## Dr. Gorton Riethmiller Heads State Board of Education

The recent election of Dr. Gorton Riethmiller to the presidency of the State Board of Education may herald a new season of co-operation, or at least, balance for that often dissent-ridden body.

Riethmiller, a Chelsea resident and the sole independent on the board, will be flanked by a republican vice-president, James F. O'Neill of Livonia, and a Democratic secretary, Dr. Edward J. Deeb of Mt. Clemens.

For treasurer, the board gave some representation both to women and new board members by selecting Mrs. Barbara A. Dumochel, a Republican from Grosse Ile.

Riethmiller, 65, was appointed to the board in 1967 to fill out the term of Dr. Leroy Augenstein, a Republican board member who died in an airplane crash. A native of Waterloo, Riethmiller now makes his home on a centennial farm near Chelsea.

Riethmiller was president of Olivet College from 1957 to 1970. Up until that time, he had served in Highland Park schools in various teaching and administrative positions.

The former board president, Dr. Edwin L. Novak of Flint, did not seek re-election when his term expired Dec. 31.

## Regional Planners Hear Report on State Land Use Report

Members representing the Village of Chelsea, Lima, Sylvan, and Waterloo townships, and the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission gathered at the Jan. 11 meeting of the Chelsea Area Regional Planning Committee. A quorum was not present.

After Robert Schaeffer was introduced as the new representative from the Village of Chelsea, Alan Dines of Lima township explained the current status of the Mill Creek project. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has reviewed the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority's latest proposal which includes minor changes in the environmental impact statement. Lima township has requested the Huron River Watershed Council to review these changes. DNR has sent the proposal to a "clearing house."

Don Pennington, of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, introduced Mrs. Antill who discussed the Governor's Commission Report on Land Use. She suggested that the report mentions three proposals relevant to the Chelsea area.

The first is the substitute House Bill No. 6256 which would provide for state action in regulating land use. It would create a State Land Planning Commission and State Land Planning Agency. It would also introduce current use assessment on open space.

She concluded that some of the wording in the bill is vague, so it is difficult to determine its possible impact.

The second proposal is designed to clarify the roles and duties of various levels of government as they relate to land use planning. The bill would give the power of planning to counties, cities, and villages. Cities, villages, and townships would be responsible for implementing the plans through zoning.

A hierarchy would be established in which the local legislative body would be responsible to regional offices, and the regions to the state.

Mrs. Antill mentioned the third proposal only briefly. Its emphasis is two-fold: geographical coordination, and functional coordination of public policy making. Administrative planning and budget planning are the primary concerns. In this plan, Washtenaw would be placed in Region No. 1 of 13 regions, and it was feared the SEMCOG would be the dominant force.

Another item on the agenda was a report by James Liebeck on the meeting sponsored by the Township Association in Grand Rapids. Liebeck stated that considerable time was devoted to zoning and planning.

## Amateur Crook Passes Altered Dollar Bills

A very "unprofessional" crook succeeded in duping two Chelsea businesses last Friday with altered dollar bills. Polly's supermarket and the Chaker gas station each accepted a \$1 bill doctored to look like a 20.

The criminal, who is now being sought by the Federal Treasury Department, had replaced the snipped corners of a \$1 bill with those of a \$20 bill. Thus the body of a one was passed off as a 20.

The appeal of this trick, which is a federal offense, is that the mutilated 20, corners missing, can be exchanged at a bank for a fresh bill.

Officer McDougall, who responded to Polly's call Friday, was astounded at the poor workmanship involved in the job. "I've seen some altered bills that are done perfectly," he said, "But this one! Some of the corners are taped upside down."

Polly's manager, Richard Sutherland, believes the bill must have been passed during rush hour when the cashier was too busy to notice the evidently altered bill.

The attendant at the gas station did not notice the strange bill when it was passed, but he does have a suspicion as to who passed it to him.

## Binet Hall Fund Hits \$1,076

The Binet Hall Fund, organized by Chelsea women to improve the living conditions in one dormitory at Plymouth State Home, has amassed \$1,076.90 since it began its drive in December.

A large portion of that sum came from a Christmas time bake sale. To that success was added donations from the Jaycees, the Kiwanis Club, and the Modern Mothers Child Study Club. Mrs. Earl Heller, a Fund board member, reports that several individuals also contributed generously to the cause.

