Prosecutor Urges Public Co-operation

Washtenaw County Prosecuting Attorney, William F. Dehley, spoke on "Sin, Sex and Syndicated Crime," at the Monday evening meeting of Kiwanis of Chelsea. Dehley stated that his office is responsible for prosecuting violations of laws ranging from lottery and bingo to murder and rape.

He indicated that state law prohibits lotteries and bingo and that his office accepts a strict interpretation of the enforcement of all the laws. Often prizes in lotteries and bingo come from stolen property, making a seemingly minor offense a serious one, Dehley said.

In speaking about sexual offenses cases, Dehley urged the victims of sexual offenses to testify in court. He said that parents who refuse to allow their children to testify in sexual offense cases prevent the possible treatment or correction of the offender. He appealed for public co-operation in identifying possible sexual offenses in the community.

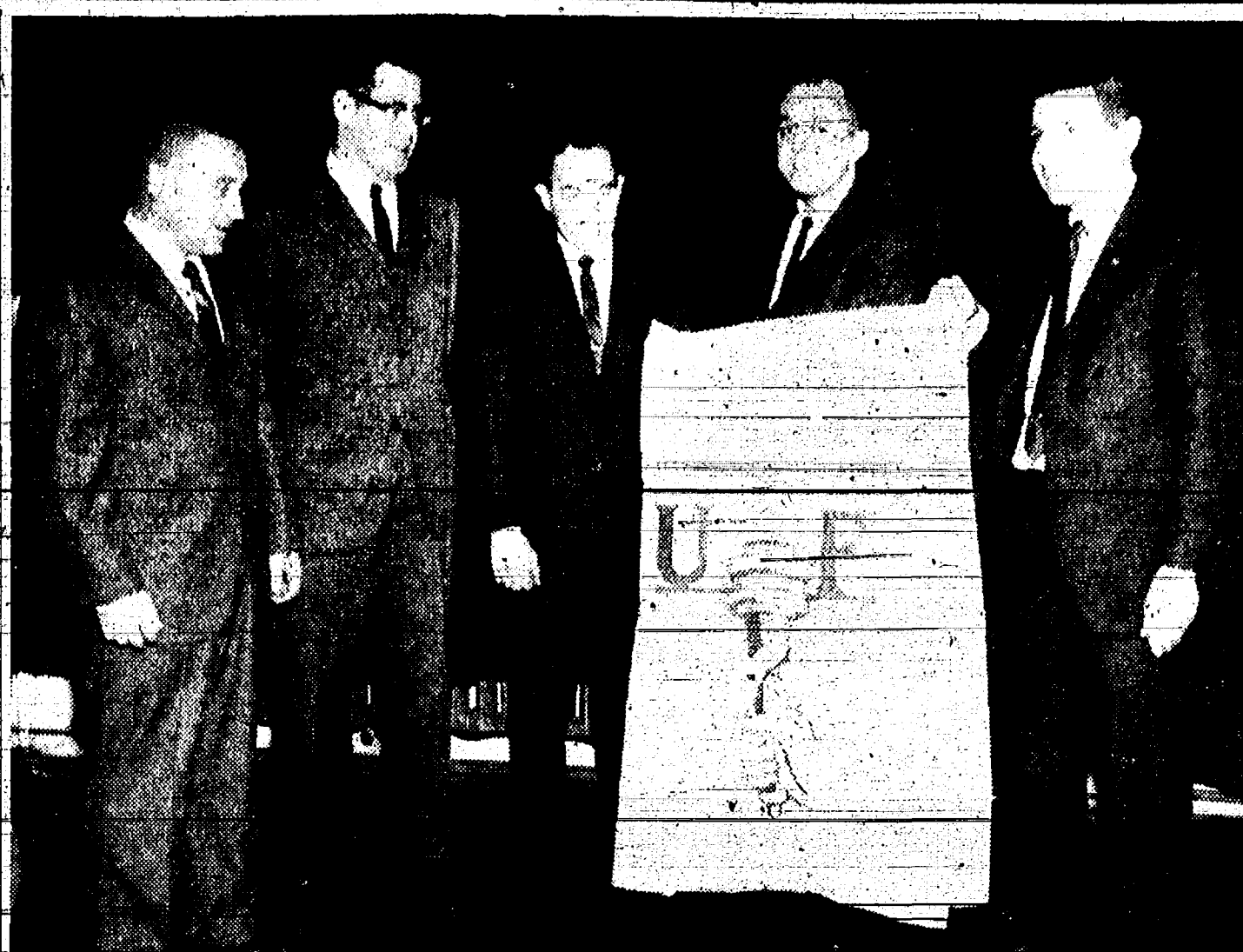

New Base May Be Set for Feed Grain Program

A feed grain base may be established under the 1967 Feed Grain Program for farms which did not plant feed grains in 1959 and/or 1960 that meet eligibility requirements, Mrs. Carolyn Stump of the Washtenaw County ASCS Office announced today.

