

### "Phaseout Planned"

If the people who run Michigan's Department of Corrections have their way, the state someday will lose the distinction of running the world's largest walled prison.

Already the first phase of a plan which will ultimately result in abandonment of the main prison at the Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson has received a go-ahead from the Michigan Corrections Commission.

This summer the commission approved a \$3.5 million plan to convert three existing cellblocks at Jackson into a separate, medium-security facility. Medium-security facilities are fenced, but don't have the high walls found in the stereotyped prison most everyone sees in his mind when the term "penitentiary" is brought up.

The prison at Jackson was built 40 years ago and the philosophy behind a correctional institution has changed a great deal since then.

Gus Harrison, who ran the Corrections Department before he took over the new state lottery, says a change is necessary because Jackson is "obsolete as an effective correctional institution."

He points out the second largest institution in the country, California's San Quentin prison, also is slated for closing.

"Modern correctional philosophy favors smaller, more manageable institutions where an inmate is known by his name and not his number," Harrison says. "That is virtually impossible in a prison the size of Jackson."

He says a vast remodeling of Jackson "seems impractical, especially in light of the likelihood that the facility may be abandoned in the future years."

The three cellblocks which will be converted under the plan approved this summer, hold about 1,100 of the more than 5,000 inmates found at Jackson. Plans call for reduction of that number to about 600 men when feasible and a closing of the top two tiers of cells.

A population reduction inside the main prison is hoped for with the opening of two new facilities in the next few years—a new medium security institution at Muskegon and a new reception-guidance center near Ypsilanti.

Plans also call for retention of the Trusty division at Jackson. This is already a separate unit within the prison grounds with a population of about 1,300 of the 1,000 total prisoners.

Longer range plans call for construction of an academic-vocational school building first. This is to be followed by construction of an administrative building sometime in 1973-74 and a factory for inmate industries in 1974-75. The type of industry to be housed in the new factory has not yet been determined.

## 4-H Dog Care Program Being Offered

El Perro 4-H Dog Care and Obedience club will be offering a dog care and training program again this year for 4-H club members from 5th grade through 12th grade.

Youths need not have dogs to join the club but should have an interest and desire to learn more about dogs. There will be puppy classes for ages 3 months to 9 months; 9 months to 1 year old; and 1 year and older.

No dog is too old to learn if it has been a pet and taught to learn some of the basic commands, such as, come, sit, down.

The first session will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 14 at the home of Mrs. Bourn, 6146 Dexter-Ann Arbor Rd. Plans for the coming season will be made at this time.

The program will be held all year and will include grooming, health care, handling, obedience training, sportsmanship, field trips, and many interesting things.

Do not bring your dogs to this first meeting, but bring a picture of you and your dog and know if your dog is licensed.

Washtenaw county requires that all dogs be licensed and have had rabies shots, and for the general health of the dog, he should have distemper shots and be free of pests and worms.

## Michigan Farm Products Exports Down in Past Year

Michigan agricultural exports totaled \$106.6 million during the last year, according to B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

"This is \$6.4 million less than the previous year's record figure. The decrease is directly attributable to crippling dock strikes during the year," Ball explained.

According to tabulations by MDA's Marketing division, Michigan ranked 24th nationally in total agricultural exports. The state was second in export of vegetables and vegetable preparations at \$24.3 million, fourth in dairy products at \$6.3 million, seventh in fruit and fruit preparations at \$4.6 million.



# Gridders of the Week



**DAN HOULE** will be missing the excitement and camaraderie of playing football next year. His desire to persevere wildlife will take him north to Michigan's Northwestern University, a school which has neither a football or a hockey team. Dan, who will study conservation there, in hopes of going on to Michigan State, if all goes well, thinks that the biggest problem in conservation is fighting the all-mighty dollar. While studying, Dan is looking forward to meeting new people and seeing new places. In all his years in Chelsea, his travel experience has been limited to a trip through Pennsylvania and part of Canada. A hockey fan, Dan has been unable to take advantage of the program at the rink because of his job at Polly's, but he is thinking of going out for baseball in the spring, something he hasn't done since his freshman year.

**JEFF MARSHALL (44)** is a 5'11" halfback on the Chelsea varsity team this, his junior year. His speed, which was instrumental in his interception of a Milan pass last Friday, also allows him to excel during track season. It was on the track, where he runs the half mile and mile relay, that he experienced his worst moment in sports. In a misunderstanding, reminiscent of the foul-ups at the Olympic games, his relay team was denied second place because they had carried a wooden rather than an aluminum baton. That disappointment, of course, has not dampened his love of sport. He regularly trounces his little brother on the family pool table, and he is an avid follower of USC's progress on the gridiron, ever since it launched O. J. Simpson into the national eye. Another thing about Jeff, he answers to the name George.

