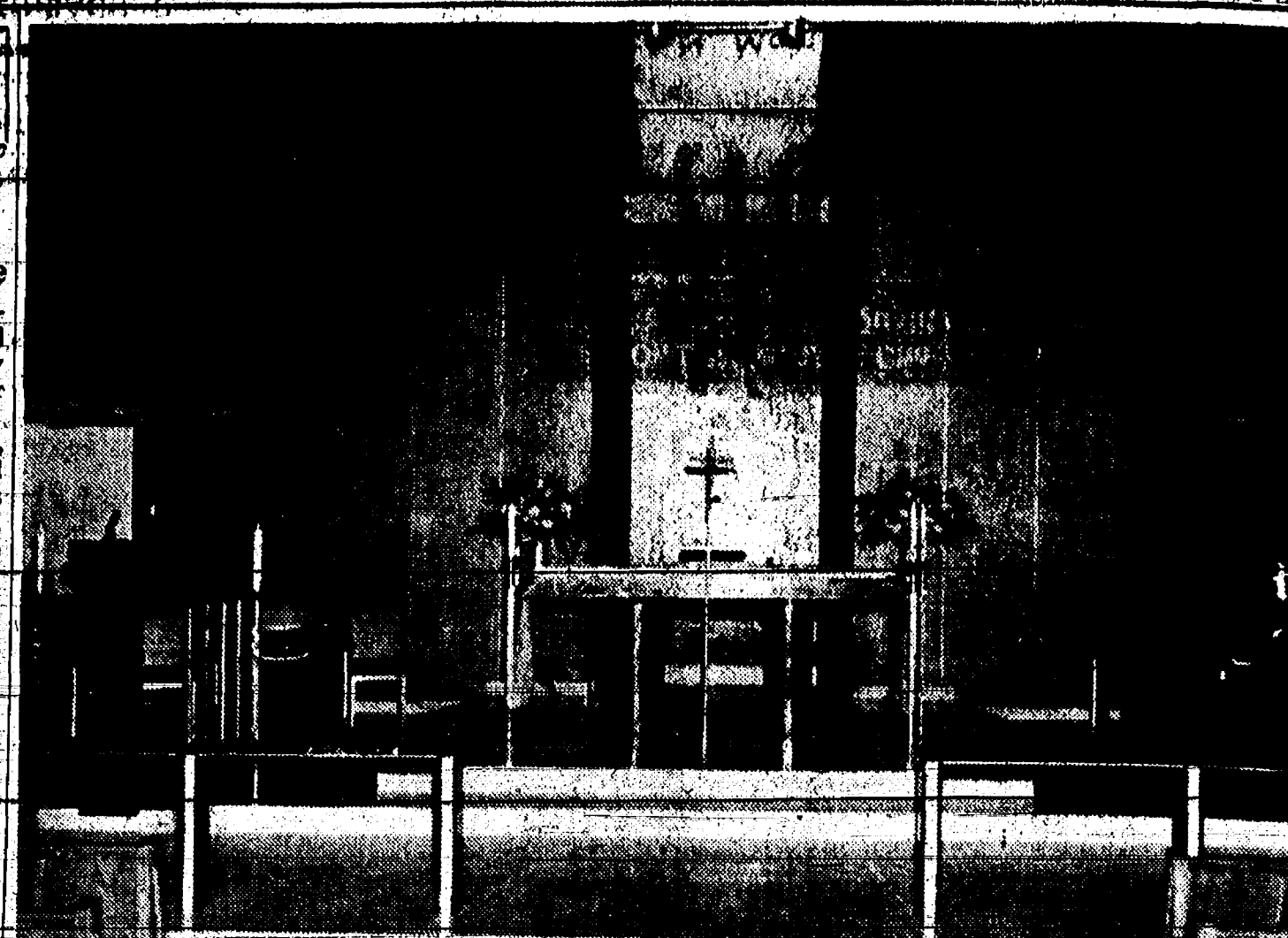

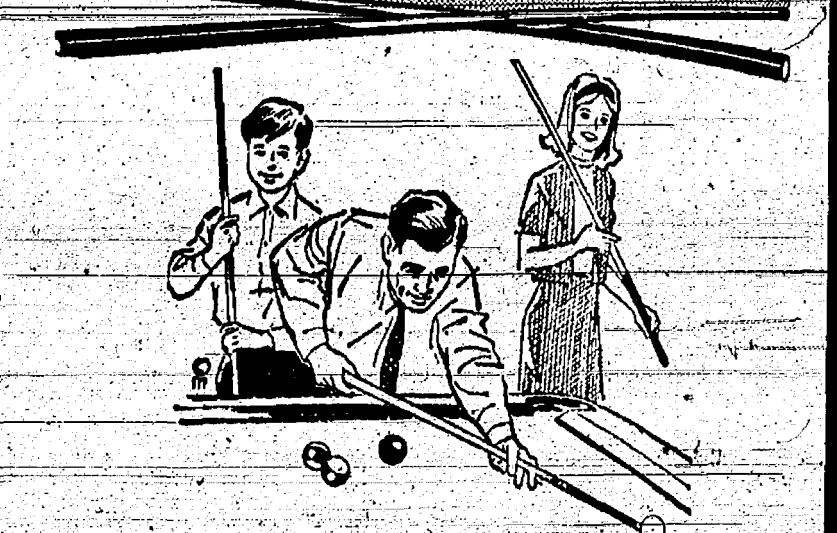
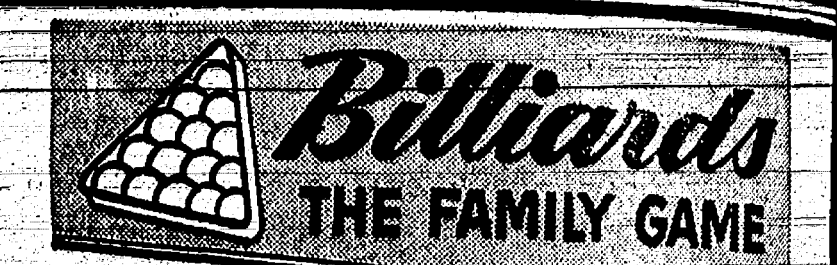
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Aggers Lose to Dundee, 56-55, in Overtime

The volumes presented to Congressman Vivian were DeLoague's "Democracy in America" and Daniel J. Boorstin's "An American Primer."