Interested producers should contact the county ASCS office not later than Feb. 28 and file an application, Mrs. Stump said.

To be eligible for a new feed grain base, Mrs. Stump said the operator must expect to receive 50 percent or more of his livelihood in the current year from the production of agricultural commodities on the farm; must have had at least two years experience in the production of feed grains in the last five years; must have adequate equipment for the production of feed grains; the land must be suitable for the production of feed grains; and neither the owner nor the operator may have an interest in any other farm for which a feed grain base has been established.

A farm for which a new feed grain base is established may qualify for price support payments and price support loans. They are not eligible for any diversion payment. They must divert the minimum to be eligible for price support loans or purchases.

Farmers' Week Scheduled At MSU Starting Jan. 30

Fewer Michigan farmers, each tilling more acreage and handling larger herds with less hired labor, face bigger jobs in meeting the 1967 Farmers' Week theme of "Food for a Hungry World."

The annual Michigan State University mid-winter educational event is scheduled for the week of Jan. 30, at East Lansing.

Programs packed with facts to help the farmers and agribusiness leaders of Michigan meet these challenges are programmed for the five-day meeting.

Here is a thumbnail sketch of the program:

Monday (Jan. 30)—Traditional Dairy Day: Breed association meetings and luncheons with dairy banquet for all visitors in evening.

"Dairy Research in Action" will be shown at the research and teaching dairy center with regular buses running from Anthony Hall to the dairy farm this day and throughout the week.

Tuesday (Jan. 31)—Morning and afternoon sessions by all major departments including home economics and youth programs, emphasizing four modern agriculture: beef, cattle, broad association, sugar beet day; fresh market vegetable production; Christmas tree growing; crop producers session; open covered or warm dairy housing; estate planning and retirement; and insect problems. Michigan tree growers banquet in evening.

The featured luncheon will be in connection with sugar beet day at Kellogg Center where distinguished service to agriculture awards will be presented three outstanding Michigan farmers. They are: Frank Heim, Jackson dairyman; O. E. Heikner, Traverse City fruit grower; and R. W. Petersen, Lakeview dairyman and potato grower.

Wednesday (Feb. 1)—Morning

and afternoon sessions by all major departments including: growing quality fruit; water use and supply; group action in milk marketing; top yields of soybeans and small grains; shooting preserve management; lookout for labor; profit with sheep; growing top yields of corn silage and mushroom production.

Essentials of Good Dental Health

This is the first in a series of articles on dental health published by The Chelsea Standard, in co-operation with the Washtenaw District Dental Society, Dr. Glen Cox, president, National Children's Dental Health week will be observed Feb. 5-11.

Ever since the low-calorie soft drinks came out on the market, I have been drinking them and so has the rest of my family. Can you tell me if this type of drink is harmful to my children's teeth?

Because the low-calorie soft drinks have an artificial sweetener in them, they are not particularly harmful to the teeth. We know that sugar is one of the main causes of decay. Because sugar is eliminated in these drinks, the main reason for decay is also eliminated.

Additionally, the low-calorie cola-type of drink contains phosphoric acid. It has been found that this type of acid increases the amount of saliva in the mouth which, in turn, tends to protect the teeth from acid attacks by bacteria.

In fact, from a dental point of view, I would recommend low-calorie rather than the regular type of soft drinks.

Is there any kind of cure for tooth decay? What causes the tooth to decay?

As I mentioned in the preceding answer, sugar, or carbohydrates, are the chief factors in the development of carie (decay). We know that the carbohydrates are converted into acids by bacteria which are normally present in the mouth. These acids will attack the teeth, eventually making them decay.

While there is no known cure for decay, there are several preventives. The drinking of fluoridated water builds resistance into the teeth to make them less susceptible to attacks by acids. In cases where children have drunk fluoridated water since birth, the decay rate is reduced by about 60 percent.

In addition, the three basic rules of oral hygiene are excellent preventives. Let me list them for you.

Rule 1: Brush your teeth after eating, including snacks. Since we know that the bacteria-acid attacks on teeth are most intense within 30 minutes after eating, the

best time to brush your teeth is teeth and treat the cavities immediately after meals. promptly before they become so deep that the teeth have to be extracted.