The canisters in Chelsea' busi-

nesses have provided another source of revenue for the Fund. More than \$35 was collected that way. The containers were picked up from the downtown area Monday. That part of the campaign has come to a close.

Although the fund has not arrived at its official goal, \$5,000, it has collected enough to begin

work. The Kiwanis Club in Plymouth has begun constructing the partitions that will break up the large rooms of Binet Hall into cozy living areas.

Presently, the Binet Hall Fund women are looking for a television for the hall. "Many of the children don't have families," says Mrs. Heller. "When there are no visitors, a television is a good way to occupy them."

The next money raising activity planned by the group will be a euchre party at Lima Community Hall. Tickets will be available around town. They may also be purchased from Binet Hall Board members, and at the door, Feb. 10, the day of the games.

"We have lots of ideas for other projects, but just haven't the time to organize them all ourselves," says Mrs. Heller. She is eager to pass along the ideas to area clubs who are willing to sponsor an activity for the Fund. The Chelsea Kinder Klub is doing just that Jan. 23, when they hold a "white elephant" sale at Sylvan Town Hall.

## Floyd D. Rowe Dies Sunday at Medical Center

Floyd D. Rowe, 73, a life-long resident of the Chelsea area, died Sunday, Jan. 14, at the Chelsea Medical Center, after an extended illness. His home was at 18331 Bush Rd., Sylvan township.

Mr. Rowe had operated a plumbing, heating and well-drilling firm in Chelsea for many years, retiring in 1969. In more recent years, his son, Duane Rowe, was a partner with his father.

Born on April 17, 1899, in Lyndon township, he was a son of Clarence and Clara Croman Rowe. He was married to Selma Benter on April 17, 1920. She survives. Mr. Rowe served in the U. S. Army during World War I.

He was a member of Waterloo United Methodist church, and of Herbert J. McKune Post No. 31 of the American Legion. He served as master of Olive Lodge No. 156, F&AM in 1926 and 1927, and was a 50-year Life Member of that organization. He was also a member of Olive Chapter No. 140, Royal Arch Masons. He was an honorary member of the Michigan Well Drillers Association.

Surviving, in addition to his widow, is a son, Duane Rowe of Chelsea, a daughter, Mrs. Walter (Madelyn) Bury of North Lake, 10 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by two sisters and a brother.

Masonic memorial services were held at 8 p.m., Monday, Jan. 15, at the Burghardt Funeral Home, where services were held at 1 p.m. on Wednesday. The Rev. Altha Barnes officiated. Military graveside rites were performed by Herbert J. McKune Post No. 31 of the American Legion, followed by burial in Mt. Hope Cemetery, Waterloo.

## Teachers OK Vote To Strike Monday

Chelsea school teachers voted overwhelmingly Wednesday evening to go on strike at 8:15 Monday morning unless the School Board changes its position.

Action by the 118-member CEA was taken at a meeting at the UAW Hall, called for 7:30 p.m. Wednesday.

With more than 90 percent of the membership attending the meeting, a vote calling for the strike action was announced at 11:30 p.m., with a majority of more than 3-to-1 in favor of the action, according to DiAnn L'Roy, CEA president.

"Teachers feel frustrated and can see no other solution," said Miss L'Roy, "after the Board's rejection of the Fact Finder's recommendations." (See accompanying story.)

School Board President William Storey declined to make any further comment until the Board has an opportunity to meet and discuss the threatened strike.

## School Board Rejects Fact Finder Report

Hope that an impartial third party could reconcile the estranged parties in the Chelsea teacher contract dispute evaporated Monday night during the Chelsea Board of Education meeting. The board passed a motion to receive the fact finder's report, and file it.

In a prepared statement for the press, the board stated "it sees nothing in that report to change its last position, and that its negotiators are instructed to meet and negotiate with the CEA as required by law."

The flat refusal to act upon the recommendations of the fact finder undercut the hopeful mood prevailing in the teacher's camp, Monday afternoon. At that time, the Chelsea Education Association voted unanimously "to accept the fact finder's report in its entirety as a basis for a contract settlement."

CEA support of the fact finder's decision was predicted long before the report materialized. The CEA, having requested fact finding procedures, was disposed to accept its rulings all along.