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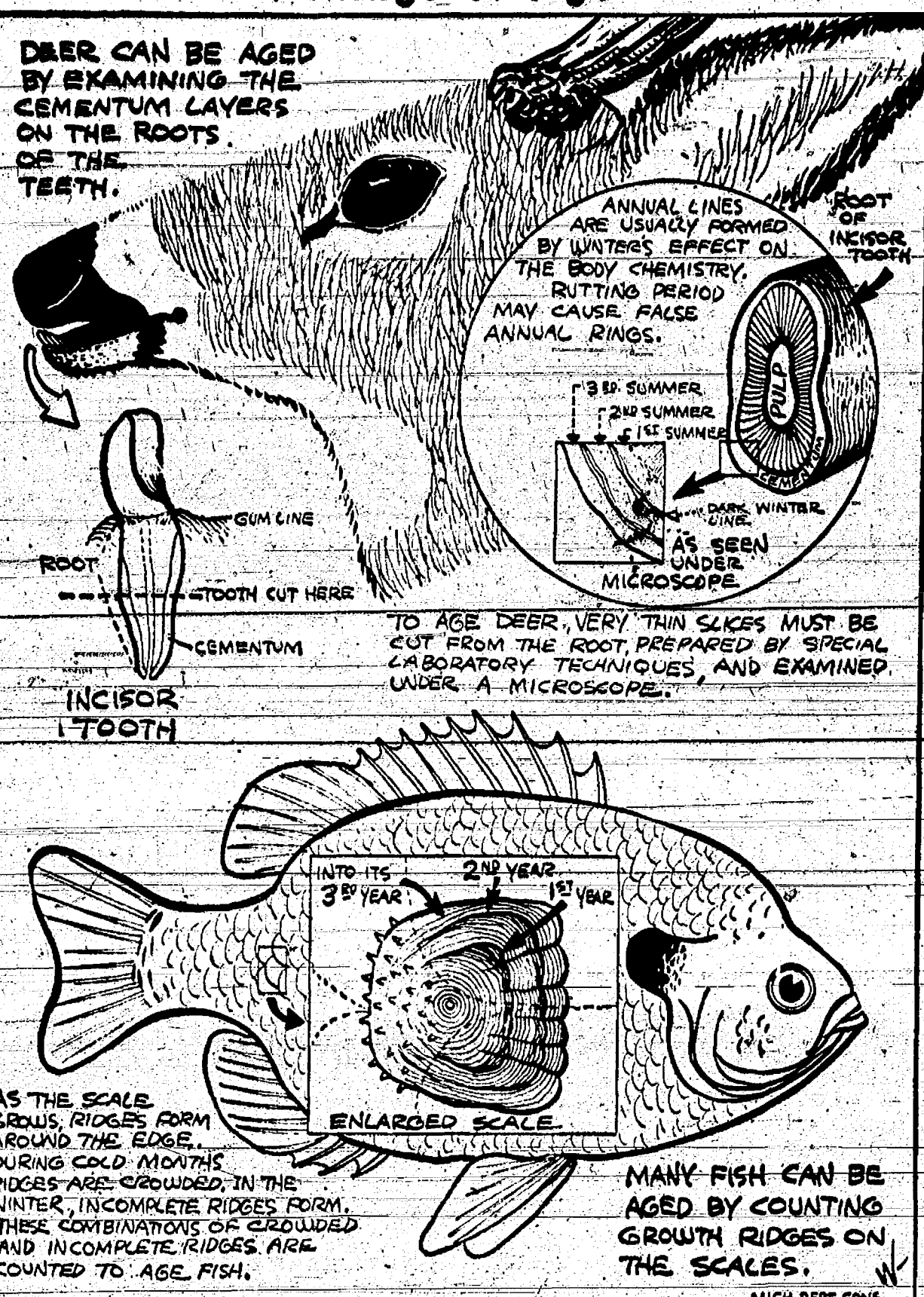

State Health Director Warns of Increasing Carbon Monoxide Dangers

Lansing.—The number of accidental deaths from carbon monoxide poisoning is again growing this year, according to State Health Director Albert E. Heustis.

"These fatalities are tragically useless, and could be avoided with a few common sense precautions," Doctor Heustis observed. "Some 50 deaths from this poisonous agent were reported in the period between July, 1965 and June, 1966. And we can expect to see at least an equal number of victims in the next reported figures."

The deaths resulted from 62 cases of carbon monoxide poisoning, involving 344 people.

"The key to avoiding a dangerous situation is to always be sure to provide adequate ventilation, whether you are in your car, a hunting cabin in the woods, or your garage. As long as a good supply of fresh air is circulating, you're safe," Doctor Heustis said.

Doctor Heustis noted that the main source of carbon monoxide poisoning is automobiles.

"If your car has a defective exhaust system, you're literally gambling with your life," he said. "If the fumes seep back through the fire wall or up through the floor, the occupants may be asphyxiated without even realizing it. This can happen even if the car is out-of-doors and moving. If it is parked, the situation is even worse."

Doctor Heustis advised motorists to have a service station completely check their automobile's exhaust system at least once a year, and keep it in good repair at all times.

"It is also important to never run the car's engine when you are parked—many of the deaths each year are from this simple cause. Couples are found unconscious or dead in automobiles with the ignition on and the gas tank empty."