Rule 2: Cut down on sweets. If you observe these three rules carefully and if you have a flour to keep sugar consumption at the lowest possible level, your children can have healthy checkups. Your dentist can watch for any beginning of decay in the

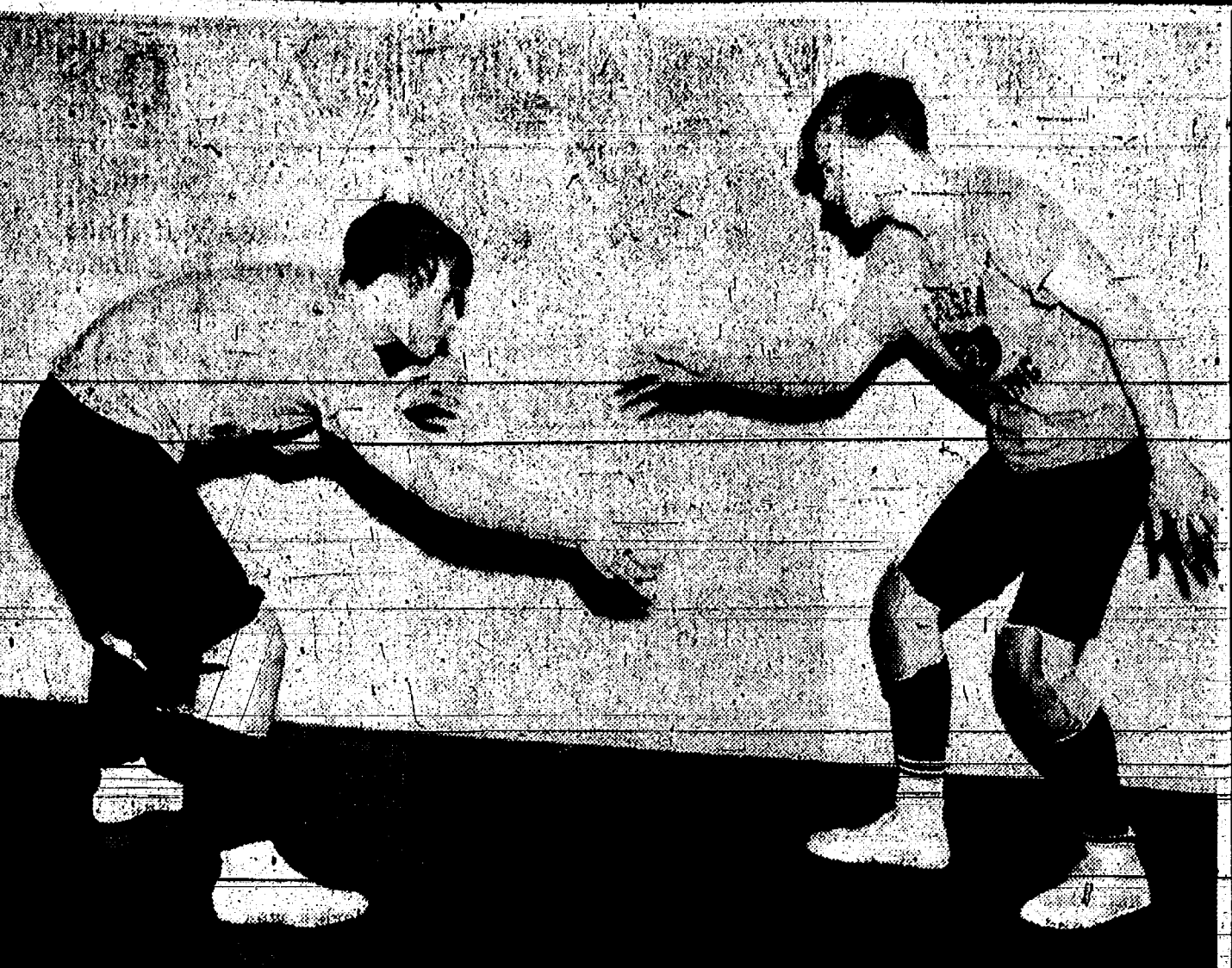

OUTDOORS with GORDIE

One of the strangest fellows in the whole outdoors is the ice shanty fisherman.

Who else would climb out of a nice warm bed long before dawn in order to walk across the frozen surface of a lake into the fangs of a screaming wind, just to spend the day sitting in a little house that almost perfectly resembles the structure which indoor plumbing is supposed to have replaced?

When not tinkering with a contrary stove to keep it burning, he can be found hunched over in a half-trance, looking through a hole in the floor at a square of green water.

After staring at that spot for hours, he is so started when a fish finally does come into view that he is nearly petrified. If he happens to be spearing, he usually does one of two things at that point.

Either he will recover long enough to kick his spear down the hole or will grab the shaft and hurl it mightily.

In either case, the fish generally escapes and the spear, the times of which have been lovingly honed to razor sharpness, will curl up like a home permanent against the only rock in that section of the lake.

To relax, the fisherman stands up and hangs his head on the low roof. At the same time, he nudges a quart bottle of coffee over the edge of the spearing hole and watches dumbly as it settles serenely to bottom.

