Chrysler Financial Services had the highest number of employees participating in the annual blood drive at the Chrysler Building in October.

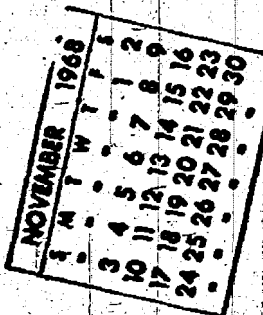
