The party, held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lancaster, 607 Washington St., was a surprise to Miss Feldkamp. It fell on the choir's regular practice night.

Bruce Galbraith, choir director, and choir member Miss D. Ann L'Roy sang duets to entertain choir members and their husbands and wives attending the celebration, and refreshments were served in behalf

of the choir. Galbraith presented Miss Feldkamp with a token gift, an oval charm with the UCC emblem on one side and her name and dates of choir membership (1904-1967) on the reverse side.

Miss Feldkamp was born in Saline and moved to Chelsea in 1902. She joined the choir with several members of her confirmation class immediately after their confirmation in 1904. This was the first choir to sing in the church since a previous one had disbanded several years before. It was formed under the leadership of the Rev. Schoen, minister of St. Paul at that

time. This choir has continued to provide the music for St. Paul services to this day. It had no director for some time, until Paul E. (Jerry) Niemeis assumed the responsibility for many years. Galbraith is the current director.

Miss Feldkamp is the only remaining member of the original choir formed in 1904; she has sung with it nearly every year since then except for occasional breaks during the depression years. 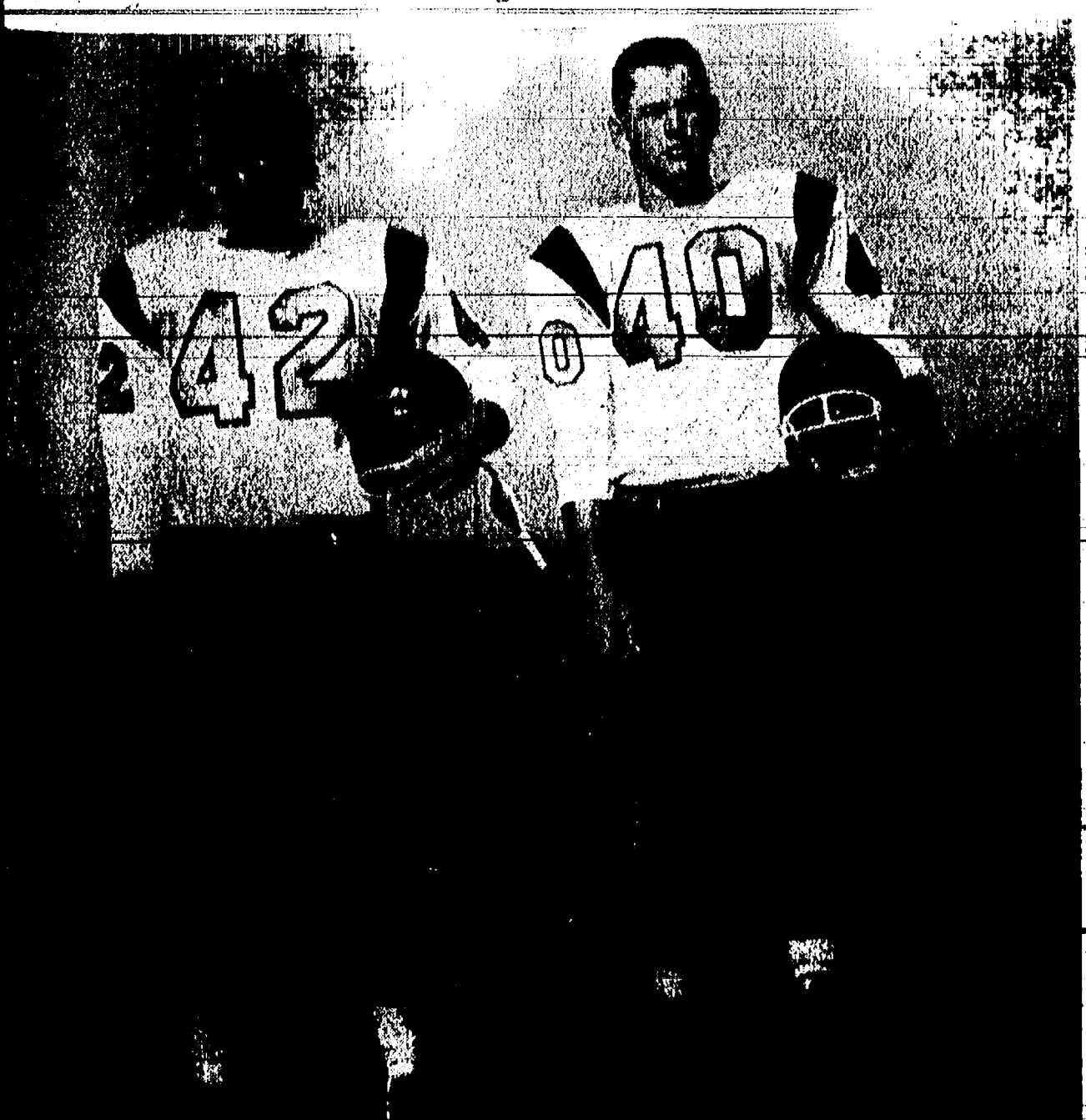

