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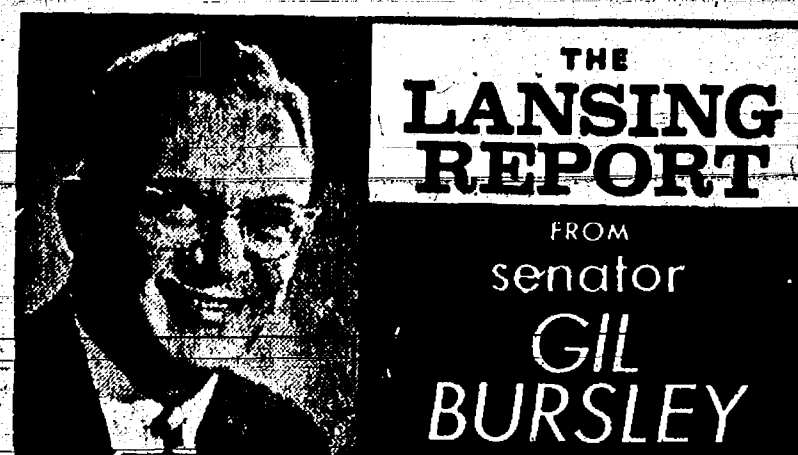

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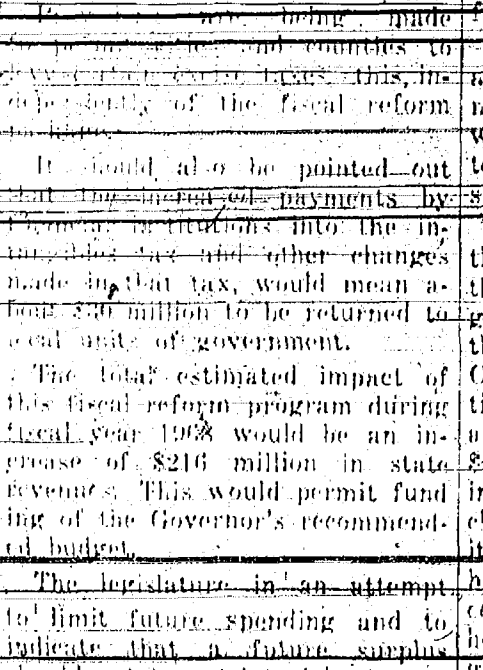

Overshadowed
What's the state Democratic party doing in this "between elections" period when the Republicans are getting jobs of publicity?

Prominence of Gov. George Romney in the national scene naturally makes news for the GOP and a special problem for Zolton Ferry, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee. But the "happy warrior" is not resting on his laurels, however battered they were when he opposed the Governor for that position in the last election. Ferry is hard at work.

Two programs are underway. The first, says Ferry, is to raise enough money to rid ourselves of all financial obligations we have incurred, and some of them date back five or six years.

Secondly, Ferry indicates, he is laying plans for the 1968 election. "We expect to have a fresh approach to a fresh campaign," the chairman said. "We have not made enough use of newspapers and electronic media advertising in the past, and we'd like to correct that next time."

Methods of campaigning, however, changed, stated the Democratic leader. "We noticed that it is increasingly difficult to get people out to our meetings," said Ferry. "We need mass media to get our story to the people." The Democratic leader said that funds are being raised for the campaign.

Better Fishing
Sea lamprey and alewife have plagued Great Lakes fishing but will soon be under control, Lamprey entered Michigan's fishing grounds through the Welland Canal beginning in 1940. In the next 20 years they nearly eliminated the state's vast schools of lake trout.

Other species of fish were affected so drastically that commercial fishing on the Great Lakes was seriously impaired.

The reduction of lake trout and other fish eating predators was another astronomical rise of the alewife, an almost useless fish about the size of a herring. The alewife creates a serious problem in die-offs along beaches, clogged water intakes, and as a depressant to more desirable species of fish.

A lamprey poison was discovered in the late 1950's. Used extensively since then, it now appears that the control of lampreys and the rehabilitation of the lake trout is assured.

