

Open House, Dedication Slated Sunday By District Court

The Fourteenth Judicial District Court No. 3, 122 S. Main St., Chelsea, will hold an Open House and Dedication Ceremony Sunday, May 3 between 1 and 4 p.m. Dexter American Legion Post No. 657 will present the American Flag to Judge Patrick J. Conlin at 2 p.m. as part of the ceremonies.

The District Court system, unique to Michigan, was established by the State Legislature in 1968 and took effect Jan. 1, 1969, replacing the old justice of the peace system in an effort to provide "greater convenience and justice for the people of Michigan." According to Judge Conlin, it is "a court of limited jurisdiction handling civil complaints up to a \$3,000 limit and criminal cases where a sentence of not more than two years imprisonment can be imposed."

Following establishment of the district court system, the Honorable Patrick J. Conlin, 37, was elected one of the first three judges to preside in the district. Judge Conlin, a graduate of the University of Michigan received the title jurist doctor and was admitted to the Michigan Bar in 1960. He resides at 3595 Daleview Dr., Ann Arbor, with his wife, Anne and their two children, Kelli, 12, and Patrick Jr., 5. His family was among the first Michigan settlers to homestead in Webster township in the early 1840's.

For the first year of its existence, District Court No. 3 occupied quarters in the Council Chambers of the Chelsea Municipal Building, 104 E. Middle St. Then, on Jan. 5, 1970, it moved to its present permanent quarters in the old Chelsea State Bank building. Directors of the Chelsea State Bank presented this building to the District Court for its new facilities.


Erected in 1900 at a cost of \$68,000 by Frank P. Glazier, a local industrialist who is best remembered for his construction of a number of buildings north of the railroad tracks, notably those occupied by The Chelsea Standard, Central Fibre and Rockwell Standard plants, the present court building was in use as a bank since its erection with the exception of a few years when it housed the offices of the Portland Cement Co. under the supervision of Nathan S. Potter. In 1924 it was purchased by the former Farmers and Merchants Bank which merged in 1934 with the

Kempf Commercial and Savings Bank under the name of Chelsea State Bank. The Doric exterior still bears this name carved on the stone slab over the entrance.

Before its conversion to a district court, the old bank building was remodeled at a cost of between \$28-30,000. While the original stone facing and interior hardwood woodwork were retained because of their beauty and as examples of early Michigan architecture, many interior changes were made. Many of the interior marble pillars were covered to lend an atmosphere of warmth to the building and the old bank vault was converted into a security cell. Originally, both the floor and walls had been completely covered with marble.

The Fourteenth District Court No. 3 has jurisdiction in Ann Arbor, Bridgewater, Dexter, Freedom, Lima, Lodi, Lyndon, Manchester, Northfield, Saline, Scio, Sylvan, and Webster townships and Judge Conlin sits on alternate days in Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Saline, and Whitmore Lake to hear cases.

The public is invited to attend the Open House and Dedication ceremony.

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Kindergarten Registration Set for May 12

Registration of pupils, both rural and town, who will enter school for the first time in September of 1970, will be held Tuesday, May 12 at South school between 6:30 and 9 p.m.


At 7:30, there will be a short presentation of comments from the administration, kindergarten teachers, speech correctionist, and school nurse.

It is important that all parents realize that before school opens, the school will need a statement from the family doctor of each entering kindergarten verifying that he or she has been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, and smallpox, has had his or her polio injections, and received a TB test. Forms to be used by the doctors are available at the school and may be picked up at registration.

Since the future kindergartners have been allowed to visit the school already this spring, no activities have been planned for them that evening.

Parents who will find it difficult to attend this meeting, are asked to phone the school before May 12 or as soon after as is possible so that their children may be registered by phone (479-5691). All kindergartners must be registered prior to the opening of school in September if they are to be properly placed in a classroom by that time.

One Dies, Six Hurt in Crash Near Dexter

One death and six personal injuries—two of them serious—were the result of a two-car collision Friday night, April 24, on Dexter-Pinckney Rd., near Wiley Rd., in Dexter township.

Edward R. May, 22, of Detroit, died early Tuesday morning at University Hospital in Ann Arbor of injuries received in the accident.

Mrs. Leonard (Janet) McCalla, 32, of 481 S. Steinbach Rd., Chelsea, and Mrs. Robert (Maryheleen) Schlupe, 47, of 8225 Jackson Rd., Ann Arbor, are listed in serious condition at University Hospital.

Treated at the hospital for injuries received in the accident, but later released were Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Schlupe of 127 W. Summit, Chelsea; Robert Schlupe, of 8225 Jackson Rd., Ann Arbor; and Leonard McCalla, of 481 S. Steinbach Rd., Chelsea.

Sheriff's deputies said that Robert A. Schlupe was apparently traveling south on Dexter-Pinckney Rd., while May was traveling north when the accident occurred.