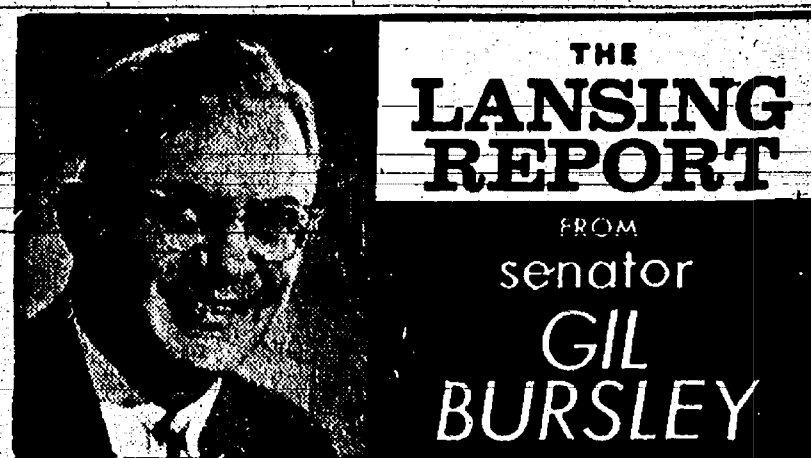
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THE LANSING REPORT

The Michigan legislature is now in the third week of its 1967 special session. All matters thus far placed on the agenda by the Governor have been introduced and are being handled by the various standing committees in both houses have been meeting regularly and some matters have been voted on by either the Senate or the House.

The Senate completed action shortly after the session started on the "Good Roads" package of five bills designed to place more money for state and local roads through a hike in automobile gas and weight taxes. House action on these bills should be taken by the end of this week.

The Senate last week passed a bill transferring state planning functions from the Office of Economic Expansion to the Executive Office of the Governor.

MICHIGAN MIRROR

It Grew!
 These are the ingredients which produced Wayne State University:
 A handful of students, five doctors determined to improve medical instruction, and a building leased from a newly created Harper Hospital.
 In 1868 the school was called the Detroit Medical College. One year after its founding, degrees were awarded to a few students who had previously studied medicine at other institutions.
 One hundred years later Wayne State University has 31,000 students enrolled in degree programs and another 20,000 affiliated through cooperative extension courses and programs.
 Currently there are 376 medical students and 482 students enrolled in medically-related fields in the School of Medicine.
 Incorporated with \$30,000 from contributions of 34 leading Detroit citizens and businesses, WSU's "book value" now exceeds \$95,000,000.
 The institution has undergone five name changes during its 100 year growth. It began as the Detroit College of Medicine. In 1885 the name was changed to the Detroit College of Medicine and Surgery. In 1913 it was renamed the Detroit College of Medicine and Surgery. In 1918 the college became a publicly-controlled medical school and responsibility was assumed by the Detroit Board of Education. In 1933 the college was made a part of the City's university organization known as the Colleges of the City of Detroit.
 The name, Wayne University, was born when the separate city colleges of Law, Pharmacy, Liberal Arts, Education and Medicine were combined into one university named after the Revolutionary War hero General Anthony Wayne.