# New Park Manager . . .

"In these circumstances, rules are not in question, so the park staff can only hope to convince each side to give a little to the other. Unfortunately, by the time the ranger is called to the scene, the tempers are high.

At times like this, Andrus asks himself how he ever got into park management, but he knows how. His love affair with nature began in his boyhood in the Upper Peninsula. He came south to study forestry at Michigan State University, only to transfer into park management when he realized that his interest in conservation was focused on people enjoying it.

Although he likes to travel, Andrus has stayed with the state park system rather than trying the national program because there is a difference between 200 and 2,000 miles when you are uprooting a family. Andrus also didn't like the threat of being posted in the swamps. "I don't like creepy, crawly things," he admits. Speedy promotion in the state parks is also an advantage. It wasn't long before Andrus became a park manager, a position he likes because it keeps him close to the parks, and to the men on the crews.

Presently, he has little ambition to advance to the more lucrative positions behind desks in Lansing. Such a position called away Glenn Kraai, Andrus' predecessor.

His career started in Weidner State Park near the Straits of Mackinac, but he was soon the assistant director at Rochester-Utida Recreation Area. He held a similar post in 1961 when he joined the Yankee Springs staff. In 1965, less than 10 years after graduation, he was a park manager at Lake Port Park.

Andrus is "still shaking sand out of his shoes from his last assignment at Warren Dunes. "A good place to get killed" is one of his impressions of that park. Its once beautiful sand is now covered with hoards of vacationers, including unruly groups from Chicago, fighting it out for stunning territory.

That area is taxed to capacity, trying to serve in its meager 1,500 acres as many people as

Waterloo does with its 17,000. "When you jam the same number of people into a smaller area, you're going to have tension and potential for a bigger blow-up," Andrus adds, "We had to be very careful there. We never went alone. We needed as many as seven men to cover a campground."

After six years there, Andrus was ready to move on. He was more than satisfied to discover his request for a lateral transfer had led him to this position "at the No. 1 park in the state."

Here he finds new challenges. Although the frequency of personal violence is not so great at Waterloo, Andrus says the opportunity for vandalism is greater. "You can't watch it all." It is also his responsibility to take care of the normal wear and tear on the facilities. "My job is the nuts and bolts of running the park."

Much of what the park manager does is not noticed by campers. His main activity is a matter of preventing occurrences, rather than adding things. For example, Andrus and his men are in the process of relocating some site markers. His change will make sites more accessible to unwieldy trailers. People notice when they hit a tree trying to get settled, but they hardly notice when they don't.

Andrus, who took a complete week just learning the lay of the land in his new area, has been in the office for six weeks. He is grateful that he was able to take over at a relatively quiet time. Spring is often hectic with spirited youths, with minds turned to other things, and of course, summer brings a work load instead of a vacation to park employees.

The fall, however, is quiet, except for hunting incidents. This fall has been especially conducive for getting settled, since the rainy weather has kept all but the dedicated hunters away.

Andrus is especially grateful for the warmth and consideration with which the community has greeted him. "Some communities start making demands before you've got your feet on the ground."

Andrus is not one to barge into a new position and immediately begin changing things. After six weeks, he is still checking out the situation, and listening closely to the rangers and other crew members who have been here a longer time. He has asked permission to install permanent wooden bunks in the camping areas, but other than that, he is waiting "to be sure any changes are for the better." While evaluating, Andrus is not just sitting. Rows of clipboards above his desk reveal organization at work.

Evidently a man that loves his work, Andrus is also a man who loves his play. His favorite toy is a Harley-Davidson 1200 cc. This fully dressed road bike (no "hog" for him) is powerful enough to hold two riders and camping gear.

His wife is often his companion on rides, but now that they have a three-year-old daughter at home, it is more often his 11-year-old son, or his 13-year-old daughter who go with him on the overnight camping trips.

Andrus foresees a pleasant tour of two to six years here, before the travel bug bites him again. In the meantime you'll find him under his clipboards at the Waterloo Area Headquarters on McClure Rd.

## Michigan's Traffic Toll for October Shows Decline

Michigan's traffic death count was 197 for October, which was 12 or six percent less than 229 in the same month last year, according to State Police provisional figures.

The toll was 31 less than the average of 228 for the month in the five years 1967-71. High October count was 248, set in 1968 while the low was 97 in wartime 1944.

October was the fourth month this year to show a reduction compared with the corresponding months last year. Six other months have recorded increases.

The October deaths brought the accumulated toll for 10 months in the state to 1,884, which was 112 or about six percent more than 1,772 in the same period in 1971.

In the remainder of the year Michigan's traffic death counts will be matched against 202 for November and 178 for December last year. The five-year averages (1967-71) for those months are 220 for November and 181 for December.