Fishing for it with a treble hook produces nothing, except that his cigarettes slide out of his shirt pocket when he bends over. Ever alert, he dives for the pack and scoops it out, getting wet only to the elbow and soaking his new wrist watch.

The oil burner now flickers out and the fisherman spills half of his spare fuel supply down the hole as he tries to fill the tank. This clouds the spearing hole so he can't see anything under the surface.

He can't light the fire again because his matches got wet with his cigarettes, so shaking with cold, he heads for home.

Is he discouraged? Don't be silly. Stop at his shanty tomorrow and you will find him right in there trying again.

Our present decade will be described in history as days of a phase and phrase that God had tied. One wonders how his torians will record the hysteria, the claims and counter claims that followed His bizarre obituary. One wonders how his torians will record the saddest aspect of it all; how churchmen themselves set out to detail new theological theories due to His alleged death.

Time will tell. But in the meantime, all of us should be thankful an OVERWHELMING majority of churchmen and laymen knew the obituary was a mistake. God — The Supreme Being, The Creator and Ruler of the Universe, All Knowing, Infinite and Ever Present — IS NOT DEAD! School Board Member Urges State Fiscal Reform Action

Did you attend the band concert Sunday, Jan. 22? Those not in attendance certainly missed one of the highlights of the year. The performance was outstanding, to say nothing of the excellent direction. The instrumental music program is one of many phases in the curriculum offered with a well-qualified staff to conduct these activities.

This is the children's education, but there is something neglected... adult education for taxpayers. In the next few months the budget committee will be putting together the 1968 budget. This will entail many long hours cutting this item to give additional credit to that item exactly as we do in our own homes.

For example, we might feel a certain number of buses are absolutely necessary (60, percent of the enrollment is rural) but when the total budget is converted to millage, it may not be approved.

This example is used because it is one of the larger items on the budget. Where does the cutting begin? A bus costs approximately \$7,000, therefore, one bus might be dropped from the budget. However, costly repairs will be put into an old bus, but there will be one-quarter of a mill less on the budget. This scene is repeated many times over in other areas of the budget.

Supposing the budget is completed, it will then be presented to the taxpayers. Resistance to the proposed millage is experienced several times due to excessive taxation in certain areas. Last year, final passage occurred late in the year making it difficult for the administrators to hire needed personnel. This was last year!

This year, fiscal reform is beginning to simmer in Lansing. If you feel your taxes are too high, yet wish to enjoy the benefits of one of the better schools in the state, be sure to write your congressman. Express to him your wish for immediate fiscal reform and emphasize that some generous portion of this new revenue be earmarked for school purposes. He needs your support and an expression of your wishes, as does your school board.

Let's hope that each of you will in some way communicate with your congressman immediately and bring this legislative simmer to a boil!

Three Michigan farm leaders will be honored by Michigan State University for "Distinguished Service to Agriculture."

To receive citations at the 1967 Farmers' Week on Jan. 31 at a special luncheon program on the MSU campus are: Frank Helm, RFD 5, Jackson; O. E. Herkner, Traverse City, and R. W. Petersen, Lakeview.

This is the 14th year MSU has honored men who have made single contributions to Michigan's agricultural progress.

Helm is a Jackson county dairyman who served for many years as president of the Michigan Animal Breeders' Co-operative. He has been a member of the Michigan Extension Advisory Council for the past 10 years and currently serves on the executive committee of the state Agricultural Council for the Extension Service. He has been active in the Michigan Agricultural Conference and has received the MSU Distinguished of the Year award.

Traverse City fruit grower O. E. Herkner has long been actively identified with the state's cherry industry. A progressive grower who is quick to adopt new production practices, he is a past chairman of the Michigan Cherry Commission. Herkner also has served as president of the Michigan Association of Cherry Producers, National Red Cherry Institute and National Cherry Growers' Council.

Long active in soil conservation circles, R. W. Petersen of Montcalm county is a former president of the Michigan Association of Soil Conservation Districts and the National Council of SCD's. He currently operates a 500-acre dairy farm near Lakeview and for 19 years was a successful farm equipment dealer in his community. He also grows potatoes commercially.

Michigan Leads
Nation in Dry
Beans, Cherries

Michigan was the nation's leading producer of dry beans and cherries in 1966 in spite of early frost and dry weather which reduced yields, according to Director B. Dale Ball of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Dry bean production of 811 million pounds in Michigan compared 40 percent of the national crop. This was 31 percent larger than Michigan's 1965 crop. Director Ball said. Year-end state and federal crop-reporting figures reveal that of navy pea beans, Michigan produced 99 percent of the nation's 1966 total. Yet Michigan bean production per acre in 1966 was down slightly from the five-year average, due mainly to dry weather.