Control of the alewife should be accomplished by the introduction of an entirely new sport fish to Michigan's waters. Different species of salmon are raised in government hatcheries and released in the Great Lakes with surprising success. If early results are indications of future achievement, the salmon should find alewife tasty meals upon which to multiply.

Some 850,000 coho smolts (Pacific salmon) were released in three Michigan streams early in 1966. Coho began showing up in commercial nets within three months, first a few and then substantial numbers of fat silvery coho ranging from 12 inches to seven pounds. By September about 2,000 had been caught by Michigan anglers. More coho smolts from Oregon, Washington and Alaska will be planted in Michigan streams this year and next. Up to one million Washington chinook salmon will also be released. If chinook take to Great Lakes living

Zeke Grubb said he was disagreed with the President in this matter, that after the year ended we would have to switch from butter to ollermagerine and start spreading that on mighty thin.

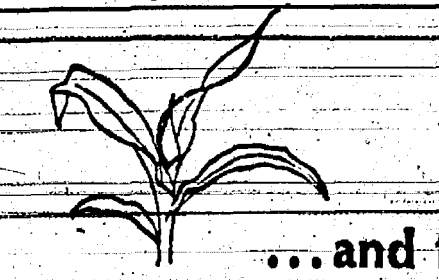

A feminine army, comprising thousands of 14-H club girls in Michigan, and practically all other states, is bringing home the paramount war-time need of making the fullest use of milk and other dairy products to keep rural America in working and fighting trim. The girls are accomplishing this task through public demonstrations which include the preparation of nutritious drinks, custards, cream and cheese pies, milk salads and other dishes utilizing milk and dairy products. They are also demonstrating how to make and handle butter, cheese cottage cheese, and ice cream.

A new space-saving device known as V-Mail is now in operation between U. S. Army units in England, Northern Ireland and the United States. Under this service, letters are first dispatched to a central station where they are censored and then photograph-

ed on small rolls of microfilm. Arriving at their destination, the microfilm rolls are developed, and photostatic copies are sent by regular mail service to the addressee.

What is believed to have been the largest crowd ever assembled to witness a Twilight Ball League game, gathered at Holmes Field Monday evening to take part in