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Understanding your HEALTH

One of the most ironic things about this joyous holiday season is that many of the very things that make it a traditional celebration create possible health hazards. For instance, did you ever stop to think what could happen if one of those strings of merry lights shorted out and ignited the Christmas tree? It might mean tragedy for you and your family.

The greatest danger that all of those yuletide decorations create is fire. Whether it is caused by a dry tinsel-like Christmas tree or faulty wiring on colored lights, it is something for which you must always be on the alert. I'd like to share a few suggestions with you that could help to make sure that your holidays are the festive time they should be.

Your Christmas tree should be set up well away from the fireplace or any other heating device, and firmly secured so there is no risk of it accidentally being knocked over. The trunk should be sawed off at an angle of at least one inch above the original cut so it will absorb enough water to keep it fresh. The water level in the base should always be above the cut surface. And when the needles begin to fall, it's time to remove the tree—even though the holidays are not quite over. When a tree begins to dry it becomes a serious fire hazard in your home.

When selecting decorations for the tree you should avoid ornaments made of celluloid, cotton, paper or any other flammable material. The safest thing to do is to use non-flammable ornaments made of glass or thin metal, and never under any circumstances, put any lighted candles on the tree.

Another thing to watch for is worn insulation on your display-lighting cords. One of the best investments you can make is to replace old worn and tangled cords with new ones. Trailing cords should be taped to wall baseboards so they will not be pulled by children or tripped over by adults. And be careful that the plug or switch is far enough away from the tree so that sparks will not be able to jump into the needles. It is also best to disconnect the lights before going to bed at night.

When it comes to your outside display lighting, make sure that the lights and cords are all thoroughly weather-proofed. Never use interior lights out-of-doors. The power cord should be overhead where it is well out of the way, and insulated to avoid shorting. Branches that support the cord should be padded so they will not wear the insulation away. And be careful.

NFO Board Okays Milk Holding Plan

A record number of more than 10,000 voting delegates attended the annual convention of the National Farmers Organization (NFO), which ended a two-day session Dec. 8 in Milwaukee, Wis.

Those attending from Washtenaw county included Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hayes, Milan; Mr. and Mrs. Don Mull, Ypsilanti; Mr. and Mrs. Homer Walter, Manchester; Ted Parker, Manchester; Pres. Harold Settles, Saline, and Glenn Rowe, Ypsilanti.

Delegates to the convention authorized the NFO board of directors to immediately initiate steps to prepare for a milk holding action. In commenting on the dairy and holding-action resolution, NFO spokesmen said: "Dairy farmers must decide whether they want to accept more of what they have had in the past or whether they want to unite their strength and establish a fair price for their commodities."

"The NFO has tried every means possible to avoid the use of a holding action in milk, but it is becoming more apparent that dairy buyers and processors are not going to pay farmers an adequate price for dairy products unless producers demand the price and back up the demands with their production."

"Such a holding action must not be built on emotion," President Oren Lee Staley told the delegates. "It must be a simple business approach—farmers putting a price tag on their products. This holding action must be conducted in an atmosphere of calmness. This organization has never advocated or condoned violence," Staley said.

Minimum prices sought by the NFO include \$6.05 per hundredweight for Grade A milk; and \$5.00 per hundredweight for manufactured milk, with added transportation differentials to outlying areas.

An NFO spokesman pointed out that "we have won our battle of recognition from meat and grain processors and buyers," in noting the progress of educating farmers to use their bargaining power.

Addressing the first evening session of the convention were Senator William Proxmire, (D-Wis.) and Congressman Alvin O'Konski, (R-Wis.). Both told the convention that "the American consumer has been subsidized by the American farmer."

NFO president Staley, of Rea, Mo., and vice-president Erhard Pfingsten, Sergeant Bluff, Ia., were re-elected by acclamation.