Michigan cherry growers harvested 109 million pounds of tart cherries for 61 percent of the nation's crop. Pennsylvania was second with a 17 million pound crop. With unusually heavy spring frost lowering sweet cherry production, Michigan produced 34 million pounds of sweets to rank behind Oregon, California and Washington. But in total cherry production, sweet and tart combined, Michigan far outstripped all other states.

Michigan's outstanding production of beans, cherries and other agricultural commodities has stimulated interest in developing overseas markets, according to Director Ball. A department agricultural marketing specialist displayed Michigan crops to European buyers in the fall of 1966, with costs borne by agricultural groups.

AGRICULTURE in Action

by M. L. Wood

★ Curbing India's Sacred Cows...

"Uniformity is not a prerequisite of unity—diversity does not necessarily mean division." Speaking was a thoughtful student from India, a young man who had just witnessed first-hand some of the great diversity that is America, and who had found that within this diversity lies a secret of national strength.

The student, and about 60 others like him, had just participated in the annual "Adventure in World Understanding," a program in international relations which each year places impressionable young foreign men and women on Michigan farms and in Michigan factories during the mid-winter holiday season.

Each student has a farm host and a city host—and between the two widely differing types of family living, they gain a better impression of this country than is probable during many years of formal study here.

Local sponsors include Michigan farmers through the Women's Committee of the Michigan Farm Bureau, and it is on the farms of our state that most of the students gain their more durable impressions.

The Indian student, for example, had a first-hand look at how Michigan dairy farmers treat their cows. Without becoming involved in deep theological arguments about why the cow is considered sacred in India (dating back to Lord Krishna, the "divine cowherd" of Hindu mythology)—he learned that the American farmer honors the cow only to the extent she is an economical producer in his herd.

Back in India, such students may well move into positions of official influence, and help others realize that the sacred cow population (estimated at 65,000,000) must be curbed.

The farmers learn, too. They learn how to effectively communicate with people of other cultures and backgrounds. Most important of all, farmer and student begin to see themselves as products of their own cultures and as part of a larger world. Perspective is gained on common world problems.

It is always comforting to discover that others have troubles similar to your own! It is remarkable, but true, that most individuals who inherit money think that nature has set them apart from the common herd.

SUNDAY'S SERMON

FRIENDSHIP

On what foundation do you build a friendship? Does friendship wane when someone disagrees with you?

Many of us consider a friend someone who, like the same things we do, who belongs to the same organizations, and who, as the saying goes, "our kind of people."

Within the structure of a true friendship, there should be room for a difference of opinion. Friendship does not require the subjection of honesty and conscience.

Do you disagree with a friend when you know that he is wrong in an adopted course or attitude? You should. In return, you should give some credit and consideration to his ideas and opinions and not become upset merely because they differ from yours.

Count your friends and you may find some indication therein of the measure of your own character. It is not enough to count "best friends" and then count "good friends" and "just friends." These are categories within your own mind and you can never be sure you are placing a friend in the category he would place himself.

You might take another approach. Count the people you believe look upon you as a friend. If you do this honestly, you will have another measure of your own character.

Just A Minute...

Things get so you can't talk about them, sometimes. At the present it seems we have gotten that way about several topics of late. Comedians will tell you that certain themes are forbidden to them now. No racial jokes may be told, nor any that reflect on a minority, nor any that mention a religion, nor any that might seem critical to a politician.

We aren't too much bothered by what the comedian can't talk about. We aren't even too much bothered by what we can't talk about. For instance, we can't talk very sensibly about the racial question in this country anymore. We can't talk about the war in Vietnam any more. Conversation on these is limited to exchanging the latest casualty figures.

Yet there are probably no matters more important for us to talk about and understand, if we can.

The intellect has always appeared to be the victim of the whim of the emotions. So we act, or react, but we don't often think. That's not meant to be insulting. It's only meant to be a statement of what seems true.

Nothing is more needed now than good, hard thinking about the world we live in and what it shall be. For those of the religious community the topic takes on the dimension of how their religion affects the world around them.

It is surely true that historically the Christian Church and its religious forebears in Judaism have thought deeply about the world's problems. Perhaps their greatest gift to us is the freedom to examine where we are, and where we're going.

Those who speed on the highways are often the ones who hurt money: think that nature has set them apart from the common herd.