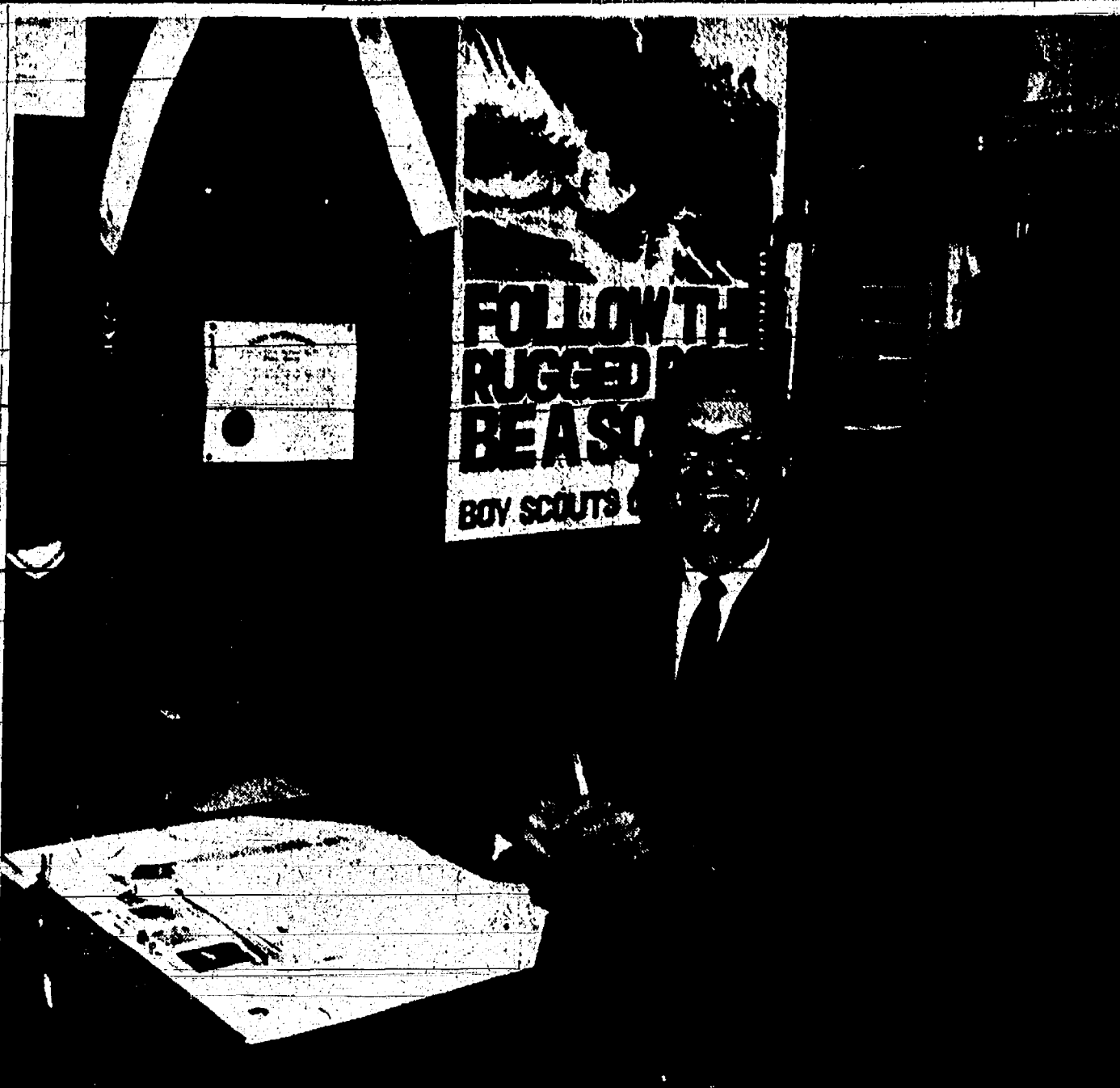

REPORT from LANSING

State Representative

Because of the House failure to move the Income Tax package, I received many calls from people in the educational field to find out exactly what this means.

Let me preface my remarks by noting that anything can change at any time when the legislature meets daily.

The situation now indicates that the House has passed a revenue package which will be sent to the Senate. Almost all units of education and local government are working on their next fiscal year's budgets. Many, including state government itself, must have these budgets in final agreement within 45 days.

Approximately 80 percent of the state budget is distributed to local units. Accepting this and with the knowledge that time is running out on those who must get the budgets approved, I feel that to delay further in anticipation of greater state aid and funding would serve no useful purpose at this time.

Both the Senate and House Appropriations Committees have been given the green light to prepare appropriations bills based on the Governor's original message,

but to be prepared to cut down in the event no additional revenue will be realized beyond 1960 million estimated.

Cold facts say no form income tax is likely to be passed by both houses, signed by the governor, placed in operation. Collections begun on or about July 1, but even this is not a possibility exists that the Senate failed to pass a public version. The House had to pass a companion promise program which would be when the Democrats take delivery votes agreed upon.

Politics is the art of compromise. Until enough votes can be moved to move any income tax measure to the other house in to start the process whereby a revenue committee can write a compromise bill, the state's possible remains. I am taking this vital first step, reserving my final judgment on an income tax bill until I see its ultimate version might.