In acceptance speeches, both stressed that the very future of agriculture depends on the farmer's determination to use their bargaining power in pricing their products. "Collective bargaining means farmers bargaining together and selling together," they said.

Mrs. Rose West of Denver, Colo., originator of "Housewives for Lower Food Prices" told the convention that "we do not put the blame on the farmers." She offered the help of housewives all over the country. "The farmer is being gouged at one end and the consumer is being gouged at the other," she said.

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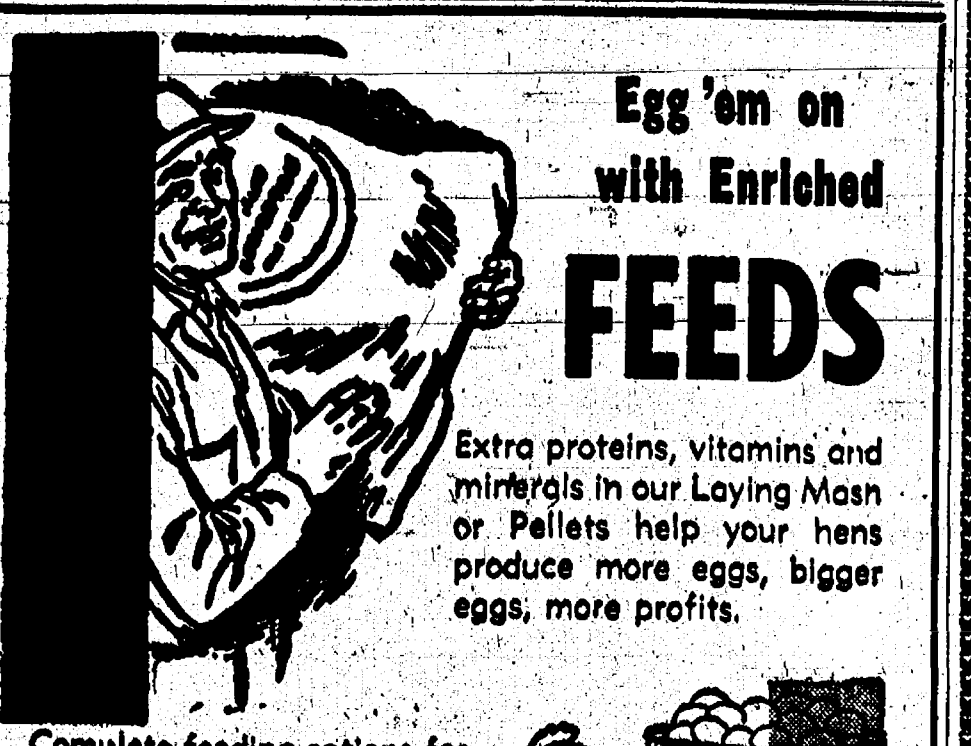
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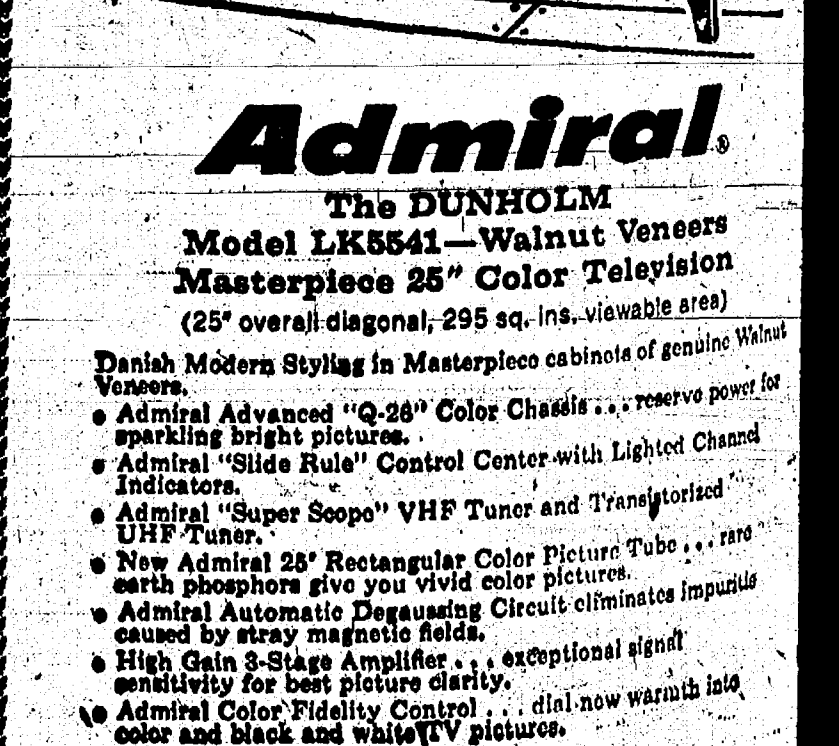