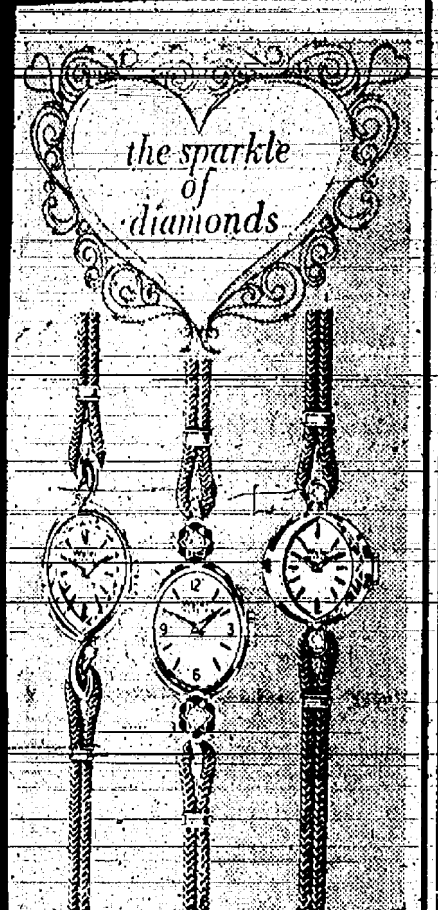

JV Cagers Tied for 2nd in League Race

Chelsea's junior varsity team has stretched its season record to five wins against three losses, and has won five of its last six games. The JV is now 3-2 for conference games and is tied with Saline for second place in the conference.

The team's fourth win of the season was against a strong, pressing Lincoln team, 54-35. Both teams suffered through the first half with cold shooting from the floor, but Chelsea still managed to grab a half-time lead of eight points, 28-20.

Both teams played neck-and-neck in the third quarter, and near the end of that quarter Chelsea had a 10-point lead. But then the Lincoln press started to work, Chelsea saw its lead dwindle to a mere four, but that's as close as Lincoln came.

Chelsea, led by Larry Blackwell, began to roll. Blackwell, both driving and hitting from outside, scored six of Chelsea's next eight points to pull the team out of the fire. Mike Schmidt added four and Roy Holliday two in the rally that shot Chelsea into the lead, 54-35, with only minutes to play. The final score was Chelsea 54, Lincoln 35.

The JV team's fifth win was against Saline. Before the game Saline had only one conference loss and was tied with Dundee for first place. Now Chelsea and Saline share second place, with Dundee alone in first place.

The game with Saline was close all the way. Neither team gained more than a three-point lead until the closing seconds, when Chelsea grabbed its winning six-point margin of 57-51.

Chelsea's defensive play was the key to the ball game as Saline was unable to penetrate the hustling, tenacious Chelsea zone defense. Chelsea also had its hottest shooting night of the season, shooting 40 percent from the floor.

Schmidt, Holliday, and Lance Burghardt did a fine job on the boards, while Blackwell and Poehlisch did an excellent job of hustling the zone "out front." Coach Robert Pursell said, "He added that it was a team effort, both offensively and defensively, that won the game for Chelsea."

In both of the last two Chelsea victories, the Bulldogs have had four men in double figures. In the two games combined, Schmidt collected 31, Burghardt 29, Blackwell 29 and Holliday 24.

This year's class is the sixth to graduate from the Ann Arbor Practical Nurse Education Center. The course is one year in length and consists of both classroom and hospital experience.

Poverty Study Group Panel Cites Low-Cost Housing Need

The third session of a three-week study of "Affluence and Poverty" examined the poverty problems to be faced in the village of Chelsea during a panel discussion Sunday evening.

The series of programs was sponsored by the Missions Commission of the Methodist church. Members of Sunday's panel were Mrs. Louis Ramp of Chelsea Social Service, Major Garrett of the Salvation Army, Gary Meyers of the Chelsea public schools, and G. Tadian of the Juvenile Division of the Washtenaw County Probate Court.

Speaking of the needs of the aged, the ill, and the otherwise underprivileged of the area, Mrs. Ramp suggested that important needs were low cost housing, transportation, day care for pre-school children and recreational facilities, principally for teenage youth.

The most pressing problem, however, was housing, she emphasized. There is just not enough available that is adequate at a price the low-income family can afford to pay, Mrs. Ramp said. Considerable study will be needed, she pointed out, to determine which types of low-cost, low-income housing might be provided in the community.

Major Garrett described the work of the Salvation Army and indicated that much of their work is of an emergency nature for persons and families while the welfare department waiting periods pass. This is usually from three to five days. He also underlined the need for housing in the area.

In response to a question, Major Garrett indicated that the amount spent by the Salvation Army to aid Chelsea area residents was about \$200 in excess of the amount received by the Salvation Army from the Chelsea Community Chest.

Meyers, a counselor at Chelsea Junior High school, reported on some of the aspects of the scholastic and social problems faced by youngsters who come from homes that may be classified as poor. Acceptance of the child or youth as an individual without regard to class distinctions is of primary importance, he said. It becomes important because often these children do not participate in school activities, such as athletics. Health and clothing also represent problems with which the schools have to deal, Meyers added.

Tadian described the workings of the Juvenile Division of the Probate Court and indicated that much of their work has to do with the investigation of neglect and arranging for adequate child care. Of some 830 cases in 1965, approximately four percent were from the Chelsea area. Tadian pointed out a number of related problems and commented on such programs as the Big Brother-Sister movement.

