In one of its most significant actions this year, the House in Washington has passed legislation which makes a major attack on which makes a major attack on the problems of unemployment and underemployment, it was re-ported today by Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Mich). Esch was co-sponsor of the bill ---the Comprehensive Manpower Act. The Sancta passed a similar

Act. The Senate passed a similar version earlier. A committee com posed of House and Sénate mem bers will now attempt to resolve the differences in the two bills. Esch said, "Our bill is one of the most far-reaching pieces of legislation passed by Congress this year. Perhaps its major con tribution is the pulling together into a streamlined package exist-ing manpower training and employment services throughout the country. Second, it makes use of modern computer techniques for job placement."

Major provisions of the bill in clude:

(1) The identification of national pockets of unemployment resulting from plant shutdowns or changing economic conditions, the development of cooperative

#### PUMPKIN CHIFFON PIE (makes 1 pie)

- 1½ cups whipping cream
- 1 package unflavored gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water: 1 can (lb.) pumpkin pie filling
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