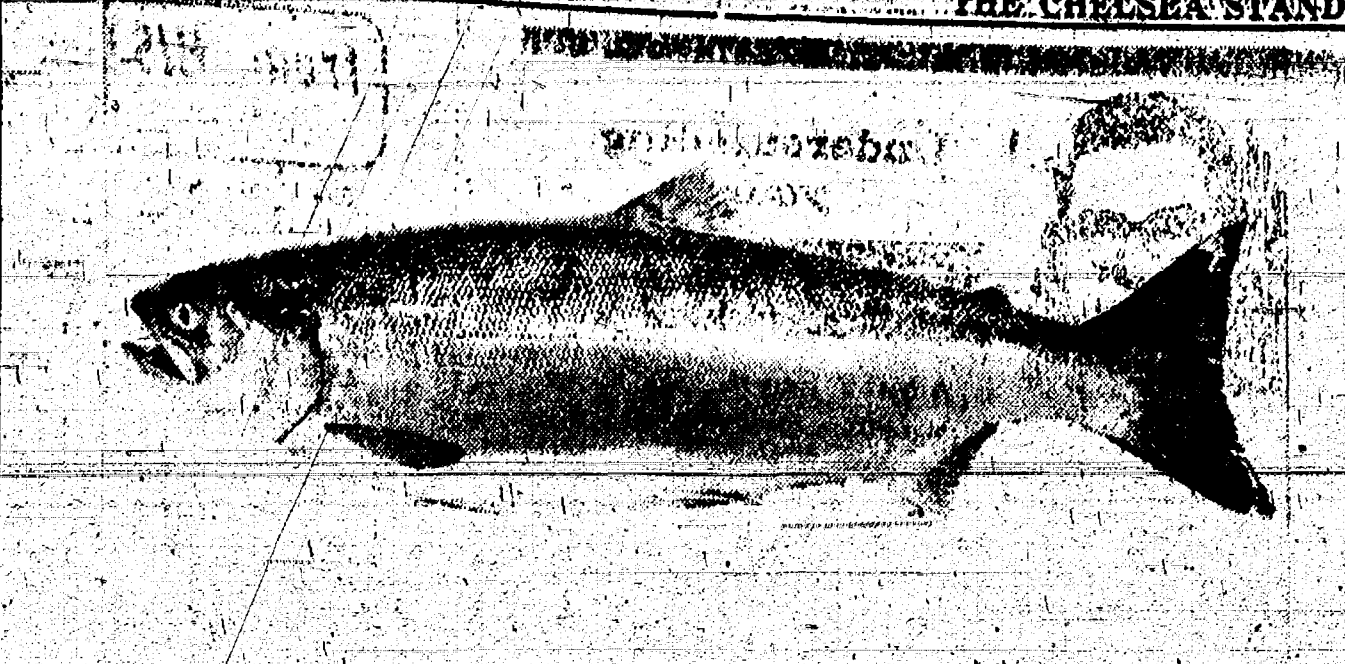
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COMING ATTRACTION: On tap to join Michigan's growing list of sportfishing attractions is the chinook or king salmon. The chinook, a close look-alike to the exciting coho which has already made a big splash in this state, ranks as the most prized salmon catch among sport fishermen in the West. Recently, the State of Washington donated 800,000-900,000 young chinooks to Michigan. From these the Conservation Department hopes to rear 800,000-900,000 young chinooks which will be planted at three to four inches next spring in a Michigan stream yet to be picked. If these new fish thrive as well in the food-rich Great Lakes as the coho, many of them will grow to the 15-40 pound class within their three- to five-year life cycle to provide terrific trophy fishing. And if they grow at the tremendous rate of the coho, a few two-year-olds are expected to return to the planted stream in the fall of 1968. It is hoped that heavier chinooks will occur from the first planting of these fish during the next few years after that. When the time comes, the best way to tell chinooks from coho salmon will be their distinctive black gums; the coho's are white.