Following a brief question period the 70 people present divided into small groups to consider two questions: What can groups or individuals in the community do to relieve some of the problems described? What is the role of the Church in seeking solutions for community problems related to poverty?

A number of suggestions were reported. They are being compiled and will be sent to the people who were present. The group included members of four of the community's churches: First Methodist, St. Mary's Roman Catholic, First Congregational and St. Paul's United Church of Christ. In addition, representatives were present from the St. Louis school.

A follow-up meeting is scheduled for Feb. 12 at the Methodist church. Reports will be made from a volunteer committee seeking specific courses of action. The chairman of the Sunday panel was the Rev. James A. Craig, pastor of First Methodist. James Hoffmeyer, chairman of the Methodist church's Missions Commission, directed the series.

The allowable truck loadings are as follows:

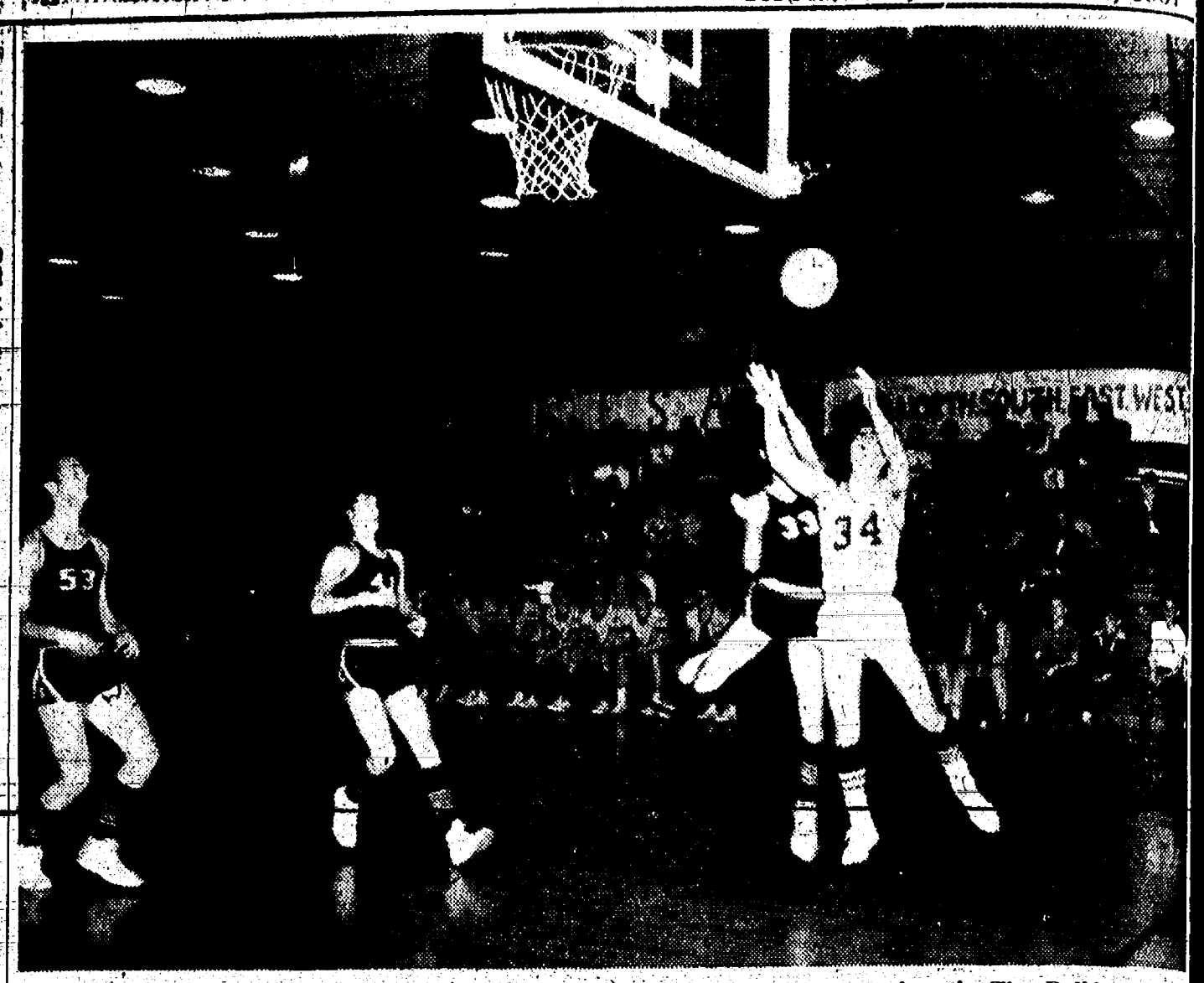

Maximum load on any wheel shall not exceed: (pounds per inch of tire width) 525 pounds 45 pounds

MAXIMUM TRUCK SPEED

No truck, tractor or tractor with trailer, nor any combination of such vehicles with a gross weight loaded or unloaded in excess of 5,000 pounds shall exceed a speed of 45 miles per hour, which shall be reduced to 35 miles per hour during the period when reduced loadings are being enforced.