The board, on the other hand, consistently guarded its prerogative to "wait and see." When asked (Continued on page three)

## Man Nabbed During Theft At Heydlauff's

Officers Gerald Shaw and Jack Dettling came upon a heist-in-progress Saturday morning, at Heydlauff's store. The suspect was quickly apprehended.

The patrolmen were on their routine patrol of the business district, at 1:15 a.m., when they allegedly spotted a man coming out of Heydlauff's back entrance. The man reportedly attempted to hide behind a truck, but surrendered shortly thereafter to the patrolmen's drawn guns.

Shaw and Dettling thought they saw another figure duck back into the building so they called the County Sheriff's Department for reinforcements. Two county cars responded to the call, and deputies helped conduct a search through the premises. No one was found.

The suspect, Donald Ecie, 24, was later transported to county jail by sheriff's deputies. He is said to have lived at the Sylvan Hotel for the week before the robbery. His permanent address is not known.

Police officers found three tape players, a portable radio, a small portable television and a large tape case piled on the flat truck, parked at Heydlauff's loading dock. Several boxes containing approximately 240 tapes worth \$1,000 alone, were also on the truck. (Continued on page three)

The fee for rabies vaccination at the clinics will remain at \$3 per animal as has been charged in the past. The certificate the owner will receive will be good for two years from the date of vaccination and will entitle the owner to get his dog's license upon presentation to the township or county treasurer. Licenses may also be obtained from the Ypsilanti City Treasurer or the Ann Arbor City Clerk.

"Township officials will, in most cases, be present at these public clinics for convenience to dog owners to get their dog's license," added Dr. Bowler.

Proceeds received above the actual cost of the clinic will be donated to the local humane society. Dog owners are urged to check the last rabies vaccination certificates for their dogs and if they expire this year get them revaccinated.

### Milliken Leads

Gov. William G. Milliken is definitely shedding the image handed him when he took office of a "Nice guy who can't get things done."

The "nice guy" part is still intact, but his successes with the legislature last year have shown he can get things done through persistent effort. His chief victory, after many hassles, was the transportation package and its controversial provision for using one-half cent of the gasoline tax for mass transit development.

The package was written off as dead more than once during its trip through the legislature, but in the end it passed.

It was a crucial test for Milliken. All the way through the legislature it was identified as his baby. He backed their proposals like no-fault insurance and an increase in the bonding capacity of the State Housing Authority. But neither was so difficult to pass nor so closely identified with him.

It will be interesting to see how he fares in the new legislative session. Observers feel he may have hurt himself a little bit with the lawmakers, though helping himself with the voters, in vetoing the pension increase for retired legislators.

If he can squeeze the transportation package through, he ought to be able to show more strength in the future.

### It Still Hurts

Though their tax load may be heavy, Michigan residents would find it even more expensive to live in some other states around the country, according to figures put together by Commerce Clearing House in Chicago.

Michigan's state and local governmental units collected a total of \$491 on the average from every man, woman and child in the state during fiscal 1971. That put it in 14th place, just behind Vermont (\$495) and just ahead of Washington (\$487).

The leader is New York state, where people paid an average of \$689. But size alone is not a determining factor. Hawaii is second, collecting \$614.

At the bottom are southern states with Arkansas last at \$269 per person, Alabama next to last at \$276 per person, and South Carolina also squandering under the \$300 mark at \$298.

Michigan's collections rose \$35 per person over fiscal 1970, just a little more than the national average increase of \$33.

Its average collection was \$31 per person over the national average of \$460.

Ten states saw state and local governments collecting more than \$500 per person.

ed last November what he thought of the fact finding procedures, Charles Cameron, chief negotiator, said, "We'll wait to see what the report says."

DiAnn L'Roy, CEA president, said of the document, "Of course, there were some parts we liked better than others, but we felt Coyle made fair and equitable conclusions, considered as a whole."

She explained that the association had decided it was not in the spirit of the fact finding arrangement to bicker about separate issues within the report. "To pick it apart negates the spirit of the idea," she said.

Upon hearing of the Board's decision, the CEA scheduled a meeting for 7:30 Wednesday night, at the UAW Hall. Miss L'Roy told The Chelsea Standard before the meeting, "We feel it is serious and unfortunate that the board has chosen to ignore the fact finder's report."