Auto Club Begins Campaign Urging Holiday Moderation

The Automobile Club of Michigan announced today it is launching a campaign to urge moderation in drinking during the holidays. The campaign, which will be conducted through the distribution of pamphlets and the use of television and newspaper spots, is aimed at reducing the number of alcohol-related accidents during the holiday season. The club's president, Fred N. Rehm, said that the club has received many reports of accidents involving drivers who had been drinking. He said that the club's goal is to reduce these accidents by encouraging drivers to drink responsibly and to use common sense when driving. The club will be distributing pamphlets to motorists and will be using television and newspaper spots to reach a wider audience. The pamphlets will contain information about the dangers of drinking and driving and will provide tips on how to drink responsibly. The television and newspaper spots will also contain this information and will be aimed at reaching a wider audience. The club's campaign is part of its ongoing efforts to promote safe driving and to reduce the number of accidents on Michigan's roads.

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When drinking, driving still is the most dangerous activity of all, but the Auto Club points to certain inescapable facts. One is that the occasions for social drinking increase over the holidays. That most party-goers depend on their cars for transportation. That alcohol is involved in nearly 50 percent of all traffic fatalities. The Auto Club this year is asking the holiday party-goer to consider himself "First a Friend, Then a Host." It's time we reappraised the role of the host—and the place of social drinking—in our motorized society," Rehm said.

As a host, you don't want your guests to think you're holding back—but, at the same time, you do want to protect their welfare. Should you stop and think before sending them out into traffic with their driving ability seriously impaired as a result of your generosity? he added. To help the host cope with this apparent dilemma, the Triple-A pamphlets contain the following suggestions: Have other beverages available for those who want to make their last drink or two non-alcoholic. Refrain from pressing drinks on a guest who is driving. Respect his wishes and his judgment when he says he's had enough. Consider promoting a car pool or arranging taxi or charter bus transportation for guests. Make a "no drink" rule after a certain hour, or end the party with a meal, after which no alcoholic beverages are served. If a guest drinks, but his wife or a passenger in his car does not, try to encourage the non-drinker to drive home. Don't let the "Spirit of Christmas" extend to the serving of liquor to minors; they are less experienced than adults in the effect of alcohol.

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Highway Dept. Crew Picks Up Little of Everything Along I-94

Lansing — Would you believe nearly 500 cans and bottles were found in a one-mile section of I-94 during a highway litter survey? The State Highway Commission reported today that 489 cans and bottles—and a lot of other things—were picked up by a Highway Department maintenance crew as part of a national litter survey. The survey, taken on a one-mile section of eastbound I-94 between Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti, turned up: 387 cans, 132 bottles, 92 auto parts and accessories, 24 items of clothing including shoes and trousers, 60 miscellaneous items and some lumber. Fifty-nine of the bottles were of the "no-deposit, no-return" variety. Broken bottles were not counted. Last month, the Highway Commission reported that roadside cleanup costs have doubled during the last five years—from \$922,000 in 1960 to \$743,701 during 1965.