They said May was trying to pass another car when he lost control of his vehicle and skidded sideways into the path of the Schlupe car.


This gives the team an overall win-loss record of 5-5 and a league record of 4-5.

MICHIGAN MIRROR

Upswing Predicted Persons worried about Michigan's economic outlook this year have received some encouraging words from Gov. William G. Milliken.

The governor told the legislature in a special report that statistics indicate the state will "see gradual economic improvement in the months ahead."

His prediction was based on a report given to him by a special task force he appointed earlier this year to take a look at how the economy is moving.

"The report says that unemployment peaked in February and gradually will level off except during the summer months when graduates and students enter the work force and the automotive industry has model 'change-over,'" he said.

The economic slowdown in the state during the first quarter of the year was not of the magnitude of the early stages of recessions Michigan experienced in 1957-58 and 1960-61.

"Looking ahead, the Task Force said it appears Michigan's economy should improve greatly in 1971 and return to those levels achieved in the 1960's when our state had unparalleled economic growth," the governor reported.

He said "several favorable factors" point to an upswing in the state's economy as well as the national economy in the coming months as more money is fed into the economy.

Among these factors he listed the following: —Increases in social security benefits which went into effect in April and were worth \$4.5 billion annually across the country.

—Removal this coming July of the federal surtax, which is expected to add \$4 billion to take-home paychecks in the coming year as well as meaning \$2 billion more for corporations.

—Increase in July of the federal income tax personal exemption to \$650 per person, adding \$1.5 billion to after tax incomes in the country.

—Increased wages expected to be given postal workers and other federal employees as well as to many workers in private industry.

A somewhat pessimistic note to the report was added by the governor who said some factors could "dampen" the effect of the above named factors by dragging on the economy.

Among those he named were: —A federal cutback of military expenditures and the subsequent

release of thousands of civilian employees into the job market. —The possibility of work stoppages in major industries, such as the auto industry, which could trigger secondary layoffs in supplier industries.

—Reduced business profits which tend to cause managements to launch cost reduction programs that include reduction of employment.

As far as defense cutbacks go, however, Milliken said the state "is in a far better position today than it was following the Korean War."

"Prior to the 1957-58 recession, an estimated 200,000 manufacturing jobs—equivalent to 20 percent of the state's total manufacturing jobs—were eliminated as a result of cutbacks in defense spending at that time.

"Today, an estimated 50,000 Michigan workers are involved in defense work, and much of it is highly technical and research-oriented," he said.

"Most of these jobs will not be affected by a reduction in defense spending during the next year."

In order to keep a continued close watch on the economy in the coming months, Milliken has appointed a special advisory group to meet periodically and report to him.

In his report to me, the special economic task force emphasized that its findings were based on economic data available at this time and that the data continually change," he said.

"Economic indicators, the task force cautioned, could change direction quickly and it urged that a watchful eye should be kept on these indicators in the weeks and months ahead."

But, he said, his general conclusion from the findings was "Michigan's economy retains its basic strengths and the state is being set for a significant increase in economic activity in the months ahead."

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

Safety Rules For Tornadoes Given By CD

Elwyn Beach, Director of Civil Defense in Chelsea has issued the following safety rules for the public regarding tornadoes.

Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado shelter, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS.

In cities or towns, seek shelter in office buildings by going to an interior hallway on a lower floor or basement.

In factories, upon receiving a tornado warning, post a lookout. Workers should move quickly to a section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans.

In homes, the basement usually offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under a sturdy workbench or heavy table if possible. In a home with no basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the lower part of the house. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them. Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to over-turning during a strong wind. Trailer parks should have a community shelter. Appoint a community leader responsible for constant radio monitoring during threatening weather or during watch periods.

In schools, whenever possible go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums or other structures with wide, free-span roofs.

In open country, move away from the tornado's path at right angles to it. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

REMEMBER
TORNADO WATCH—means tornadoes are expected to develop.
TORNADO WARNING—means a tornado has actually been sighted.

KEEP LISTENING
 Your radio and television stations will broadcast the latest tornado advisory information.

**AGRICULTURE
IN ACTION**

★ Let the Sun Shine

There has been a lot of talk about pesticides, and unlike the talk about the weather where nothing is done, a lot of positive action for safety is being taken by the Michigan Department of Agriculture to keep the record straight.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture put tax dollars to work with the creation of the Inter-Agency Pesticide Review Agreement. It gives other governmental agencies the opportunity to evaluate poisons and pesticides before final approval is given these products to enter the public marketplace.

Members of the agreement are real "naturals" concerned with man, his air, land and water. Participants are the Department of Natural Resources, Department of Public Health, and the Water Resources Commission.