Michigan's death toll in 1971 was 2,162, sixth worst on record. Delayed death reports will add somewhat to the death counts for October and the accumulated period.

Thomas S. Welsh, Macomb County Drain Commissioner, has served on the Board of Commissioners of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority since March of 1961. He has represented Macomb county since December of 1964 and previously was a Governor Appointee on the HCMA Board. The Authority has nine "Metroparks" in public use.

The Wacker family makes the candles by pouring wax, color, and scent into molds. They not only sell the finished product,

but also the necessary materials so that customers may do the same at home. Even with all the tools, it would be hard to be as prolific as Mrs. Wacker. She has already made 600 to have on hand for the opening this weekend, and plans to finish even more.

Although Lois left Chelsea as a part-time concern for George Wacker, the Standard Oil Agent in Manchester, he is responsible for the lawn ornaments. He mixes the cement and color, and pours the mixture into various molds. The children, Kimberly and Timothy, pitch in, too. "They are a great help in cleaning up," says Lois.

Although Lois left Chelsea when she was married, and her parents moved to Florida a few years back, she has kept in touch with Chelsea happenings. There are relatives from her mother's side, the Protectors, still in Chelsea, as is her husband's uncle, Lawrence Wacker.

The grand opening of The Ornamental Shoppe on the Wacker property at 536 W. Main in Manchester, will be Saturday and Sunday. Lois thinks it all goes well, she'll not only be selling candles and candle makings, but giving classes in the spring.



### Aspirin Bottles

Have you heard those ads that say don't leave your keys in the car because you might be tempting a thief? Jeffrey Flintoft learned the hard way that there might be something to that.

They were picked up at 3 a.m. by Shelby County Sheriff deputies for trying to steal gas out of automobile gas tanks. When Chelsea police were notified, it was discovered that the juveniles had the stolen car.

Parents of the juveniles retrieved them from Ohio. The car, which was not damaged, was driven back to Chelsea by Mrs. Luella Flintoft.

Lopez, turned out to be Mrs. Lopez's estranged husband. The couple is in the process of getting a divorce, and Mrs. Lopez says he has been threatening her. Lopez, who was in a very emotional state, maintains that he merely wanted to speak to his wife about getting back together.

Lopez was charged with felonious assault and arraigned at 2 p.m. the same day before visiting Judge from Wayne, Judge Seiler. The judge entered a mute plea for the accused, set the examination date for Wednesday, and placed the bond at \$75,000.

The judge called for the unusually high bond because Lopez is already out on bond for carrying a concealed weapon in Ann Arbor in early October.

Lopez was unable to make his examination date yesterday because he had suffered what appeared to be a heart attack at Friday, while being detained at Washtenaw County Jail. He was transferred to University of Michigan Hospital, where, as a prisoner, he is receiving treatment for stroke symptoms.

When Chief Meranuck speaks of the tragic potential, he is referring not only to Mrs. Lopez' close call. After Lopez leaped from his car to pursue his wife, the car continued to move, rolling across the children's crosswalk, which could have been full of young students at that time in the morning. There were many children around, but luckily the car came to rest in the vacant lot at the end of the street without harming any of them.

As Chief Meranuck was talking on Monday with the patrol boys who had witnessed the scene on Friday, another potential tragedy surfaced. Michael Muck, a seven-year-old with exceptionally good sense, came into the school office with a .25 caliber pistol he had just found in the rest room. It had been jammed into one of the holes in the wall which house shut-off valves.

The gun was loaded with seven bullets, but Michael had removed the pin clip before anyone was hurt.

Meranuck believes there may be a connection between the discovery Monday and the scene on Friday. As the investigation continues, he is grateful no one has been hurt.

## Death of Pinckney Boy Believed To Be Accidental

The death of a three-year-old Pinckney boy five weeks ago is now believed to have resulted from an accidental shot fired by the boy himself.

Thomas Kizer, Jr., Livingston county prosecutor, said the investigation of the death of Mark A. Waters, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Waters of 428 Hamburg St., determined the boy was not shot in the back as originally thought.

Kizer said the boy died instantly in the bedroom of the home of State Tpr. Robert Schutt. Schutt, who is assigned to the Brighton post, was with his wife visiting neighbors at the time of the shooting.

The prosecutor said Schutt had changed clothing when he came to his home at 414 Hamburg St., and laid his loaded gun on the dresser.

One matter which puzzled investigators was finding the gun 10 feet from the boy's body in what Kizer described as a "wastebasket area." Police theorized the gun must have bounced away when it fell to the floor, Kizer said.

This led investigators to believe at first that a playmate might have been with the boy. Kizer said other children were questioned but no determination was made that any were with the victim.