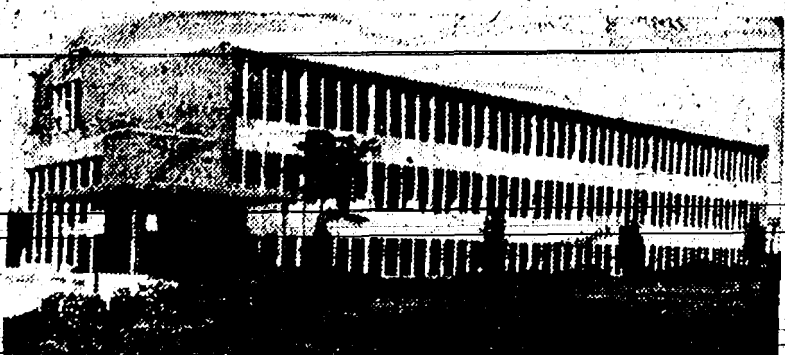

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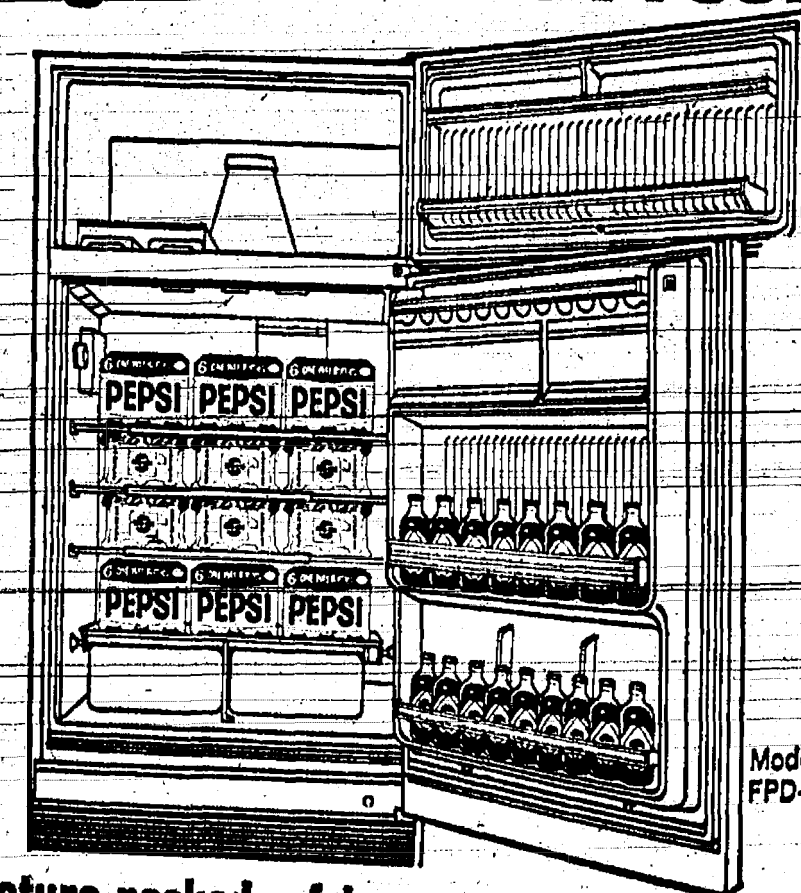
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VFW Auxiliary Installs Officers

Ironside was much impressed, and said: "What a beautiful picture of substitutionary atonement. We too were once orphans. We were not adopted by God because of our sin. However, the lovely Lamb of God took the sting of the 'old serpent' and died upon the Cross for us. Now by receiving Him through faith we are adopted and made ready for Heaven because His righteousness is imputed to our account."

FAIR PLAY

It is not always true, as it has been said, that "nice guys finish last."

Many of the nation's greatest athletes have earned recognition of the public as "nice guys." And, let's face it, if an athlete is good enough to win, and to win often, he should learn how to become a graceful winner.

On the other hand, some never learn to lose. Winning is important to the professional athlete. He has to win to survive. Yet the professional athlete, generally, knows that his success or failure depends upon his personal ability. He does not have to be popular to remain in professional sports. He just has to keep winning.

As one grows older, the need for calories decreases. Yet older people forget this and continue to eat at 45 as they did at 45. As a result they become overweight.

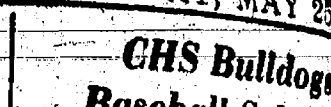