She stressed that the fact finder was not attempting to please either side. "He thought that both the teachers and the board should be responsible to the community, and he gave his recommendations in hopes of bringing about a fair settlement."

"We feel the board should be accountable to someone," she concluded.

Miss L'Roy suggested there was a "good possibility of a strike vote" at the Wednesday night meeting.

The Old Testament cites many cases of cruelties, stonings, scourges, slaying by the sword — and all for nought. And in the New Testament consider the cases of the twelve disciples. Only John died of old age, Peter was crucified, head downward. Andrew and Simon were crucified too. James, the young brother of the Savior was beaten to death with a club. Bartholomew was flayed alive. James, the elder son of Zebedee was beheaded. Thomas the doubter, was killed with a lance. Philip was hanged. Matthew was slain by sword. Thaddeus was shot to death with arrows.

In martyrdom they suffered pitiful deaths. Through the ages, such deaths have proved that the God of right is ever more powerful than naked might, atomic bombs, armies or weapons... 

## Local Baby Featured in Book on Infant Education

Lincoln James Lauhon is featured in a new book on early infancy education. He is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Lauhon of 58 Cavanaugh Lake, and Mr. and Mrs. Charles S. Cameron, 615 N. Freer Rd. Lincoln Lauhon's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward B. Lauhon, 2003 Anderson, Ann Arbor, were involved in the research from which the book was developed. Photographs of Lincoln appear in the book.

The book, "If You Only Knew What Your Baby Is Thinking," was published this month by Panamedia, Inc., Box 242, Burlingame, Calif. 94010. The price is \$3.95.

The book is unusual in that it is written in the first person. The experiences of the child are described from the baby's point of view. The book explains the non-verbal means by which a child attempts to communicate with parents and relate to the world.

"If You Only Knew What Your Baby Is Thinking" is based upon the premise that the first years of life are crucial to a child's development. During the first year, the infant child begins the life-long process of learning. Instead of a haphazard approach to the learning opportunities of the first year, the book guides parents to recognize and utilize these opportunities.

The basis of this unique book is years of research in early infancy education conducted by the Character Research Project of Union College, Schenectady, N. Y.

From this research, a carefully designed learning system for positive personality development was created. This learning system helps parents to better observe and more effectively guide their own child.

Through this simple learning system, parents begin to understand the language of infancy—their baby's own language.

The front section of the book gives visual and conceptual cues that will help the parents see and recognize their child's development. The second section of the book is devoted to observation and recording of the baby's growth and development. This section directs the parents' attention to their own child. By guiding parents to observe and record their child's

behavior, parents learn to understand their own child and are able to appreciate what their child is thinking and learning. As a result of this understanding, parents become more effective guides of the growth and development of their baby.





## 10-Year-Old Nabbed for Burglarizing

A 10-year-old Chelsea boy has been petitioned to Juvenile Court for burglarizing the home of Zita Hafner, 77, of Middle St. The dwelling was entered on Jan. 2, 3, 4, and 9.

Mrs. Hafner first suspected someone had been entering her home, while she was away at morning mass, when she found money missing on two consecutive days, Jan. 2, and 3.

She began locking her doors, a habit she had never acquired, after first losing a \$1 bill, and then a \$10 bill. Nevertheless, an assortment of items, such as partly filled boxes of prunes and raisins, two linen towels, and Christmas bows and cards, continued to disappear. She concluded the thief was coming through the kitchen window.

When Mrs. Hafner reported the missing articles to the police Jan. 10, she also offered a suspect, according to police records. She reportedly had suspicions about a small boy she had seen around her place. She recalled that he had come to her door twice during the hours she was usually at church.

Acting on this lead, Chief George Meranuck spent two mornings waiting in the dark of Mrs. Hafner's home. On the second morning, he reported seeing the small boy peering into the window and looking around the house, as if to determine whether anyone was.

The child allegedly waited outside the house for 10 minutes without knocking or ringing. Finally, he went to the back of the house where the police chief apprehended him.

The child's parents were notified, and they joined him at the station. Police files state that the child admitted to the crime. His father has paid \$11 restitution to Mrs. Hafner.

The case has been submitted to Juvenile court.