Safety Checks Find 1 in 6 Autos Unsafe

More than 7,273 of 45,451 cars and trucks in Michigan were found to be in unsafe driving condition during the 1966 National Vehicle Safety Check, said Gerald W. Shipman, executive secretary of the Michigan State Safety Commission. Vehicle safety checks, projects were conducted throughout the state by public officials, business, civic and safety groups, high school students, car clubs, industrial plants, military installations and other organizations. The voluntary safety checks are held each year as part of the national program sponsored by Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee and Look Magazine, with the co-operation of the Association of State and Provincial Safety Co-ordinators. The Michigan State Safety Commission served as 1966 state co-ordinating unit. Nearly 4.4 million cars and trucks were safely checked this year across the nation, chiefly in those states not requiring periodic motor vehicle inspection by law. More than 4,500 local groups sponsored individual safety-check projects.

Almost a half-million of the vehicles checked nationally were found to have one or more items in unsafe operating condition. Items checked were brakes, front lights, turn signals, rear lights, stop lights, steering, tires, exhaust system, glass, windshield wipers and washers, rearview mirrors and horn. Top level recognition went to two Michigan cities. Tecumseh received the National Award of Excellence and Ellsworth was presented a State Award of Excellence. The Tecumseh Auto Club, a young Detroit group of car fanciers, won the Circle of Safety Award for youth activity in the Safety Check.

Midwest Ski Fans Eagerly Awaiting Michigan Season

Lansing — Record numbers of mid-west ski buffs are ready to flock to Michigan winter resorts during the 1966-67 season, provided the state gets a favorable assist from the weatherman, according to the Michigan Tourist Council. William J. McGraw, Tourist Council director, said that Council field representatives had direct contact with more than 13,000 winter sports enthusiasts at recent mid-west ski and vacation shows in Chicago and Cleveland, an increase of some 30 percent over the same shows last year. "This interest, coupled with early returns from our advertising and publicity programs, indicates continued high interest in Michigan as a winter vacation destination," McGraw said. "With favorable conditions for winter sports activity, we expect that the 1966-67 season will be a good one."

The Tourist Council estimates that some 250,000 persons will spend about \$28 million to ski in Michigan this winter compared to 210,000 persons and \$21.5 million last year. In addition, many more will participate in such other winter vacation activities as hunting, ice fishing and outdoor festivals.

McGraw said that some 80,000 persons attended the Chicago and Cleveland shows, an increase of about 75 percent over last year. Not all of them stopped at the tourist Council booth, but more than 13,000 requested information and obtained copies of the 1966-67 Michigan Winter Sports Map and other state vacation literature.

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ASC Cropland Adjustment Program Now Underway

Earl Dolotzky, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, has announced the 1967 Cropland Adjustment Program (CAP) is well underway in Washtenaw county. The program is directed toward diverting acreages of certain crops in plentiful supply into some long-term conservation or public use. Signup of farmers for next year's program began Nov. 14. CAP adjustment payment rates for designated crops are related to production on the land and the productivity of the acreages put in the program, the chairman said. Payments will be determined by the number of acres diverted and the farm yield per acre. The CAP adjustment rate for corn land in Washtenaw county for 1967 is 51 cents per bushel, and the rate for grain sorghum is 40 cents per bushel. The rates for these two feed grains vary by counties. After placing all of the base acreages of one or more of the above crops or the entire tame hay base in the program (except that a small acreage may be planted to corn or grain sorghum for home use), farmers may include other row-crop and small-grain acreage. Rates for this other cropland in the county—including that for wheat and barley—range from \$6 to \$8 per acre, depending on the productivity of the cropland. Besides the adjustment payments, CAP participants also are eligible for conservation cost-sharing on land put under the program. CAP agreements cover 5 to 10 years.