Where Taxes Go
 Paychecks issued to Michigan workers now reflect the new state income tax and many cause citizens to wonder just where their tax dollars are being spent.
 Latest figures show how Michigan compares with other states. The average Michigan citizen pays \$447 per year for state and local government services. This compares with a \$423 per capita figure across the nation. The per capita tax in Alaska is \$923; in South Carolina it is \$268; in Ohio it is \$306; in New York it is \$530.
 Biggest tax bite is for education. Michigan rates high on the list, spending an average of \$200 per capita for state and local schooling. The U.S. average is \$170. In Ohio, only \$157 is spent for education. In Illinois, the total is \$162. California and New York spend \$219 and \$190 respectively. Some of the less populated states have higher per capita averages, but these totals do not give a significant comparison.
 Highways take the second bite of the tax dollar, but Michigan, with \$53 per person, ranks below the national average of \$65. The national average is raised by large sums spent in sparsely populated states which are just beginning highway programs. Wyoming, for instance, spends \$226 per person on roads, and Arizona spends \$210.
 Despite the unpleasantness of paying taxes and the outlook for more of them, there is some consolation in the fact that Michigan citizens are not taxed at a rate higher than others and invested much of our money is invested in what should be the most productive place possible: education.
 The problem is how to get more value for money expended and how to keep government programs limited to areas where it can be effective for public benefit.

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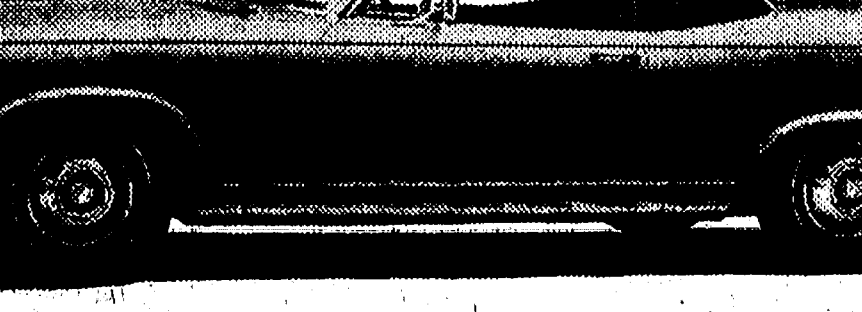

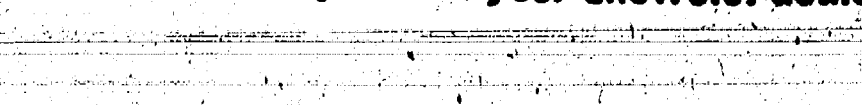

A total of 107 juniors are studying in 18 cities in nine countries of Europe, Africa, Latin America and the Far East. Of the total, 187 began the trip on board T. S. Bremen on Sept. 12 to their campus-away-from-campus where, under Kalamazoo College's foreign study program, they will study for at least six months as an integral part of their undergraduate education.

Ending their transatlantic journey at various European Ports they have gone on to the following study locations: 15 students to Bonn, Germany; 23 to Erlangen, Germany; 23 to Hannover, Germany; 20 to Münster, Germany; 16 to Madrid, Spain; 13 to Segovia, Spain; four to the United Kingdom; 16 to Caen, France; 22 to Strasbourg, France; and 15 to Clermont-Ferrand, France.

Since 1958, Kalamazoo College has sent a total of 1,295 students to 24 cities in 14 foreign countries. More than 90 percent of Kalamazoo's students participate in the foreign study program before graduation. Many of them live with non-English speaking families in their host countries.

General purposes of the program are to acquaint the students in some depth with a different culture and people, and to give them an academic experience which is comparable in quality to the work at Kalamazoo and, at the same time, enriched by the environment in which it takes place.

TODAY'S THOUGHT

Close to half million American servicemen are strapped in the strange conflict in Viet Nam. Many have already made the supreme sacrifice. The rest know they too must be prepared to die suddenly. With the blood-letting over there and the bickering of "do this and don't do that" over here, with the tragedy of torturous human suffering over there and the unprecedented strange behavior over here, isn't it high time more of us think of our servicemen's plight, and let them know we are thinking of them, praying for them?

For example, a family we heard of, has been sending cookies regularly to several men in Viet Nam. They're not relatives, merely acquaintances, not even close friends. Here is a good suggestion if you want to do likewise. Remember the baked goods must travel a long, long route. Wrap each cookie separately and tightly in foil or transparent wrap. Insulate the package on the inside with unsalted, unbuttered pop corn—or puffed cereal. Put the pop corn or puffed cereal on the bottom and top and BETWEEN each row of cookies, preferably in a TIN container to insure against damage. In doing this, the men will receive cookies, not crumbs. Any ex-serviceman who was stationed overseas knows such remembrances are deeply appreciated.