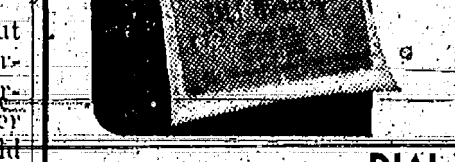
Owing to business pressures, James Tryand, Scio Township supervisor, has submitted his resignation four months before his successor was slated to take office.

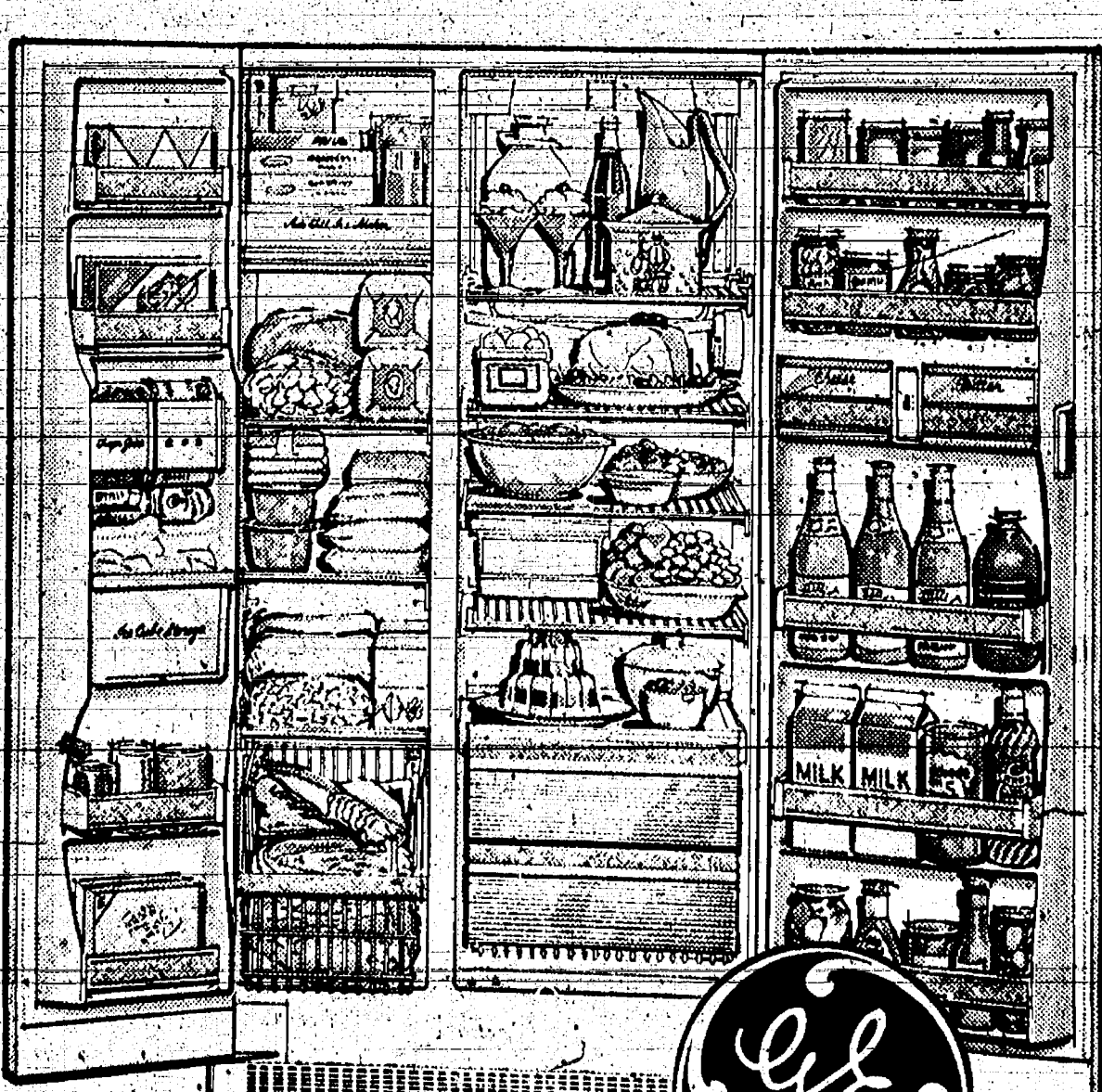
