

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THE LANSING REPORT
FROM senator
GIL BURSLEY

The Michigan legislature is now in the third week of its 1967 session. All matters thus far placed on the agenda by the Governor have been introduced in bill form. Standing committees in both houses have been meeting regularly and some matters have been voted on by either the Senate or the House.

The Senate completed action on the "Good Roads" package of five bills designed to raise state revenues for state and local roads through a hike in automobile gas and weight taxes. House action on these bills should be taken by the end of this week.

The Senate last week passed a bill transferring state planning functions from the Office of Economic Expansion to the Executive Office of the Governor.

In establishing procedures for helping persons displaced from their homes by urban renewal to find new housing,

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

These are the ingredients which produced Wayne State University:

Action on House-initiated bills such as "open occupancy" and lower court reorganization has been slower since these matters have been more controversial. The court reorganization bill, which is the prime reason for the special session, will be a difficult one to pass since a two-thirds vote is required—and since no two lawyers in the legislature seem to be in agreement on all provisions of the bill.

Senators still hope to take action on all matters by Nov. 15 and to adjourn at that time. Personally I very much favor this because we will need several weeks to ready new legislation for the 1968 session, which begins in early January. The House, however, has not yet agreed to any adjournment schedule. I also hope to have time to visit communities and constituents throughout the 18th senatorial district and to be kept aware of needs and concerns of the people.

Currently there are 476 medical students and 482 students enrolled in medically-related fields

and responsibility was assumed by the Detroit Board of Education.

In 1933 the college was made a part of the City's university organization known as the Colleges of the City of Detroit.

The name Wayne University

was born when the separate city

colleges of Law, Pharmacy, Liberal Arts, Education and Medi-

cine were combined into one uni-

versity named after the Revolutionary War hero General Antho-

nny Wayne.

Centennial observances during the 1967-68 school year will be keyed to the theme "The Urban University and Urban Society."

Symposiums, dedications, salutes,

conferences, presentations and

commencement programs will mark the university's 100 years of service to Michigan.

It will be interesting to follow progress during WSU's second century. Growth and accomplishments possible from such humble beginnings in 1868 should give Wayne State University a head start on the next 100 years.

A total of 197 juniors are studying in 18 cities in nine countries of Europe, Africa, Latin America and the Far East. Of the total, 107 began the trip on board T. S. Bremer on Sept. 12 to their campus-away-from-campus where under Kalamazoo College's foreign study program, they will study for at least six months as an integral part of their undergraduate education.

Ending their transatlantic journey at various European ports they have gone on to the following study locations: 15 students to Bonn, Germany; 23 to Erlangen, Germany; 23 to Hannover, Germany; 20 to Muenster, Germany; 16 to Madrid, Spain; 13 to Segovia, Spain; four to the United Kingdom; 16 to Caen, France; 22 to Strasbourg, France; and 16 to Clermont-Ferrand, France.

Since 1958, Kalamazoo College has sent a total of 1,295 students to 24 cities in 14 foreign countries. More than 90 percent of Kalamazoo's students participate in the foreign study program before graduation. Many of them live with non-English speaking families in their host countries.

General purposes of the program are to acquaint the students in some depth with a different culture and people, and to give them an academic experience which is comparable in quality to the work at Kalamazoo and, at the same time, enriched by the environment in which it takes place.

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
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
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**JV Gridders

The Chelsea Junior High football team has run its undefeated string to 12, over a three-season span, by winning its first three games of the 1967 season.

Milan was the first victim on Oct. 4 going down 18-6. David Porath scored twice for Chelsea, including an 85-yard run from scrimmage. Ron Sweeny scored the other touchdown on a 60-yard pass play from Wayne Welton.

In the second game on Oct. 11, Chelsea defeated Leslie, 20-13. Ron Sweeny scored twice on pass plays of 40 and 30 yards, both from quarterback Wayne Welton. David Porath scored the other touchdown on a game-opening run of 60 yards.

Chelsea won its third game in succession over Dundee, on Oct. 18, by the score of 14-0 in a game played in rain and muddy conditions. The game was scoreless until the fourth quarter. Chelsea recovered a fumble on the Dundee 20 and scored when Porath hit Mark Collins with a 10-yard pass. The second touchdown was scored by Porath on a 10-yard run.

The junior high will have played its final game against Saline Wednesday, Oct. 25.
