A two-year building program by the state highway department brought the completion last week of a three-lane superhighway on US-12 between Ann Arbor and Jackson. Traffic was opened on 15.9 miles of the highway west from Jackson to ring down the curtain on an improvement pro gram that cost the state and Fed eral governments approximately \$1,473,650. Motorists can now drive over a 31-foot pavement all the way from Jackson to Ann Arbor, with the exception of a five-mile section in the vicinity of Chelsea. There, the highway was unable to proceed with its building program because of right-of-way difficulties.

ARTICLE V, SECTION 5.04

"Lot area is to be reduced from 10 acres to 2 acres excent in those instances where livestock is maintained, which is to be 5 acres and limited to the following: 1 horse, 1 pony, 3 sheep, 25 chickens, or 10 rabbits. All other animals other than dogs and cats are to be excluded. Frontage shall be no less than 200 feet.'

G. "A parcel having a lot area of ten (10) acres or more may be used for public or private recreation . . ." H. "A parcel having a lot area of two (2) acres or more

may be used for a public and private conservation area and . . ." I. "A parcel having a lot area of two (2) acres or more may be used for . . ."

L. "A parcel having a lot area of five (5) acres, but not more than ten (10) acres may be used and a building or structure located thereon, for not more than one (1) horse, one (1) pony, three (3) sheep, twenty-five (25) chickens or ten (10) rabbits. SECTION 5.04-REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS

should be propped about 30 de grees toward the eyes. If the book is flat, the type is fore-shortened, and reading is more

the eyes, Mrs. Fairman says. If the child is writing or drawing, the light should be placed opposite the working hand, so that he isn't working in his own shadow. The light should be about eye levelabout 15 inches above the desk top-and about 15 inches to the of the book.

SAT'S, or Scholastic Aptitude tests, will be administered at Chelsea High school this Saturday, Dec. 5, according to Chelsea High school counselor, George Bergman. According to Bergman, this is the fifth year that Chelsea has been chosen as a testing center for the very important examination commonly known as the "College Boards" exam. This is the only date all year that the test will be given in Chelsea. Approximately 40 students have signed up to take the tests, which will begin promptly at 8:30 a.m. Students are urged to be at the testing station by 8:15 a.m. so that the testing may begin on time. Tests will be administered in the library.

In the afternoon, the Achieve-ment tests of the SAT's will be given. Bergman indicated that these tests are not specifically for college application, but are used generaly to aid placement of a student in the proper classes once admitted to a specific college. Achievement tests are given in the subject areas.

The following week, peting examiniation, the ACT's series of tests will be given. ACT is short for American College Testing. It is given three times a year in Chelsea, in December, February, and April. ACT tests are also a test upon which colleges base acceptance.

Bergman indicated that only two schools within the state of Michigan, Michigan State University, and Eastern Michigan University, will accept either one test or the other as a means of admission. All other colleges ac-cept only one of the tests. Students are urged to check cata-logues of the colleges in which they are interested to decide which examination they should Most take so-called "prestige schools" re-quire the scores from the SAT to be submitted, while of the 28

junior colleges within Michigan, nearly all—with some exceptions —ask for ACT scores. Next SAT tests will be ad-ministered in January. Bergman