Business has been heavy too. During the course of the past year more than 5,000 registrations of poisons and pesticides were reviewed by the MDA, and of this number nearly 700 reviews were instituted by the three participating groups. Encouragingly, 668 of the 700 passed the scrutiny of inter-agency scientists. Thirty-two cases are still being studied.

This checking system maintains the farmers' and general consumers' confidence in the safe pesticides on the public market. The orderly process reinsures the facts. It takes the emotion out of pesticide issues and disrupts suspicions used to the advantage of mongers of scare campaigns. Looking at it another way, facts clear the air, they let the sun shine in.

The "nuts and bolts" of the inter-agency are fastened to the facts. The inter-agency agreement requires a scientist from each agency to act on its behalf with the MDA. Before evaluation, a plan of specific chemical formulation and types of uses must be submitted. Underlined is the requirement that scientific evidence must back up all objections. Objection to a product demands accompanying scientific evidence which is reviewed by the MDA. This department takes the concluding steps, based on all scientific and administrative review. Prior to final decisions, reviews are forwarded to the inter-agencies.

Any differences of evaluation by the agencies and the MDA are usually resolved through consultation with the agencies.

Sergeant Cross, an aircraft loadmaster assigned at Phan Rang, was cited for his outstanding airmanship and courage on successful and important missions completed under hazardous conditions.

He serves with the 310th Tactical Airlift Squadron, a unit of the Pacific Air Forces, headquarters for air operations in Southeast Asia, the Far East and the Pacific area.



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



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Changes Made in Storage Facility Loan Program

Several changes have been made in the Commodity Credit Corporation loan program under which farmers may borrow funds for constructing on-farm storage structures and purchase of drying equipment.

Earl Doletzky, chairman of the Washtenaw County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, said the changes should help expand on-farm storage and drying capability and should permit more orderly marketing and improved returns.

The period of farm production used in determining storage structure needs for loan purposes has been extended to two years compared with one year's production previously used, Mr. Doletzky said.

The changes include an increase in the maximum amount producers may borrow for dryer loans to 85 percent of the net cost up

to \$5,000. This compares with the previous rate of 65 percent up to \$2,500.

The interest rate on the loans has been increased to a 7 1/2 percent annual rate, compared to a previous annual rate of 6 percent. The chairman added also that essential in-storage operating equipment may be included in a loan made for storage and drying equipment.

Changes in the loan program have been made as the result of a review announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture last December, Doletzky said.

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

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

Warrant for Arrest Not Easy to Obtain

It was learned recently that for a society that is as supposedly concerned over marijuana and drug use as ours seems to be, obtaining warrants on individuals possessing or suspected of possessing is no easy matter.

A recent case of the Chelsea Police Department illustrates just how difficult this can be.

A week ago, two individuals were noticed sitting in their parked automobile at a closed gasoline station by Patrolman Leonard E. McDougall at 5:05 a.m. When he approached them on a routine check and asked their business, they replied that they were out of gas and were waiting for the station to open.

A routine check with the LEIN machine led to the discovery of outstanding misdemeanor and traffic warrants on both individuals. They were told they would have to accompany Officer McDougall to the Police Station and were searched routinely.

The search revealed a quantity of material on one of the individuals which Officer McDougall believed to be marijuana, several marijuana pipes, and an assortment of other types of "evidence." Could a warrant be issued for his arrest on a charge of possession? No.

The two individuals had to be released to the police departments holding the outstanding warrants though Officer McDougall also had to warn the one that he suspected him of being in possession of marijuana and if lab tests supported this suspicion, a warrant for his arrest would be obtained. They were then released to the other law enforcement agency where they paid their fine and were set free.

Officer McDougall had to send the confiscated substance to the State Police Crime Lab at Plymouth for analysis. There lab tests revealed that the substance was indeed marijuana. Could a warrant now be issued? No.

Contact with the prosecutor had to be established first. It was, and John C. Hass, Wayne county prosecutor, advised them to first contact the Michigan Board of Pharmacy in Lansing and request an affidavit that the suspect was not licensed to carry marijuana for experimental purposes. This was done and almost a full week elapsed before the document arrived.

Now, the warrant could be issued; however, since a full week had elapsed since the suspect had been released without charge, he was on his honor to appear in court for arraignment.

Why was so much trouble taken before the warrant was issued? In the words of Officer Louis Schneider, "Our primary concern is to safeguard the individual's rights. Our secondary concern is to obtain the warrant."

In the past, not all prosecutors have required the affidavit from the Department of Pharmacy before approving the issuance of a warrant, but in all cases, it must have been obtained before the suspect was arraigned. Now, however, it seems to be policy to obtain the document before issuing the original warrant. When asked to comment on this case, Chief Meranuk stated that "this was an example of excellent police work on the part of Officer Leonard McDougall, who was operating alone."

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
